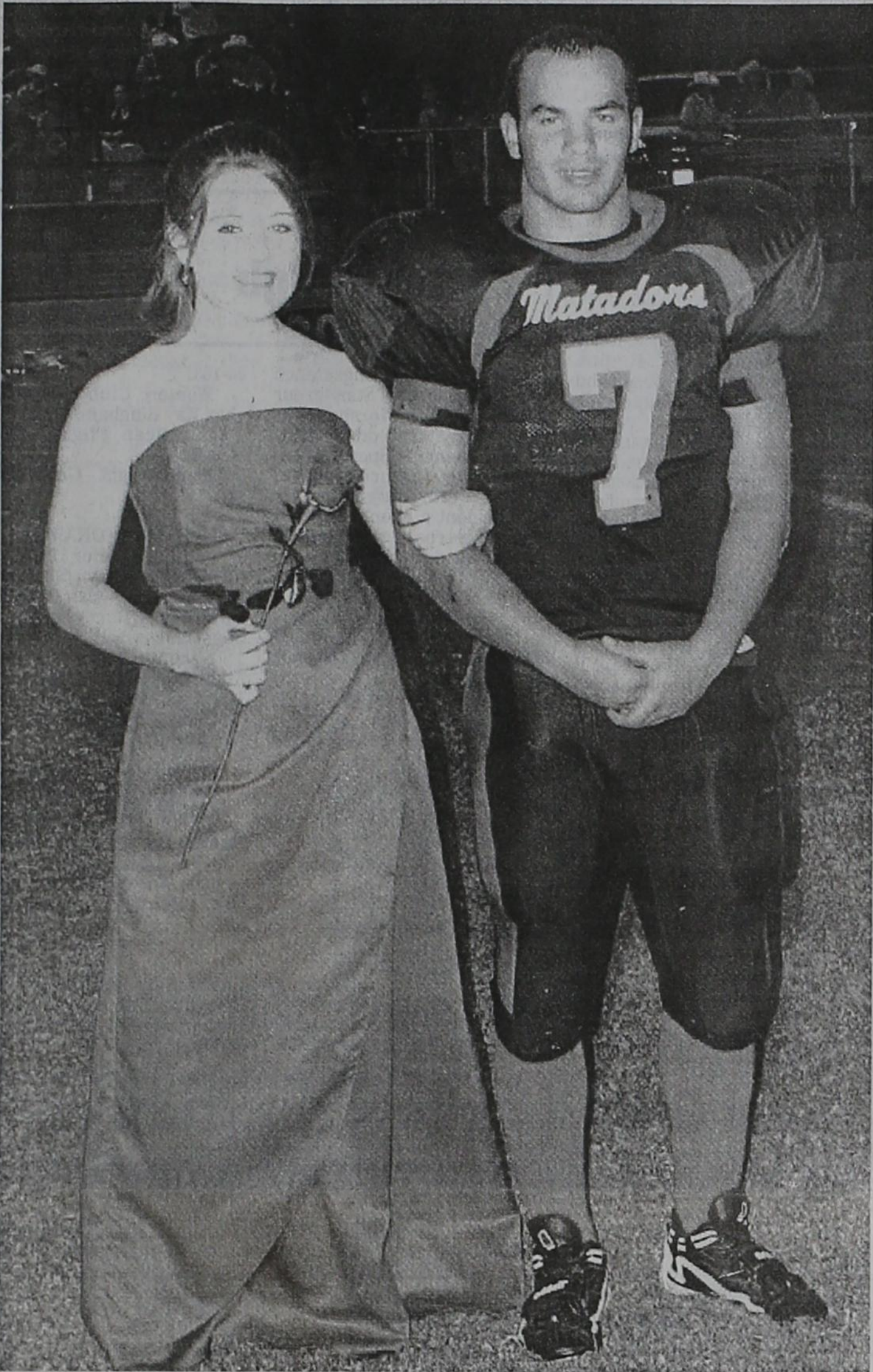

Matador City Council meets

Matador City Council met Thursday, September 14, for their regular monthly meeting. Council members present were Terry Simpson, Chuck Ream, Bert Darsey and Pat Seigler. Also present were Mayor Pat Smith, Water Superintendent Steve Barton, City Secretary Debra Scott and CPA Dianne Washington. Council member Lara Davey was absent.

Mayor Smith called the meeting to order and gave the invocation. No one participated in Open Forum.

