The 55th Annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show will be held on Saturday, March 11, 1995 at the Motley County Livestock Barn. The Livestock Show is sponsored each year by local volunteers to provide an opportunity for 4-H and FFA members to exhibit their livestock projects. By caring and feeding their livestock throughout the feeding period, youth have the opportunity to learn responsibilities and increase their knowledge of the livestock industry.

Matador Native Named Distinguished Alumnus By Perkins School of Theology

Bishop Dan E. Solomon has been named one of two 1995 Distinguished Alumni of Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University.

Solomon is bishop of the Oklahoma Area Conference of the United Methodist Church and also chairs the World Division of the General Board of Global Ministries. He is recognized for his efforts to provide opportunities for women and minorities in ministry, and his sensitivity to the plight of those in need around the world.

Bishop Joel N. Martinez of the Nebraska Area Conference is the other award recipient. Both recipients will be honored at an awards presentation on Monday, February 6, at SMU.

Solomon was born in the town of Matador and grew up on a farm near Tulia, both in Northwest Texas. His mother is Mabel Jenkins Solomon, formerly of Matador. He earned his bachelor's degree from McMurry University, his Master of Divinity degree from Perkins School of Theology and his Doctor of Ministry degree from United Theological Seminary. He holds honorary doctorates from McMurry University and Okla-

homa City University.

Solomon's first appointment was at First United Methodist Church in Plainview. He then undertook the task of establishing a new congregation, St. Stephen United Methodist Church in Amarillo. He went on to serve churches in Corpus Christi and San Antonio and served as district superintendent for Kerrville.

Since his election as bishop and his appointment to the Oklahoma Area Conference in 1988, Solomon has demonstrated a commitment to equal opportunity for women and minorities by appointing the first woman and the first ethnic minority person to the cabinet in Oklahoma and the first woman district superintendent to the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference. He has also been a leader in making appointments to accommodate clergy couples. He has served his local community by working to create nonviolent Shalom Zones in Oklahoma City.

Solomon currently serves as chair of the World Division of the General Board

of Global Ministries. He has given invaluable leadership to that division as it sets church policy on affairs outside the United States. He previously served on the Commission on the Status and Role of Women and chaired the General Board of Church and Society.

In nominating Solomon for the award, North Oklahoma City District Superintendent William R. Henry wrote, "I would say that Dan E. Solomon has the theology of an Albert Outler, the concern for the disenfranchised of a Mother Teresa, the tenacity of a Jack Nicklaus, and the energy of my three grandchildren."

Perkins School of Theology was founded in 1915 by the Methodist Episcopal Church South, now the United Methodist Church, as one of the original schools of Southern Methodist University. Offering a variety of degree programs, it remains one of the few university-related theological schools in the nation.

DIABETES A CONCERN FOR ALL TEXANS

For many Texans, factors influencing health are personal lifestyle, diet, heredity and environment. Poor lifestyle choices such as poor eating habits, insufficient exercise and lack of responsibility for individual health and safety result in two-thirds of all illnesses and premature deaths.

In 1986 through 1988 some 6,952 Texans listed diabetes as one of the causes of death. Currently, more than 850,000 Texans, one half of which are unaware that they have the disease, suffer from diabetes.

In all, Texans suffering from the long-term disease will spend an estimated \$1,275,000,000 per year in direct (medical care) and indirect (lost productivity) costs.

Diet has been of critical importance in managing diabetes and embarking on educational programs such as that of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which will enable persons with diabetes to make positive changes and practice self-care diabetes management. Nutrition education planned by local county Extension agents in consumer and family sciences can help persons with diabetes control blood glucose levels and make certain lifestyle changes following the primary education by the physician and the dietitian.

Extension educators continually organize educational programs such as low-fat cooking, reducing fat, sugar and sodium in recipes, weight maintenance, etc. to meet the needs of many audiences and are trusted for providing sound advice.

Although some \$210,792,187 are spent reaching 91,116 clients with diabetes by such agencies as the Texas Rehabilitation

Commission, Texas Commission for the Blind, Texas Department of Health and the Department of Human Services, none of these focus their effort solely on education. The American Diabetes Association or The American Diabetes Association - Texas Affiliate focus their efforts on association work to benefit clients with diabetes providing publications, meeting opportunities and professional development opportunities. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is the only organization devoted solely to the goal of education. Diabetic programming efforts have been conducted as one of many areas of Extension education.


