A 2-day Softball Tournament has been set for June 16-17 to raise funds for the Relay for Life Event, which is scheduled to be held June 23-24.

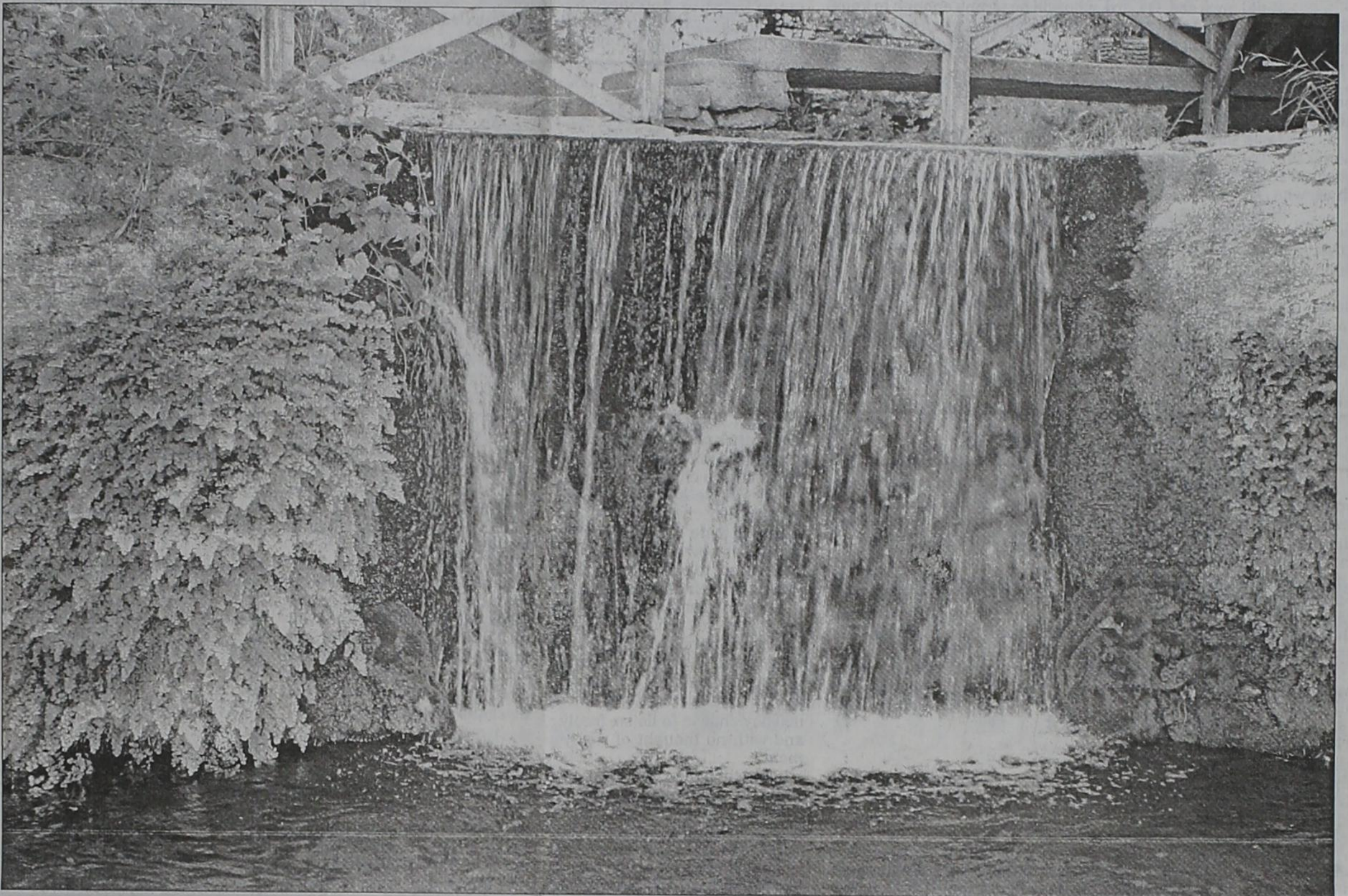
The tournament is open to all teams for an entry fee of \$110. To sign up call 806-347-2943.

Motley County Commissioners meet in regular monthly court session

Motley County Commissioners Court met for their regular meeting, Monday, June 11. Members of the court present were County Judge Ed D. Smith; Commissioners Ronnie Davis, Donnie Turner, Franklin Jameson and Russell Alexander; County Clerk Kate Hurt. Also in attendance were Sheriff Jim Meador, County Attorney Tom Edwards and assistant Carol Campbell.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read by Mrs. Hurt and approved by the court. Outstanding bills were reviewed, as well as reports by the Treasurer, Tax-Collector, Justice of the Peace, County Agent and Library. All bills were approved for payment and all reports were approved.

TxDOT representative Ben

Kautz met with the court to request leasing space on the Radio tower. The State is in the process of upgrading their radio system and will need to install a repeater on the tower. This will be beneficial to the county also. The court was in full agreement for Mr. Kautz to have TxDOT prepare an agreement for their approval.

