Water Assured For Cemetery

Irrigation water to beautify and improve East Mound Cemetery has been assured. A meeting of the East Mound Cemetery Association held last week in the Commissioners Court room here ratified a plan to bring a 2-inch galvanized pipe line from the city water system to the cemetery.

Cost of the project will be in the neighborhood of \$1600 including risers at various locations in the cemetery, the pipe and installation.

A drive to raise the necessary funds has been started and form letters are being mailed to members in the association, appealing for contributions to aid the waterline fund. Especial appeal is made to non-resident members who are interested in East Mound Cemetery.

The water system will be of entirely new materials and will be installed to provide a maximum of coverage at the cemetery.

Winter Delivers a Low Mercury Blow

OLD MAN WINTER stepped here by rain and mist which later changed to sleet and snow. The moisture content here was 07-inch, but glazed streets and only 33 degrees and the mercury had dropped to 27 by 5 p.m., Mr. Killingsworth said.

No accidents had been reported in the county to last night but numerous accidents resulting from the storm were reported over the Panhandle.

Amarillo Weather Bureau was expecting near zero mercury reading Wednesday night, which would probably produce 8 to 10 degrees here.

The severe storm caused some schools on the Plains to close. Except for frozen pipes and car radiators, no damage was reported in this area.

Some warmer weather is expected to follow today but another storm is being observed in the Pacific Northwest, which may again lower temperatures by the week end.

County Approves New Crop Quotas

Motley followed other counties in the High Plains area Tuesday in approving the 1964 marketing quotas by a margin of almost 85%.

A total of 9,991 votes were cast in the 23-county area, according to the Lubbock Avalanche. Total vote showed 8,478 for quotas and 1,513 against.

Motley County voted a total of 166, with 154 for and 12 against, with over 92% favoring quotas.

County Pioneer is Claimed by Death

Rites Sunday for Mrs. J. M. Jackson

A PIONEER who came to this county when it was a primitive frontier is dead. Mrs. J. M. "Mom" Jackson died Friday evening in Quanh Memorial Hospital. She was 84. Her life was a sermon in service and kindness from the the 14 years when she was mistress of the Matador Ranch headquarters while her husband, the late J. M. Jackson was manager, until she was stricken by illness.

Mrs. Jackson administered to ill and injured cowboys and was affectionately known as "Mom" to scores. She came to the area when kerosene was fuel for lanterns and lamps, and lived to see it propel jet

Use of this stamp insures first-class mail treatment — meaning the card may contain personal messages and may be forwarded or returned free of extra charge.

Born in Tennessee
The former Annie Whitaker was born May 14, 1879 in Flatwood, Tenn., and moved with her family to Fannin County, Texas in 1886. The family moved to Dickens County about 1889 and lived in a dugout on Croton Flat.

One winter a few years later, the Matador Ranch sent several cowboys to the Croton "brakes" to look for cattle. Mrs. Whitaker had an old organ and invited the cowboys to join the family for singing. It was here that Annie Whitaker met one of the cowboys, John Morgan Jackson.

They were married March 29, 1896 in a small one-room combined church and school house at Afton, by the light of coal-oil lamps.

The Jackson family moved to the Matador Ranch headquarters in 1909 when Mr. Jackson was made manager of the ranch empire. It was during this period that Mrs. Jackson cared not only for her own family but for the extra cowboys who were sent

Soil Conservation Active in County

Conservation is on the move in Motley County. Due to the early harvesting of crops the installation of structural conservation measures have increased. Terraces, ponds, diversions and underground pipeline are among the many practices being instal-

led. Wade Martin, Furman Vinson, Frank Eiring, Claude Harp, Edith Vicker, Tom Edwards and Stuart Dixon are land owners who have either installed or are thinking of installing standard terraces. Earl Thompson, Jim White and Gus Bird have plans for stock ponds. J. W. Pritchett, along with others, have plans for underground irrigation pipeline. The brush control season for

the most part is over for this year with several thousand acres being applied. Deferred grazing along with proper range use was carried out with the brush control. Our local rangeland is in very good condition this time of the year due to good management and the applied conservation.

Emergency tillage, stubble mulching, cover crops and crop rotation are practices to be applied between now and spring to carry out a complete conservation treatment of our soils.

The above practices, incorporated into a sound conservation plan, are the goals of the Upper Pease Conservation District. The progressive ideas and actions of local land owners will keep conservation moving forward in Motley County.



Overplanting Wheat Can Affect Future

College Station — Overplanting wheat allotments this year can reduce a farm's future allotments, according to R. J. Mearns, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This effect on a farm's wheat history is one of several factors which farmers will want to consider in planning their 1964 crop operations.

Mearns calls attention to a provision of the law passed in 1958 which can affect a farm's wheat acreage history. It directs that when no marketing quotas are in effect, farms exceeding allotments will receive that year's allotted acres as history for future allotments. Complying farms receive their base acreage as history, he says.

Overplanting for the 1964 wheat crop will not affect the 1965 allotment since national and state 1964 wheat acreage figures will not be available when allotments are determined.
