Stock Show Totals Exhibitors \$9,510

GLEN MOSS was top winner Saturday in the 29th Annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show held in the school FFA building. He received Grand Champion honors in breeding swine division with a Poland China sow; Reserve Champion place in the breeding swine division with another Poland China sow and Grand Champion honors in the market hog division with a 195-lb. Poland China barrow. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Moss of Matador. A brother team, Berry and Steve Bostick took the Grand and Reserve Champion honors in the fat steer division. Both animals were Herefords from the W. E. Burleson Ranch. The boys are sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Bostick.

A brother and sister team, Steve and Shane Stevens exhibited the Grand and Reserve Champion animals in the heifer division. They are the son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John V. Stevens, and the heifers were from the Stevens Ranch. Pat Peacock of Roaring Springs was a double winner. His 217-lb. Duroc swine was awarded Reserve Championship in the market hog division. He was also the swine showmanship winner. He is the son Mr. and Mrs. Bill Peacock of Roaring Springs. Elbert Terry of Roaring Springs was the beef showmanship winner.

90 Animals Exhibited
A Total of 90 animals, 24 calves and 66 hogs, were exhibited by 38 boys and girls. Total receipts were \$9,510.27.

Total premiums amounted to \$811.50, with the sale of animals amounting to \$8,698.77, including the auction premium of \$2,150. Floor bid on hogs was 20.20c by Farmers Hog Commission Co. of Plainview (39 animals) and the floor bid on steers was 28.50c for 20 head by the Cattlemen's Commission Company of Lubbock.

Hartsel Ash of Thockmorton served as auctioneer. Grand Champion steer was purchased by W. E. Burleson and Green Bostick from a premium of \$170. Reserve Champion steer was purchased for a premium of \$145 by Hartsel Ash and Homer Hill.

Both the Grand and Reserve Champions market hogs brought \$40 premium. The Grand Champion was purchased by the Dickens County Electric Coop. Spur, and the Reserve was purchased by Thompson Feed and Seed of Matador.

Swine judge was Milton Mann, Clarendon Vo-Ag instructor and the beef judge was Steve Ham-mack of Spur Agricultural Experiment Station. J. C. Cross served as announcer and public address system was furnished by Matador Volunteer Fire Department. Show advisors are Bill Peacock, Bill Moss and Bill Pallymeyer.

Directors Re-elected
During the election conducted by members of the Motley County Livestock Association, sponsors of the show, while the exhibit was in progress, three officers were re-elected to the board. They were Bundy Campbell of Matador.

Publisher Believes Peace is Possible

WORLD PEACE is possible, believes Wendell Tooley of Floydada, publisher of the Floyd County Hesperian. His opinion however, is based on a religious rather than a military or political conviction. Principal speaker at El Progresso Study Club's annual "Gentlemen's Evening" banquet, Thursday night at the First Methodist Church, Mr. Tooley showed slides made during a world "Crusade for Christ" tour to Indonesia last summer. Mr. and Mrs. Tooley were members of the tour. Tribune Publisher Douglas Meador introduced his neighbor publisher.

The slides included a number of scenes of squalor and want in which the people of Indonesia exist. The tour continued to the Holy Land, where the scenes were in sharp contrast. In other countries, temples and shrines were visited.

"This is my favorite shot of the entire trip," Mr. Tooley said as he came to a scene made from their plane, of terrain several thousand feet below. "This was made over the battlefields of South Vietnam . . . we were surprised that our route was in this direction.

"We were reminded as we flew over this area, that there wouldn't be a war if there were more love in the world . . . we can legislate everything but love. But we won't have peace until we have the Prince of Peace in our hearts."

Theme is Hawaii
The banquet theme was Hawaii, and the church basement was transformed into a bower of plants and flowers for the occasion. Colorful leis were at each guest's place at the tables, which were decorated with bougainvillea petals from a plant grown by Mrs. Freeman Thacker.

Ike is Called First Citizen of World

MONDAY WAS A DAY OF MOURNING in the United States with Tribute to the late Dwight D. Eisenhower. When Dr. C. L. Kay rose to address seniors from three Motley County high schools at the American Legion building Monday night, he announced that events of the past three days had caused him to change his subject.

He referred to the late President and great military leader Dwight D. Eisenhower. Dr. Kay, Assistant President of the Lubbock Christian College had received a citation from Eisenhower in 1964. He was visibly moved by the passing of the great leader. He said he had made over 2500 speeches and only three times had he changed his subject because of current events, citing the assassinations of the two Kennedys and the death of the former President Friday.

