



Plan To Use Safe **Canning Methods** 

COLLEGE STATION-If you're counting on canning some of the extra produce from your garden this summer, plan now to do it the safe way.

Some canning methods, equipment and procedures are not safe and can result in food spoilage and even serious illness or death, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Marilyn Haggard. She says that canning in a

microwave oven, for example, is dangerous. Microwave ovens do not allow even heat penetration in the closed canning jar and the metal lids interfere with heat distribution. The use of metals in a microwave can also damage

the oven's magnatron tube, requiring costly repairs. Canning in a conventional oven is not advisable, because oven temperatures vary as the heat goes off and comes on again. The dry heat may not penetrate the food thoroughly

"Trying to can in a conventional oven is also a safety hazzard," Haggard "Pressure can build up in jars causing them to explode, or jars may break as drafts of cooler air hit them when the oven door is open.

Haggard, a specialist in food safety and preservation, says the "open kettle" canning method

which was popular years ago, may not kill spoilage organisms. In the open kettle method, foods are simply heated and put in sterile jars. Spoilage in sterile jars. Spoilage organisms can enter the jar when organisms can enter the lar when the food is transferred from kettle to jar. Also, the initial heat treatment may not be sufficient to destroy spoilage organisms and even if the jar seals, it may be only temporary

Steam canners are also not Steam canners are also not foolproof for canning. Haggard says the U.S. Department of Agriculture does not recommend the use of steam canners when the process time is based on boiling water both times.

Research shows that the ability to kill bacteria in a steam canner is considerably less than in a boiling water bath canner when the same process times, says Haggard.

For that reason a steam canner should never be used for

canner should never be used for low-acid vegetables and meats, warns the specialist.

If you are planning on doing some home canning, Haggard recommends setting aside old cookbooks, grandma's recipe or advice from friends so you won't be taking chances with your. be taking chances with your family's health and your home-

Stress-Effective Families Develop Money Management Skills

Polls show that most families, regardless of income, worry to some extent about finance. But healthy families seem to be able with it better-mostly because they have some money management skills.

her book Stress and the Healthy Family, researcher Delores Curran says that her studies of stress-effective families show they use four common money management

techniques.

First, they learn to control money stresses together. In twopaycheck families they may pay different bills out of each check, and in other families there may be separate accounts for household expenses and discretionary money. But in general, money is not considered to belong to one partner or the other, but is theirs as a family.

other, but is theirs as a tamily.
Second, these families
budget, although how tightly
they budget varies widely. The
families tend to plan for fixed
monthly costs like a home, car
and medical and insurance
payments and then divide the
set into swings food cothing. rest into savings, food, clothing, recreation and miscellaneous. Setting aside some savings for

emergencies is an especially important feature of the budget, because it means that the family doesn't fall apart when something out of the ordinary happens.

Curran also found that when money gets tight, healthy families tend to scale down more effectively than others. They do this by revising their expectations. So, for example, the family that has taken an expensive vacation each summer may settle for a nearby weekend camping trip when finances are

Other families who refuse to lower their expectations often depend more on credit, which can add to their financial stress in the long run.

Fourth, stress-effective families develop methods for making major purchases without the need for painful arguments. Couples tend to respect each other's daily decisions on spending unless there's unusual reason such as high monthly bills

But for major purchases, such as a new car, furniture or trips, these couples share their own these couples share their own feelings, fears and attitudes and take into consideration the different attitudes of their partner. This makes it possible for them to strike a compromise.

The skills of sharing, budgeting, revising expectations and compromising may not seem.

and compromising may not seem like much, but evidently they add up to a family that can handle finances without it becoming a major problem in their lives

# **Adjusting The Family Budget** To Cope With Unemployment

COLLEGE STATION--Rising unemployment rates mean more Texas families are facing a

nancial crisis.

"This can be a frustrating and stressful situation, but improved money management skills can

stressful situation, but improved money management skills can help families survive these rough times," says home economist Mary Clayton Nance.
She points out that families must give high priority to must give high priority to paying fixed expenses such as rent or mortagae payments, insurance mortgage payments, insurance premiums, car payments and installment debt from the income they have available

That leaves food, utilities, clothing, household operations and other flexible expenses to

Nance, a resource manage ment specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service (TACX), says

Extension Service (TACX), says the following can produce the greatest savings of flexible family expenses:

\* Reduce food costs by carefully planning meals and snacks for each day for a week ahead. Plan low-cost protein meals and snacks for each day for a week ahead. Plan low-cost protein meals and snacks for each day for a week ahead. Plan low-cost protein foods such as dry beans, eggs, peanut butter, turkey and chicken, hamburger or liver. Stretch meat in casseroles and

other combination dishes.

