## INTEREST LAGS IN STOCK SHOW

Interest is lagging in Motley County's Junior Livestock Show. The cause is money. Cost of producing a stock show animal is more than ordinary livestock, yet steers, swine and sheep must be sold at market prices when the show is over. Although Motley derives 35% to 50% of its income from livestock, parents are no longer compatible with the idea of losing money for the sake of the show. Prize money is excellent but it is not enough to offset the added expense.

The solution if the citizens of Motley County desire to continue the stock show, it will be necessary to buy some of the entries at bonus prices. County Agent Bill Palmeyer suggests that four calves, eight hogs and four lambs be purchased locally. A 5c premium on a calf would amount to about \$40. The same premium on a hog would be about \$10 and on a lamb, about \$5. The premium prices would also qualify for certain income tax benefits.

Other West Texas counties have found the same problem. Those that have continued their livestock shows have paid bonus prices at a local sale.

It is pointed out that memberships in the Motley County Livestock Association are needed in addition to the premium sale, to pay for show expenses as well as providing prize money.

The verdict is up to the people. County Agent Palmeyer and agriculture teachers Bill Moss and Bill Peacock (at Roaring Springs) would like to receive a response from the public.

Funeral services for W. D. Herring, 83, were held at Plainview at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church, and were attended by several Matador residents.

An early-day resident of Matador, Mr. Herring died at 5 a. m. Monday at Lubbock, after being in ill health for the past year. Burial was in Plainview Memorial Park.

## Paul Eubank's Work Is Living Monument

**PAUL EUBANK** loved young people and they loved him. He was a natural leader for the youth of Matador in 1937 when he started teaching school and became Scoutmaster of Troop 60. He was 29 when he died in January 1944, a Navy Air Corps Lieutenant. His one-man torpedo plane struck the side of his carrier ship during combat in the South Pacific as he was attempting to land in rough seas. Shipmates were helpless as they watched the angry water cover the pilot and his plane.

Lt. Paul Eubank was a member of the State Legislature House of Representatives from this district. He quit his desk and volunteered when the war started. Soft-spoken, gentle in manner, religious and dedicated to the service of mankind, Paul Eubank won friends easily and kept them eternally.

## US Highway 70 To Speed Up Traffic

US Highway 70 east and west through Matador is due for a re-zoning designed to speed up traffic under the direction of the Texas Highway Department.

District Engineer Palmer Massey in a letter to Mayor Bill Seale has requested a city ordinance to permit the re-zoning which will speed up traffic to as much as 45 MPH across the city limits of approximately one mile, with the exception of the business section which will probably be zoned for 35 MPH.

The recommendation of the Highway Department has been approved by Childress, Benjamin, Quanah, Paducah and Wellington.

An excerpt from Mr. Massey's letter follows: "We have found that the usual 30 MPH speed zone signs at the city limits are ineffective, ignored and often result in speed traps. Many of these 30 MPH signs are set too far out into the country, and the zoning, in addition to that mentioned above, is also a nuisance to the long distance traveler."

An ordinance making the re-zoning legal appears in this issue of the Tribune.