Mr. Barton reported the landfill is in good shape. A lightning strike caused damage to Well #2 at Roaring Springs. The

repairs have been done to the motor and turned into insurance.

Ms. Scott reported she has billed the Chamber of Commerce for half of the insurance costs for the upstairs apartment. TML reported that they can provide coverage for the Fire Department building at half the cost of current insurance and progress is being made on the second grant to obtain new water lines from Roaring Springs into town.

The minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved.

CPA Dianne Washington gave the report on the 05/06 au-

dit. The city and the books are in good shape. The city is showing a loss due to depreciation expenses. Council was reprimanded about spending 4A and 4B monies without following the proper guidelines. Expenditures must be approved by both boards, a public hearing conducted and then checks cannot be issued for a period of 60 days.

Bills were reviewed and approved for payment.

A public hearing was held at 5:30 p.m. on August 24 to discuss the tax rate for 2006. Council voted to set the 06 Ad Valorem tax rate at 41 cents per one hundred dollar evaluation.

Adding to the excitement and further boosting the team and fans was the exhilarating announcing by Kevin Keltz and electrifying music by Brendan Wiltshire.

Homecoming Queen candidates were escorted by their fathers on to the football field before the game, where they were introduced to the overflowing crowd. Candidates were Chicagra Brown, Courtney Alexander, Emma Knowles, Mylissa Gilmore, Griselda Flores and Melissa Flores.

During halftime the girls were once again escorted on to the field for the crowning of the Queen. Courtney Alexander, escorted by Isaiah Archer, was crowned as the 2006 Homecoming Queen. She is a Sophomore and the daughter of Rick and LeJeanna Faulks of Matador and Jerry and Linda Alexander of Spur. Isaiah is a Junior and the son of Alan and Kay Bingham of Matador and Herb and Polly Sims of Colorado.

The celebration continued at Saturday's program, featuring a special film depicting early day football, cheerleaders and the drum and bugle corp. Ex-student, Gerald Pipkin, had the film put together from 8mm clips his mother, Mrs. Opal Pipkin had taken. A large display of school memorabilia brought back memories of days gone by.

Gerald Pipkin and friends performed a very entertaining melody of song selections. The group consisted of Gerald, Kelly and Pennie Keltz, Brandt Bearden, Billy Donaldson, Kathy Shorter, Carolyn Ewing and Kay Norman Copeland.

Special recognition was made to Frances Hobbs for her volunteer work for the ex-student association and other organizations in Matador. She was presented with a framed certificate. Gordon Russell and Evelyn Garrison, from the class of 1946, were elected Homecoming King and Queen. Also recognized was Mrs. Marguerite Keltz Edwards for being the earliest graduate, the only surviving member of the class of 1930. Mrs. Edwards was also recognized as the earliest teacher, beginning her teaching career in 1936. She taught for 34 years, 28 of them in the Matador/Motley County School system.

If you have never had a booth at the Chamber Banquet, why not have one this year?

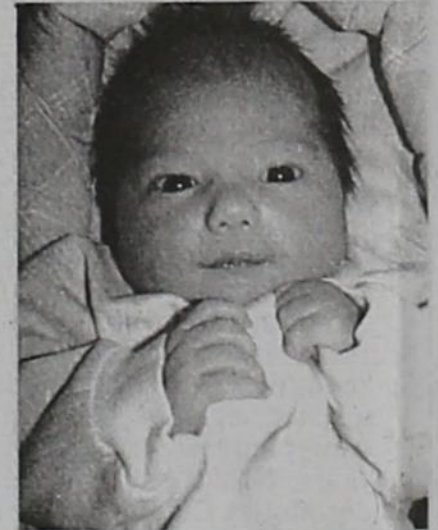

4-H Awards Banquet, October 7 at 6:30 p.m.

