Plans Set For Roaring Springs Reunion

The second reunion of the Roaring Springs schools will be June 17. The first reunion was in June of 1991 and was organized by The Community Volunteers, a group who also formed in 1991. The reunion committee officers are Devonne Dillard, president; Betty Bearden, vice president; and Billie Clifton, secretary/treasurer, Dillard said.

The reunion will be at the Tabernacle in Roaring Springs, with Gordon Harmon as the Master of Ceremonies. Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. At 12:30 p.m. there will be a noon meal catered by Virginia Sailsbury; and there will be a short program by Jane Thacker in the afternoon, Dillard said.

"We wanted to leave plenty of time during the day for people to visit, and we are also setting up a display of school memorabilia at the Depot," Dillard said. "In addition, we will have some time set aside for recognition of teachers, and for classes to get together."

"Anyone who has attended any Roaring Springs school is welcome at the reunion. We have a list of about 700 now, and we have mailed almost 600 letters," Dillard said.

The day will end with a dance open to the public at the tabernacle, with music provided by Mike Porter, and will begin at 8:30 p.m., Dillard said.

The Roaring Springs Ranch is going to let people bring R.V.'s to the campgrounds at a charge of \$11.69 per night. Dillard said that this will help the reunion, because it is hard for people who want to come to find places to stay.

In the past, there were many small schools in the area such as TeePee and Darden Canyon, Dillard said. The old rock school in Roaring Springs was built in 1912. In 1918, a three-story school was built in the town.

In 1941, the high school and gym were built and the school had its first year

book. In 1972, the high school consolidated with other county schools to the Motley County school in Matador, and the last yearbook for Roaring Springs was published.

Freda Keahey who taught at Roaring Springs for 43 years, recalls the first graduating class. I think it was in 1914, and there were six students, Bernice Payne, Ura Keahey, Gladys Hoyie, Lula Mae Ketchem, Eunice Payne and Roy Roberts, she said.

The first letter of each of their names spelled out BUGLER, Dillard said, "and we've been tootin' our horns ever since."

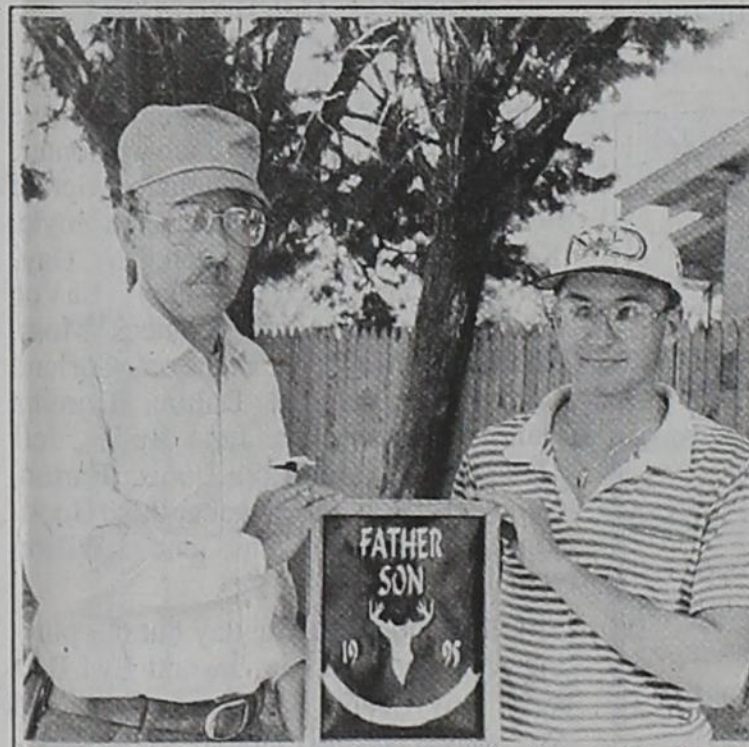
Methodist Church Will Celebrate Heritage Sunday

