

We want doctor and hospital protection for ourselves and families in the future. We do not want any change from the present situation. We have no purpose but to protect it in the future.

I will support a bond issue for a new hospital, for which plans are drawn by a hospital architect, and let the state approve our plans, then we may be in line for a Federal grant to equal the amount we vote.