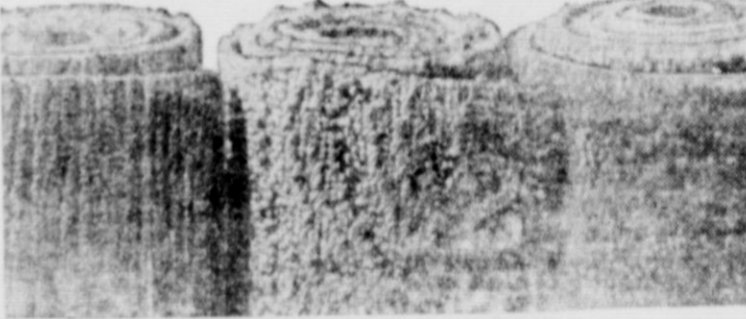

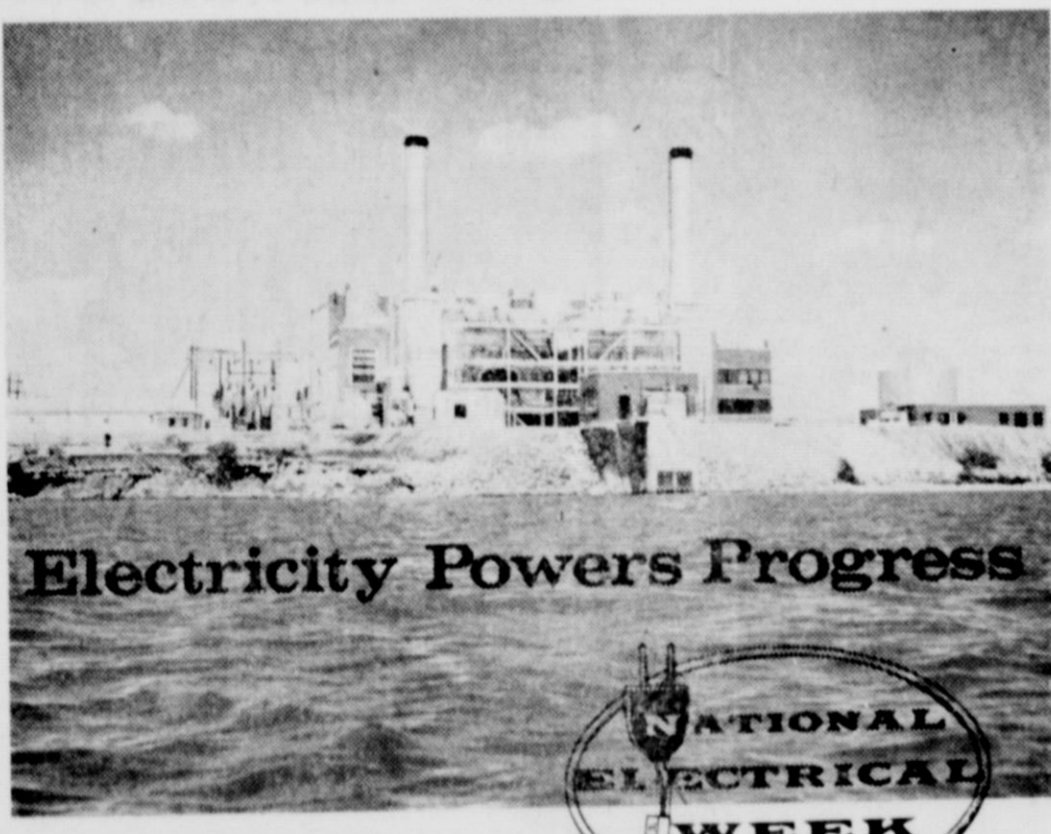

## Daily Attendance Urged By Officials By Supt. Ezzell

Someone has asked the question as to why or how will every student attending school every day help the school in a financial way. The answer is that the number of teachers allotted to the school by the State Department of Education is determined by the number of days each student attends school. Thus one student absent for one day could quite possibly mean a loss of as much as \$5,000 for the school by causing the school to be short on the number of days required for one teacher.

The number of teachers allotted to the Matador School is determined by dividing the number of days in the school year, 175, into the total days of attendance and then allotting one teacher for each 24 students attending 175 days.

At present, the Matador Schools are allotted 14 teaching units on the basis of last year's attendance. This could very easily be lowered if enough parents take their children shopping, visiting or out of school for any reason.

Students who miss school for illness are allowed to make up this work by state law, but those out for other reasons are not allowed to make up their work.

It would help the school a lot if parents could plan their children's shopping and visiting on week ends or days when school is not in session.

CITY OF MATADOR ORDINANCE REGULATING THE RATE AND SPEED OF MOTOR VEHICLES

Whereas, in Matador, Texas, an engineering and traffic investigation has been made to determine the maximum, reasonable and prudent speeds of motor vehicles on a certain section of U. S. Hwy 70;

Whereas, it has been determined by the engineering stud-

ies and traffic investigation that the maximum, reasonable and prudent speed for motor vehicles on said section of hereinabove mentioned road in Matador, Texas, should be set out hereinafter; and,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF MATADOR, TEXAS, ACTING BY AND THROUGH ITS CITY COUNCIL:

Section 1: That the section of U. S. Hwy. 70 described as follows: Hwy. U. S. 70 from the present West City Limits of the City of Matador to the present East City Limits, being a distance of approximately 1.021 miles,

is hereby regulated as to the speed of motor vehicles traveling within said section in any direction as evidenced by the attached plan which is hereby approved and made a part of this ordinance, and it shall be unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle at a speed in excess of any speed so declared in this ordinance when signs are in place giving notice thereof.