\* Reduce utility bills by raising \* Reduce utility bills by raising the temperature in your house to lower cooling eosts. If you have a protable fan, use it in place of air conditioning when possible or along with the air conditioner to make the higher temperatures feel more comfortable.

\* Consider selling a second car or recreational vehicle. This will

save money on gas, insurance and upkeep. However, think

carefully about your future transportation needs before selling, since you may need a second car for transportation to a new job.

Reduce child care costs by arranging the family's schedule so that an unemployed parent can take care of the children while the other parent works. If both parents are unemployed, alternate child care duties so each will have an opportunity to

each will have an opportunity to look for a job or have some personal time. An unemployed single parent may try to share child care with a relative, neighbor or friend.

\* Repair or remodel clothing you already have and swap items of clothing with other family members or friends. Investigate local resale shops and agrage sales to find good and garage sales to find good buys on used clothing. These are especially good options for buying children's clothes which are often outgrown before they

are worn out.

\* Consider cutting out or "consider curring out of finding alternatives to all "extras." Depending on the family circumstances, "extras" might include cable television, or might include cable television, or several cable hook-ups; gift-giving or donations; expensive habits such as smoking; magazine subscriptions; more than one telephone; and entertainment costs. Make use of free or low-cost resources for entertainment, such as the public library. parks and community library, parks and community

Nance suggests contacting the county Extension office. County Extension home economists can provide information on spending guides for thrifty food plans and how to develop an unemploy ment spending plan.





# **County Agent's** Corner

By Ray Minkley

Spring is the time when many Spring is the time when many homeowners discover they have termites because winged forms appear and swarm. Several homeowners have come by the Extension office this past week asking for information about termites and their control.

Winged termites outdoors are a natural occurrence so usually

a natural occurrence, so usually there is no problem. But if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill, chances are good that an infestation has established in your home. Termites can cause extensive

damage to wooden parts of your

home, so take some precautions.

Quite often termites and certain ants swarm at the same time and it's important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants swarm in the springtime and can cause some structural damage to wood. However, termites are much more destructive and require different control measures.

Termites have a broad waist-ants have a narrow, constricted waist; termite wings are the same size and shape--winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different lengths and shape; termites have straight antennae (feelers on thier heads)--ants have elbowed

tennae. Termites may be attracted to your house by dead tree limbs, stumps, old lumber and other sources of termite food. These

be removed. If soil is above the point where wood or brick meets the foundation, termites have easy access to your home. Anywhere that wood meets dirt (siding, wooden steps) is a potential spot for termite entry into the home.

Termites also have the ability to build mud tunnels over non-wooden structures to reach a food source. These tunnels (about ¼-inch wide) may extend several feet up concrete surfaces. On a slab home, these may be seen on foundation concrete between soil and brick. On homes built above the ground, these tunnels can be found on piers or pipes that go from soil to structure. The bath trap in homes built on a slab is another source of entry. Plumbing in this situation has contact with soil under the slab,

contact with soil under the slab, and termite tunnels may be found in this area.

Although a thorough inspection is best done by a professional, a homeowner can make a quick check for termite infestations. If termites or damage is found, contact a local damage is found, contact a local pest control company. This is one insect pest that should not be handled by a "do-it-yourselfer," emplasizes Dr. Phil Hamman, Extension Entomologist. Commerical pest control companies have the necessary equipment and experience to effectively rid a home of effectively rid a home of

#### Farm Homesteads May Be Exempt For Five Years After Foreclosure

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Financially troubled farmers may be able to keep their homesteads for up to five years, even after for eclosure proceedings on their farms. The agriculture department

The agriculture department has begun a new program that allows farmers with severe financial problems to keep their homes, along with "a reasonable amount" of land, even though they may have lost their farms through foreclosure.

FmHA borrowers who qualify for the program can apply to the

for the program can apply to the agency to lease the farm home, and the "reasonable amount" of land. The usual amount of land. considered "reasonable"

about five acres.

