



Recollections by Duff Green

معده وحمده وحمد W.R. (BILL) TILSON

Old Bill Tilson was a Virginia product that somehow found his way to Texas during the early eighties and ultimately worked on the Matador Ranch during it's

harem-scarem, wild hey-days. Bill was as big as a Government Mule and physically a powerful fellow that could easily have matched Jake Killrain in the prize ring, and if a fellow was hunting trouble, he didn't have to go any further than Bill Tilson to find it.

Bill, like most all Virginians I ever knew, was trained in their youth to be good horsemen, trained as tourney or tournament performers and they never lived to be too old to love the sport.

The cueing of small suspended rings on the end of long pointed wooded-lances, while racing a speedy horse over the course, has many fine points of art and requires much practice to become at all, an expert. The tournament joust never seemed general in Texas, though followed to some extent.

The last one I ever say was back in the nineties at the Roaring Springs Falls on Tongue River. Bill Tilson was there, though he had no horse of his own. Bill was touched up enough to feel his oats, though not inebriated. John Chalk, a rancher nearby, loaned Bill a horse to ride The pony was a broke horse, but had never been used in a tournament. Bill saddled him up for a practice round. When he clipped the first ring, the pony shied to one side, putting him out of line for the

concons next ring. Bill tickled the horse in the ribs with his left spur to bring him back in line, and the pony downed his head and laid Bill on the gr then ran off with the saddle. ground,

Chalk caught the horse and brought him back. Bill tried the horse again and when the first ring clicked on the lance, he shied to one side again, Bill raked him the second time with his spur, and he again stacked Bill on the ground. When Chalk brought the horse back he said to Tilson, "Bill, let me wipe him out for you." Bill replied, "Hell no, I will wipe him out for myself." He crawled on the horse without his lance, caught the saddle horn with

his right hand, grabbed the horse with both spurs and, man alive, that horse went up in the air and turned round and around until Bill was spilled the third time in less than fifteen minutes, but Bill Tilson got up holding the saddle horn in his right hand. This was the first and only time I ever saw anyone rip the saddle horn loose before he could be thrown.

Cowmen's saddles are substantially made and the horns are belted to the fork or tree so securely that the heaviest wild horses, steers and bulls can be roped and held with rarely the loss of a saddle horn. Ropes are often broken in checking the terrific speed and weight of heavy wild animals, but it is rare, indeed, to have the saddle torn apart by them. Bill Tilson pulled one out by its roots as he came off that gentle horse.



Spraying in the 24th edition of the annual High Plains boll weevil battle got off to a fast start September 21. Twelve aerial applicators in near-perfect weath covered about 12,000 acres the first afternoon. In the next two days the 12 planes, using three airports, completed the program's first application, spreading insecticide on weevils infesting a total 56,497 acres in six counties.

Planes took off from airports at Spur, Post and Roaring Springs to hit the most heavily infested fields in Motley, Dickens, Kent, Garza, Floyd and Crosby Counties.

Pheromone sex attractant traps times as many boll weevils as had been caught in any previous year, altering program officials to the need for the expanded spraying expected this Fall. The program, initiated in 1963, knocks down lateseason weevil populations before they reach the diapause state necessary to winter hibernation. Doing this along and below the Caprock on the eastern edge of the High Plains each year has maintained the weevil-free status of the huge and concentrated cotton acreage just above the Caprock and on west into New Mexico.

Without the program, entomologists say, cotton production in the area might have ceased entirely and at best would have been severely curtailed years ago.

well reach above 500,000 this year, according to Ed Dean, Field Service Director for Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. PCG is the producer service organization responsible for the program. The excessive numbers emerging from hibernation this spring, Dean says, resulted from the mild 1986-87 winter. While it's normal to expect diapausing weevils to survive the winter at a rate of three percent or less, the survival rate for 1986-87 climbed to a surprising 18 percent, Dean explains. Contract for the spraying this

year was let to Perryton Flying Service. The Perryton, Texas company was the lowest of three bidders. The contractor will be paid \$5.09 per gallon for applying the program's low volume malathion at the rate of 12 ounces per acre, giving a per-acre application cost of about 48 cents. The smaller contract in 1986 went to McAdoo Flying Service, McAdoo, for \$5.35 per gallon.

The program is funded jointly by producers, through PCG's Boll Weevil Steering Committee, the U.S. and Texas Departments of Agriculture. Prior to this year federal funds were available to match producer and TDA funds dollar for dollar. But USDA's part of the cost for 1987 has been cut to 80
