

RAINFALL is the most important factor governing the econo my of West Texas and a study of its dramatic history in Motley county for a quarter of a century reveals many unusual facts. Nature has not indicated any change in the amount of rainfall, based on a ten or 25 year average. Some of the best cotton years have resulted from less than average annual pre-
