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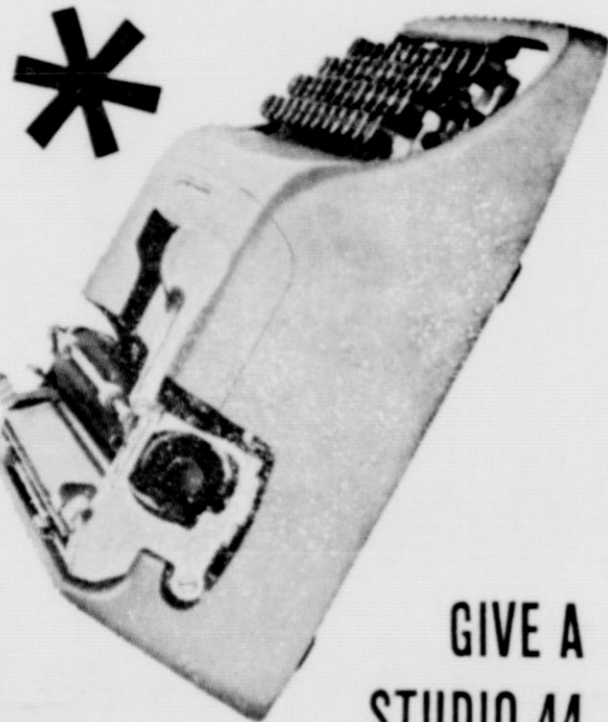
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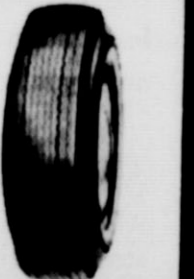


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COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Wiley County boys and girls under, in or out of school, but not a high school graduate will be interested in the Soil Conservation essay sponsored by the Upper Pease Conservation District and the Ft. Worth Press. Title of the essay is to be 300 words and is "Youth's Stake in Conservation." Essays are due in the office by Thursday Feb. 13th. The state winner will receive a Western vacation or education fund. The coun-

ty Junior and Senior winner will receive \$5.00, and as this is an open contest, it does not affect participation in Interscholastic League events.

The cotton variety test planted by Sam Ross of Flomot has been harvested, and results are available at all county gins, feed stores and my office.

Planting date was May 27th, and the test was severely damaged by hail on June 2nd. If seed had been available, the plot would have been replanted, as the thin stand increased production costs and reduced yields.

Seed were furnished by the breeders, and varieties in order of net return per acre were as follows: Parrott, Lankart 57, Western Stormproof, Dekalb

302, Anton 99, Paymaster 101A, Qualla 10, Rilcot 90, Lockett 88A.

Yields ranged from 351 to 274 lbs. ac., with the lowest yielder not necessarily the variety giving the lowest net return per acre. Percent turnout ranged from 24.1 to 29%.

What is believed to be the first natural attractant ever obtained from male insects has been extracted from male boll weevils. Females of the species are attracted by the substance. Thus a new approach may be opened for controlling the most destructive of all cotton insects, according to USDA entomologists, who isolated the natural attractant.

To obtain the chemical substance, they enclosed the male boll weevils in a plastic cage,

then drew air from it into a column of activated charcoal. After 11 weeks, they removed the charcoal and soaked it in chloroform. When the chloroform was evaporated, a residue was left that attracted female boll weevils. Chemists are attempting to chemically identify the attractant so that a similar attractant can be made synthetically for possible use in boll weevil control.

Attractant research is just one of several approaches ARS has emphasized during recent years in a search for new pest-control methods that limit or avoid the need for insecticides and involve only the target pest. Attractants obtained from the female of several insect species have opened the way to broad-front attacks, which include luring pests to traps, to isolated insecticides, and to chemicals that sterilize them.

