MOST OF THE OUTSTANDING floats appearing in the 75th Anniversary parade here August 5, will be displayed next week in the parade at Roaring Springs, opening the 43rd annual convention of Matley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association. The parade will start at 10 a.m. Thursday, August 25th.

Corby Lee (Corky) Marshall, secretary and manager of the association, said this week that it appeared that most of the floats will be shown again at Old Settlers. Sam Ross of Flomott is President of the pioneer association.

Marshall said motor vehicles would be permitted in the parade this year.

LCB Warns Public Of Drinking Laws

Texas Liquor Control Board working with local law enforcement authorities has issued a reminder and warning of state laws concerning the public possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages.

It is unlawful for persons under 21 years of age to purchase, possess or consume an alcoholic beverage anytime unless accompanied by parent, guardian, adult husband or adult wife, or other adult person into whose custody he or she has been committed, according to House Bill 602.

Anyone convicted of violating any portion of the above shall be fined not less than \$10 or more than \$100.

The public is also advised to remember that it is unlawful for any person to possess or consume any alcoholic beverage in public at any time on Sunday between the hours of 1:15 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. and on all other days at any time between the hours of 12:15 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. Violation and conviction of this provision shall be a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$50.

Horton Gets 10 Years in Matador Bank Robbery

TEXAS TECH STUDENT Sammy Jim Horton, 24, was sentenced here Monday to 10 years in prison after pleading guilty to the state's charge that he held up the First State Bank of Matador on June 16, and took some \$9,046 from cashier Howard Gwinn at gunpoint.

Placing himself at the mercy of the 110th Dist. Court Judge D. D. Ratliff of Spur, Horton took the stand and admitted the robbery. No jury was requested in the trial. The court proceedings lasted less than two hours.

Unmentioned in the trial was federal grand jury indictment which charges Horton with the holdup of a Lubbock bank, according to the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. The newspaper said U. S. Dist. Attorney Robert S. (Bob) Travis of Fort Worth, told reporters that Horton had been indicted for the Lubbock bank charge last week.

The indictment, Travis said, charges Horton with the March 1966 robbery of Security National Bank of Lubbock (in which \$100 was taken from a drive-up window teller) and the Matador holdup.

Sheriff J. D. Spray removed Horton from Motley County jail early Tuesday and delivered him to the state prison in Huntsville to begin his sentence.

Prior to sentencing Monday morning, Horton had been out on a separate \$50,000 bond. Only two witnesses took the stand. The first was Mrs. W. F. Jacobs,

Forrest Campbell is Choice of Chairmen

Forrest Campbell, manager of Campbell Chevrolet here was selected late Friday night to have his name on the November general election ballot as Democratic candidate for the office of County Judge and Ex-Officio County Superintendent of Motley County.

The selection was made by the five county Democratic precinct chairmen, who had met previously and considered several applicants for the place after the sudden death of Democratic nominee Bryan Cammack.

County Democratic Chairman Furman Vinson said the precinct chairmen were bound by law to make a selection from those available for the office.

Forrest Campbell, a deacon in the First Baptist Church of Matador, has long been a leader in religious and civic affairs. His interest in Little League baseball work prompted the naming of Forrest Park baseball park in his honor.

He has been a resident of Matador for more than 35 years and is a graduate of Matador High School and Texas Tech University.

Regarding his being thrust into Motley County's political arena, Mr. Campbell said: "I have never sought public office and I want to first publicly thank the Motley County Democratic committee for selecting me as the nominee for the office of County Judge and Ex-Officio County Superintendent."

Secondly, I want to assure the voters of Motley County that I appreciate the honor of being a candidate for this high office. In event of my election I promise to serve to the best of my ability, and with fair and equal decision in every instance of my responsibility.

Delegate To Youth Conference Leaves

Patsy Green left Lubbock at 6 a.m. this morning (Thursday) for the University of Texas, Austin, where she will represent Motley County at the fourth annual Texas Youth Conference, scheduled to begin tonight.

Expected to attract some 1,200 outstanding teenagers from throughout the state, the program is aimed at the development of community projects for the prevention of delinquency.

The program originated as the Attorney General's Youth Conference on Crime; it has become a project of the Texas Law Enforcement and Youth Development Foundation and is directed by Robert Davis.

Delegates are selected from outstanding high school students and limitations are set on the number of representatives from each county.

Miss Green, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Green, is sponsored by the Matador Lions Club. A senior in Matador High School, she is the third delegate from Motley County to attend the conference, which will terminate Sunday afternoon.

Demos Nominate D.A. Dee Miller

Dee Miller of Amarillo, district attorney of the 47th District was chosen on the fourth roll call, Monday, Aug. 8, by the Democratic county chairman of the 18th Congressional District as nominee for Congress to succeed Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa.

Miller got 17 votes from the 30 county chairmen but the choice became unanimous on a motion by J. R. (Dick) Brown, Hartley County chairman, when he withdrew as a candidate. Miller will oppose Republican Bob Price of Pampa in November.

Necessity of selecting a nominee occurred when Rogers, who has represented the 18th district for 16 years, announced recently that he would not be a candidate in the Nov. 8 election, but would return to private practice of law.

Furman Vinson, Motley County Democratic chairman, was among the 30 Democrats selecting a party nominee.

La Arena editor, Miss Gwinn, also attended lectures and labs while at the workshop. Yearbook editors spent a majority of their time working on dummies containing lay outs for their coming yearbooks.

Miss Stevens said of the workshop, "The instructors taught us something about everything and I really learned a lot."

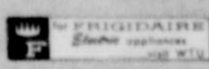
