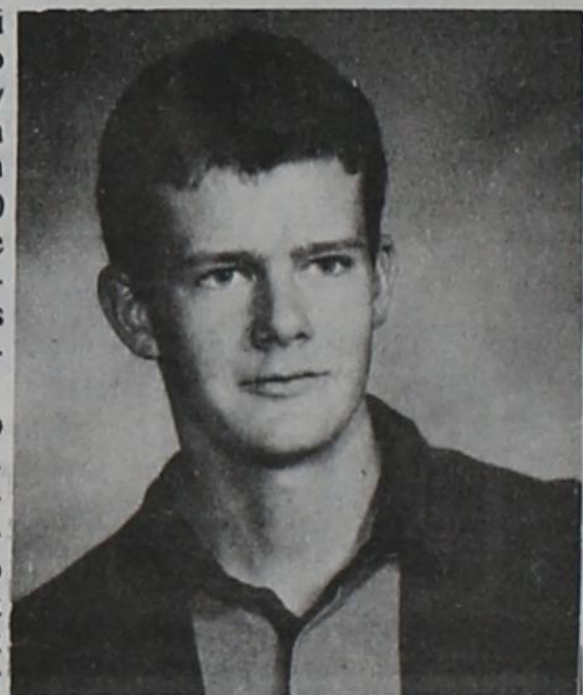

Lee Jones Wins Bausch & Lomb Science Award

Lee Jones of Matador was named winner of the annual Bausch & Lomb Science Award on May 26, 1995 at Motley County Schools. The Science Award, a handsome bronze medal, is presented each year to winners at approximately 6,500 participating schools throughout the United States, Canada and several foreign nations. More than 400,000 medals have been awarded to outstanding students since the program began in 1933.

According to Kathy Gillespie, who presented the award, "The Bausch & Lomb Science Award is especially significant because it recognizes the junior student at our Rochester Bausch & Lomb Scholar. This designation carries with it scholarship funds, the minimum amount being \$20,000 (\$5,000 per year for four years).

FINANCIAL ADVICE FOR RETIREES

Q: As a retiree, what investment strategy should I follow?

A: A total return strategy. Retirees must consider not only the income element of their portfolio, but the growth element as well. In most cases it would be a mistake for a retiree to convert his or her portfolio solely to income-producing investments. Currently, most retirees have a life expectancy of at least 20 years. Don't ignore the impact of inflation on your investments. Your financial adviser can assist you further with investment strategy advice. If you don't have an adviser, contact the International Association for Financial Planning, 1-800-945-IAFP, for a free listing of financial advisers in your area.

FINANCIAL ADVICE ON BENEFITS

Q: My company has a new 401 (k) plan; should I put my retirement savings in that, or keep investing in my IRA?

A: It might be wise to shift your savings to the 401 (k) plan, for a number of reasons. First, your company may encourage savings by matching your contribution up to some level and that's free money for you. Second, you can save more on a tax-deduction basis in a 401 (k) -- \$9,240 in 1994 -- compared to the \$2,000 maximum in an IRA. Finally, depending on your salary, your IRA may no longer be deductible, so you would lose the tax benefits. Your financial adviser can assist you with your retirement planning. Q: How often should I review my finances?

A: When major changes take place in your life, or when changes are expected, it's a good time to review your finances. If you work with a financial professional, review the investment part of your plan once or twice a year. If you plan your own finances, you should review your invest-