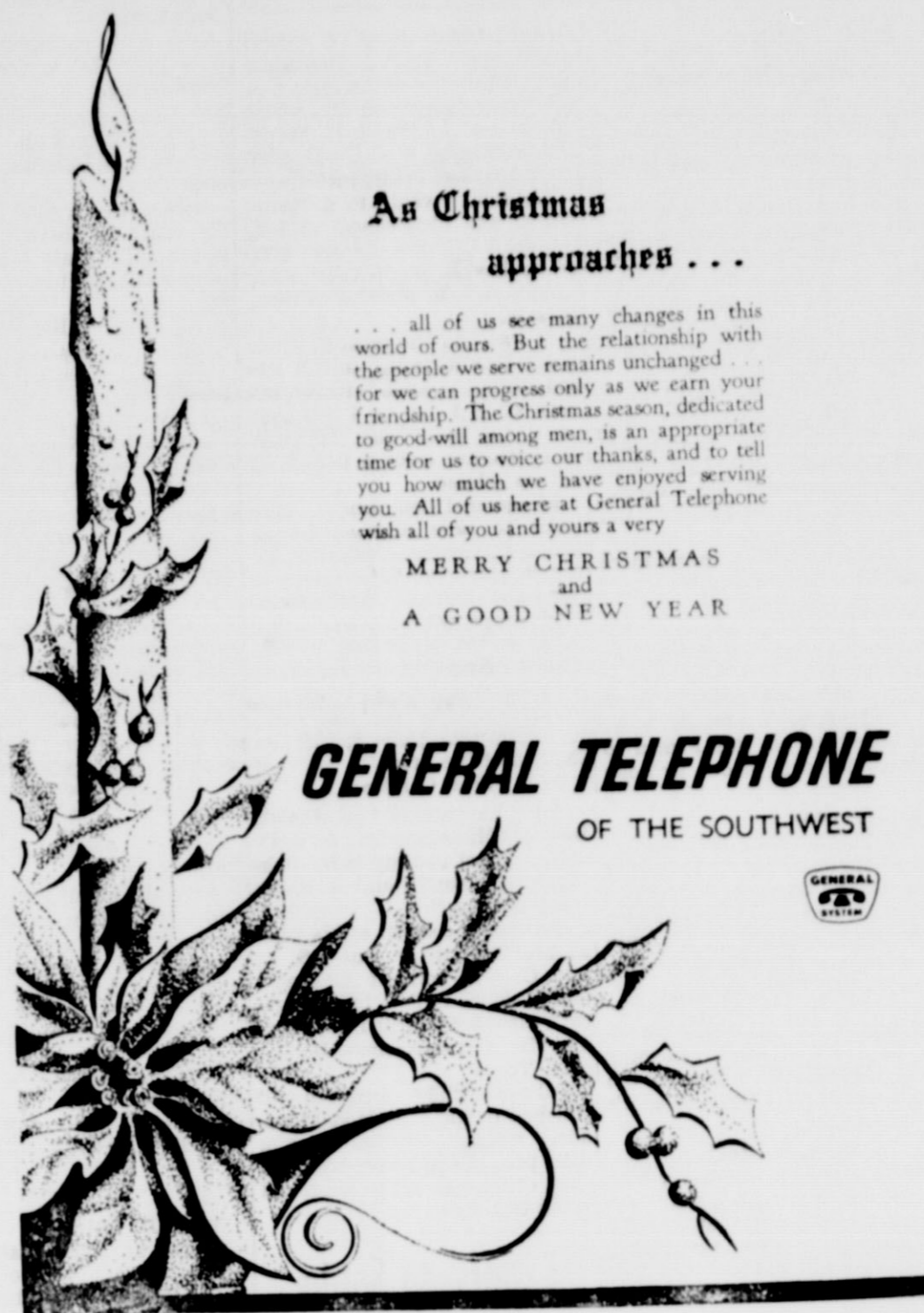

with the Lexington (Texas) Enterprise in February of 1913. Neely J. Hamilton was editor and publisher.

His first job in a shop was that of inking a Vaughn's Ideal Hand Cylinder press. It took two men to operate the machinery — one to put the unprinted sheet on fly, throw down on the form, and roll the roller across and the other to ink.

Installed New Machine
Hanging around a print shop, Mr. Mac learned to "hand spike" straight matter. The first article he ever set was titled: "Do not Envy The Other Fellow, But Emulate Him."

"That stuck in my mind more than any other piece of copy I ever set," he said.
The venerable operator has worked on more papers than he can remember. He had learned the trade before doing a hitch in the Navy and upon discharge, answered an ad "for a man to learn linotype," placed by John Esten Cook, owner of The Rockdale reporter.

Mr. Mac learned the keyboard on an old Model 19, barnstormed around the country to develop accuracy and speed. He left Central Texas because of a drought and ended up in 1925 at the Hesperian, Floydada.

He recalls installing a new machine at the Matador Tribune in the 1930's and returning there 19 years later to move the same machine to Doug Meador's new building.

Work At Baylor
Before donning the Navy blue in World War I, he had done "piece scale" work at Baylor University's Lariat newspaper, printing textbooks for a Dr. Tidwell, who was teaching Bible there. "It was all hand set, I was paid 30 cents per 1,000 ems," Mr. Mac said. "I learned a lot about even spacing, pasting up my string, and figuring how much money was coming to me at the end of the week."

It was about 1920, when Mr. Mac learned to operate a type setting machine. This paved the way to reading firsthand many sensational stories of the times, he recollects, including floods, death of a president (Harding) and the world championship prize fights.

Before the advent of radio, "elections and a championship prize fight always meant printing extras," he said.

Mr. Mac recalls hand setting an extra in 1921 when the San

Gabriel River went on a rampage and flooded Thorndale, Tex., where he was working on the Thorndale Champion, which was owned by the H. B. Terrell Publications.

Learned Emergencies
McIntosh went to grammar school and high school at Lexington, Tex. "And if I ever played hooky, it was to get in some 'time' at the printing office," he said.

"I was told the printing trade was worth learning and it was something I could always fall back on if I had to. I fell back on it for more than 50 years and wouldn't trade a minute of it," he related.

Mechanical department men learn to take emergencies in stride, according to McIntosh. He remembers one time seeing a one-page circular "pied" (jumbled) twice while it was being taken to the press first by one man ("myself," he joked) and then by another man ("not me, thank goodness," Mr. Mac said). It finally was put together on the bed of the press.

Five Children
After his "official" retirement Dec. 31, Mr. Mac plans to work with a metal turning lathe, dabbling in electronics and do some "locksmithing."

His family consists of his wife, Emma Etta; three sons, S. J., and O. R., both of Floydada, and B. F. of Dallas; two daughters, Mrs. J. Y. Jordan, Midland, and Mrs. Weims Norman, Dougherty, Texas.

All of the children started and finished public schools at Floydada, while their dad was a good provider as he set lines and lines of type on many tours and shifts of duty.