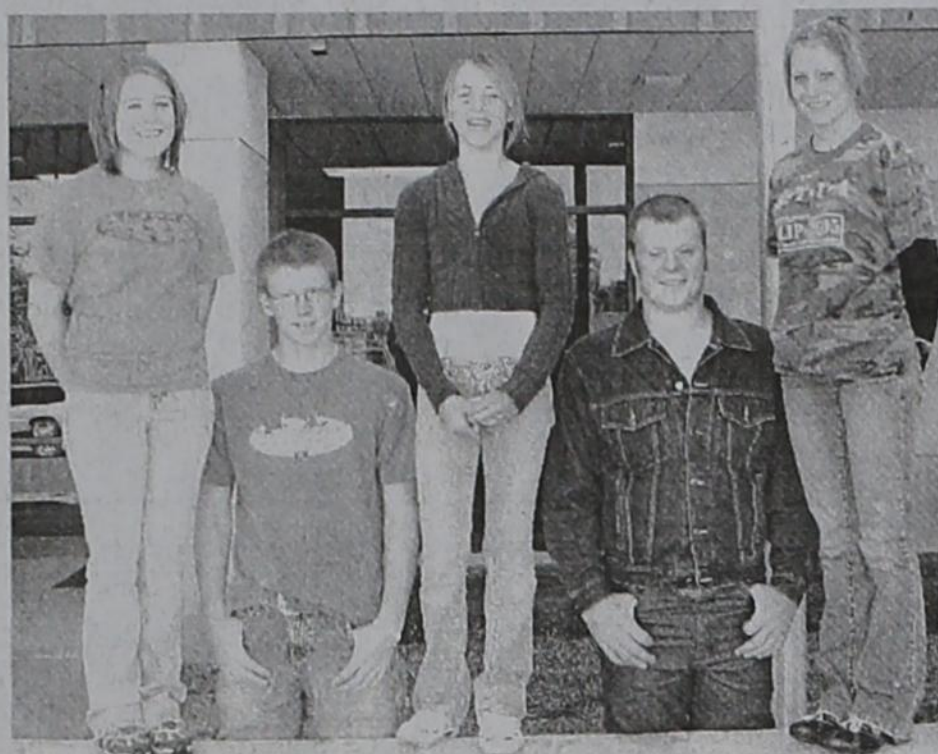
District Nutrition Quiz Bowl, November 2.

one. Don't forget we also have the bucket calf project for the younger kids.