Eligible borrowers who lease the home and land will also be

eligible to buy, if financially able. Eligibility for the program is based on the farmer being able to show that sales of farm commodities in at least two of the last five years amounted to forty thousand dollars annually, and that at least sixty percent of the family income came from the farming operation.

As this FmHA action is being

instituted another government entity the Office of Technology Assessment says that about a million farms now in production will disappear by the turn of the century, if present trends

Your voter registration is stamped "Democrat" or "Republican" simply to prevent you from voting in both primaries or from crossing over party lines in the event of a primary runoff. For example, if you vote in the Democratic primary and then Kent Hance is forced into a Republican primary runoff, you will be unable to vote for Kent in that runoff. # **Boulter Urges Changes** In Dairy Liquidation

WASHINGTON-Citing plummeting beef prices and general market confusion, Texas Congressman Beau Boulter (R-13 is requesting changes in the way the controversial dairy wholeherd buyout program is being administered. Boulter, who fought against dairy diversion during the farm bill debate last fall said, "this is bad ag policy to fall said, "this is bad ag policy to start with, but the USDA needs to administer it in a manner which won't ruin the beef industry."

Boulter is urging the Secretary of Agriculture to use several options which he has at his disposal to minimize the problems which this porgram is causing cattlemen. The main causing cattlemen. The main hing that the secretary can do is more orderly

marketing period for the dairy cattle going to slaughter. Boulter said the current plan is "front-loaded" and that the marketings should be more evenly spaced throughout each of the three marketing periods. Boulter emphasized that USDA is required by the Farm Bill

USDA is required by the Farm Bill to increase their purchases of red meat by 400 million pounds to offset the increased dairy cattle being slaughtered. Also, there is potential to export some of the diary cows.

Congressman Boulter is meeting with representatives of

meeting with representatives of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association in Washington this week, and will be working with the cattlemen to find a remedy for the situation.

# **Traffic Death Decline**

AUSTIN--Traffic deaths in Texas declined by 5.9 percent in 1985 compared to 1984, according to DPS Director Colonel Jim Adams.

Adams said 3,682 persons died in traffic accidents accross the state in 1985, compared to 3,913 deaths the year before. The 1985 death toll is the lowest since 1976. he said.

continued to drop since 1981. Five years ago, the rate was 3.9 deaths per 100 million miles; in 1985, the rate was 2.6 deaths per 100 million miles, the lowest death ever recorded in Texas, Adams said.

"We green years pleased with this."

Adams said.
"We are very pleased with this decline in deaths," Adams said.
"The most significant thing is that despits Texas' rate of growth, the death toll in 1985 was more than 1,000 beneath Texas' alltime record traffic death count of 4,701 in 1981."

see two principal reasons for this saving of lives," Adam said. "When the safety belt la went into effect on September

went into effect on September 1, 1985, we began noticing a monthly drop in fatalities.

"The four-month average decrease in front seat fatalities was 14 percent. Secondly, I think the continuing--and growing--emphasis on the dangers of drunken driving, coupled with strict enforcement of DWI laws by police agencies, has had a definite impact on the number of traffic deaths."

In 1985, the number of reported DWI-related traffic

reported DWI-related traffic deaths in Texas dropped by 6 percent, with 989 fatalities compared to 1,049 deaths the year before, Adams said.

While overall the number of traffic deaths decreased, the number of motorcycle riders killed in accidents rose by one percent to 364, Adams said.

"Of those motorcyclists killed, 75 percent were not wearing protective headgear," the director continued.

protective headgear," the director continued.

Texas law provides that helmets be worn by motorcyclists younger than 18, but there is no requirement that older motorcyclists wear the lifesaving headgear.

"While we are delighted with the decline in traffic deaths, the

the decline in traffic deaths, the reality is that 3,682 people died on Texas' streets and highways," Adams said. "We know we will never be completely free of traffic tragedy, but we will keep doing everything we can to insure that the death toll continues to drop.



Two years ago on May 1 a tornado touched down in northwest Matador and tore a destructive path through our peaceful community. Due to the peaceful community. Due to the fact that the May tornado hit in early evening and that our fire department volunteers were out watching the approaching storm, enough warning was given for people to take cover. However, we all know of Nell who was unable to get her storm cellar open and retreated into her house in time to hide in the hall while her house was torn apart around her, and finally her desperate crawl into her closet where she stayed until the storm passed. Also, we recall the Pipkin family, whose house was hit-whose children clung to Grandma in the closet and the parents who beat the storm's destructive power by seconds trying to be with their children. And how about Mrs. Murphy, and now about Mrs. Murphy, who took the only course of cover and 80 year old could take as the tornado bore down upon hershe hid under her table. Mrs. Murphy was our only community member who received physical injuries that required medical member who received physical injuries that required medical attention. However, as Sweetwater residents are experiencing now, we all here in Matador, experienced the mental injuries. Our homes, our friends' and families' homes were destroyed. In all, a total of 30 homes were destroyed or damaged. Our county school was gone. Damage was reported in the millions.

