City of Matador is awarded Grant

City-wide clean-up project plans now in progress

The City of Matador was recently notified of a grant award in the amount of \$40,525.00. The Regional Solid Waste Grant is made available from the South Plains Association of Governments.

The City plans to use the funds for litter and illegal dumping cleanup and citizens' collection stations, "small" registered transfer stations, and community collection events.

The City of Matador has joined forces with Market Matador, in an effort to enhance the look of the community by cleaning up litter, illegal dumping sites, and hazardous properties within the city. The long-term goals of this joint venture is to help bring in new industry, create pride in the citizens, and keep properties from becoming hazardous to children/citizens walking and playing near by.

A Resource Team Member, in cooperation with the Rural Development partnership evaluated the town in September, 2004. Out of this meeting a strategic plan was developed and clean up tasks were prioritized. In the efforts of the City and Market Matador, "Operation Cleanup" was born.

Plans include launching an advertising campaign to promote "Operation Cleanup!" to educate and rally citizens and businesses. Volunteers will be

recruited to facilitate with the cleanup. Quarterly cleanup events will be held where the city provides dumpsters, equipment and manpower to cleanup the town.

The city will bring in large roll off dumpsters and fill them with unsightly white goods, illegal dumping and brush. Citizens will also be allowed to voluntarily abate the litter and debris from their own property at any time while dumpsters are available.

The city plans to hire a tire disposal company to pick up and haul off old tires for recycling.

"This grant will benefit every citizen in Matador by creating a clean, safe environment and helping instill a sense of pride among citizens and their property," Mayor Paul Westbrook commented.

A cleaner town will create a positive atmosphere for future industry to come to this area. It will also benefit children playing in or around these illegal dumping sites and help rid rodents from residential areas and help keep hazardous materials out of landfills.

Clean-up efforts will be concentrated on illegal dumping sites and brush with the city and will begin on the City Square working outward and cleaning up the most visible sites. Citizens will have access to the roll

off dumpsters to dispose of any unwanted items that are allowed.

Plans include the purchase of a "multipurpose bucket" attachment for the city backhoe which will reduce time in cleanup efforts by allowing trash to be easily picked up and put into dumpsters. Plans also include purchasing a used dump truck so that trash can be hauled from waste sites to

dumpsters located throughout town.

The proposed financial commitment is a potential total of \$73,525.00, which translates to about a \$99.36 per capita expenditure. The City and EDC/IDC are committed to the goal and have committed \$33,000.00 in matching and in-kind services.

"Most people realize the need for the town to be cleaned up in order to comply with re-

gional goals and to further prosper our community," Mayor Westbrook said.

The city has discussed volunteer efforts and received support from the local Lion's Club and 4-H groups to aid in the clean up efforts.

Three quarterly cleanups will be scheduled.

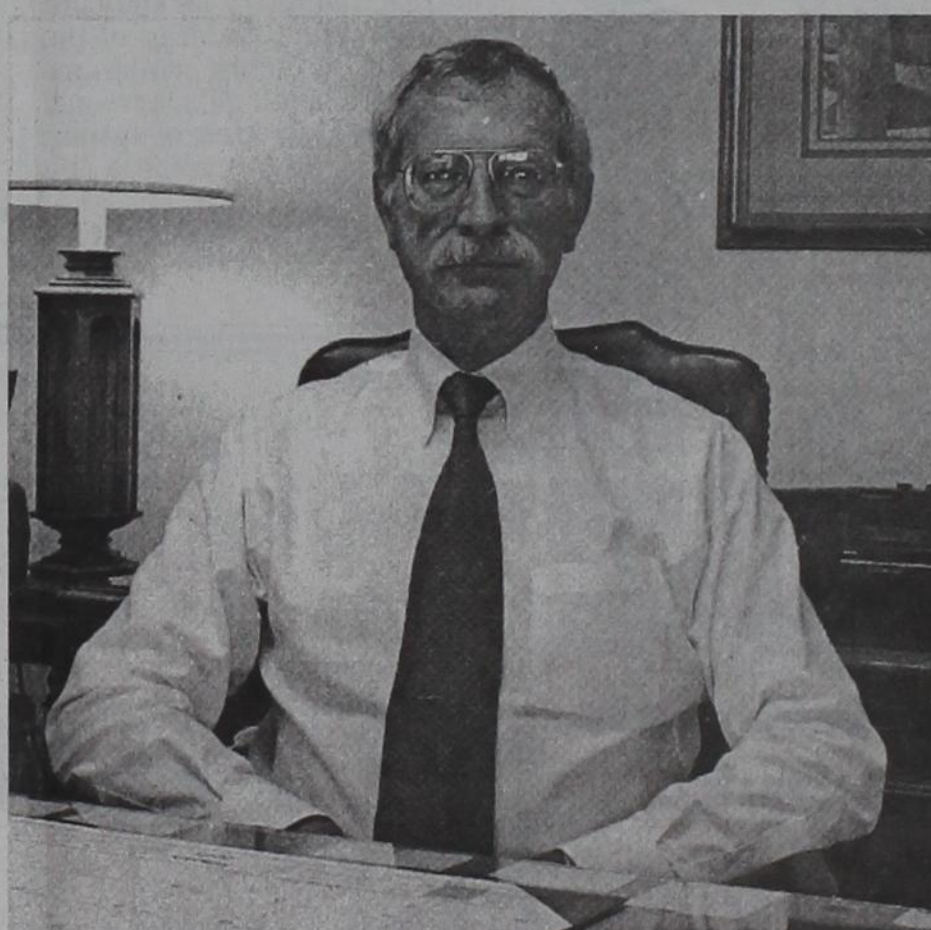
Homemade Chili with all the trimmings and dessert will be on the menu.

Matador graduate now practicing law in hometown

He received his B.S. in Economics from Texas Tech University and following three years in the U.S. Army as a combat infantry officer (discharged with the rank of Captain), he received his J.D. Degree from the Texas Tech University School of Law. He then prac-

ticed law in Houston for 33 years, specializing as a civil trial attorney.

Mr. Edwards is admitted to practice before all Texas courts, the U.S. Court of Appeals, Fifth and Eleventh Circuits, and the U.S. District Court, Southern and Eastern Districts of Texas. He is Board Certified by the Texas Board of Legal Specialization in Personal Injury Trial Law. His professional activities have included: President, Texas Tech Law School Alumni Association; Trustee, Texas Tech Law School Foundation; President, Houston Northwest Bar Association; President, Houston Trial Lawyers Association; Director, Texas Trial Lawyers Association; and Director, State Bar of Texas. He has recently been named a Texas Super

Lawyer by Texas Monthly Magazine, the result of a poll of Texas lawyers selecting the top 5% "go to" lawyers in their respective areas of practice.

He is an avowed conservative, a Republican, and a proud member of the newly-created Texas Christian Trial Lawyers Association. His non-lawyer avocation is that of a Christian apologist, which involves the actual proof of the truth of the core essentials of Orthodox Christianity. One of the highlights of their trip was when their son came to visit for a period of two weeks. Together they traveled to unique places.

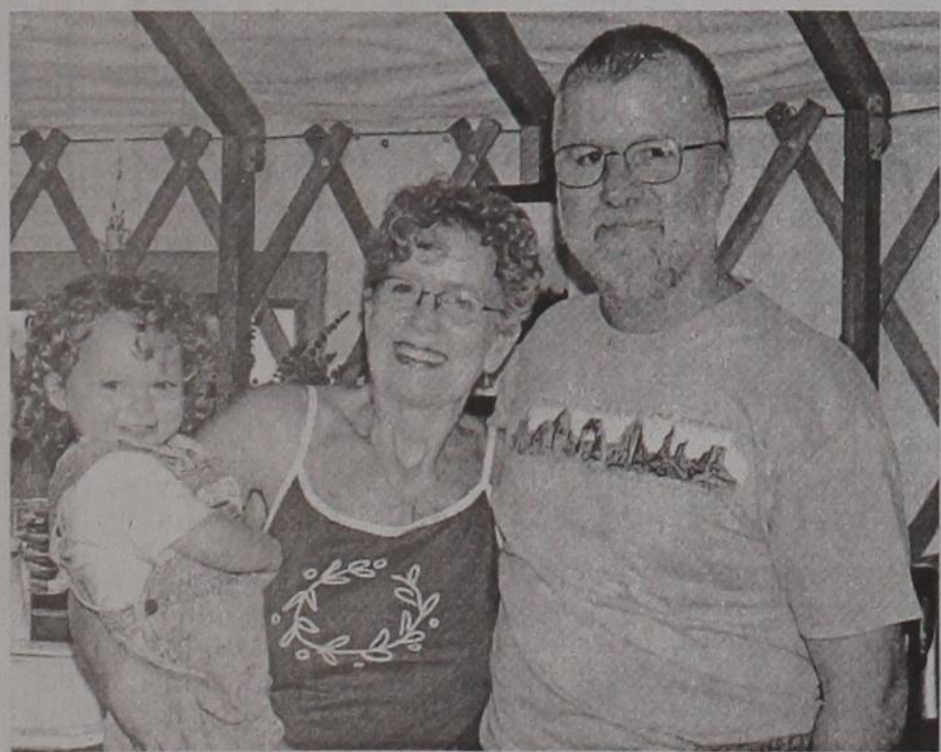
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Trick or Treat Saturday night

Also, please use caution when driving and watch for trick or treaters walking on the streets.



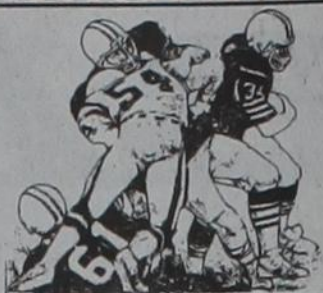

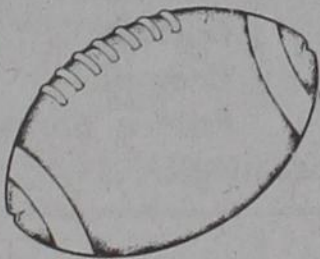
Friday night's leading scorer was Seagram Sims. Sims managed 2 touchdowns against the

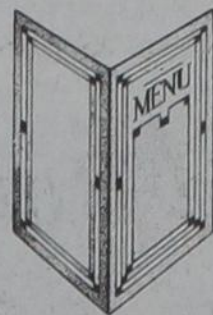

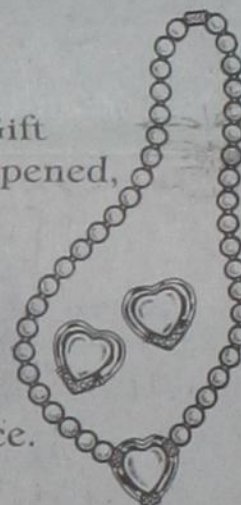

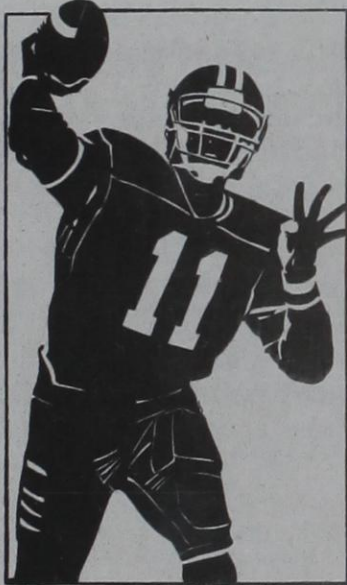

Mr. Copp informed the board that Motley County has once again earned a Superior Achievement for the 2002-2003 Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas.

TAKS tests results are in and Motley County also maintained its rating as a Recognized school again.

Mr. Copp discussed the 2003-2004 audit letters from TEA. Four items needed to be changed and this has been taken care of and the audit sent back.

Enrollment is holding at 156, with attendance at 97%. Mrs. Hicks informed the board that there has been a Jr. High teaching change.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Expenditures were approved as presented.

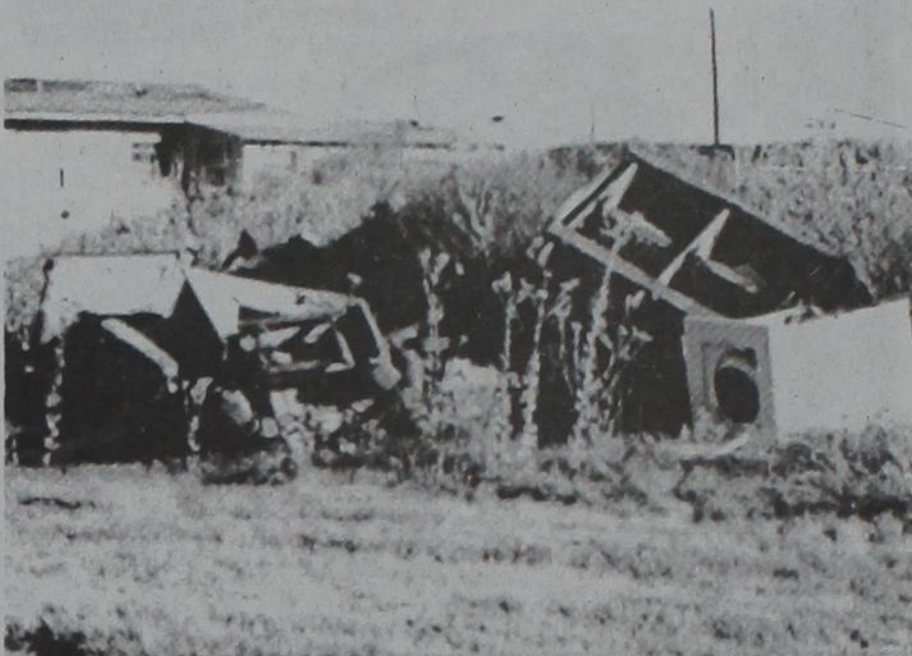
The board approved a Floyd County 4-H resolution allowing 4-H leaders to take children from their county 4-H to events during school hours.

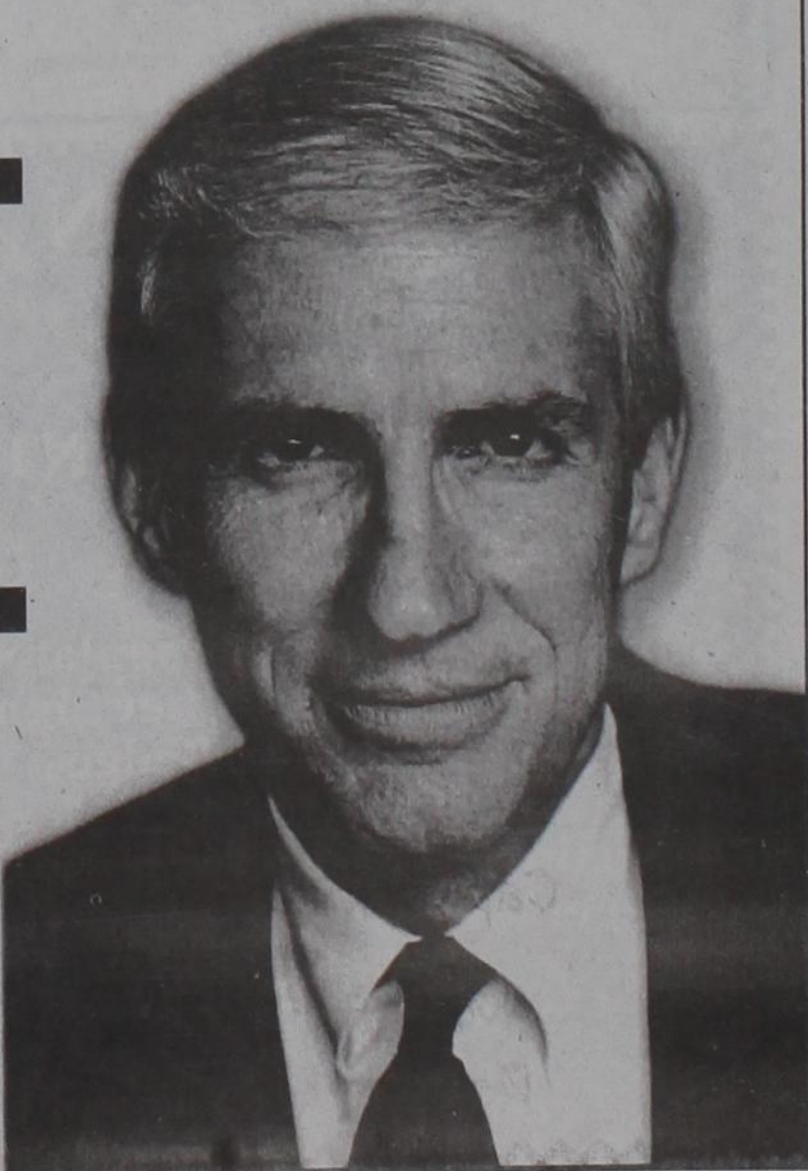

First, I would like to congratulate you and your staff on such an enjoyable newspaper! I try to make it a point to pick up a copy of the Tribune every time that I am in Motley and Dickens counties and always enjoy reading the articles, advertisements and commentaries that are associated with the area. I will probably be in your area almost every weekend between now and February as me and my family spend a great deal of time on a hunting lease in northern Dickens County. I happened to notice a recent article in the October 14th edition of the Tribune concerning the Highway 70 Association. After reading the article, it occurred to me that Highway 70 is already the center piece of a great deal of economic opportunity for the area.

Each weekend during the hunting seasons, hundreds of individuals and families flock to the area to hunt dove, deer, hogs, turkey, and quail. Not only do hunters contribute to the local economy by paying significant amounts to be on a hunting lease, but they also visit your cafes, restaurants, grocery stores, hardware stores, gas stations, and other businesses for food supplies and services. Hunting is a family sport, and often entire extended families will spend all or part of their weekend on an area lease.

Before deer and other game became so plentiful in your area, I used to hunt in the central Texas area near Brady, Llano, and Mason. These communities have long since learned how to maximize the economic opportunities associated with hunting.

Stores and businesses in these areas have learned to recognize the hunter's needs and their schedules. Hunters are not always searching for deer corn, ammunition, camping supplies, groceries, ice, gasoline, restaurants, lodging, lumber, hardware and other essen-

tial supplies and services while they are on their lease. Another important thing to remember is the hunting schedule. For example, during deer season, hunters will often leave their homes and head to their lease on Friday afternoons and will often remain in the area until late Sunday evening. Hunters will usually try to be in their deer blinds well before daylight each day and will remain there until around 9:00 or so in the morning. They may not return back to their blinds until around 3:00 or 4:00 in the afternoon, and will stay there until dark.

Between mid-morning and mid-afternoon each day and after 7:00 or so each evening, hunters and their families are often out contributing to the local economies. Members of my family will generally visit one or more restaurants, buy groceries, visit hardware and lumber stores, gift shops, golf courses, ball games, and even garage sales. We have bought propane, ice, medical supplies, and have even had to be pulled out of the sand (twice). On most Sunday mornings, we generally attend an area Church. As you can see, there is a lot of opportunity for benefit from this influx each weekend.

Each year the community of Llano hosts an annual Christmas evening on the Friday night

after Thanksgiving. The Courthouse is lighted and decorated, stores and shops stay open late, and restaurants get ready for a big turnout. Santa Clause arrives on the square and the entire downtown fills up with locals and out of town hunters. Because this event occurs when many hunters are taking advantage of the long Thanksgiving holiday, this event has become very popular and has even been written about in various newspapers and travel magazines. Other communities publish a directory of services similar to a "yellow pages" for hunters.

This directory includes a brief history of the area, places to see and things to do, a listing of emergency numbers, and of course, ads for shops, stores, and services. These directories are distributed at motels, restaurants, gas stations, and some even include coupons.

As this hunting season gets underway, I hope that the local businesses will benefit as much from the season as do the hunters and their families. It is a joy to be able to come to your area often, and it is my hope that Highway 70 through Motley and Dickens Counties will continue to attract visitors to your friendly and beautiful area.

CRP haying and grazing
Our office conducted a signup for managed haying and grazing of CRP. The final removal date for livestock is Oct. 29, 2004. After this date, CRP spotchecks will again be conducted to insure that there are no animals grazing CRP. Please be aware that there are very strict and serious penalties for grazing, haying, or doing anything else unauthorized on CRP.

Tumbleweeds on CRP/DCP land

In an effort to make cotton harvest a little more enjoyable for the cotton producers, the office will enforce compliance rules regarding tumbleweeds on cropland or CRP acres. If you have tumbleweeds, please shred them immediately before they begin to blow into neighboring cotton fields. Penalties are in place for farms that have not controlled tumbleweeds.

Update your information

Please be sure to update your information in the office when anything changes. We have had checks returned to us lately because of incorrect addresses, and then we tried to call and had the wrong phone number.

If you have not received your 04 CRP payment or final 04 DCP payment, please check with us and find out why. It may be that we need to update our information.

Some clarifications on ECP

We have received some clarification on the cost share pro-

gram to help repair terraces which were broken by the heavy rains in August.

1. Producers that begin the repairs before applying for assistance and having an on-site inspection are not eligible.

2. Land must not be damaged so badly that its agricultural use is threatened.

3. Repair costs must be beyond what the producer can accomplish with his or her own resources.

4. Cost shares are only authorized for repairing the breaks, not building up the terraces.

5. At \$1.20 a cubic yard, costs must equal at least \$1,000.00 to be eligible.

As described in the 1-ECP handbook, ECP is for "producers who have suffered severe losses from natural disasters...it is not intended that everyone who suffers a loss be entitled to a payment."

To sign up, producers must sign an AD-245 and a statement certifying to the fact that they can not afford to repair the damage without federal assistance. NRCS will then do an on-site inspection to determine if the damage is eligible, and what it will cost to repair. On site inspections will not be completed unless and until funds become available for ECP.

Survey Cooperation Key To Accurate Cotton Volume and Price Reporting

LUBBOCK, October 22, 2004

Announcement of the 2003 final Counter-cyclical payment rate is serving as a reminder of the important role the National Agricultural Statistics Service plays in the delivery of the 2002 Farm Bill's Counter-cyclical program.

Final Counter-cyclical program payment rates are computed based on the marketing year average price received by farmers weighted by marketings.

In order to collect this information for cotton, which does not have a mandatory price reporting requirement, cotton producers and NASS rely on the cooperation of cotton merchants. Merchants asked to participate in the voluntary cotton survey program provide accurate volume and price information for cotton that is used to develop the monthly average price received by growers and the marketing year weighted average price received that is used to calculate Counter-cyclical program payments.

While 100% participation has not been achieved, merchants asked to participate in the survey, can rest assured that the information they provide is kept strictly confidential.

The information NASS collects is not reported until the end of each month on which it is collected and is, in fact, only used to create an aggregate estimate of the volume of cotton sold nationwide. Data is not used to estimate a state level volume and price total until after the end of the marketing year.

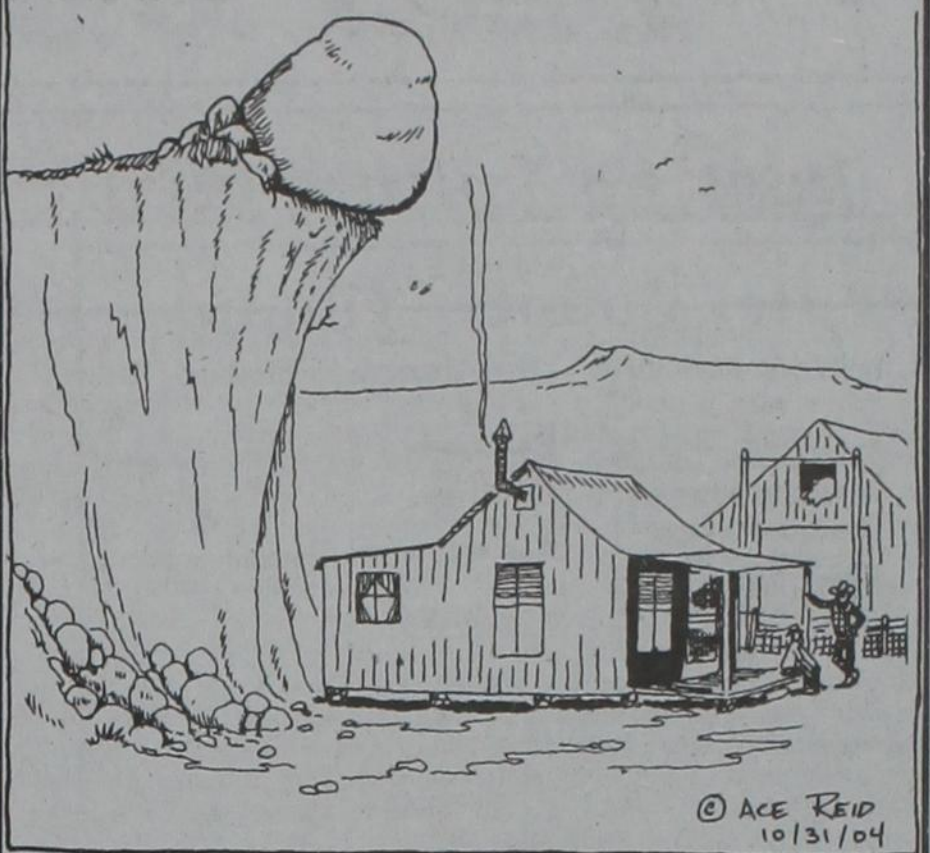
Plains Cotton Growers leadership notes that the accuracy of the information provided to NASS is critical to the proper function of the Counter-cyclical component of the 2002 Farm Bill. PCG encourages every merchant contacted by NASS to participate.

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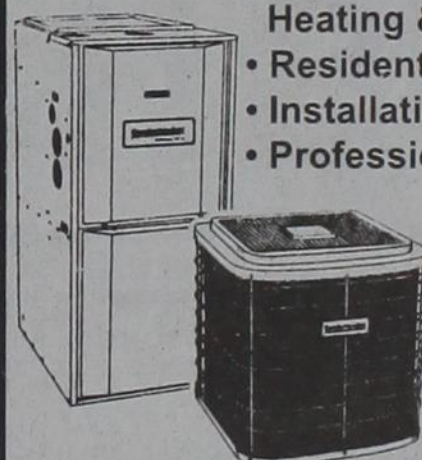

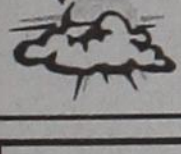

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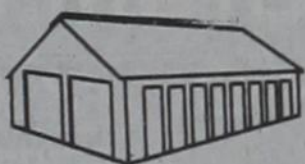