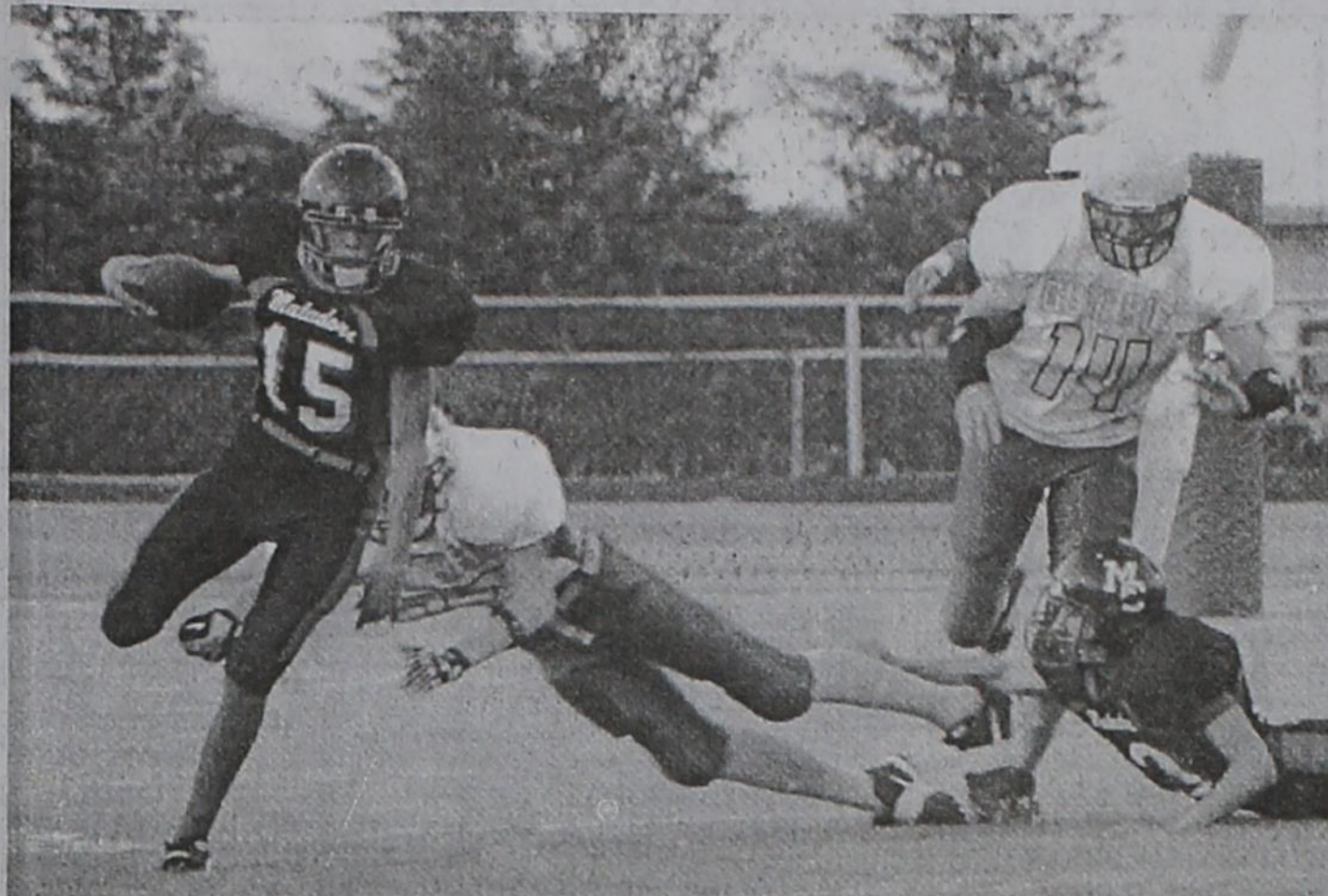

Matadors get big Homecoming win

The Motley County Matadors beat the Guthrie Jaguars, 58-27, to earn a big homecoming victory and run their season record to three wins and no losses. The Jaguars entered the contest ranked 12th and the Matadors were ranked 18th in the Six-Man Division II statewide rankings. The Jaguars were favored to win the game by fourteen points.

"This was a good win for the Matadors," said Head Coach Mike Bigham. "The homecoming crowd and the atmosphere was great."

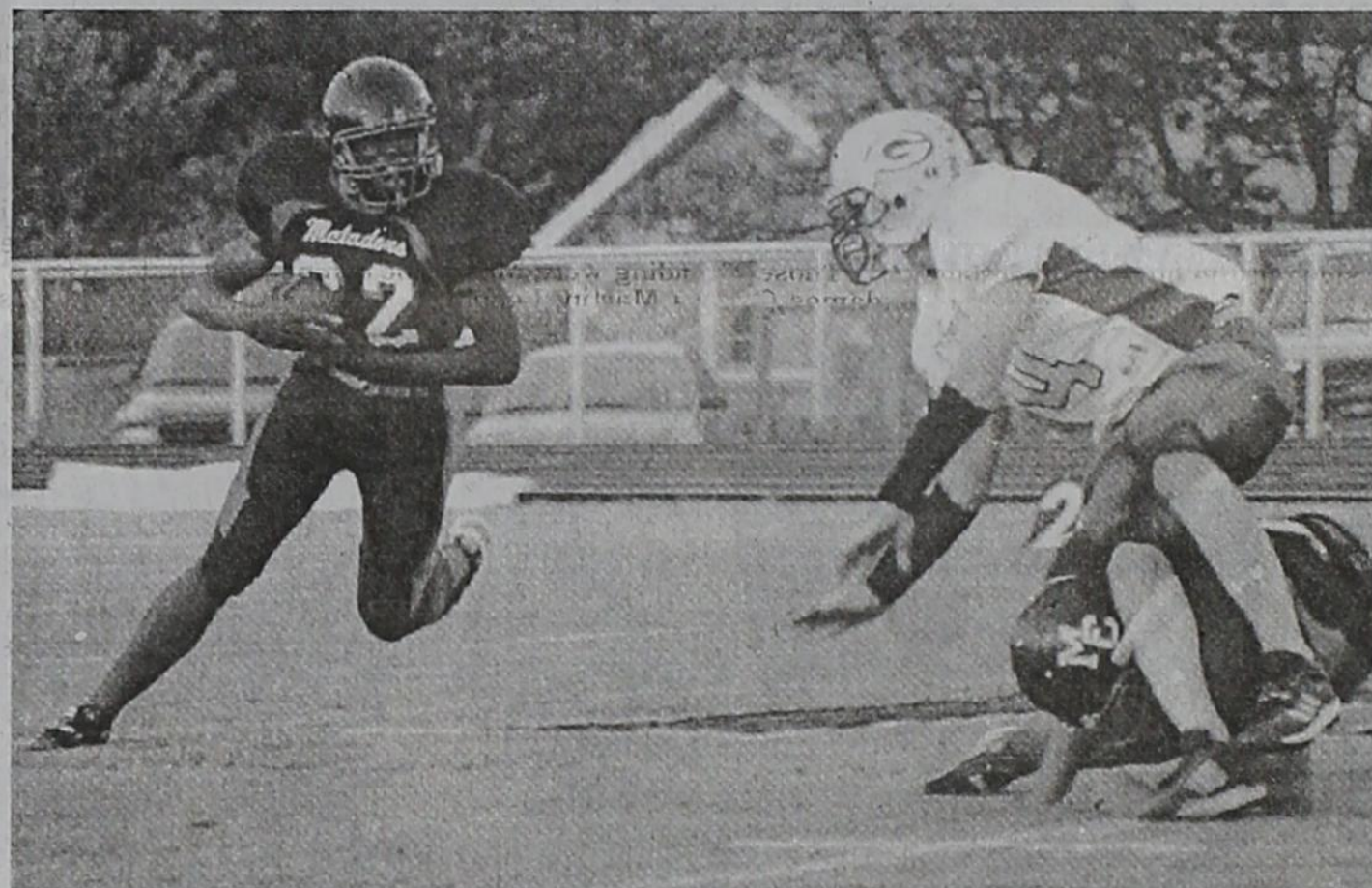
Bradley Brown played his first game of the season after being sidelined by an injury the first two games. He led the Matadors with 220 yards on

