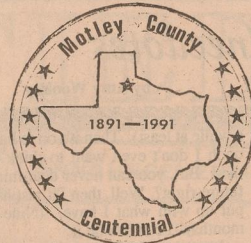

A Look Back In History Japan Surrenders In August of 1945

VICTORY
ANNOUNCED
AFTER ANXIOUS WAIT

"Peace On Earth
Good Will Towards Men"

The Peace of today, and the world of tomorrow formed the nucleus of an address by Rev. G.E. Turrentine, pastor of Matador Methodist Church in special union services held Wednesday evening at 9 o'clock, in the Baptist Church. A number of personal expressions of thanksgiving were made at the invitation of Rev. Turrentine.

The services were arranged under the sponsorship of Fleming Post NO. 337, American Legion in cooperation with the

churches of the city, after the surrender of Japan was announced by president Truman Tuesday evening.

Fleming Post, in regular meeting, immediately formulated the plans for the service, naming Vernon Doss as master of ceremonies. Presentation of Colors was by Matador Boy Scout, with Bobby Harp in charge. Rev. H. G. Verner, Baptist pastor read the Scriptures, and benediction was by T.E. Wood, Church of Christ minister. Prayers, special music and congregational singing led by B.F. Tunell, were also included in the service.

With the exception of a minimum amount of celebration by the younger crowds noted principally by the use of auto horns and a few firecrackers, news of Victory Tuesday evening was met with a spirit of reverence and sobriety, in Matador.

Many local residents realized that peace finally had arrived only when the fire siren and gin whistles began to blow at 6 o'clock.

First State Bank, the post office and most business places remained closed throughout Wednesday.

Japan has surrendered and peace again reigns on earth.

The announcement, anxiously awaited for so long, came over the air at 6 o'clock Tuesday evening.

In making the announcement, President Truman said he regarded the surrender as "unconditional".

"I deem the reply a full acceptance of the Potsdam declaration which specified the unconditional surrender of Japan. In the reply there is no qualifications", he said.

The Japanese note, however, directly followed one from Secretary of State Byrnes in which the Allies agreed that the Japanese would be permitted to keep their emperor, at least for a time.

V-J Day will be proclaimed after the surrender has been formally accepted by General of the Army Douglas MacArthur, who has been named by the President as the supreme commander to receive the Japanese surrender.

City of Matador Lowers Tax Rate

The City of Matador lowered its tax rate from 57.9 to 56 cents per \$100 for the 1991 year at the Council meeting August 9, beginning at 7:30 a.m. All Council members were present. The newly hired City Secretary, Seven Alexander, was also present. Nell Berryman is retiring October 1.

Kate Hurt thanked the Council for having the confidence in her to hire her for the City Secretary job originally, but explained that due to their family business, she was resigning the city job.

The minutes and bills were read by Nell Berryman and accepted. Outstanding July expenses are \$3,975.67.

Rodney Williams, representing the Fire Department, presented and explained the analysis of Key Rate inspection that was made in July. Williams also asked the City to pass the Arson Reward ordinance. This was passed.

Health Insurance Agent, Sandy Doward, presented a new insurance policy to the Council members. The present policy premium had gone up and the Council decided to find another policy.

The Mayor read a letter he received from the Texas Department of Health informing the council that a law suit against EPA by the National Wildlife Foundation and the Natural Resources Defense Fund has been settled. The judgement required the parties to agree to a

30 days from the settlement date and 6 months from that date. Rules will be promulgated by the end of January 1992. This meaning the City will have until January to close the City Landfill and make other arrangements.
Meeting adjourned.

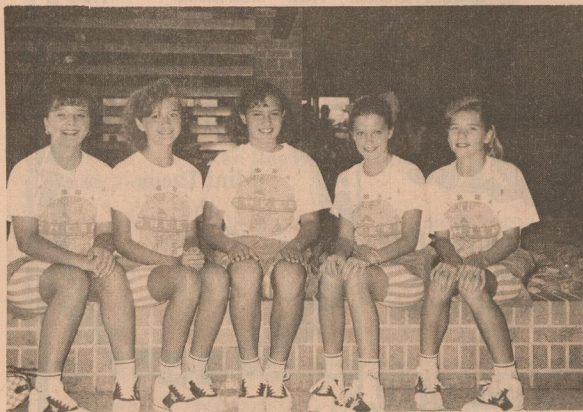
DPS Urges Caution For Back To School Driving

PARENTING TIPS FOR COPING WITH STRESS...

With the current state of national affairs, the need for attention to children is more crucial than ever. Today's high-stress circumstances--like the unrest in the Middle East, job layoffs and an unsteady economy--impact many families. The high levels of stress that many families are experiencing make children particularly vulnerable as family stability is threatened by forces over which parents have little or no control.

The following tips can help your family cope in better times of stress:

* Remember to be the parent. Children need your attention at times like these.

* Keep communication open. Listen and don't duck the hard questions.

* Be reassuring and comforting. Listen to your child's fears. Let the children know you will be there for them.

