The longest running home-owned business in Matador, Billy's Grocery, will end an era August 3, 1986. After 32 years ownership of the grocery store, Billy and Marihelen Wason have sold the business to Pay 'n Save Corporation of Littlefield.

Billy, a Matador native, and son of Mrs. Artie Wason and the late W.B. Wason has worked in a grocery store since 1941 as a High School Sophomore. After graduating from Matador High School Billy served two years in the army. Coming out of the army, he bought the meat market in Charlie Meador's Grocery Store on January 1, 1950. He and Mr. Meador became partners in the grocery store in 1952 and two years later he bought out Meador. At that time the store was located next to

the old Vaughn Drug Store.

In the intervening years, Marihelen Lewis caught the ambitious young man's eye. Their courtship gained momentum from the Echols' Ranch, which Marihelen's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Lewis owned at the time. On September 10, 1950 ended their courtship with a wedding. Their children are Charla (Marricle), Brenda (Cruse) and Mark, and five treasured grandchildren.

Two of Billy's employees have shown equal longevity in the grocery business. Richard Turner will have worked for Billy's 32 years in July. Joe Fair has been with the Wason's 16 years.

In their present location for 21 years, Billy and Marihelen acknowledge that although there was always a lot of work involved in the grocery business,

they have had a lot of fun with it as well. One memorable situation in the 1950's evolved

around Billy's efforts to keep enough cash on hand at the store to cash transient cotton pickers' checks on Friday. On this particular week, Saturday night Billy found himself with several

thousand dollars on hand to be deposited on Monday morning. For safe keeping, Billy carefully wrapped the money in butcher

paper and placed it in one of the freezing compartments. Monday morning bright and early, Richard Turner waited on a

customer at the meat counter who requested meat from his locker which Richard dutifully gathered up and gave to him. When this customer reached

home, his wife placed all the meat in their home freezer except for the package that

hadn't been marked with what cut of meat it held. That package, she decided to leave out on the counter to thaw for dinner. However, when she opened the package, instead of good beef, she found a parcel of greenbacks! A quick call to Billy's Grocery solved this puzzle and waylaid Billy's frantic search for his missing reserve. He made a speedy trip to the country home to retrieve the cash.

With his forthcoming retirement from the grocery business, Billy plans to devote time to his ranching operation. Marihelen on the other hand has visions of sleeping late and just having fun.

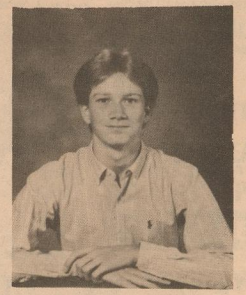
Home Economically Speaking

**Planning Low-Cost, High-Protein Main Dishes**  
 Protein foods add important nutrients to our diets. So even if you're trying to save money, you'll want to keep these foods in your diet.  
 But there are some things you can do to plan low-cost protein main dishes:  
 \* Use more low-cost protein foods, such as dry beans, eggs, peanut butter, turkey and chicken. Hamburger and liver are good buys in red meats.  
 \* Shop the sales for red meats.

If you find a good buy in a larger roast, you can cut it up and use it in different ways for more than one meal.  
 \* Include meat combined with other foods so it goes further. Spaghetti and meat sauce, beef stew, chicken and dumplings and tuna casserole are some ways to stretch your meat.  
 \* Use less tender cuts of meat, including blade steak, chuck and arm roast. Make them tender by moist, slow cooking or using a marinade.  
 \* Figure the cost per serving of meat to save money. As a general rule, meat with no bones has four servings per pound. Meat with some bones has two to three servings per pound. Meat with lots of bones has only one serving per pound.  
 \* Serve eggs as a main dish. Two eggs provide the same amount of protein as an average serving of meat.

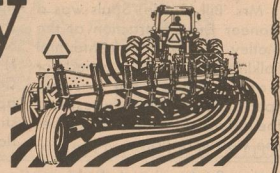

Peel the bananas and cut in half lengthways. Brush with lemon juice. Put a half on either side of each of the plates and place a scoop of ice cream between. Trickle the sauce over. Sprinkle with nuts, add the cherries and serve immediately.