twenty carries, an interception return for fifty-two yards, and six touchdowns. Isiah Archer had 124 yards on twenty-four carries and two touchdowns. "Both running backs blocked and ran well," said Coach Bigham. "We are glad to have Brad back, and Isiah had another outstanding game."

The Matadors defense was again dominant. "Jacob Blanco and Jacob Johannes both stepped up and had big games defensively. Isiah Archer and Shane Newman have consistently played well," said Coach Bigham. Leading tacklers for the Matadors were Isiah Archer with 12, Jacob Blanco with 10, and Jacob Johannes with 7

"It feels good to be 3-0, but we definitely have room for improvement," said Coach Bigham. The Matadors will face the Cotton Center Elks on Friday, September 29th, at Cotton Center. Kick-off for the contest is set for 7:30 p.m. Cotton Center has won their last two

ballgames over Ropes and Lubbock Christ The King. "Cotton Center will be very multiple on offense and defense," said Coach Bigham. "Our players will have to be focused and play with great effort. Our fan support has been great this season, we hope to have a big crowd cheering for the Matadors at Cotton Center."

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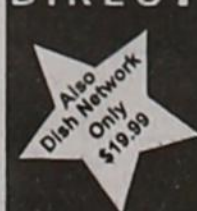


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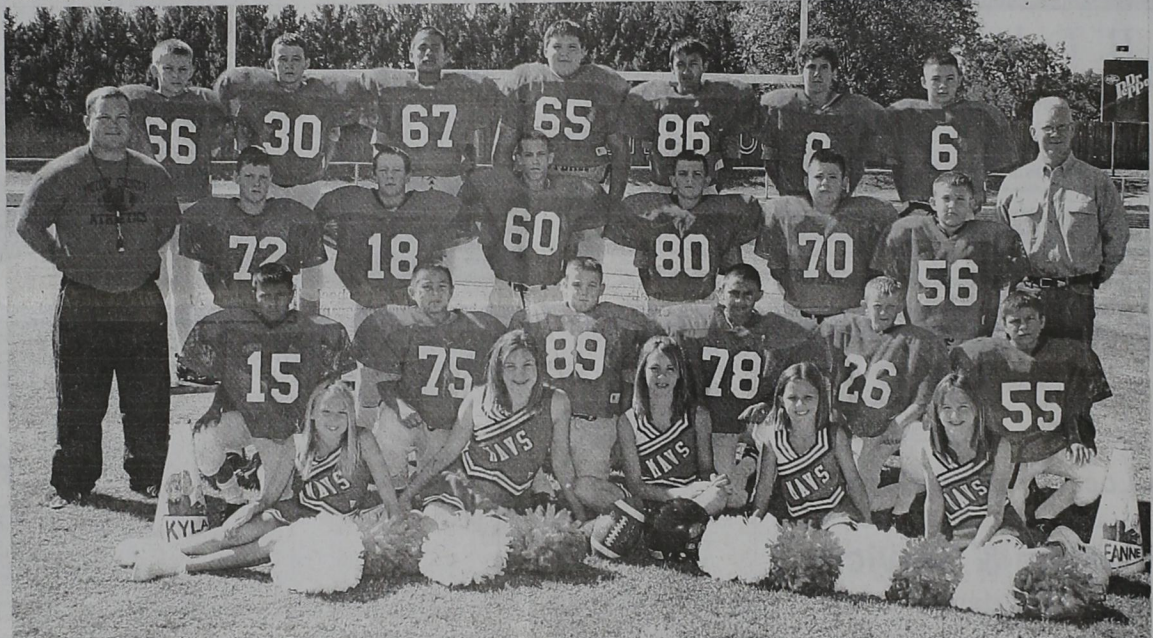