We began the clean-up. We cleaned and we hugged and supported each other and drew closer to each other, and finally began the business aspect of cleaning, the "getting our contents of the state." We was a server of the state."

began the business aspect of cleaning, the "getting our community back together." We applied for aid. We applied for a federal disaster. We were turned down. Millions of dollars worth of damage, and we were turned down.

Not only our city affected by the tornado, our county was affected. Our school was gone-what of our children's education? Did Governor White see fit to come to Matador and see first hand the destruction?
No! As a result of this, two years later, our children are still without a school. They are meeting in churches, portable buildings, and an old school building, having to be bussed from class to class and to the American Legion Building for meals.

To the residents of Sweetwater, I'm glad he came to your community to see the damage nature turned wild can do. I'm glad you're going to get assistance because we know the

assistance because we know the hardships without this aid. However, I can't help but say you're lucky this tornado hit during an election year.

#### To The Voters Of Motley County (110th Judicial District of Texas)

George Miller, the present District Judge, has in his paid political advertisements represented himself to the voters as being fair, qualified, capable and experienced. We ask that you consider the representations made by George Miller in such advertisements with the injustices inflicted on the people by his erroneous rulings and by his other conduct.

The people of Texas, in the State Constitution and through laws passed by the legislature, provided for the establishment of a set of rules to govern the conduct of Judges. Judges are expected to obey these rules which are found in what is known as the Code of Judicial Conduct.

Canon 5 D. of the Code of Judicial Conduct provides that a Judge should not serve as executor of an estate except for a member of his family and that he should not serve even for a member of his family if it is likely he will be engaged in proceedings that would ordinarily come before him or if the estate becomes involved in adversary proceedings in the Court in which he serves or one under its appellate jurisdiction.

In vlolation of this rule, on February 5, 1981,

In vlolation of this rule, on February 5, 1981, Judge George W. Miller appeared in the County Court and applied for probate of the handwritten will of W. A. Massie, Deceased.

Mr. W. A. Massie was not related to George Miller either by blood or by marriage.

This handwritten will was patterned after a draft of a proposed will which Judge Miller, in his own handwritting, had prepared for Mr. Massie in 1971. George W. Miller wrote himself into this proposed will as Independent Executor without bond.

bond.

Prior to the time of the application for probate
by Judge Miller, Mrs. W. A. Massie had applied
for and received letters of administration on the
grounds that Mr. Massie left no will. She was
represented at this time by attorney, Kenneth
Bair.

represented at this time by attorney, Kenneth Bain.

After Judge Miller came up with the handwritten will, he employed attorney, Kenneth Bain, to represent him. Mrs. Massie had to employ other lawyers.

The will of W. A. Massie provides: "I hereby constitute and appoint George W. Miller of Floydada, Texas, Independent Executor without bond of this my last will, and direct no action be had in County Court other than probating, appraisement and list of claims," Several of Mr. Massie's relatives filed suit for a construction (interpretation) of the will and for part of the estate.

In spite of this clear direction in the will, Judge Miller did not remove the lawsuit from County Court to District Court which he could have done and was obligated to do. The County Judge could have also sent the case to District Court in order that the will could be construed (interpreted) by a Judge who was a lawyer, familiar with the complicated rules of will construction, but the County Judge was not advised by either George Miller or the County Attorney representing George Miller that failure to transfer the lawsuit to District Court was a violation of the valid directions of Mr. Massie's will.

If the suit had been removed to District Court (in accordance with the provisions of the will) then Judge Miller would have been disqualified, a District Judge would have to be called in from another District with the result that another District Judge would have to be called in from another District with the result that another District Judge would have taken whatever action he considered appropriate in light of Judge Miller's violation of the rules of judicial conduct.

