



The best way to help parents or children in abusive situations is to know the facts. How much do you really know about child abuse? Here are some questons and answers that provide some insight:



Information is held in confidence and reporters, according to statute, are immune from civil or criminal liability if they acted in good

Q: Emotional abuse is the easiest form

A: False. Identifying a victim of emotional abuse is very difficult. Treatment is difficult because the abuse is subtle and cumulative. The effects of emotional abuse may not be apparent for parental role models and the absence of several years. Behavior is often the best indicator of emotional maltreatment.

My meeting was very informative and I feel that each of you should know about it. The county is not responsible for the position and the \$100 a month they contributed was for expenses for gas, etc. The money that the Court took back was given to the Fire Department of Flomot and Roaring Springs to help them organ-

Since laws have changed over the years and more restrictions have been placed on all of us we need to be made aware of the changes and understand about them, the City is responsible for our not having a night watchman and our County Sheriff's department cannot afford to hire someone else to take the watchman's place. The County salaries

are not as high as the City and each of us pay taxes to the City and to the County. If our Sheriff and Deputy are not making as

much money as the City Secretary and other City employees, then that is a shame and disgrace and this is one of the things that was pointed out to me.

If we want the City to come forward with a possible solution then we need to speak up. One of the suggestions was a neighborhood watch, one a small fee on our water bill, one the training and certification of a person and to be responsible for that person in case of a law suit.

The meeing I had with the Judge and Commissioners was much more informative than with the Council. I feel that I was understaood by them and I certainly feel that I can understand their position a lot better. They all took the time to listen and explain and I thank them.