Carol Campbell informed the Court that the Texas Historical Commission has invited the county to proceed to the project proposal stage of the Texas Preservation Trust Fund Grant

Program application process. Ms. Campbell submitted the request for the grant on the Motley County Jail Restoration Project. THC received 123 applications requesting more than

\$4.9 million in grant funds. Motley County was one of 44 selected in the state to proceed to the proposal stage. The final project selection will be very competitive. THC will announce final grant awards in November 2007.

County Extension Agent, Ryan Martin, informed the court of his recent trip to San Francisco. The trip was fully

funded by the Texas State 4-H program. Ryan toured wind farms and obtained more infor-

mation on their production. County landowners may contact Mr. Martin for more information.

Judge Smith informed the court he has contacted companies to repair the termite damage and water leaks in the courthouse.

80th Legislature a success for West Texas

Despite the usual - and some markedly unusual - political turmoil during the most recent legislative session, the West Texas legislative program was enormously successful in the 80th Legislature.

Several West Texas legislators held key positions during the appropriations process. Rep. Warren Chisum of Pampa was appointed by Speaker Tom Craddick to serve as chairman of the House Appropriations Committee. Rep. Carl Issett of Lubbock also served in a key role on that committee, along with Rep. Drew Darby of San Angelo. I was pleased to serve on the Senate Finance Committee and on the appropriations conference committee that negotiated the final state budget totaling \$152 billion.

The state was fortunate to encounter a historic surplus this year, which enabled the Legislature to reduce school property taxes to \$1 as we promised in April 2006. We managed to maintain at least \$2 billion in the Rainy Day Fund, which may grow to more than \$4 billion by 2010, and reserve \$2.5 billion to support continuation of the property tax cuts for the 2010-2011 budget cycle.

The budget appropriates \$280 million for across-the-board teacher pay raises and an additional \$340 million in incentive funding. We recognize teachers are professionals, and it's critical that we treat them — and pay them — as profes-

sionals. To help our retired teachers, we shored up the Teacher Retirement System with \$635 million in new funding and mandated that the state's contribution shall not be less

than the active teachers' contribution. This step will help the TRS Board in providing a 13th month check to those retirees in desperate need of assistance.

Local farmers and ranchers asked to nominate peers for Motley County FSA Committee

Local farmers and ranchers are asked to nominate eligible peers as candidates for election to the Motley County Farm Service Agency county committee (COC), June 15 through August 1. The 2007 election will be held in LAA-3, covering the area from highway 70 east and west to the southern Motley County line. This area is currently represented by Truitt Read.

The COC nomination period is an important time for the community because county committee members make federal farm program delivery decisions that significantly affect producers and the area's agricultural sector as a whole.

For example, committee members make decisions on applications for disaster assistance. Committee members play a vital role in helping local farmers and ranchers weather tough financial times and natural disasters.

To hold office as a county committee member, a person must meet basic eligibility requirements. Contact the county

office staff or visit <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/pas/publications/elections> for details about candidate eligibility. Nomination forms can be obtained at the county office or online at the above address.

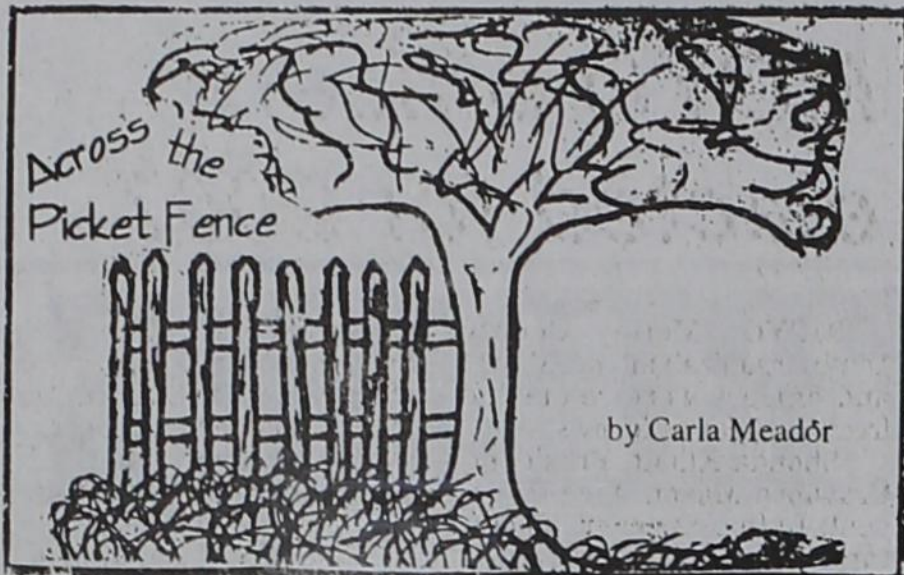
Voting for COC nominees takes place in the fall. Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters by November 2 and December 3 is the last day to return voted ballots to the county office. Newly elected members and alternates take office January 1, 2008.

