Today it is possible to reach almost 100 homes and places of business in the Flomot, White Star and Whiteflat areas, by telephone. All telephones in the area are listed under Flomot and pass through the new Cap Rock Telephone Company, Inc. (Co-op) automatic exchange in Flomot. Outside messages go by way of Memphis.

The Flomot area has been using its new telephone system for about six weeks and has been "tied-in" with the outside world for about two weeks. Martin family has the largest number of telephones in the community (nine).

It is now possible to talk to almost any farm, home or ranch in Motley County.

A new telephone directory has just been released which includes Flomot. County Agent Bill Palmeyer has a copy. The directory lists Spur, Afton, Dry Lake, Flomot, Girard, Hackmont, Jayton, Peacock, Verbena and in Flomot listings from the Post Telephone directory. Spur and Post comprise most of the directory.

Hackmont is a combination of Hackberry (Cottle County) and Dumont; Guthrie is also included in this listing.

**COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:**

Questions about Midland bermuda and other improved grasses continue to arise, and confirming an earlier announcement, the meeting on these grasses and irrigation will be held in the Matador courthouse Friday, May 8, starting at 8:00 p.m. Al Novosad, Extension Pasture Specialist from College Station will discuss the grasses, and Dave Sherrill, Extension Irrigation Specialist from Lubbock will discuss irrigation. Establishing these grasses or an irrigation system is an expensive undertaking, so it is best to learn all possible about these subjects to reduce costly mistakes one may make.

Midland bermuda is a new crop, and one hears all types of reports on what the grass will do, both good and bad. This much is known, if you don't manage,

fertilize and sprig the crop properly, you may be better off if you leave the crop alone. This is the only time these men can arrange to be with us, so don't forget the date, and spread the word to those interested in these subjects.

Leader work for top quality work is a necessity. To help with this program, a leader workshop was held at Lake Brownwood on March 24-26 for leaders of District III. Those attending from Motley County and workshops attended were: Mrs. Sam Ross, Flomot, Housing-Home Furnishings; Mrs. C. C. Jones, Flomot, Recreation; Mrs. Harrison George, Flomot, Organization; Mrs. Wilburn Martin, Flomot, Foods-Nutrition; Wilburn Martin, Flomot, Junior Leaders; Mrs. W. F. Sauls, Flomot, Beef; Jerry Noles, Matador, Beef; Mrs. Jerry Noles, Matador, Clothing; and myself.

Studies indicate a single tansy mustard plant per square foot in dryland wheat will reduce yields about 10%. Now is the time to determine if this weed is your problem. If so, figure a 10% reduction in yields for each weed per square foot, assuming wheat at \$1.75 per bu. at your normal yield, and determine if weed control will be economical. Custom rate of applying 2,4-D is about \$1.50 per acre.

A half-pound of 2,4-D ester should be applied per acre after the wheat is fully tillered, but before vigorous spring growth begins. If weeds are large, the rate may be increased to 1 pound per acre to give controls.

Agricultural Commissioner John White is cautioning people about bogus tree and nursery stock salesmen, especially those operating out of the back of pickup trucks. Some of these peddlers are OK, but many people report that the plants they bought proved to be dead or dying. The influx is heavier this time of the year, and plant diseases are sometimes introduced through these plants.

Several loads of illegal and below standard plants have been seized. White urges people to buy only from reputable local nurseries, or at least ask to see the inspection certificate, which is required by state law, but is difficult to enforce on fly-by-night operators who slip in from out of state. "Bargain plants often prove to be not such a good bargain after all," says White.

In regards to planting of guar, I have been advised that the crop can be delivered to Roaring Springs at \$3.90 per hundred for No. 1 beans. A factor to remember in reaching a decision to plant guar is that it can be planted on diverted feed grain acreage and still receive 50% of the payment if the beans are harvested. Tests have also shown that guar helps to improve soil condition, with yields increased on crops following guar.

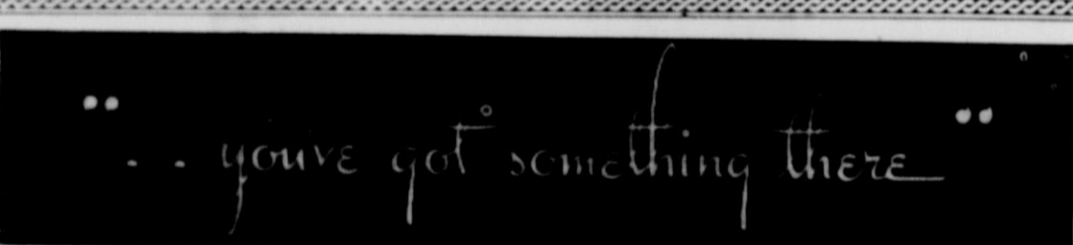

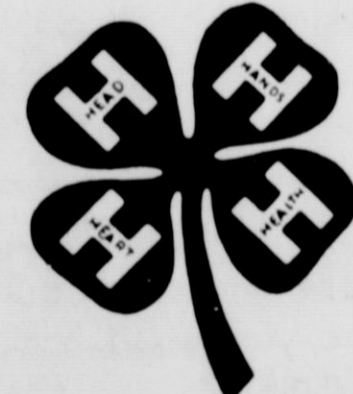