Judge Miller paid out of the Estate directly to the lawyer for one group of relatives the sum of \$110,000.00 for division among the lawyers and plaintiffs in a compromise and settlement agreement and it was agreed that the County Judge would construe the will in accordance with Judge Miller's violation was taken in the County Court regardless of the fact that the will of W. A. Massie provided: "And direct that no further action be had in County Court other than probating, appraisement and list of claims."

The County Court records show that Judge Miller served as executor from February 16, 1981, to December 9, 1985, which amounts to approximately one-half of the time that he has occupied the office of District Judge. He has spaid himself as executor a commission of thousands upon thousands of dollars out of the Massie Festate. During the per

approximately one-hand of the three in a paid himself as executor a commission of thousands upon thousands of dollars out of the Massie Estate. During the period of administration he has played the roles of witness, litigant in an adversary proceeding, district judge, proponent of a will, lawyer, and employer of the County Attorney who had previously represented Mrs. W. A. Massie in the same case.

We ask that you consider the conduct of a judge who apparently being dissatisfied with his \$60,000.00 salary plus the large retirement benefits, chose to enrich himself with extrajudicial activities which were in violation of the Code of Judicial Conduct.

Canon 3A of the Code of Judicial Conduct states, "A Judge should be patient, dignified and courteous to litigants, jurors, witnesses, lawyers and others with whom he deals in his official capacity."

We ask that you compare this rule with the manner in which Judge Miller dealt with a witness in Cause No. 1974 in Motley County, Texas, on November 12, 1985.

This was an uncontested divorce case. The husband was being questioned by a lawyer, Mr. Arnett, concerning a box spring and mattress which had been destroyed in a tornado.

The following is a partial transcript prepared by the Court reporter:

Question: Are you using that at this time?

Answer: Using what? The box springs and mattress?

Question: And the bed.

Answer: I've got — I went and bought me another —

Answer:—Box—
Judge Miller:— You keep your mouth shut
and your voice down, you understand? This is a
Court of Law. Now, you try to answer the

questions without arguing.

The witness, who was told by Judge Miller to "shut his mouth", is a government teacher in the Matador School system. What can he tell his government students about the patience and courtesy of District Judge Miller of the 110th. Judicial District?

Judge George W. Miller has been mailing out letters to some of the voters of the District in which he boasts of his fairness, experience, capabilities and responsibilities.

which he boasts of his fairness, experience, capabilities and responsibilities.

In view of these representations we ask you to look at what the Judges on the appellate courts of this state had to say about his erroneous rulings while they were trying to straighten out his errors and correct the injustices of his erroneous rulings as shown in the cases described below. Some of the cases were tried inside this district and others were tried outside the district.

In each of the cases listed below Judge Miller has committed one or more of the following described reversible errors:

Failed to properly instruct the jury; rendered decisions when there was no evidence to support his judgement, ignored the jury verdict and substituted his own erroneous judgement; awarded the title to property to a loan company under unlawful foreclosure proceedings; failed to grant a temporary injunction to stop unlawful foreclosure proceedings; halture was a clear abuse of discretion; tried a case when he had no jurisdiction to try it for the reason that petitions were not verified by sworn affidavit as required by law; failed to grant an injunction to keep a candidate's name from being placed on the ballot when the candidate was not eligible under the law to run for office; entered an order ejecting a land owner from his land when the land had been unlawfully foreclosed upon; failed to submit the proper issues to the jury; made erroneous rulings on matters of law; and enter a judgement which was not supported by the jury verdict.

In the case of The State of Texas vs. T. L.

In the case of The State of Texas vs. T. L. Baker, reported in Volume 580, page 611, Southwestern Reporter 2d. Series, Judge Miller was appointed to precide over this case in Amarillo, Potter County. This was a suit to remove the Sheriff of Potter County from office. The amended petition for removal filed by the State was not even verified by sworn affidavit as the law requires. Therefore Judge Miller did not even have jurisdiction to hear the case. In spite of this Judge Miller went ahead and permitted the selection of a jury and proceeded to try the case, wasted the cost of the trial, wasted the jury's time and caused the Sheriff to endure a trial the law clearly prohibited Judge Miller from conducting.

wasted the cost of the trial, wasted the jury stime and caused the Sheriff to endure a trial the law clearly prohibited Judge Miller from conducting.

The jury ruled in favor of the Sheriff and Judge Miller entered a take nothing judgment. The State appealed and the Court of Civil Appeals reversed Judge Miller's judgment and dismissed the case against the sheriff and ruled that Judge Miller did not have jurisdiction to hear the case because the amended petition for removal was not sworn to by any person.