Section 2: Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not exceeding two hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Section 3: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.

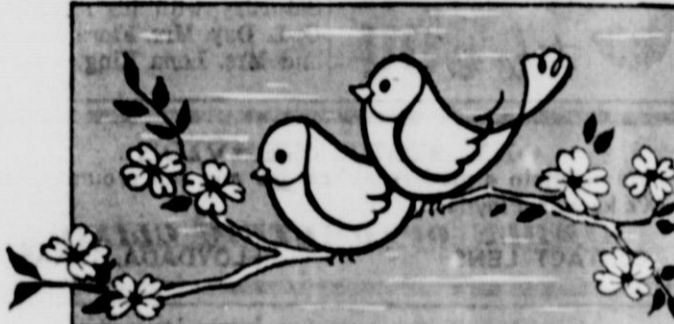

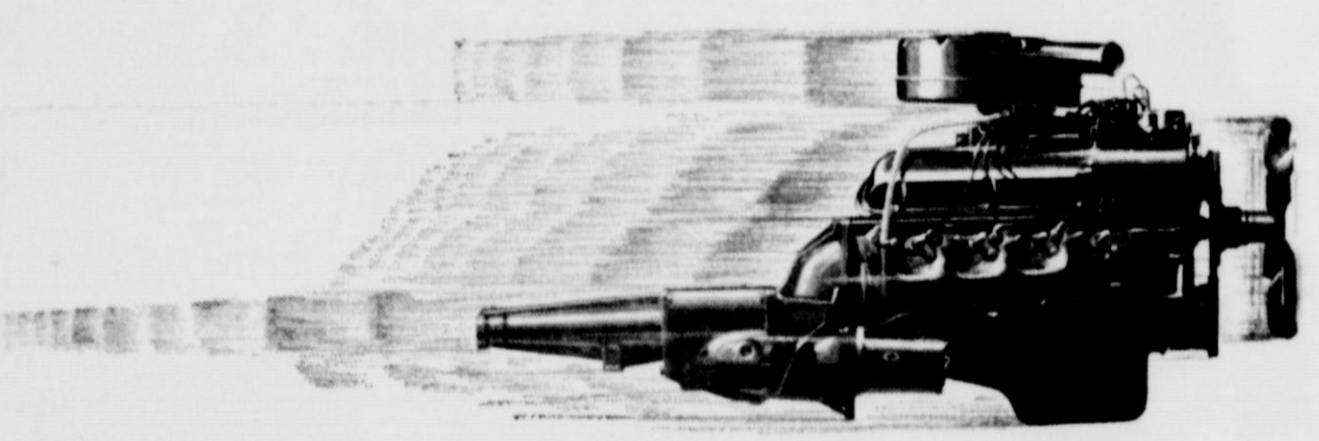

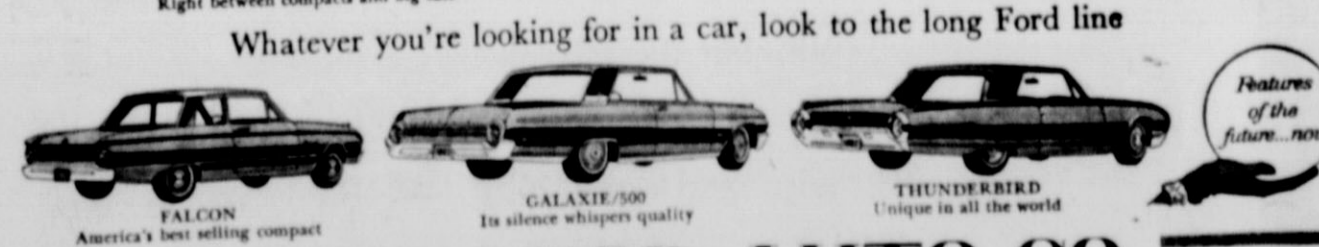
