Jimmy M. Ross of Quitaque was in as the Briscoe Judge Tuesday morning, June 30, after the Commissioners' Court had received Judge Fred Mercer's resignation in a special session.

Ross expressed a sincere desire to serve all the people of Briscoe County, and said that "his office door will always be open and he will be receptive to the constructive ideas of the people." He plans to have an open meeting soon, at which residents will be invited to voice their opinions about the future of Briscoe County.

Not having campaigned for this office, I have not had an opportunity to get acquainted with them prior to assuming this office," he said, "and I do want to get to know them and learn what their priorities are for our county government."

Ross is married to the former Velda Woods, daughter of Duke and Mary Woods. They have three daughters, Julie, Janet and Sammie Dee.

They are members of the Methodist Church and he is affiliated with the Democratic

He is a graduate of Flomot High School with the Class of 1961 and West Texas State University in 1965.

He has also done graduate work at the University of Arizona. He was employed in public relations and education for High Plains Underground Water District in 1967-68, and was a member of the staff of Governor Preston Smith in 1969-70. He has been self employed since 1971.

He will be retiring soon as District Governor of Lions Club District 2T-1. He has served during the past year as secretary of the Lions Club statewide organization, and has been chosen as the state parliamentarian.

Ross was a Sunday School teacher in 1979-81, was chairman of the Administrative Council of his church in 1982-86, and is currently a Lay Leader.

He has been active in the Flomot Homecoming Association, serving as president in 1972-75, was Motley County Democratic Chairman in 1976, is serving as secretary of the board of directors of Water Control and Improvement, and has been a member of the board of directors of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative since 1984. the reason for his resignation and said, "I've really enjoyed these 8½ years I've served as County Judge."

He has also served in Commissioners Court, on the board of the Silverton Independent School District, on the ASCS county committee, as Scoutmaster and as Mayor of Silverton. He has been active in community service through his involvement in the Lions Club and other civic organizations.

On June 30, Alvaro Q. Carrasco, was found guilty by jury, of posession of less than 200 pounds and over 5 pounds of marijuana.



Recollections

con con con con con con THE EAST TEXAS CROW

Part I

I was reared in a land that was the home of what is commonly called the "East Texas Crow". They were quite plentiful and were a curse in more ways than one. A destroyer of much grain, and especially of young corn. Many farmers had their young corn. thinned to a scant stand by the hordes of crows that inhabited the timber and bottom lands of central

The crow was also a great thief, for they robbed the eggs of most all the feathered tribe that were not able to whip and herd them away. Turkeys, both wild and tame, knew enough to throughly cover their eggs with leaves and grass on leaving them. Else the robber crow made a feast of them.

The crow is a noisy bird, jet black in color and looks very much like the Raven, only he is a little smaller. They have a keen shrill voice that carries to great distances, while the raven has a dull croak that isn't heard very far.

I never saw ravens until I reached the prairie country in West Texas. When did I see them? I mistook them for crows that had a bad cold and were hoarse.

I assume both the crow and raven are kindred birds of similar

species. They have many traits in common, yet they are vastly different in many respects.

There are lots of ravens in the West. They abound from the Escarpment of the Llano Estacado eastward to the cross-timbers and eastward to the cross-timbers and nest and raise their young fairly well distributed, but seem migrate

southward in the winter time.

I had been in the West forty-eight years before I ever saw a crow in that part of the world.

South of my home a half a mile, there is an elevated ridge. In 1937 and during the winter season, I was sitting by a south window and glanced out just in time to see the land birds in the largest flock I had ever seen in all my lifetime. I thought they were ravens. The air was black with them from my house to the ridge mentioned above. None looked to be more than a couple of hundred feet high, and the drove looked to be a mile in length. All leisurely flying West and I estimated them to be five thousand ravens, only they turned out to be East Texas Crows. Most of them settled on an eleven acre field and the ground looked as black as

How poor a "crow-guesser" I was can be seen later, still no one will ever know how many crows were in that bunch. They stayed in this Part II next week

section until sometime in May, had a central roosting ground and scattered out every morning, north and south or parallel to the Caprock and covered a good fifty miles each way daily as they visited the farmer's feed lots for grain. Everyone in the country killed numbers of them. At my place, we killed a hundred and put them on maize stacks. That was the only way they could be kept off without spending all of one's time there.

In time a Government man came in and the roosts were bombed at night. It was said that five thousand dead crows were gathered and counted. Maimed and crippled crows could be seen everywhere, and still they stayed and one could hardly miss them. Stayed until they were ready to leave, and when that time came, there were no more crows. I saw their arrival, but not

their departure.
Where they came from or where they went can only be conjecture. They arrived following the great flood in the Ohio River Basin, and it could be that their feeding grounds had been flooded, and they were forced out in search of food.

On leaving the roost in the morning around and shortly after daylight, they seemed to leave leisurely a few at a time in small bunches. At least, that is the way they came to and passed over my place. All that passed over by no means stopped with me.

Then late in the afternoon, they passed back on their way to the roosting ground. One evening shortly before sundown, I chanced to stop out in the yard in time to see what looked to be the lead of the flock passing my way. Thought would count as many as I could. Sometimes they would come over pretty thick and wide, and the they would thin out a little, but it was a continuous flight. I counted two thousand; got tired and quit and still the crows flew by. While they were here as thick as house flies were here as thick as house flies in the summertime, I had an occasion to go to Lubbock. It is fifteen miles from my house to the Cap-rock and the crows were everywhere. After going on the Plains, I saw no more crows and yet they roosted in five or six miles of the Cap-rock. Everyone on the Plains had feed stacks and lots of loose grain. That seems a little strange and unbelievable too.

Goodnight says that buffalo never went on the Plains until driven there by the buffalo hunters. The crows could have but didn't seem to care to go, nor did the prarie dog ever inhabit the Plains to any great



Notice is hereby given that DICKENS ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service effective July 19, 1987 or as the reactive as may be soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. Based upon a test year ending December 31, 1986 the increase requested over actual test year revenues is \$1,395,775 or

Effective April 1, 1986 the Utility switched wholesale power suppliers from West Texas Utilities (WTU) to Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, Inc. (Brazos). Based upon a test year which is adjusted to take into account differences in the WTU and Brazos wholesale rates the increase requested is \$815,703 or 7.62%. The utility believes that purchasing its wholesale power requirements from Brazos will result in lower total cost. Increases or decreases in the cost of power purchased by the Cooperative are passed on to its members.

The changes are applicable to all areas, all customer classes, and all customers served by the Utility. The Utility intends to change its service rules and regulations including rules relating to obtaining service, the provision of electric service, and discontinuance of service.

Implementation of the proposed changes is subject to approval by the appropriate regulatory authority. A statement of intent including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change is available at the general office of the Utility located at Spur, Texas.