"He was the first citizen of the world," Dr. Kay declared and said he had witnessed (by the medium of television) leaders of nations, some of them former enemies, paying tribute to Eisenhower.

Instead of his originally prepared speech, Dr. Kay showed slides of a tour of the world when he was invited last year by Secretary of Defense Clark Clifford to attend the Joint Civilian Orientation conducted for the purpose of giving 70 civilian leaders a first hand view of the nation's armed forces. He observed operational demonstrations at Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine commands.

Landmark Goes Up in Flames

One of Motley County's oldest commercial structures burned Friday when fire of unknown origin destroyed the former Arthur Lynch store in Whiteflat. The old building was in the process of being torn down for the materials it contained when the fire occurred.

Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Stephens had acquired the structure from the Lynch heirs, and had started salvaging the lumber. The Matador Volunteer Fire Department answered the call but exhausted the supply of water before the blaze could be brought under control.

Mr. Stephens said the building was constructed in 1909 and was used as a general mercantile store until about 14 years ago. It was first 24x40 feet in size and later another room 16x20 feet was added. The lumber was declared in excellent condition after 60 years. Mr. and Mrs. Stephens lived in part of the building at one time. Mr. Stephens said Whiteflat at one time had more places of business than Matador and that the Whiteflat school had more students than Matador school.

He said the late Arthur Lynch, who was a cripple since a child, first sold merchandise from house to house and later acquired the store. He sold hardware, dry goods and groceries from the store for many years.

Funeral services for Walter Taft Evans, 60, will be held at 4 p.m. today (Thursday) in the First Baptist Church. Officiating will be the pastor, Rev. Larry Heard and Minister Carroll Thomas, Church of Christ.

Burial will be in East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home. Mr. Evans, a mechanic and resident of Matador since 1944, suffered a stroke at his home during the noon hour Monday, and was conveyed by Seigler ambulance to Richards Memorial Hospital, Paducah, where he was pronounced dead on arrival, about 1 o'clock.

He was born February 28, 1909 at Waxahachie, Ellis County, Texas. He was married to the former Elga Jackson of Matador Oct. 18, 1938 in Clovis, New Mexico and they made their home in Arizona and California before returning here. Mr. Evans was a member of the Church of Christ. He passed away March 31, 1969 at the age of 60 years, one month and three days.

Besides his wife, Elga, he is survived by one son, Roger, and two daughters, Mrs. Derrick Taves (Katherine) and Margaret, all of Matador; five brothers, Charlie of Claypool, Ariz., John of Yakama, Wash., Earl of Martin, Tex., Floyd of Dallas and E. M. Evans, Lubbock; three sisters, Mrs. Ruby Irick of Knoxville, Tenn., Mrs. Jesse Lee Brock of Gatesville and Mrs. Tommie Fullerton of Lubbock; and one grandchild.

GOD AT WORK

What is true Revival? Is it hearts grown spiritually cold suddenly stirred and warmed anew by God as he become rededicated to the task which he has called us? Is it a life with little or no purpose suddenly changed by God to a life of fullness and purpose? Is it young people responding to God's command to "Go and Tell" and surrendering their lives to what they feel is the will of God? Is it people without hope of eternal life suddenly finding that hope in Christ Jesus as they find God's salvation? Is it families united together in worship and service in the fellowship of a local church? Is it a joint commitment by a church to follow God's will as they find it revealed to them in the days ahead, regardless of the cost? According to the Bible, God's Holy Word, it is all of these things and yet still more besides. In short, it is God working in His mysterious way among people who are responding obediently to His will and direction.

This is what I witnessed this past week as a Pastor. I watched God at work as some 28 people responded to the gift of God, Jesus Christ, and accepted Him as their personal Saviour. I watched God

at work as the majority of this number indicated this decision publicly in one of our local revival services and requested baptism and local church membership in our church (others will perhaps be joining with other local congregations here). I watched God at work as young people turned their lives over to God trusting Him with their future. I watched God at work as hearts grown cold were recommitted unto God and watched these same hearts work diligently as they prayed and encouraged others to "get right with God." I watched families united together in a local church and these same families dedicate their homes to God and themselves to be used in His service. Yes, I watched God at work and I marveled, for only God could do these things.

And as I watched I rejoiced, for we witnessed anew one of God's miracles, God Himself working in the hearts of men.