There will be two public meetings take place for discussion on the 2007 election process. The first one will be held on Wednesday, June 13, 2007, at 9:00 a.m. and the second on Wednesday, July 11, 2007, at 9:00 a.m. at the Matador USDA Service Center Meeting Room. A FATHER'S PRAYER
by General Douglas MacArthur

Build me a son, O Lord, who will be strong enough to know when he is weak, and brave enough to face himself when he is afraid, one who will be proud and unbending in honest defeat, and humble and gentle in victory.

Build me a son whose wishbone will not be where his backbone should be; a son who will know Thee - and that to know himself is the foundation stone of knowledge.

Lead him, I pray, not in the path of ease and comfort, but under the stress and spur of difficulties and challenge. Here let him learn to stand up in the storm; here let him learn compassion for those who fail.

Build me a son whose heart will be clear, whose goal will be high; a son who will master himself before he seeks to master other men; one who will learn to laugh, yet never forget how to weep; one who will reach into the future, yet never forget the past.

And after all these things are his, add, I pray, enough of a sense of humor, so that he may always be serious, yet never take himself too seriously. Give him humility, so that he may always remember the simplicity of true greatness, the open mind of true wisdom, the meekness of true strength.

Then, I his father, will dare to whisper, "I have not lived in vain."

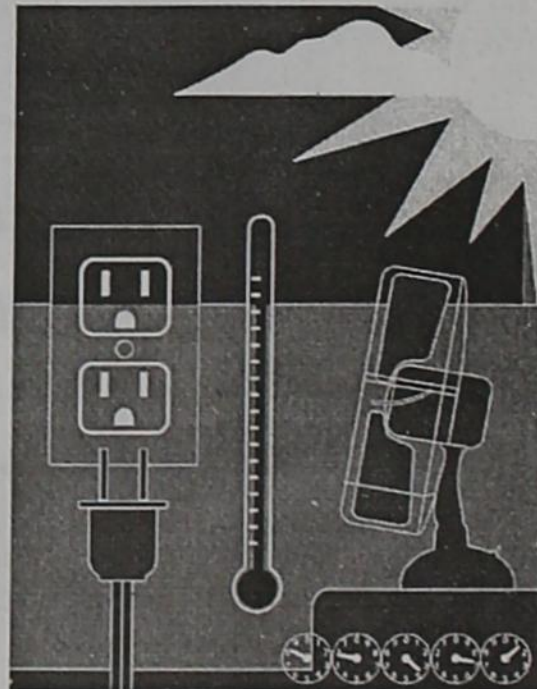

80th Legislature a success for West Texas

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Together, these figures total \$1.2 billion in new funding for public education salaries and benefits.

For higher education, we added significant funding to the basic formula and stipulated that no university or community college would receive less state money than they did in the last biennium. These mechanisms are important to all institutions of higher education, but especially at our community colleges where enrollment and associated formula support may have decreased because of our robust economy drawing more students into the workforce and temporarily away from higher education.

For Texas Tech, we secured in excess of \$120 million in new appropriations. Included in that total is the long-awaited appropriation of \$48 million to secure faculty and begin operations at Tech's new four year medical school in El Paso.

With astounding community support, the Legislature realigned Angelo State University with the Texas Tech system. We expect students at both campuses will benefit from that new

partnership.

We used the surplus to benefit our state's health care services. We changed the enrollment deadlines in Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) to allow families to register once a year as opposed to twice a year for their children's health care benefits. This should ensure 100,000 eligible children will be added to the list of young Texans with health insurance. This change is especially important for West Texas as we have lost more enrollees than other parts of the state as a result of the 2003 budget short-fall decision to require six-month eligibility. We allocated \$99 million for higher nursing home reimbursement rates and put \$57 million in our state schools to provide for enhanced quality and to address the issues raised by recent Department of Justice reports criticizing the Lubbock State School. And, we passed legislation to increase transparency in the many facets of our health care system so that consumers may better gauge the expected cost of their health care and under-

stand the components of their insurance coverage.

Our natural resources are precious and with Senate Bill 3 by Sen. Kip Averitt of Waco, the Legislature took an important step toward wise preservation and maintenance of our water supplies. SB 3 designated several reservoir sites throughout the state, including Marvin Nichols in North Texas. The vision behind this reservoir is that it will provide water for thirsty cities, such as Dallas and Fort Worth, without dipping into our reserves in West Texas. Most importantly, we have funded the state's obligation for projects called for under the state water plan which is significant for infrastructure in our West Texas communities.

I'm proud of what we've been able to accomplish in these rather tumultuous times. The budget is a disciplined budget that addresses our state's critical needs, restores some of the painful cuts made necessary in 2003, and reserves funds to support our future obligations to hold the property tax cuts pro-

vided in 2005. Your delegation worked hard for you, and I must mention the extraordinary presence of our two "freshmen" members, Rep. Drew Darby of San Angelo and Rep. Joe Heflin of Crosbyton. Along with the experience of your more seasoned representatives, Sen. Kel Seliger of Amarillo and Reps. Delwin Jones and Carl Isett of Lubbock, John Smith of Amarillo and David Swinford of Dumas, we worked together to achieve the best possible session for the people of West Texas.
