County is Approved for Federal Project

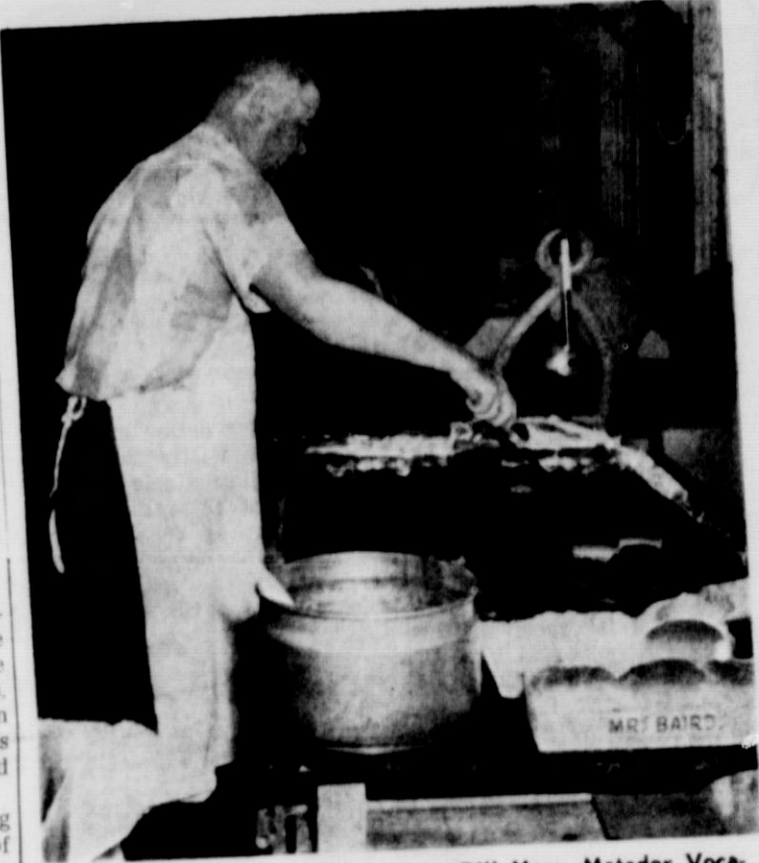
A CHOICE position in the beautiful lap of Nature may thrust Motley County as a recreation Mecca for crowded urban areas.

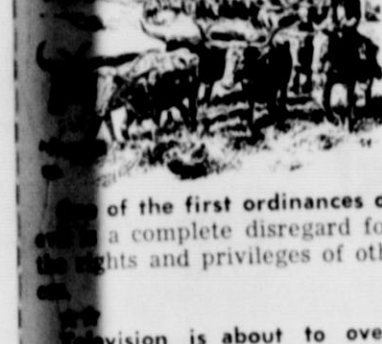

Friday is Final Day On Wheat Program

Motley County wheat producers who wish to participate in the program must sign an agreement at the County ASC Office before the close of the day, May 15.

This agreement must be signed if the producer is to be eligible for diverted acreage payment and is to qualify for marketing certificates. If the producer wishes to divert more than the minimum acreage, the wheat must be destroyed by May 1.

Motley County acreage support price is \$1.27 per bushel, and all who planted within their allotment are eligible for this support. In addition, those who participate in the wheat program will be issued certificates with a face value of 70 cents but export certificates with a value of 25 cents but.



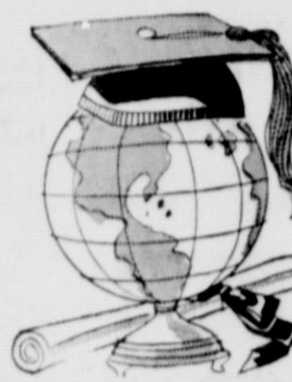
During intermission, Alvia Joe received a school trophy and silver lapel pin. His sister received a bronze plaque and gold lapel pin. She missed the word super-sede.