Judge Miller should have read Article 5977 of the Texas Statutes which reads in part, '. . . the petition shall in every instance be sworn to at or before the filing of the petition'.

In the case State of Texas vs. Fortenberry, 579 S.W. 2d 482, a murder case tried in Hale Courty, Texas, on a change of venue from Motley County, the defendant was tried for the cold blooded murder of Jalmar Wilson, the Sheriff of Motley County, Texas. The Jury found the defendant guilty and assessed the death penalty, but the Court of Criminal Appeals reversed and sent the case back for another trial. This trial cost Motley County approximately \$124,000.00, of which the County was required to get a grant from the State of approximately \$52,000.00. The County did not have the money to try the defendant again, resulting in a plea bargain agreement in which the defendant received a lesser sentence than the sentence given by the Jury at the trial. The reason given by the Court of Criminal Appeals for sending the case back for a new trial was that JUDGE MILLER DID NOT PROPERLY INSTRUCT THE JURY.

Judge Miller presided over the case of Bankers Commerial Life Insurance Company vs. Merrell. This was a case in which the Plaintiff sought to recover a claim from the insurance company under a policy which provided for additional payments in the event that death resulted from injuries sustained while riding in, operating or driving a "private passenger automobile". The insurance policy excluded coverage of "any-truck". It was undisputed that

in a pickup at the time of the fatal accident.

In order of judgment to be rendered for the plaintiff it would have been necessary to determine that a "pickup" is a "private passenger automobile".

Judge Miller ruled in favor of the Plaintiff. The Defendant insurance company appealed. The Court of Civil Appeals used a whole paragraph in their opinion to point out to Judge Miller that a "pickup truck" is a small light "truck" and that a "pickup truck" is a small light "truck" and that a "pickup truck" is a small light "truck" with an open back, used for light hauling" and not a "private passenger automobile", and reversed Judge Miller's erroneous judgment.

In the case of Garcla vs. Rutledge presided over by Judge Miller in Lamb County, Texas, reported in Volume 649, page 307 of the Southwestern Reporter 2d. Series, Mr. Garcia sued Frank's Truck and Tractor Co. claiming in his suit that the repair company had not repaired the truck as it had agreed to do, but instead kept the truck and would not return it to Mr. Garcia. The case was tried before a jury and the jury found for Mr. Garcia. In spite of the finding for Mr. Garcia by the Jury, Judge Miller entered a judgment for the truck repair company.

The Court of Civil Appeals said that, "reinstatement of the Jury Verdict is required and judgment must be rendered in accordance with the jury verdict." Thus the Court of Appeals

reversed Judge Miller's decision and awarded the plaintiff damages of \$3,892.98 plus attorneys fees of \$2,500.00.

The case of Moore Ag Credit vs. Lovell, (Cause No. 2313, District Court, Briscoe County, Texas), concerned a loan company (Moore Ag Credit) unlawfully foreclosing on a landowner's land in Briscoe County. The case was tried before a Briscoe County jury in March, 1984, and the jury found that the substitute trustee who sold the property for the loan company was not timely appointed and also found that the loan company did not act fairly with the landowner. Despite the jury's findings, George Miller erroneously awarded title and possession of the land to the foreclosing loan company. The Court of Appeals reversed Judge Miller's ruling and sent the case back for another trial. The reason given for the reversal of Judge Miller's judgment was that the Trustee for the loan company was not appointed (as found by Briscoe County Jury, and the Trustee's Deed and the foreclosure proceedings were void as a matter of law. This unlawful foreclosure was conducted in July, 1982, and the Supreme Court in January, 1986, affirmed the Court of Civil Appeals finding that Judge Miller's judgment was incorrect, thus reversing and remanding the case back for a new trial. As a result of George Miller's incorrect ruling on a matter of law, the landowner has been unlawfully deprived of the title to and the use of his property for almost four years, the Jury's time was wasted, the Court expenses were wasted, and an estimated \$100,000.00 in attorney fees of the litigants was wasted because Judge Miller did not study and understand the laws of this case.

The case Dhananl Investments, Inc. vs. Second Masterbilt Homes, Inc., is reported in Volume

The case Dhanani Investments, Inc., vs. Second Masterbilt Homes, Inc., is reported in Volume 650, page 220, of Southwestern Reporter 2d. Series. In this case from Fort Worth, Texas, Judge Miller erroneously denied an application for injunction to prevent the loan company accelerating the debt and foreclosing on the property of the plaintiff.