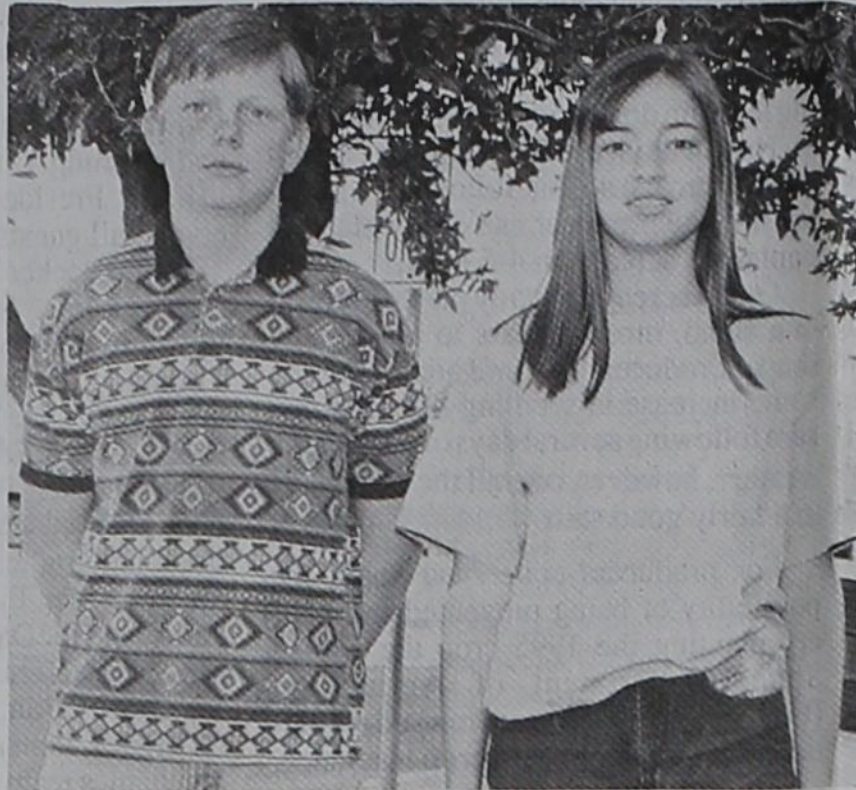

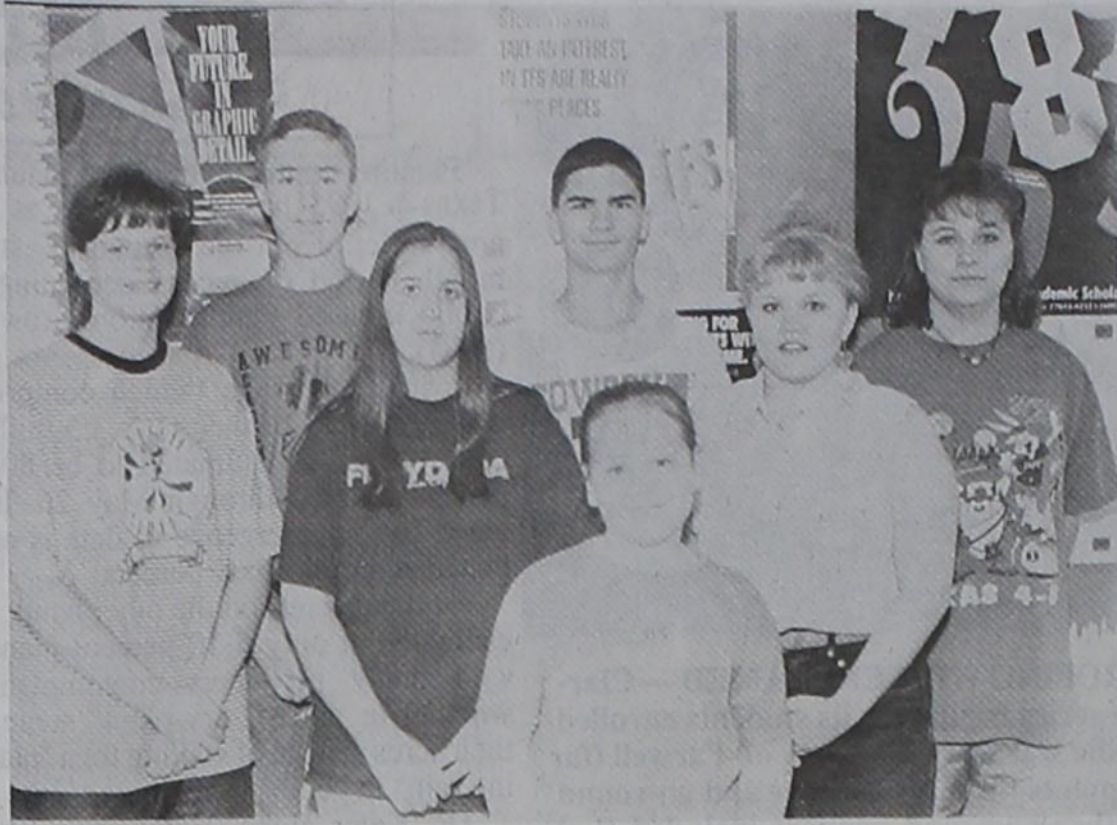

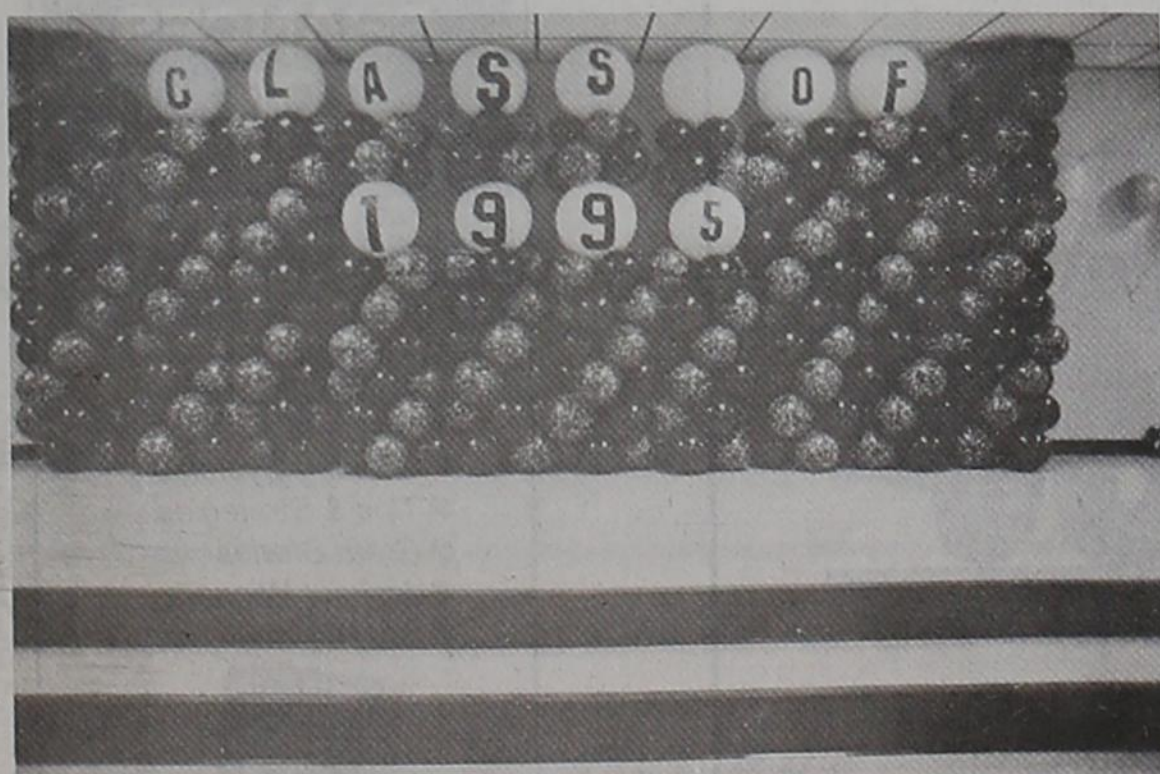

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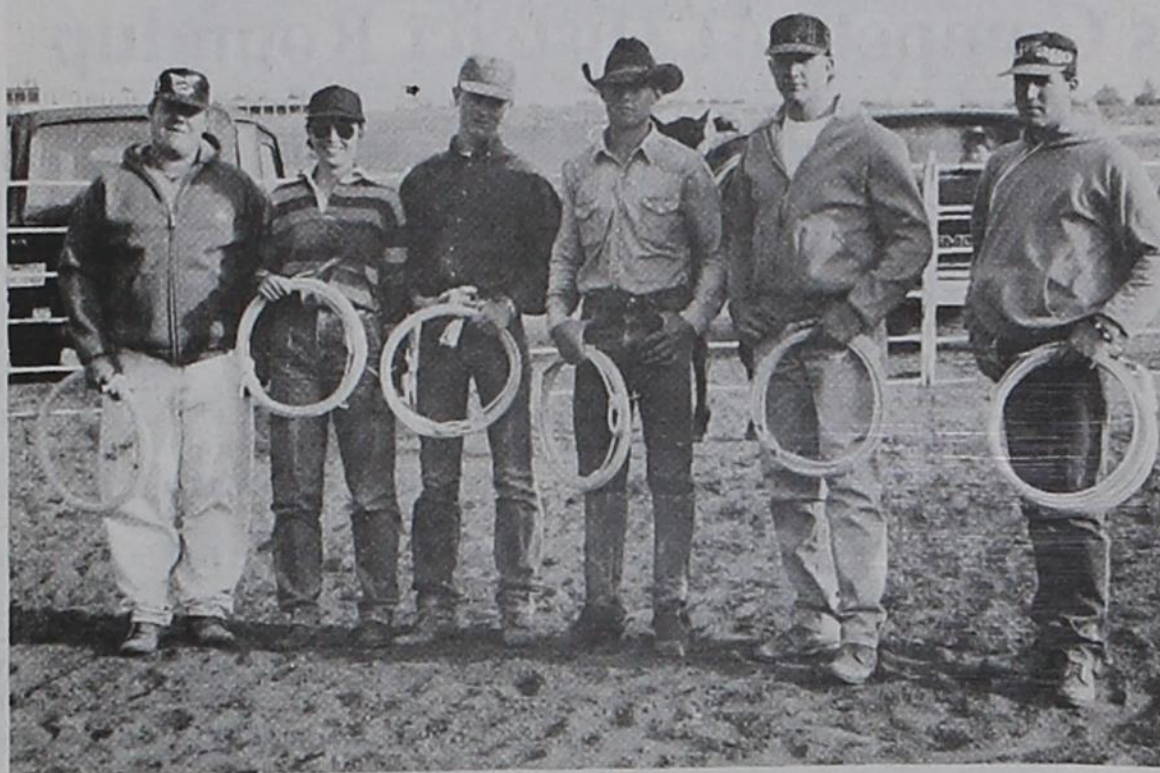

COTTON NEWS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

Planting cotton on the High Plains of Texas in 1995 hasn't been easy as the area suffers from the second driest 12 month period on record according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

Irrigated acreage, which comprises about one-half of the area's 3.5 million cotton acres, is estimated to be 80-90 percent planted through May 26. Irrigated cotton emergence to date is estimated at around sixty percent.

Dryland acres, on the other hand, are estimated at only 5-10 percent planted with many producers contemplating whether or not to "dry-plant" some of their acres instead of waiting for a "planting rain" to come along.

Dr. Kater Hake, Extension Cotton Specialist for the High Plains region, says he expects at least a portion of the areas unplanted dryland acres will be planted in a dry seedbed. Hake is advising producers who are thinking about dry-planting cotton to be conservative and only plant part of their dryland acres in this manner.

"Currently there is still enough time for producers to implement some strat-

egy into their planting efforts," notes Hake. "We still have a little time to get a planting rain. The key will be in getting the number of acres to be planted following that rain down to a manageable level."

