



In 1930, Irvin and Naomi St. Clair opened their first store in Muleshoe. The store was located in a 20 x 40 building where Western Drug is currently located.

At the time they opened their variety store, the St. Clair's moved their family into the back of the store.

Then, in 1932, they expanded, and moved into the south 25 feet of what was known as 'the old bakery building'. When the St. Clair's moved into the 25 x 60 foot building, the St. Clair's still resided in the rear of the building. Another expansion took place in 1937, when the store was doubled in size

to 50 x 60 feet. By 1940, expansion was again necessary, so the St. Clair's moved into a store with 75 front feet, included

There's good news and there's bad news in the cotton picture for this fall in the area. First the good news!

Charles Moraw at the Muleshoe Co-op Gin said they have currently ginned 4,750 bales of cotton and are hoping for 15,000 before the end of a shortened season.

Although the cotton did not start out good, Moraw said recent cotton has been very good, with a good mike and is of a good grade. Some fields are yielding up to two and a half bales per acre.

Average yields coming in to the gin he manages are from 3/4 bale to the two and a half bales.

He predicts that if the

weather continues good, the season for ginning this year will be very short. Another good report was received from Don McDonald at the Clay's Corner Gin. He said they have tagged 2,100 bales and are expecting a fairly good turnout this year. He added that irrigated

cotton is looking very good, and most cotton is producing up to a bale, and in some instances, 600 pounds of lint per acre. Module builders first

came into this area in southern Bailey County, now McDonald said the module builders are really coming into the northern cotton areas. He predicted that no cotton will be left in the fields within two weeks

City Council Okays Payment For Curb Work

Several items were discussed during the meeting of the Muleshoe City Council Wednesday morning. A lease is still pending between the High Plains Drifters Sport Parachute Club and the City of Muleshoe, although the lease was discussed.

Council members signed an agreement with the Bailey County Appraisal District for tax collection, assessment and appraisal services.

Payment was approved to Jake Diel -Dirt and Paving in the amount of \$8,442 for lowering the curb at 12th Street and. US84 and an additional amount of \$675.36 for engineering fees associated with the project. However the payment is subject to the satisfactory tests to be conducted on the project. although the cotton gins will still be ginning, and will be working on the modules.

Now the bad news! Farmers Co-op Gin at Enochs said they have tagged 853 bales of cotton thus far in the harvest, and expect around 2500-3000 bales, compared to the 9,800 ginned last fall. According to a spokesman for the cotton gin, it is taking from 1-20 acres of cotton to produce a bale on dryland cotton in that area.

The Bill Darnell Gin at Progress will not open this fall and the Circleback Gin. east of Needmore has not started ginning as yet. Another cotton gin reporting 1-20 acres per bale is the Maple Co-cp where 2,334 bales have been tagged. The Maple Gin predicted all cotton is expected to be out of the fields within two weeks. They hope to gin 4,000 bales this fall, compared to

17,301 ginned last year. Nickels Gin at Goodland has tagged 348 bales, again with the ratio of 1-20 acres per bale. They expect to completely wind up their ginning operation in the next two weeks. Cont. Page 6, Col. 4

At Lariat, the Lariat Gin said they have tagged out 850 bales and should be winding up their season shortly.

From Bula, Claunch Gin has turned out 800 bales and expect a very light harvest because of adverse weather conditions during the summer.

Both the Needmore Gin and Nickels and Nickels Gin at Baileyboro said the cotton mikes and grades are good. Needmore Gin has tagge out 200 bales and Nickels and Nickels has ginned 278 bales.

Around Baileyboro, on unirrigated land, some of the dryland yields are considered 'very good' if they turn out one-fourth bale per acre.



Women enrolled in higher education increased in the '70s

COLLEGE STATION _ The number of women in higher education has increated dramatically, according to a Texas A&M University demog. rapher.

Dr. R. L. Skrabanek noted that in 1970 there were only 68 women enrolled in college for every 100 men; but by 1878 the ratio had increased to \$2 per 100 men. Nearly one-haf of all college degrees granted in 1977 went to women. The number of females receiving doctrates more than doubled be ween 1970 and 1977.

Skrabanek gathered his information from a new Bureau of Census report, "A Statstical Portrait in the United States: 1978." The report in itsef can be viewed as an example of women's progress. It is only the second such volume exclusively about women ever to have been published by the Census Bureau in its amost 200-year history - and the first was in 1976.
