## Matador City Council meets in regular session

The Matador City Council met Thursday, August 10 with Council members, Terry Simpson, Chuck Ream, Bert Darsey and Lara Davey in attendance. Also present were Mayor Pat Smith, Water Superintendent Steve Barton, City Secretary Debra Scott and City Attorney Tom Hamilton. Councilman Pat Seigler was absent. Mayor Smith called the meeting to order and asked Chuck Ream to give the invocation.

No one participated in Open Forum.

Mr. Barton reported the landfill is in good shape. A water transmission line had burst and a valve was broken effecting water supply to the City. Mr. Barton is repairing the water valve at midnight because he has to shut water off to the entire town while the valve is being replaced. SPAG suggested we apply for an emergency grant to replace the lines from the wells at Roaring Springs into town.

Mayor Smith commended Mr. Barton for cleaning up the Campbell lot.

Ms. Scott showed Council the Appraisal Budget, noting the increase in their budget was to pay additional help for Ag and Home appraisals. Wendi Taylor turned in her resignation, effective August 23, to accept a job offer at Farm Bureau. Contracts have been signed to start the Water Line Grant with SPAG.

Tom Hamilton was present to go over the Sub-standard Housing Ordinance with Council. This ordinance will allow the City to condemn certain houses that are posing a fire threat or endangering the public. The ordinance will be at City Hall if anyone wishes to have a copy. A motion to approve the ordinance was made by Chuck Ream, seconded by Lara Davey and the motion carried 4/0.

Council was approached by citizens about tapping into the city sewer from West of High-

way 70. The city is not required to provide sewer connections to land annexed before 1972. The city may allow someone to access city sewer lines if the following is agreed to: (1) must be okayed with the City as to how it is to be done; (2) the customer will pay all costs including bore lines, pipe and lift station; and (3) the city is not held responsible for any repair or damages.

The minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved. The bills were reviewed and approved for payment.

Council approved the addition of a street light for Hackberry Creek Care Center.

A motion was made and approved to hold a public hearing at 5:30 p.m., August 24, to set the tax rate for 2006, at 41 cents per one hundred dollar evaluation.

A motion was made and approved to award Roy Moreno a \$1500 bonus for obtaining his Landfill License.

A motion was made and approved to lease a copier from Tascosa Office Supply.

Council approved to table the Matador Housing Authority until further notice.

The Water District board requested that Council increase the amount paid for water to \$1700 per month to cover the electric bill and other expenses. Council made a motion to approve and amend the budget to reflect the increase.

Council made a motion to table the Chamber of Commerce Contract on the lease of the upstairs apartment until the next meeting but to bill them for insurance.

Money was moved from Water Works and the General Fund into one month CDs with a renewal date of the 15th of the month.

Chuck Ream asked that an appointment to the Matador Housing Authority Board be put on next months agenda.

## Motley County I.S.D. Trustees lower tax rate

Motley County I.S.D. School Board members adopted the 2006-2007 budget and voted to lower the tax rate from \$1.50 to \$1.37 at the August 21 board meeting. This decrease was possible due to recent legislation lowering the maximum tax rate. New school finance laws also require lowering the tax rate by an additional 33 cents for the 2007-2008 school year.

"We are decreasing our tax rate 13 cents from last year and are still getting to do some good things with our budget because the state is picking up more of

the burden than the local taxpayer is," Superintendent Randy Brown said. "We are generating more money than we would otherwise, because the state is now paying us more than we are losing by lowering taxes."

The majority of the addi-

tional revenue will be used to pay for transportation needs. Anticipated increased costs of fuel and utilities were also addressed in the adopted budget.

The district is also paying tuition and books costs for students taking dual-credit classes. Gifted and talented students

will now receive additional instruction by Donna Hoyle, who previously served the district as a Kindergarten teacher.

"These are positive things for the district that we are excited about," said Brown. "We feel good about being able to do this for our students and for the taxpayers."

## School Board meets for two regular sessions, one called meeting in August

The Motley County School Board met Monday, August 14 in a regular scheduled meeting. All board members were present with the exception of Lewis Drum. Also present were Superintendent Randy Brown, Principal Marilyn Hicks and Denise Ford. Lewis Drum entered the meeting at 7:40 p.m.

Mr. Brown gave the invocation. No one was present for Open Forum.

Mr. Brown went over the board goals that were discussed at the previous meeting.

Bids were opened for the use of liquid propane gas. After a review motion by Drum, and seconded by Woolsey to accept the bid from Wylie Gas.

Motion by Davey, seconded by Woolsey to accept the bid from Cornelius Oil.

Bids for the 2006/07 school insurance were tabled until the next board meeting.

Motion by Fisk, seconded by Drum to add Randy Brown as the authorized representative for Mot-

ley County ISD to the Lone Star Investment Pool.

