# **State Comptroller Delivers February Sales Tax Rebates**

(AUSTIN) — State Comptroller John Sharp today delivered \$220 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,075 Texas cities and 111 counties, a 3.6 percent increase over payments of \$212 million in February of last year.

"Local sales tax rebates for January and February are running more than 10 percent ahead of the first two months of 1993", Sharp reported.

Texas cities received \$200 million,
4.2 percent above the \$192 million delivered last Feb. Counties received a total of \$20 million for their February rebates, down1.8 percent from the February 1993 rebates of \$20.3 million. This month's payments include taxes collected on December sales and reported by businesses filing monthly returns in January. nesses filing monthly returns in January, marterly returns for sales made in Octo. ber, November and December, and yearly filings for 1993.

"Perryman Consultants, a leading economic forecasting group, predicted economic growth of more than 3 percent through 1995 for San Antonio," Sharp said, "expected to be fueled by tourism and health care."

The city of Austin's payment of \$8.4 million ranked as the fourth highest rebate, an amount 1.6 percent over the \$8.35 million delivered in February of

The only appreciable change in re-bates to Texas' major cities when compared to those of one year ago was Fort Worth's \$6.3 million, an 8.7 percent in-crease above the \$5.8 million delivered to the city in February 1993. The city of Arlington received \$6.3 million, a 5.3 percent increase over the \$5.8 million rebate for the same period last year.

The latest rebate to El Paso was \$4.7 million, 3 percent above the city's February 1993 rebate of \$4.5 million.





Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, Inc.
