





FmHA County Supervisor, said today. Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, rural homes and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Homes may be built on individual tracts or in subdivisions. Funds may also be used to modernize homes add improvements such as bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens and other improvements. Borrowers may buy an existing house and lot or buy a site on which to built a home. Loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the appraised value of the site and the new home. Interest rates for this type of loan are presently 8.75 percent with 33 year terms. Monthly payments are subsidized with the amount of the payment dependent on the borrowers annual income. Homes will be modest in size, design, and cost but about 1,050 square feet of living area.


In addition, Farmers Home Administration guarantees home ownership loans made to applicants of low or moderate income. Guarantees offer opportunities to families who are unable to afford a commercial loan without a Guarantee. These loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the value of the property and are made for terms of 30 years. The interest rate is based on the Federal National Mortgage Association rate with a maximum loan amount in most counties

The Farmers Home Administration through County Offices of the Farmers assists rural America by guaranteeing Home Administration (FmHA), Spur, private sector loans and by providing temporary, supervised direct loans to farm and housing borrowers who have a reasonable chance for success, and whose current needs cannot be met at reasonable rates and terms by commercial sources. 



Several main steps are involved in planning a successful reunion. Select a date and location convenient to most family members. Decide on an appropriate facility at which to gather. Summer dates are usually best for reunions. Families can plan vacations while children are out of school. The weather may be hot, but will still allow outdoor activities. Choose the date sufficiently far in advance for all family members to make plans. Depending on the location you choose, you may need to check to see when facilities are available before setting the reunion date.

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

HOME CLEANING CORNER

Spring Cleaning Doesn't Have to Be Torture

(NU) - Spring cleaning. The very words conjure up thoughts of days of drudgery and labor, right? Well, they don't have to.

Spring cleaning, like any job, is easier and more enjoyable if you just know the best way to do it. As a professional cleaner, I get a lot of questions on this topic. Here are some recent ones that should shed some springtime sunlight on the subject and help slash the time you spend cleaning:

Q. My house isn't huge, but no matter what I do, spring cleaning always threatens to become summer cleaning. How can I move R.J., New Jersey

A. First, make every move count. That means work around each room once. Eliminate backtracking by carrying your supplies with you in a special utility apron. Second, work from left to right, back to front and top to bottom. These motionefficient patterns keep you moving forward with visible results.

Q. I hate doing windows, especially outside. Is it true waddedup newspapers and vinegar work

A. Forget helpful hints and rely on what professionals trust: a squeegee, a window scrubber, and a cleaning solution of two to three tablespoons of clear, nonsudsing ammonia per gallon of cool water. Apply the ammonia solution with the window scrubber. Then squeegee clean and dry. Always start your

squeegee strokes on a dry spot and dry the blade after each stroke.

Q. My "no-wax" vinyl floors are really dullsville - nothing seems to help anymore. What can E.M., Chicago

A. A once-a-year process will make your floors look better the rest of the year. Take a "mop-on, no rinse" acrylic stripper and remove whatever you've been using on those floors. Then apply two separate coats of floor sealer, and finally a coat or two of acrylic floor finish. After it all dries you'll have a shiny, easy-care floor once again.

Q. My house has lots of walls. What's the best way to clean them T.R., New York

A. Don't clean. Paint. With the exception of the kitchen and bathroom, entire walls rarely need washing. Scrubbing textured or flat paintcovered walls often doesn't work and can take more effort than painting. Instead, clean key areas such as corner cobwebs, baseboards and around light switches. Vacuum walls as necessary to remove surface dust.