During the Superintendent's report, Mr. Brown informed the board that Motley County ISD received a Recognized rating for the 2005-06 school year. There will be a combined Pep Rally/TAKS Rally, September 1 at 10:00 a.m. on the courthouse lawn to celebrate for the TAKS and kick off the Matador's football season. The first day of school shows preliminary attendance for the 2006-07 school year to be good. Carolyn Lancaster has resigned as the ITV paraprofessional aide for personal reasons. Pam Newman has been hired to fill this position.

The board went over the preliminary figures for the 2006-07 budget. The budget hearing will be held Monday, August 21.

The board entered executive session at 8:55 p.m. and exited session at 9:27 p.m.

Out of executive session, Mr. Brown recommended to the board to compensate the Ag teacher for use of his personal vehicle and personal equipment.

Motley County ISD Board of Trustees met Monday, August

21, 7:00 p.m., in a called meeting. All members were present. Also present were Superintendent Randy Brown, Principal Marilyn Hicks and Denise Ford.

The invocation was given by Mr. Brown. No one was present for open forum.

The board reviewed the proposed budget and expenditures.

The board discussed setting the tax rate at \$1.37 for the 2006-07 school years.

The Board met Monday, August 21 in a regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. All board members were present, as well as Superintendent Randy Brown, Principal Marilyn Hicks and Denise Ford.

David Stafford gave the invocation. No one was present for open forum.

The board reviewed the minutes of the previous meetings and expenditures.

Denise Ford discussed with the board the 2005-06 budget items that needed to be amended. The board approved to amend the budget.

There are some features that exist both in Berlin and in Motley County. And some that could, if only they were not impossible.

In the category of features that exist in both places, there is the item called a parade. All local residents are familiar with the parades that can be enjoyed in Roaring Springs on the occasion of the 4th of July and Old Settlers'.

One of the Berlin variety that took place on July 15th is called the Love Parade. It featured 40 bands on trucks from 17 countries playing music so loud it could be heard all over the city. Surrounding these trucks with music, as they moved up the Street of the 17 of June from the Victory Column through the Tierpark, were something like a million "ravers". Thus are termed the young people who like rave music (the kind blaring from the trucks), and they danced and danced to the music into the night. The throbbing music boom-boom-boom went on until well past 11pm.

In the category of features that could exist in both places there is the Motz Street Party. The Motz Street in Schoneburg was blocked off, and the sides of the street were lined with booths selling all manner of things--balloons, jewelry, leather goods, books, and food, food, food. And then there were the bands, countless, each playing different kinds of music, placed so that they did not interfere with each other, but the pedestrians went from one band area to the next, and it made for quite an experience.

The Motz Street (and surrounding streets) were mobbed with people, walking, talking, looking at all the goods on offer, munching on sausages or chickens or Doner (thin slices of meat wrapped in thin round bread sort of like tortillas), and dancing to the bands whose music they liked.

There was a street party in Matador, too, years ago, with food and a band playing music perfect for dancing in the street. People sat at the tables and ate and chatted, and many danced. The evening was beautiful, and was much enjoyed by all who were there.

But there hasn't been a street party in Matador for years now. Isn't it time to revive the custom, and make it a yearly event? Or is this desire merely the rambling of someone too dim to realize it is impossible?

## Notice of Public Hearing on Tax Increase

The **Motley County Commissioners' Court** will hold a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in the preceding tax year by **1.256** percent (percentage by which proposed tax rate exceeds lower of rollback tax rate or effective tax calculated under Chapter 26, Tax Code). Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property and the tax rate that is adopted.

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## A Praying People

"Now He was telling them a parable to show that at all times they ought to pray and not lose heart."

Bids were opened for the 2006-07 property, general liability, fleet insurance, and accepted the bid from Pat Carson Insurance.

Mr. Brown recommended the board hire Karen Davis for the part-time Reading Interventionist position open. The board approved.

For the part time Gifted and Talented teacher, Mr. Brown recommended Donna Hoyle. The board approved.

During the Principal's report, Mrs. Hicks informed the board that enrollment is at 171. On August 24, Motley County children were bussed to Roaring Springs for the Old Settlers Parade. After returning to school they were treated to a picnic lunch of hot dogs grilled by Jim Cooper. After lunch the children attended a presenta-

tion by Dr. Gamble with his mule and wagon.

The Spirit Rally was held Monday, August 28.

On the first week of school students went over disaster drills.

Mr. Brown informed the board that September 18 will be the regular board meeting. At this meeting the board will hold a public hearing for the FIRST (Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas) school rating. Motley County received a Superior rating; this is the highest possible rating. This task has been accomplished by the hard work of Denise Ford and Richard Watson. There will be a policy review meeting on September 25 and 26 for all board members and administration. There will be a called board meeting September 25 to approve the policy changes.



## Proof of the Truth

### REMEMBER RADIOHALOS!