Pallbearers were Leon McDonald, Harlee Childers, Benny Brown, Jessie T. Sims, Jr., and Tim Shannon.



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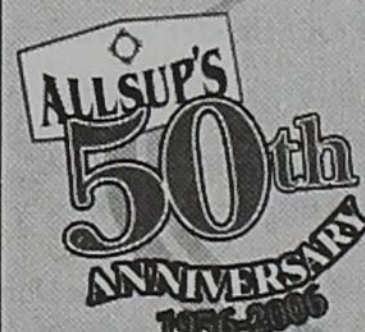

Proof of the Truth

THE ATTRIBUTES OF GOD (Part 3)

Before launching into the specific attributes of God, two additional points should be made regarding and following last week's presentation of the Gospel, based on God's attributes.

First, eyebrows get raised, when it is said that God sacrificed Himself. But, it is a true statement, when it is realized that God is one being, not three. That Being is also indivisible! This kind of thrashes those who object that a "good" God wouldn't do that to His son. Shoot, He did it to Himself; to satisfy His own absolute and perfect attributes in order to open a way for sinful man back to Him, making mankind savable, and He did it out of love for the whole world!

Second, God's attributes make plain the consequences of denial or rejection of His free offer of salvation, for which He paid an awful price. Because sin is an offense to a perfect and holy God, His perfect justice mandates (requires) that His wrath and punishment is the ONLY alternative for those who reject His grace! This is a sobering thought, and the Bible is clear that there will be no second chance after our earthly death, "for man is destined to

die once, and after that to face judgment." Heb. 9:27. All who land in Hell will be there by their own choice, having rejected or failed to accept God's one condition for salvation - faith and trust in Jesus Christ, the only way!

Now to His attributes, and as we study them, God should get a whole lot bigger, and ourselves a whole lot smaller.

God is holy. This means separate and pure - set apart. As such, He is the source of what is right and the standard for it. He is free from all evil, and loves all truth and goodness. He values purity and detests impurity. He cannot approve or tolerate any evil or encourage sin. Because God is holy, He consistently detests all sin and is repulsed by all evil without respect of persons. If for no other reason, God's holiness is why being a "good person" or works-based religions are insufficient to satisfy God. His standard is absolute perfect holiness - a standard that none of us could meet. We've all "sinned at least once, and already failed the test. There is a denomination that teaches that one can become perfectly holy in this life, but that is simply wrong. It will not happen until ultimate glorification of believers' new bodies after their resurrection.



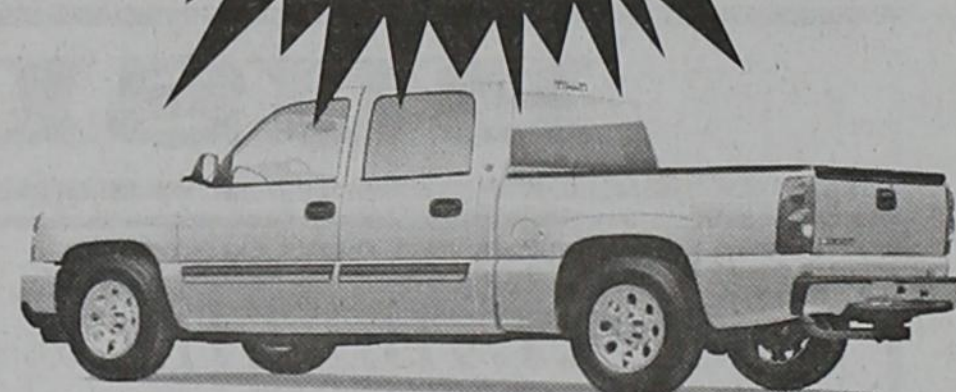