* Be truthful about your feelings. Children can sense when you're upset and if they don't know why they may believe they are the cause.

* Spend time together. Family activities and games will help everyone relax and enjoy each other.

* Be consistent. Continue usual routines and household rules. Unexpected or sudden changes are confusing and stressful to children.

* Take time to think before you act. When disciplining your child don't over-react to your own fears and anxieties. Take steps to calm yourself down - count to 20, take several deep breaths or remove yourself from the scene for a few minutes.

* Don't take it personally. News of war or a lost job, difficult family events and other stresses can make your child

upset and irritable. Kids are only human--their moods may have nothing to do with you.

For additional information about parenting education and family life concerns, contact your local county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service agent office.

Golf Game Made Easier By Divising Own Rules

I do not play golf, but I understand it can be a frustrating game for an individual as well as for other golfers with whom they play. At a recent Jack and Jill golf tournament in Lamesa, after the game a golfer remarked, "On our team, we had two Jills, one Jack and one Jackass, who was me!"

I am told that buying and then replacing golf balls you lose is costly. Evidently, golf players lose more balls than I can imagine, because Alan Bingham, several years ago, made the game of golf

profitable (a trait of a Production Credit Ass. manager) by finding lost golf balls at the old course north of Roaring Springs. (I did say SEVERAL years ago!) His fellow golfmates teased him about being better at finding golf balls than playing the game. There are annual Easter egg hunts, how about an annual golf ball hunt?

The Camp Creek Golfers of Renown who play near Franklin, Texas have complained about a substantial number of golf balls disappearing from their course. At the same time, they noticed a lot of squirrels about the area. One day lightning struck a hollow tree on the

course, split it, and hundreds of golf balls rolled out. Most of them were red and white. They said the squirrels probably thought the green ones weren't ripe yet. Sounds like you have to be pretty squirrily to play golf!

I enjoy Hazel's column, "In The Rough", but I've convinced myself I get enough exercise without playing the game of golf. However, if I decide to learn to swing this club of iron, I would want to make the game a little easier by devising rules as the Camp Creek Golfers did. Here's a sample:

Rule No. 1. If a ball rolls to the cup, teetering on the edge but never actually drops in, the player may attempt to force the ball into the cup by shaping his lips in

such a way as to derive the greatest velocity of aim using only his lungs.

Rule No. 2. When arriving at the first tee, players may hit up to five balls accepting the drive that appears to be the best (assuming there is one).

Rule No. 3. No strokes will be assessed a player making an honest swing at the ball and missing it completely.

Rule No. 4. Should one golfing companion become ill while on the course, and it would appear hospitalization may be required, the game should be called so that all resources can be channeled to the stricken comrade. However, the vote to do so must be unanimous.

I bet it would be fun to play a game of golf with the Camp Creek Golfers!

are attending school for the first time and others who have moved to the neighborhood during the summer months and who may be unfamiliar with the area.

State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that has stopped to load or unload school children, to stop and remain stopped until one of three things happen. The bus driver signals you to go on by, they turn off the flashing red lights, or the bus itself remains in motion. This law applies whether you are meeting the bus or whether you are going in the same direction; with the only exception being drivers on the other side of

a divided highway (roadways separated by a physical median). These drivers are not required to stop when meeting the bus.

Motorist who must back their vehicles into the path of pedestrians or bicyclist should use extreme caution, noting that

the driver's line of sight is very limited in a backing maneuver. It's a good idea to physically inspect what's behind your vehicle prior to backing and while backing. Do it slowly and sound your horn, if necessary to ensure safety.

Let's all work together to make this a safe school year for our children by observing the speed limits in school zones and being alert for increased pedestrian traffic in neighborhoods at the beginning and ending of each school day.

The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

On July 22, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for approval of two new optional services, Exchange Connection Service and Customer Alerting Enablement. Exchange Connection Service will permit a customer of the Telephone Company to provide voice messaging service, telephone answering service, or other services to itself or to patrons of the customer. Customer Alerting Enablement will permit residence and business lines to receive an alerting tone (intermittent dial tone) transmitted by an Exchange Connection Service customer. The proposed effective date for this offering is September 23, and will be available statewide where facilities permit.

The calling party's telephone number and other originating network call information will be delivered to the Exchange Connection Service customer when the calling number and the called number are served by the same switch. Additionally, the caller's telephone number and other originating network call information may be recorded and stored by the Exchange Connection Service customer. Customers may be able to identify the caller before the call is answered. All Exchange Connection Service customers will be required to sign a non-disclosure agreement prior to being provided service. In the agreement the customer agrees not to disclose the calling party's telephone number unless the customer has written permission from the calling party.

The Telephone Company estimates these new services will increase its annual revenues during the first year by approximately \$1.2 million. Providers of voice messaging service and telephone answering services and their subscribers are the types of customers likely to be affected by approval of these services.

Exchange Connection Service is provided to customers in two parts: Local Serving Arrangement, which provides access to the exchange network; and Optional Service Features. The proposed rates, for both Exchange Connection Service and Customer Alerting Enablement, including installation charges, are as follows:
