


"In 1621, after a hard and devastating first year in the New World the Pilgrim's fall harvest was very successful and plentiful. There was corn, fruits, vegetables, along with fish which was packed in salt, and meat that was smoke cured over fires. They found they had enough food to put away for the winter.





*Keep tree away from floor heaters, fireplaces, or other heat sources and make sure it does not block any exits.

* Never use candles as tree ornaments, even on artificial trees

* Do not use electrical ornaments or light strings on artificial trees with metallic leaves or branch coverings. This could create an electrical shock. * Use miniature lights,

which have cool-burning bulbs.

Lights * Use only UL-listed lights,

and no more than three strands linked together. Examine your old light

strings each year, discarding worn ones. Review the original pack-

age for light strings to verify power wattage and voltage.

Use a power strip to avoid overloading wall outlets and extension cords and to protect your decorations from electrical surges

* Fasten the bulbs securely and point the sockets down to avoid moisture buildup.

* Unplug light strings before replacing bulbs.

* Turn off the Christmas lights and all other electrical decorations when you sleep and when you leave your home. Consider using a timer to automatically turn on and off your electrical decorations according to your schedule.

Outdoor Decorating

* Before using any light strings, animated displays or other electrical decorations outdoors, make sure the product is approved by a nationally recog-

nized certification organization and marked "for outdoor use." Never use indoor extension cords outside.


* Keep outdoor electrical connectors above ground and out of puddles. *Make sure trees decorated

with lights are not touching

when connecting light strands, wrap a plastic bag

around connections and tie ends with teflon tape. * Do not staple or nail through light strings or electri-cal/extension cords. You could damage the wire or insulation, which could lead to an electrical shock or fire.

* Do not decorate after dark when it is difficult to see electrical cords and easier to pierce one while hanging light strands.




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FARM SERVICE AGENCY NEWS

Electronic Government Services

FSA Producers can take care of a lot of their government business at home, including applying for LPD's, signing up for 2005 DCP, and keeping track of payments. To do this go to the following site: http:// www.sc.egov.usda.gov

When you go to the site, click on register. Follow the instructions on how to gain level two access. (There is a level one access, but it does not allow you to complete any business.) After you have set up a profile, you will receive an email giving you a user I.D. and some other information.

The final step to gaining level two access is to go to any county office and present a photo I.D. The office employee will then "validate" you, and you will be a level two customer.

Electronic LDP Service Available

Producers who are connected to the Internet can now stay home and apply for an **Electronic Loan Deficiency** Payment, or eLDP, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Producers will receive approval and payment by direct deposit within 48 hours.

To participate in the new service, you must meet eligibility requirements for marketing assistance loans and LDPs for the commodity.

The voluntary eLDP service

USDA eAuthentication Level 2 account, which requires filling out an online registration form at www.eauth.egov.usda.gov/ followed by a visit to the county office for identity verification.

Note: Cotton is not yet eligible for eLDP at home, but we can do cotton eLDP's in the office.

Maintaining Beneficial

An important requirement for marketing assistance loans and loan deficiency payments is that producers must have beneficial interest in the commodity on the date the loan or LDP is requested, and, in the case of a loan, must retain beneficial interest for the life of the loan.

What is beneficial interest? A producer maintains beneficial interest in a commodity if all of the folowing remain with the producer: Control of the commodity; Risk of loss in the commodity; and Title to the commodity. The producer must re-tain the ability to make all decisions affecting the commodity. The producer must be responsible for loss or damage to the commodity. And, the producer must not have sold or delivered the commodity or warehouse receipt to a buyer.

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
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