Herein lies the truth embodied in the theme of the great Crusade of Americas which Baptists in North and South America have jointly undertaken (this local revival was our participation in this Crusade of Americas). The theme is "Christ the Only Hope." He is the "hope" of all salvation, whether it be the individual salvation of soul for eternity, or whether it be the salvation of a great nation, stumbling beneath its great

burden of ills. I saw God at work in the lives of men; He can work in our nation as well.

The key to this mighty working of God is that which is found in the Old Testament passage of Scripture, II Chronicles 7:14 "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."

Baptismal services for the candidates joining the First Baptist Church during the revival last week were held this Wednesday night. Five others joined by letter from other churches, and rededications were innumerable.

God worked when His people were ready to pay the price for revival. He will continue to work if we allow Him to do so and pray for Him to. If we do, then true revival and the working of God will have just begun.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN, Tex. — Showdown time is near the Legislature. That's when the time comes for crucial issues of spending and taxation.

Moving at a billion-dollars-a-minute clip, the Senate whipped through a record \$5.8 billion 1970-71 appropriations bill which would require a minimum \$63.3 million in new taxes.

Of this \$5.8 billion budget, \$69.7 million is recommended for support of the State Department of Public Safety, an increase of \$10.2 million over the current level of spending by that agency. Difference would pay for the hiring of 150 more highway patrolmen, 50 more narcotics agents and 10 additional intelligence agents, as well as \$864,638 for an addition to the Horner Garrison Jr. Police Training Academy in Austin.

Despite all its left, the Senate bill contained no funds for the anticipated \$220 million teacher-pay raise, the contemplated \$30 million lift in the welfare ceiling, \$16.5 million for two new medical schools, \$7.5 million for a new dental school or \$6 million for planning new colleges.

Include these high priority items and you are looking at a tax bill a lot closer to \$345 million than \$63.3 million.

However, House Speaker Gus Mutscher has called for an appropriations bill which will require no new revenue. It would include money for new medical schools, dental school and college planning.

Major difference in the bills is in the area of higher education, where the Senate would raise general fund appropriations of 22 senior colleges and universities \$106.5 million, public junior colleges \$19.3 million.

First hearings on major tax bills are getting under way. Hearing on Gov. Preston Smith's supplemental revenue recommendation, to place a one half of one percent levy on chemical producers and raise the cigarette rate to 15 cents a pack, will be set for mid-April.

House may very well pass its version of the budget next week. It would permit a \$240 million increase in general revenue spending without additional taxes. Difference between lean House and fat Senate spending measures must be ironed out in conference committee during the next two months.

Tax battle, which must start in the House, will see-saw back and forth from House to Senate and

vice-versa. Senators have some revenue ideas of their own.

TRAFFIC TICKET IMMUNITY SCORED — State Rep. Maurice Angly of Austin has touched some state lawmakers on a very sore spot.

He wants them to renounce their immunity from traffic and parking citations in the capital city. Angly said, as an Austin lawmaker, he has participated in the practice of "taking care of" his colleagues' tickets and is ashamed of it. He introduced a resolution asking legislators to go on record as "expressing a desire to be treated without special favor or undue accord."

CITIES GET SALES TAX REBATE — Nearly 290 Texas cities last week received a whopping \$28.2 million in allocations from the state comptroller as their share of the one per cent local option municipal tax for the last quarter of 1968.

Totals ranged from \$122 for little Josephine to \$6.4 million for big Houston. Comptroller reported totals exceeded expectations in nearly all cases.

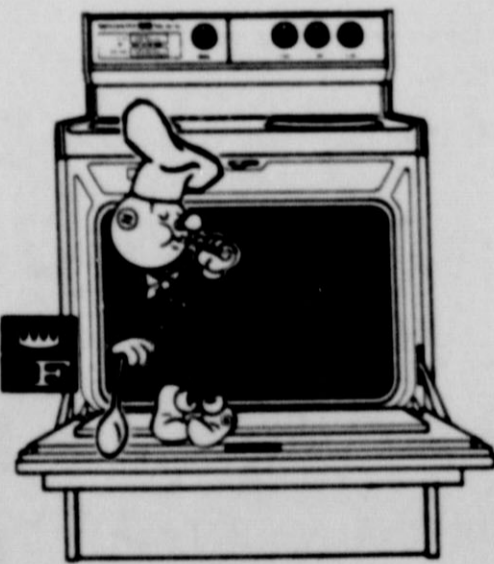
