**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 20**

proposing an Amendment to Ar-
ticle III of the Constitution of
the State of Texas by adding a
new section thereto to be known
as Section 61 to authorize cities,
towns, and villages of this State
to provide insurance for em-
ployees; providing for the sub-
mission of the proposed Amend-
ment to the qualified electorate;
and providing for proclamation
and publication by the Gov-
ernor.
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of
the Constitution of the State of
Texas be amended by adding a
new section thereto to be known
as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall
have the power to enact laws to
enable cities, towns, and villages
of this State to provide Work-
men's Compensation Insurance,
including the right to provide
their own insurance risk for all
employees; and the Legislature
shall provide suitable laws for
the administration of such in-
surance in the said municipali-
ties and for payment of the costs,
charges, and premiums on poli-
cies of insurance and the bene-
fits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitu-
tional Amendment shall be sub-
mitted to a vote of the qualified
electorate of the State at the
General Election to be held on
the first Tuesday after the first
Monday in November, 1952, at
which election all ballots shall
have printed thereon (or in
counties using voting machines
the said machines shall provide
for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional A-
mendment authorizing the Leg-
islature to provide for Work-
men's Compensation Insurance
for employees of cities, towns
and villages"; and
"AGAINST the Constitutional

Amendment authorizing the
Legislature to provide for Work-
men's Compensation Insurance
for employees of cities, towns
and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one
(1) of said clauses on the ballot,
leaving the one (1) expressing
his vote on the proposed Amend-
ment; and if it shall appear from
the returns of said election that
a majority of the votes cast are
in favor of said Amendment, the
same shall become a part of the
Constitution of the State of
Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the
State of Texas shall issue the
necessary proclamation for said
election and have the same pub-
lished as required by the Con-
stitution and laws of this State.

The Friends of Texas Libraries was organized in 1838 at Austin when the People's Library Movement for Texas was originated by the Texas Library Association and the League of Library Trustees. The purpose was, and still is, to aim toward the provision of free access to good books for all Texans. In 1949, the name was changed to Friends of the Texas Libraries in keeping with similar citizen library organizations in other states.

Now, local groups are being formed all over the state, whether a public library is in operation or not. The local Friends groups promote libraries and library services, organize reading rooms, provide bookshelves in the courthouse, and hold meetings of all citizens interested in the library movement.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

A STATEMENT

To The Citizens of Precinct One . . .

All the property in the city of Matador, including homes, buildings, stocks of merchandise, household goods and automobiles, pays its pro rata part of the county's road and bridge tax. The valuation is in the neighborhood of one million dollars. This tax has been collected through the years and prorated to the expense of county operation, including the purchasing of road grading equipment and the cost of paying an operator's salary.

The law defines a street as a road. I am unable to understand why the people of Matador should be denied the service of street (or road) dragging and maintenance merely because they happen to live in an incorporated municipality. Their tax dollars should be worth just as much as the tax dollars of residents outside of the city limits. If there is any reason why the people of Matador should be denied the use of road equipment, then it seems they should be refunded the many thousands of dollars they have paid into the road and bridge fund.

If any question of irregularities should arise it must be based on failure to divide impartially with the people of Matador the county's available services. They pay exactly the same tax rate as all other county property-owners.

I have no desire to make an issue of an obvious duty. If I am elected Commissioner of Precinct One, I will maintain (through the cooperation and with the permission of the city council) the streets of Matador on exactly the same basis that other roads of the precinct are maintained.

Health Officer Urges Examination Of School Children

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges the parents of all children who will respond to the school bell for the first time in September to be sure the child is physically ready for school duties.

"First and foremost is the need for vaccination against smallpox. Parents should see that children are vaccinated before they are one year of age; however if not done previously, at school age vaccination becomes absolutely necessary," Dr. Cox said. "If your child has not been

vaccinated, have it done immediately for his own protection and that of others."

Immunization against diphtheria is also highly important, Dr. Cox declares. This disease which causes serious illness and deaths among young children can be prevented with toxoid. The child who has never been protected should be given this safeguard against a dreaded killing disease. Even though he may have been immunized as a baby, doctors and health officers usually recommend an additional dose of toxoid to strengthen immunity before entrance into school.

"In addition, before you send your child to school you are urged to take him to your family physician and dentist for a thorough examination," Dr. Cox adds. "You will want to know that he is in good physical condition and can compete with the other children on equal terms. If the check-up reveals any weakness or defects they should be corrected at once. Don't let your child start his school life with any avoidable handicap."