Hake's advice is to dry-plant enough cotton acreage so that following a planting rain the producer can easily plant all unplanted acreage in 4-5 days.

Of the acreage already planted and up to a stand, most appears to be in good shape. Producers in some areas may see some increase in seedling disease pressure following several days of cool, damp weather, however, overall the crop is off to a fairly good start.

For producers concerned about the possibility of being prevented from every planting the 1995 crop the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) just issued some revised regulations for producers with crop insurance.

The revised provisions relate to a producers options under the Federal Crop Insurance program. For more information about the changes producers should contact their county Consolidated Farm Service Agency office.

WHAT MAKES FARMING DIFFERENT FROM OTHER BUSINESSES?

Several things:
A large number of farms produce the same commodities and each farm accounts for a very small part of total production. As a result, individual farmers have little influence on either the general price level received for their crops or on the prices paid for their production inputs. It is often said that farming is the only business that buys retail and sells wholesale. Modern production practices require farmers to maintain a substantial capital investment in land and equipment - and the bulk of agriculture's capital equipment has limited use and value outside the sector. Consequently, agriculture is particularly sensitive to changes in the overall economy, such as interest rates and inflation. Although capital investment in American farms is relatively high, the return on that investment is generally lower than investments in non-farm businesses. And the average non farm business does not risk losing a significant chunk of its annual income to an intermittent hail storm, lack of timely precipitation, or some other event completely beyond its control. The weather makes agricultural production variable, causing wide swings in farm prices and income. Farmers cannot easily start up or shut down production in response to fluctuations in demand or market prices. On top of that, continued technological ad-

vances have resulted in rising production capacity and declining per-unit profit margins at the farm level. As agriculture has grown more dependent on export sales for farm income, American producers face new challenges as well as new opportunities from the more open trading environment created by the GATT and NAFTA agreements

In the global marketplace, farmers are affected not only by the weather - which can be unpredictable enough - but also by such variables as currency relationships and the uncertainty of political and economic change abroad. Because of its unique characteristics, agriculture receives special treatment from governments the world over. According to a recent World Bank survey of some 80 nations, only one - New Zealand - did not intervene in its commodity markets either to protect farmers from low prices or consumers from high prices. While recent passage of the GATT agreement will help level the playing field for efficient farmers around the world, U.S. farmers still face intense competition from foreign producers who continue to receive sizeable subsidies from their governments. In effect, U.S. producers not only have to compete against foreign producers for new markets, but against foreign governments as well. In this context, the farm program safety net is just as important, if not more so, than ever before.

YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION IS SAFE WITH SOCIAL SECURITY

During your lifetime, Social Security collects a great deal of information about you. Are you concerned that other people may be able to get this information? Don't be - it's all confidential and protected by law. Unless you specifically permit it, Social Security cannot give information about you to anyone without your permission.

If you receive a letter from Social Security and have questions about the information in the letter, call us; we are here to help you with those questions. But the call we receive must be from you. If you ask someone else to make the call on your behalf, the Social Security representative is prohibited by law from discussing your personal business with that person unless you authorize it.

When Social Security began keeping records, we decided to use a numerical identifier, your Social Security number.

The number assigned to each person is different. This allows us to keep information about you separate from any other information. The public was told that information kept by Social Security would be regarded as confidential.

