

# **Motley County farmers** planting crops after May storms and rain

The land is furrowed and the deep brown earth is ready to be replenished with cotton and feed crops following mois-ture in May. Annual planting in Motley County occurs as a rule in May, but cool weather, hail damage and wet fields have delayed the 2005 planting season. However, farmers have until the end of June to get cotton into the ground and producers are in a situation they can really roll across the acres if conditions are good for them.

Brian Marshall was assigned as the NWSV for Matador June 1st. On May 31st rain

Austin -- Gov. Rick Perry joined with Lt. Governor David Dewhurst and Speaker Tom Craddick last week to tout the successes and accomplishments of the 2005 Legislative Session. Perry also stated his continued determination to broker a deal between the house and the senate on school finance reform.

On the issue of school finance Perry expressed opti-mism that legislative leaders could still reach an agreement, saying, "the final chapter of this book has yet to be written. I don't believe we are finished here and I know a great many legislators feel the same way. Legislators' inability to strike an agreement will make for a long and uncomfortable summer when they go home and explain why they did not act on education reform and property tax relief."

Perry highlighted the fol-lowing accomplishments of the legislative session:

 A lawsuit reform measure that will crack down on frivolous asbestos lawsuits while ensuring Texans truly harmed by as-bestos get the care they need.

 A workers' compensation reform that will lower health care costs, provide relief to employers and provide better benefits to injured workers while giving them every incentive to return to work sooner.

 A landmark \$200 million CPS reform bill that will make a tremendous difference in the lives of thousands of vulnerable Texans with the hiring of hundreds of new investigators to protect children at risk of harm.

 A continued investment in the jobs and technology that will be the foundation for the future with about \$380 million in funding for the Enterprise Fund and the new Emerging Technology Fund.


John Wesley Stevens "Mot-ley", son of Bettye and Steve Stevens graduated from West Texas High School in Stinnette, May 26.








# Cotton in other crops costly to farmers

(Abilene) -- Farmers on the remains before planting the High Plains of Texas know that crop damage from foul weather is one challenge they will have to contend with.

Recent storms in the area unleased hail, high winds and heavy rains that caused significant damage to the emerging cotton crop of many growers. They must make a decision soon about whether to replant cotton or plant an alternate

But before they plant an alternate crop, they need to do a thorough job of destroying remaining cotton plants in their fields, said Charles Allen, program director of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation.

"If High Plains growers fail their cotton before the certification date and keep it free of fruiting cotton plants for the remainder of the season, they qualify for a credit on their assessment," he said.

"They'll really help themselves if they do a thorough job of plowing down cotton plants in their fields before they plant another crop," Allen said.

Ensuring no viable cotton

new crop, saves the growers money, Allen said.

If the cotton is not destroyed, it may grow back and provide a haven for the cotton boll weevil, he said. The weevils will feed and reproduce in the cotton and become a source for infesting remaining cotton fields.

Allen said foundation employees will continue to trap and monitor fields originally planted to cotton to ensure any hostable cotton or potential boll weevil populations are detected. If weevils are found, the fields will have to be treated, along with any adjacent cotton fields.

The new weevil populations and additional field treatments add to the total cost of eradication, he said.

The Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation is a nonprofit, grower-initiated and funded organization dedicated to eliminating the cotton boll weevil from the state in the most cost-effective and environmentally responsible manner possible.
