Recent research conducted by the Diabetes Care and Complications Trial has emphasized the need to individualize the care for persons with diabetes, which includes lifestyle changes such as increasing exercise, monitoring glucose, eating healthfully and drinking plenty of fluids. These lifestyle changes can prevent the onset of debilitating complications of the eye, kidney and nervous system.

These new recommendations by the American Diabetes Association and include:

 Looser rules that move away from any rigid single diabetes diet to a more individualized meal plan of reduced fat content and increased complex carbohydrates.

- Sugar is no longer the villain if eaten within the context of a normal nal of the American Dietitic Associadiet. Sucrose as well as other sugar sources such as fructose or honey should be less than 10 percent of total carbohydrate calories. Studies proved that sucrose had no more effect on increasing blood glucose levels than did fructose. So both fructose and

# Social Security Tips

#### FARMERS, WORKERS, MUST REPORT EARNINGS FOR BENEFITS

Reporting agricultural earnings for will probably not occur until the Fall will not be included in the legislation. Social Security purposes is still sometimes misunderstood. Social Security continues to find a significant number

> tant for the LOCALITY area because of the large number of farms in the area earnings from farm work.

The amount of monthly Social

Security benefits that a worker and/or the worker's family can receive in case of retirement, death, or disability is based on the earnings that are reported to the worker's Social Security number. If your earnings are not reported

correctly during the years when you are working, you and your family could lose money every month when it comes time to collect Social Security bene-

Here is how farm reporting works: If you work as an employee on a farm and earn more than \$150 a year, your employer should be taking money out of your wages each time you get paid Security. At the beginning of each calendar year, he or she should give you a W-2 form, a statement that shows the total amount of money sent in during the past year for Social Secu-

What should you do if you own a farm and have employees? In general, you must: 1) keep records of the wages and make the required payroll deductions; 2) report those wages to the able in English or Spanish.

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Internal Revenue Service (IRS) on IRS Form 943 and pay Social Security taxes; and 3) provide a pay statement for each of your employees as well as a W-2 form after the close of each year. If you don't report the wages and pay the taxes due, you may be subject to a penalty from IRS.

You should also note that you are required to report a worker's earnings The problem is especially impor- if you pay the employee less than \$150 in cash wages, but your total expenses for agricultural labor are \$2,500 or and the number of people who have more in a year (unless you employ seasonal hand-harvest laborers who commute to work daily from their homes and are paid on a piece-rate basis, and who did less than 13 weeks of farm work in the previous year).

As a farm owner, you must report your own earnings to Social Security. Farmers are covered under Social Security just as other self-employed people are. This is true whether you are an owner, operator, partner, renter, or share farmer. You are required to report your earnings if your net income from farming is \$400 per year or more. You report these earnings on your federal tax return, IRS 1040 using schedule F and schedule SE. If you live in Puerto Rico, you must file form 1040PR. You can contact the IRS if you have questions about filing any of


