# tax surge continues

(Austin) -- Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn said last week that the state collected \$1.57 billion in sales tax revenue in April, up 17.2 percent compared to April 2005.

"The Texas economy is healthy and sales tax revenue is expanding at a pace I have not seen since I have been Texas Comptroller," Strayhorn said.

Local governments are also enjoying double-digit sales tax growth. Strayhorn said local governments will receive \$501.9 million in May sales tax allocations, up 10.1 percent compared to May 2005. So far this calendar year, sales tax allocations to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts are up 15.3 percent compared to a year ago.

Comptroller Strayhorn sent May sales tax allocations of \$344.3 million to Texas cities, up 10.2 percent compared to May 2005. Calendar year-to-date, city sales tax allocations are up 14.2 percent compared to the same period last year. Texas counties received sales tax payments of \$29 million, up 9.3 percent compared to one year ago. Calendar year-to-date, county sales tax

allocations are 16 percent higher than last year.

Another \$14.5 million went to 108 special purpose taxing districts throughout the state, up 16.4 percent compared to last May. Ten local transit systems received \$114 million in sales tax allocations, up 9.4 percent compared to a year ago.

May's sales tax allocations to local governments represent March sale that were reported to the Comptroller in April by monthly tax filers, and January, February, and March sales reported to the Comptroller in April by quarterly tax filers.

Matador, with a rate of 2.000%, received a net payment of \$7,217.54, compared to \$5,092.80 last year, a 41.72% change. 2006 payments, to date, total \$25,889.74, compared to \$23,410.26 at this time in 2005, a 10.59% change.

Roaring Springs, with a rate of 2.000%, received a net payment of \$2,222.58, compared to \$7,264.58 last year, a -69.40% change. 2006 payments to date total \$12,866.23, compared to \$17,586.81 at this time in 2005, a -26.84% change.

For those of you who have not traveled enough to have lost your curiosity about parts further afield, there is a perfect brochure about where you can travel in the form of the Texas Plains Trail Region: Exploring the Heritage of the Panhandle

Prepared by the Texas Historical Commission in partnership with the Texas Department of Transportation, Office of the Governor--Economic Development and Tourism, Texas Parks and Wildlife and Texas Commission on the Arts, it suggests a travel route in the area from Dumas to Gail, and from Muleshoe to Turkey. But the brochure covers more than that. It starts up at Dalhart and Stratford, and extends down to Seminole and Big Spring, and reaches over to Quanah.

The brochure outlines the history of the area, named the Llano Estacado (Staked Plains) by the Spanish conquistador

Fransisco Vasquez de Coronado, who came here in 1541. It follows the development of the area from his time through the time of high cultures of the Plains Indian, to the open range ranchers up to the

If you follow the trail outlined on their map, you will travel around to 21 of the 49 communities in the West Texas Panhandle area, and for each of the 49 towns, there is a brief historical description. This includes a short piece on Matador and Roaring Springs.

The preparers of the bro-chure also have a free Texas State Travel Guide, which you can get by calling (800) 8888 TEX or visiting their website at www.TravelTex.com.

The Texas Plains Trail brochure shows you a travel route that would be perfect for a weekend outing from Matador, and you would get to enjoy the spring flowers on the way.



### **Turfgrass specialists** offer tips for lawns

'Tis the season for planting, fertilizing and watering lawns to get them as lush and green as possible, said Dr. Jim McAfee, and Extension turfgrass spe-

But for many homeowners this year, all the fertilizer and watering in the world won't be enough to keep their St. Augus-tine and centipede grass lawns from yellowing and thinning, McAfee said.

Unlike previous years, such diseases as take-all root, rot, brown patch and grey leaf spot are not the main problem, McAfee said. Instead, homeowners are now experi-encing fallout from the prolonged drought. McAfee said 2005 was one of the driest years on record and North Texas is 20 inches behind on rainfall. There is no water in the soil, he said, and lawns are stressed.

"What we're seeing this year is desiccation or root damage due to the drought and people not watering enough, "McAfee said. " It's been nine degrees warmer than average for the year. Even though people may have been watering some, with these dry conditions and the winds, it just takes more water.

The high winds and freezes we had in December and March were an added problem. Yards under dry conditions when those freezes occurred were hit the hardest."

A secondary problem caused by the drought is that lawns already stressed by the environmental conditions are also highly susceptible to such diseases as take-all root rot, McAfee said. Take-all root rot is a fungi which attacks the plant's root system in the fall and the spring when soil temperatures are in the 60 to 65 degree Farenheit range.

He said the old advice of applying manure is no longer recommended, because some manures can be alkaline and salty. So what's a homeowner to do? The answer is spaghum peat

"It's an organic product and you can get it anywhere," McAfee said. "Topdress the af-fected areas of the lawn with

The theory is that spaghum is an acidic material and holds acidity in the soil, which in alkaline soil helps control the growth of the plant," McAfee said. " That is under research right now in six states thanks to a grant from the Environmental Protection Agency."

McAfee said it is still too early to determine how much of the grass will recover.

"People need to have patience," he said. "Don't try to force it by putting out a lot of water and fertilizer, because that could make matters worse. It tries to force too much top growth when the plant doesn't have a root system to support that growth, which means it puts an additional stress on the

McAfee said homeowners should put 1 inch of water per week on their lawn and mow it at least once a week. For St. Augustine lawns, mow to a height of 2 to 2 1/2 inches in sun and 3 to 3 1/2 inches in shade. For centipede lawns, mow to a height of 1 to 2 inches each week.

McAfee said he is hearing landscapers and lawn care companies are being inundated with questions homeowners because their yards are looking bad.

" I don't want to send the message for everyone to get out there and turn on their sprinklers and run them everyday, McAfee said. The lakes are dry and it is not necessary. Overwatering is problematic too. We're stressing proper watering and conserving water for the dry summer months."

McAfee said most of North Texas is under stage two water restrictions, but many cities area already expecting to go to stage three by June. He said details of the water restrictions levels vary slightly from city to city but generally stage one is normal water use following proper watering guidelines; stage two is voluntary water restriction; stage three restricts watering to once per week between the hours of 10 p.m. - 6 a. m., and stage four prohibits outside water use for landscapes, washing cars and filling pools.