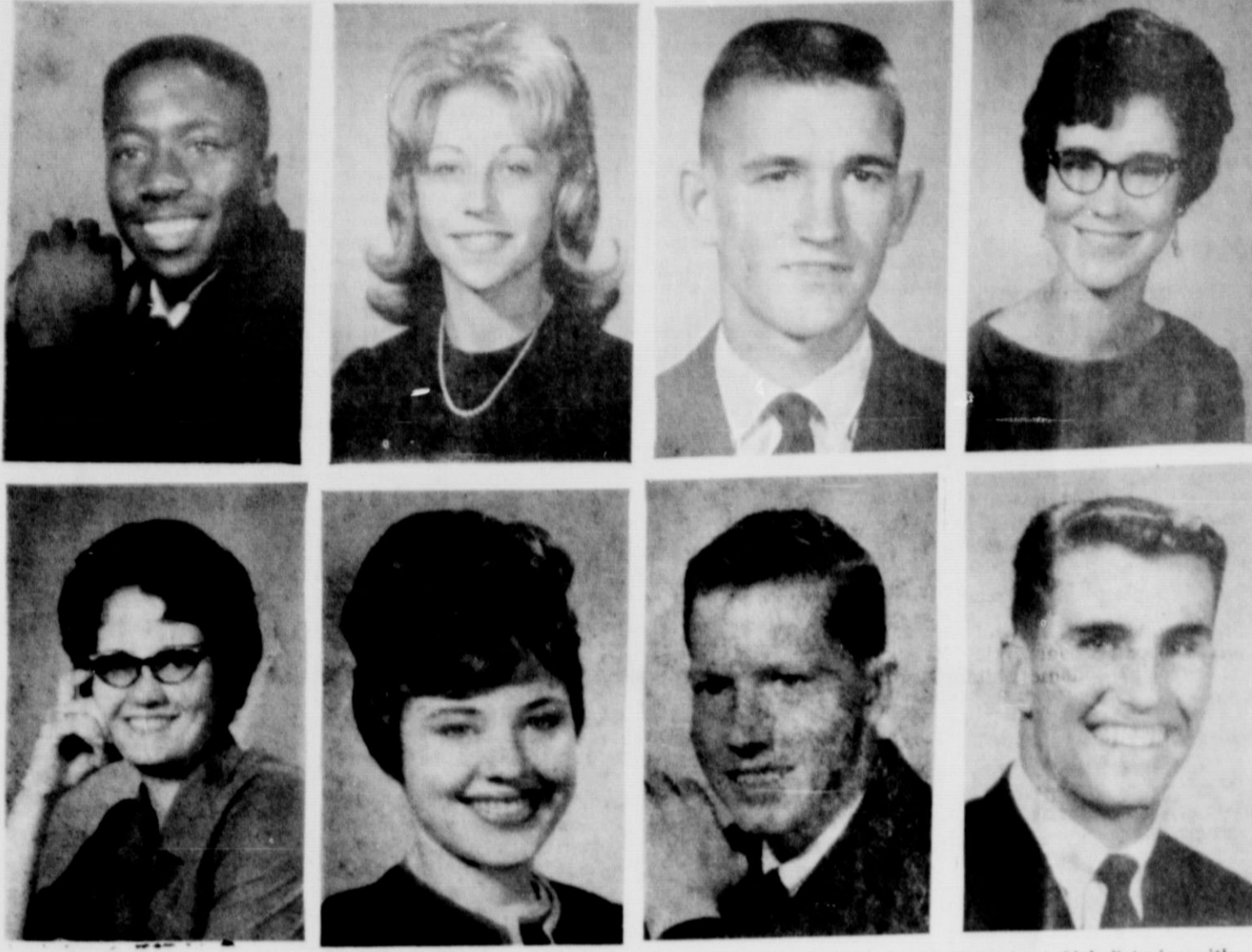