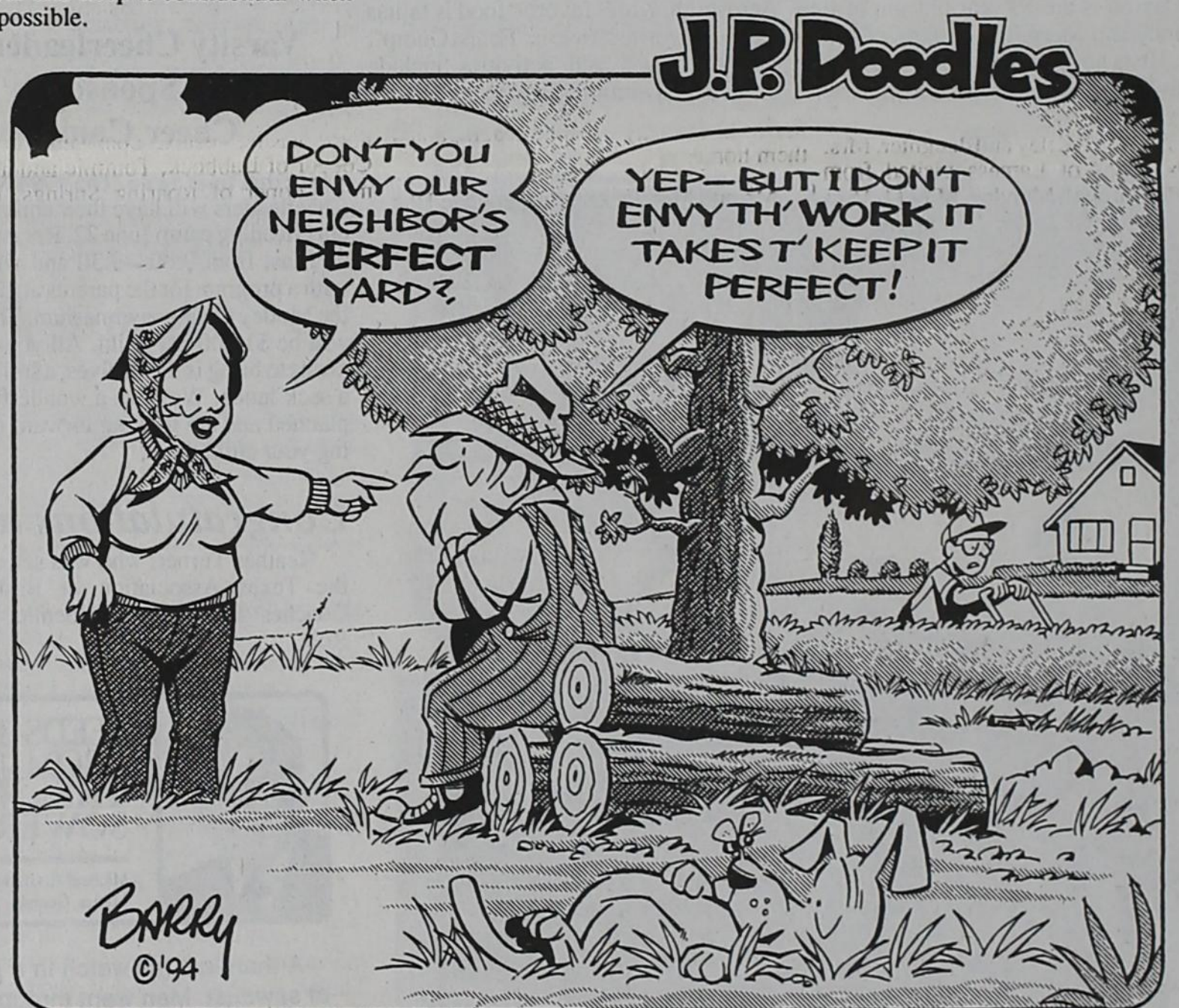
Although we can't prevent others from asking for your number, you should know that giving it to them does not give them access to your Social Security records. The privacy of your records is guaranteed unless the law requires us to give it to another government agency or the information is needed to conduct Social Security or other government health or welfare programs.

If a business asks you for your Social Security number, you can refuse to give it them. However, they may not let you make the purchase or give you the service you are requesting without the number. Be careful with your Social Security number and keep it confidential whenever possible.

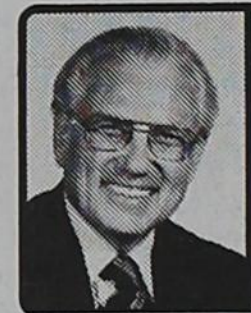
