Dear Editor:

My Father, E. B. Kimbell, and family came to this valley called

Ring Cone in autumn of 1888, also the Hardin Powers came about the same time and settled near us. Later the Cete Turners came and settled about 1 mile to the north of us. The Kimbell and Powers families lived just a sort distance from the dripping springs now called Miller Springs named for the Millers who came several year after we left there.

We only lived there about six months but moved to Whiteflat where we established our permanent home. Both my mother and father died there and are buried in Whiteflat Cemetery.

At the time we lived in Ring Cone there were bears and panthers. The men folks killed a few of them and when a bear was killed the meat was divided among the three neighbors.

We lived in a half-dugout just to the north of the little stream flowing from the springs. Sometimes it was dry and then water was in it at times.

Those were happy days for us children. I was five years old. I think my mother taught me to read while we were there.

I enjoyed reading Mrs. C. H. McCully's description of Ring Cone. I remember well the John Miller family, also her people, the Damrons I think.

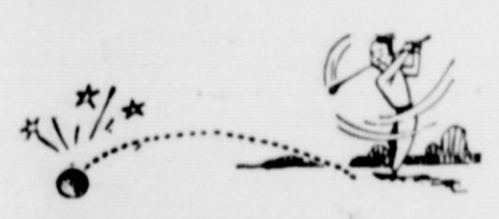

Stop by and get the information you will need on one of these contests by July 22nd, as I will be at Ft. Gordon, Ga. from July 25-Aug. 6, and at McAllen Aug. 8-11. Many members now have information on these contests, but many still fail to include items that will add points to their score.

Thirty 4-H Club members are participating in the Quail Man-

agement and restocking program sponsored by the Parks and Wildlife Department. Delivery was made June 29th, with distribution under the supervision of Game Warden Jerry Noles.

The program has a two-fold purpose. First, to teach 4-H members the kind of cover that the birds need, and the native plants they feed on. Proper management will result in better quail hunting. Second, areas where quail numbers are low are built up again.

Others interested in the program may be included in the 1966 program, providing it is continued.

4-H Club members, with their parents and leaders are reminded of the camp at Roaring Springs July 12-13. Registration starts at 9:00 a.m.

Wheat crop residue should be considered an asset rather than a liability, as the advantages of leaving wheat residue on the soil is in maintenance or improvement of soil structure by increasing the water intake, and reducing runoff.

A 20 bu. crop will produce about 1 1/2 tons of straw, containing about 23 lbs. of Nitrogen, 6 lbs. of Phosphorus, and 40 lbs. of Potash. To fully realize the benefits offered by the straw, leave part of the residue on the surface; if a heavy straw crop is produced, increase decomposition by adding nitrogen worked into the soil, which increases micro-organisms; and remember all of these benefits are lost if the straw is burned.

### 'BIRD' USED BY ROGERS

WASHINGTON—The voice of Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa Monday soared up to the Early Bird satellite and back down to London—where it informed a prominent Britisher that English money helped to develop the Panhandle.

The "friendship" conversation was part of ceremonies Monday marking the first day the Early Bird satellite went into commercial use.

Rogers, as chairman of the committee of the House Commerce Committee, with jurisdiction over legislation affecting satellite transmission, talked with Joseph Slater, the British assistant postmaster general in England, the Post Office Ministry handles communications matters for the government.

Rogers talked with Slater for nearly five minutes, pointing out that many of the earliest Panhandle settlers were British immigrants and that English land and cattle syndicates made a valuable contribution to the origin of the Panhandle economy.

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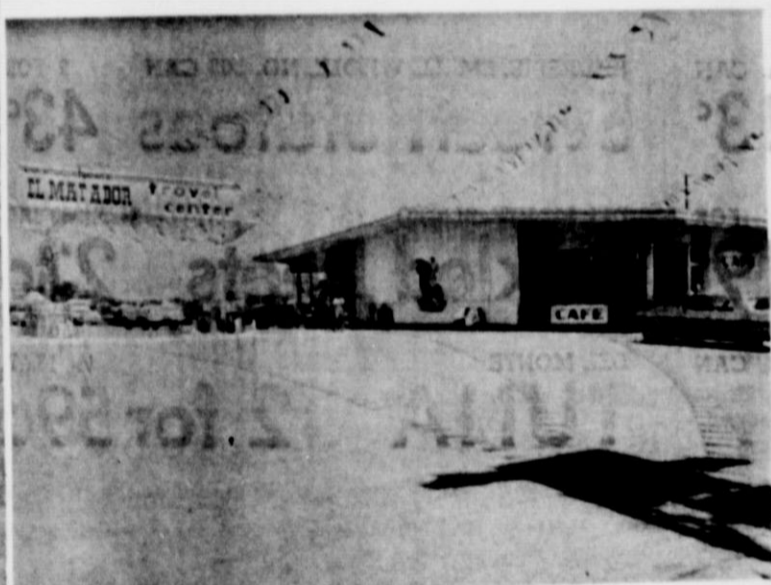

"The better the training program, the less you make," he said. "Some hospitals pay interns \$75 a month. One of the top pays only \$10 a month."  
"But since he wants to specialize in orthopedic (bone) surgery, Dr. Stafford will have to spend another four years in residency at some hospital before he can hang out his shingle."  
"AT THE END, he will have had 15 learning years, beginning with his college freshman year, before going into private practice."  
"Dr. Stafford figures he's been better off financially than some of the other new doctors. My wife worked me through medical school," he grinned. Mrs. Diana Stafford is a teacher in Arlington schools. Adding to his income, was his work in hospital emergency rooms.  
"Three out of five of the young doctors had borrowed money to get through medical school. One commented, 'We're \$10,000 in debt to start out with.'"  
"Dr. Stafford was outspoken in his feeling about the pending Medicare legislation. Like doctors of a generation before him, he doesn't like the idea."