The Plaintiff appealed and the Court of Civil Appeals reversed Judge Miller's judgment and granted the nijunction for the reason that the facts showed that the loan company did not have the right to accelerate the debt.

Judge Miller clearly abused his discretion in this case because the rule of law is clear that trial judges shall not be reversed for failure to grant an injunction unless there is a CLEAR ABUSE OF DISCRETION.

In the case of Lemons vs. Wylle, a 1978 case reported in Volume 563, page 882, of the Southwestern Reporter 2d. Series, Mr. Lemons brought a suit against Oscar Wylie, the Democratic Chairman of Castro County, to enjoin him from placing the name of Jimmy Davis on the ballot. Mr. Lemons alleged in his petition that Mr. Davis was not eligible to have his name placed on the ballot since he had not been a resident of Castro County for the six months period required by law.

Judge Miller dismissed the suit claiming he did not have jurisdiction. The Court of Civil Appeals held that Judge Miller erred in dismissing the cause for lack of jurisdiction and the Court of Appeals entered a judgment stopping the placing of the name of Jimmy Davis on the ballot as he was not qualified to seek office since he had not been a resident of Castro County for the time required by law.

In the case Harrison vs. Parker, 620 S.W. 2d 102, the Plaintiff, represented by David Cave, sought to recover her share of her Mother's estate. Judge Miller incorrectly ruled the woman could not assert her claim because it was barred by the statute of limitations. The woman's small share of the estate amounted only to about \$1,200.00, and she was not able to pay a large fee to appeal the cas

which was thereafter settled and finally paid to her.

In the case Northcutt vs. Jarrett, 585 S.W. 2d. 874, the Plaintiff attempted to set aside an agreed property settlement in a divorce case presided over by the late Honorable L.D. Ratliff in 1971. Judge George Miller, after failing to properly instruct the jury, made an erroneous redistribution of the property which had the effect of setting aside the judgment made by Judge Ratliff. The Texas Supreme Court reversed Judge Miller's judgment and allowed Judge Ratliff's judgment to stand. The Supreme Court said, in effect, that Judge Miller did not submit the proper issues to the jury and that the jury's findings therefore did not support the judgment entered by Judge Miller. As a result of this error, the jury's time, the money of the parties, and the expenses of operating the court were totally wasted, with nothing having been accomplished.

All of the four attorneys agreed that under the present (at that time) state of the law, the charge not required and the State argued against the requested charge being given. Judge Miller ruled in favor of the State.

If Judge Miller had ordered the requested charge to be given the jury, I am of the opinion that the jury would have found the defendant not guilty found the defendant not guilty of capital murder and might not even have imposed the life sentence that Fortenberry is presently serving. The Court of Criminal Appeals created new law when it reversed the case and Fortenberry vs. State has been cited by the Court ever since as the first case under the

It would be nice if I could believe that David Cave ran his advertisement while ignorant of the true facts in this case, but David Cave had knowledge of the above facts. I informed him of the true facts several weeks before the misleading advertisement appeared in the grean newspapers. I submit that area newspapers. I submit that this is an example of the "anything to win morality."

The second item to be corrected is the manner in which the District Attorney's office assists with the Grand Jury. The record shows that this District has OPEN GRAND JURIES. Mr. Cave's advertisement implies

I have, throughout the ten plus years of being District Attorney in this district, always conducted open grand juries. That is, any person who felt that a crime had been committed was allowed to general and testiful. allowed to appear and testify before the Grand Jury. Mr. Cave is well aware of that fact in that he personally attended and helped conduct most of the grand juries in Dickens County during that period. Mr. Cave accepted or refused most of the accepted or refused most of the criminal complaints received in Dickens County during this period (the first step for most Grand Jury cases). He, of all people, knows or should know, that certain legal elements must be met before a case can be successfully prospected or an be met betore a case can be successfully prosecuted or an indictment returned by a Grand Jury. To present a case to the Grand Jury before all the elements are provable is often a waste of the Grand Jury's and the Caut's time

waste of the Grand Jury's and the Court's time.
David Cave knows and has followed the above precepts in his own actions before the Grand Jury of Dickens County. So why imply that the present system is not working? It must be the "anything to win morality" again.