Today, more than ever before, nutrition education is essential in the management of diabetes and in reducing the risk of developing long-term complications. One goal of nutrition education also is to help people improve their lifestyle habits. Dietary changes related to eating habits can occur when support and guidance are consistent and realistic goals are set and a better way to know if the education was successful.

Progress is being made through Extension diabetes programming efforts. Persons with diabetes are making changes related to eating and nutrition, daily exercise and glucose monitoring. This ultimately leads to improved health.

Diabetes is a major health problem in Texas. It is important to assess why some persons with diabetes are better able to control the symptoms than others. Also, education gives confidence in the ability to control and take charge of diabetes.

Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all citizens without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age, or national origin.

The Motley County tennis players are working hard for a winning season with the help of their coach, Coach Brewer. There are currently 17 players consisting of six boys and eleven girls.



DEALING WITH A "KNOW-IT-ALL"



Agriculture Workers, Pesticide Handlers Training March 15

A pesticide safety training for agricultural workers and pesticide handlers will be held in conjunction with the Spring Cotton Production Seminar on Wednesday, March 15th at the Flomot Community Center. The registration will start at 8:30 a.m. with the training to begin at 9:00 a.m.

To comply with the Worker Protection Standard (WPS), all ag workers and pesticide handlers must be trained in pesticide safety. The training must follow WPS guidelines and be conducted by a certified or licensed private applicator. A card will be issued to the employees to verify that they have been trained. The card is valid for five (5) years.

Ag worker is anyone employed for any type of compensation and performs tasks related to the production of agricultural plants. This includes harvesting, weeding, and watering. Pesticide handler is anyone hired for any type of

compensation by an agricultural establishment and is responsible for any tasks related to pesticides. This includes mixing, loading, transferring, applying, and incorporating pesticides.

All agricultural producers are responsible to assure that their farm employees are properly trained. All producers are strongly encouraged to bring their farm employees to the training in order to meet WPS regulations.

If your farm employee plans to attend the training, please contact the Motley County Extension Service, at (806) 347-2733, before March 13th in order to prepare for the meal.





Social Security Tips

REPORTING CHANGES IN LIVING ARRANGEMENTS FOR SSI PURPOSES

Do you know that if you receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI), you have a responsibility to report changes in your living arrangements to us? This is not difficult at all. All you need to know is what to report, when to report, and how to report.

The changes in your living arrangements you need to report include:

- * If you move to change your address.
- * If someone moves into or out of your household, someone in your household dies, or if someone in your household has a baby;
- * If you get help with food, utilities, rent, or mortgage; or
- * If you enter or leave a residential institution, hospital, skilled nursing facility, nursing home, intermediate care facility, halfway house, jail, prison, public emergency shelter or any other kind of institution; and/or
- * If you leave the United States.

You must report a change in your living arrangements within 10 days after the month it happens. You should report

a change even if you're late. If you don't report a change, you may miss out on money you need if the change will mean you can get a bigger check, or you may get too much money and have to pay it back.

If you don't report a change or if you make a false statement and get money you aren't supposed to, Social Security will make you pay back the money. You may also have to pay a fine, face imprisonment, or both.

You can make your report by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. any business day. The best times to call are later in the week and later in the month to avoid busy telephone lines.

You can also report by mail or in person. If you mail your report, be sure it shows:

- * The name of the person the report is about;
- * The Social Security number of the person who gets the SSI checks;
- * The change being reported;
- * The date the change happened; and
- * Your signature, address, and phone number.



In addition, Kater Hake, Extension Cotton Specialist - Lubbock, will be on hand to discuss cotton production in Rolling Plains and give an update on cotton market trends.

Cotton producers and landlords are reminded that March 15 is the last day to purchase Federal Crop Insurance policies with coverage above the minimum level required for participation in USDA administered programs.

PCG officials note that the recent extension in the sales deadline for crop insurance applies only to the minimum Catastrophic Coverage policy. Producers intending to purchase an additional coverage policy for the 1995 crop must do so by March 15. Producers wanting more information about crop insurance can call their county Consolidated Farm-Service Agency office.