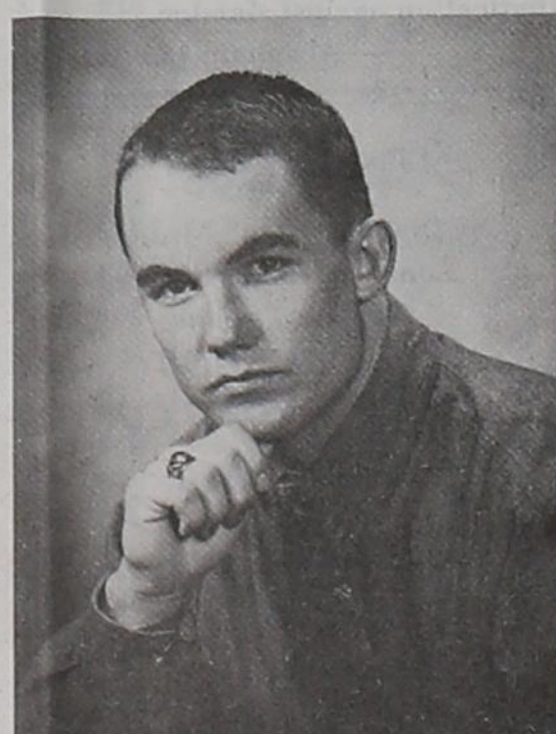

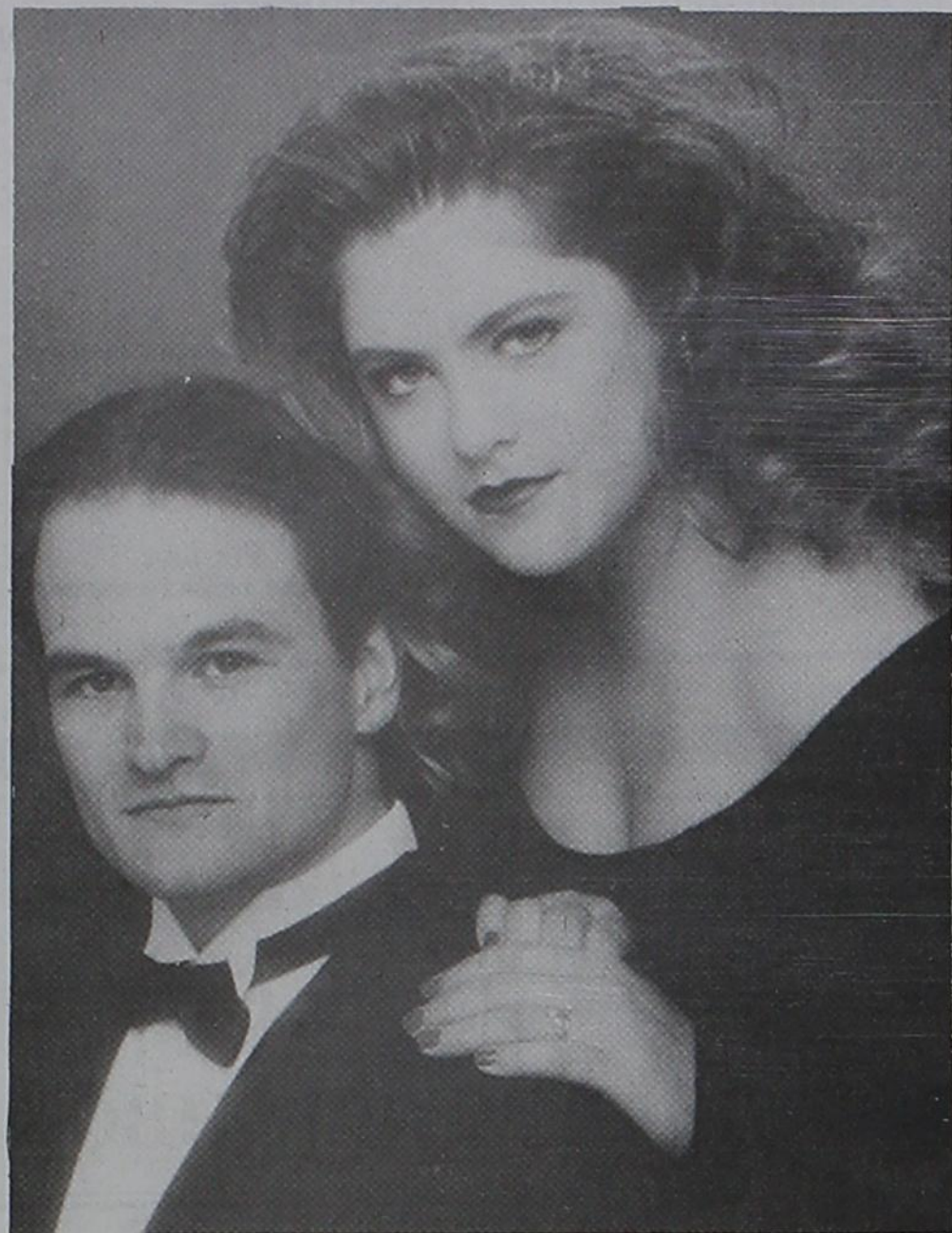

Home Economically Speaking

BENEFITS AND RISKS OF EXERCISE AND HYPERTENSION

Individuals who exercise regularly have a lower risk of heart disease and a lower blood pressure than those who don't according to a recent study of approximately 15,000 Harvard male alumni.

Sedentary alumni had a 35 percent greater chance of developing hypertension. Alumni exercising vigorously had lower blood pressure, and effects that were independent of body weight. Still another study found the relative risk of hypertension about one and half times greater in sedentary individuals than in non-sedentary persons.

What makes exercise have this blood pressure lowering effect? Most likely the desirable changes in body weight, body composition, or by stress reduction. The question arises as to whether regular exercise can reduce high blood pressure rather than prevent its development. Many studies have been conducted to see if exercising results in a significant reduction in blood pressure. In a 10-week study, sedentary men with mild hypertension reduced their blood pressure levels to high normal levels. It took 30 minutes of aerobic exercise such as walking briskly, bicycling or running for four times per week at a level well within the comfort level to be effective.

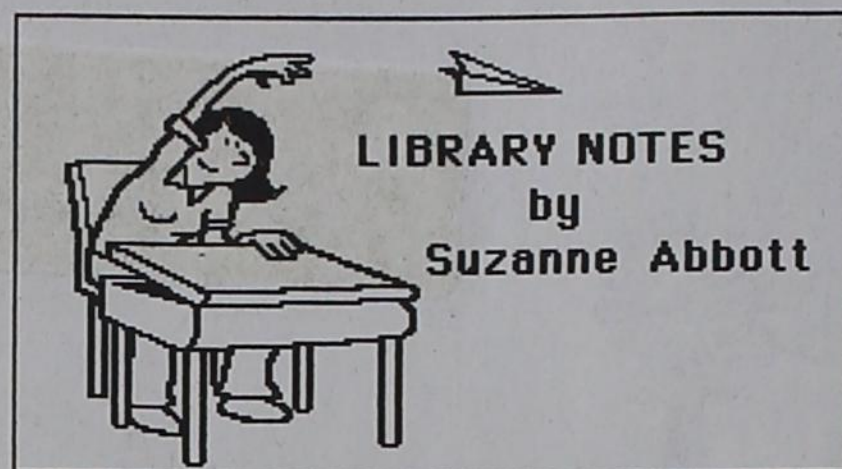
Other types of isometric exercise such as lifting, pushing, holding or hanging movements may not be recommended for people with hypertension or at least should be monitored. If you or a family member has problems with hypertension, contact your physician for the exercise recommendations for your particular problem. The overall impact of exercise on reduced risk of disease and im-

proved quality of life makes it a logical and important part in both the prevention and treatment of hypertension.

Besides changing your sedentary lifestyle, you can also improve your eating patterns by following the dietary guidelines which tells us to cut down on sodium, fats, sugar, alcohol, to increase complex carbohydrates, to eat a wide variety of foods in moderation and to drink enough water throughout the day, and to attain and maintain a weight appropriate for your height and bone structure. Start following the United States Department of Agriculture "Food Guide Pyramid" or another dietary guide that may be recommended by your physician today for another positive lifestyle change.

These calves are delivered and fed at the Randall County Feed Yard. During the feeding period, feed efficiency, daily gain, cost of gain, medication cost, and other various factors are recorded for each individual producer. After the calves are finished, they are slaughtered and carcass data is collected.

At the end of the feeding period, a field day is held to report the results of the program. During the field day, beef cattle specialists will be on hand to address concerns and issues facing the beef industry. This year's speakers include Dr. Dan Hale, Dr. Bill Mies, Dr. John McNeill, Dr. Jeff Savell, and Dr. Davey

Griffin - all from Texas A&M University. Topper Thorpe, with Cattle FAX, and Richard Winter, manager of Randall County Feed Yard, will be on the panel of speakers.