Convention go and make a declaration of independence and we will then understand, and the world will understand, what we are fighting for. If independence is not declared, I shall lay down my arms, and so will the men under my command. But under the flag of independence, we are ready to peril our lives a hundred times a day..." An so they did peril their lives and we are the beneficiaries today as we celebrate this Sesquicentennial year.

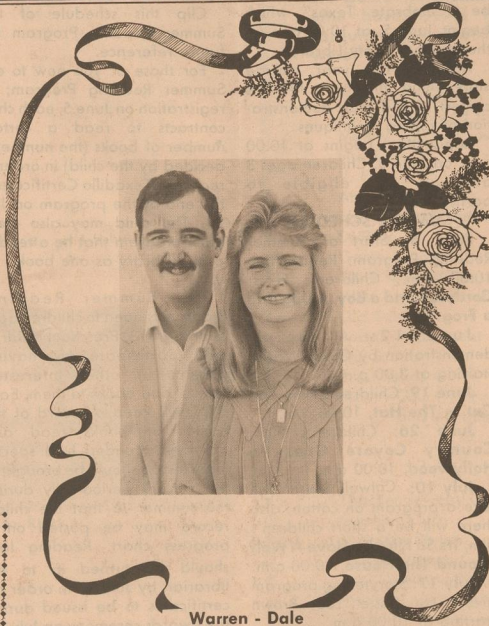

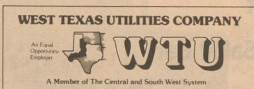

## Plans Stray Even With Successes

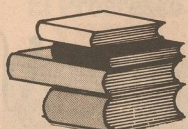
The planning of such a gala event as Motley County's Sesquicentennial Folklife Festival involved much down to the letter details to keep momentum at a high peak.

Any plans to purchase the county's own Texas-sized flag are to be encouraged. Contact your County Commissioner if you are in favor of it.

## Obituaries

### Verlin Reeves

A longtime resident of Matador until 1983, Miss Verlin Reeves died Monday, May 26 in Plainview's Care Inn after a lengthy illness. Before entering the Care Inn, she had resided at West Ridge Manor, an apartment complex for retired persons, since moving to Plainview three years ago. She was 90.

Funeral services were conducted at 4 p.m. Wednesday, May 28, 1986 on her 91st birthday, with Rev. Greer Willis, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Matador, officiating the service here.

Burial was in East Mound Cemetery, Matador, under the direction of Wood-Dunning Funeral Home of Plainview.

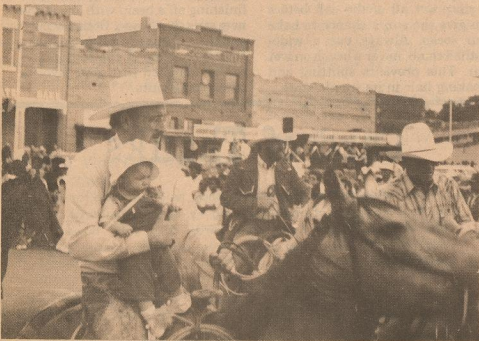

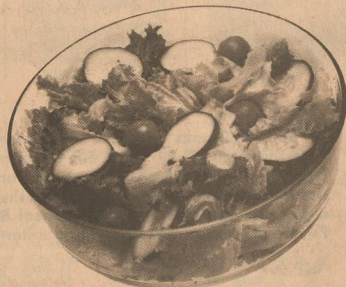

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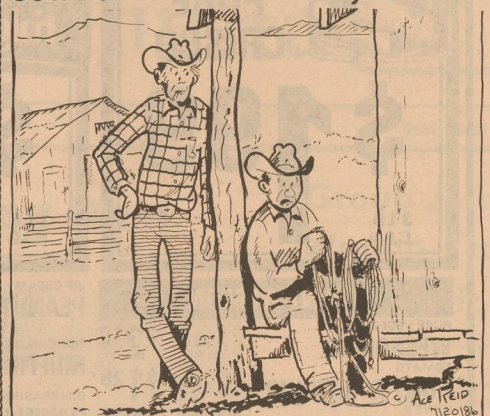
