The top three at the Bailey County Spelling Bee will also receive prizes. The Champion Speller will receive a plaque from the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal and \$15 from the Muleshoe Publishing Company. Second place winner will receive \$7.50 and a ribbon; and third place winner will receive \$2.50 and a ribbon.

The Bailey County Champion Speller will advance to the Regional Spelling Bee to be held at Smylie Wilson Junior High School auditorium on April 14. Prizes to be offered regional winners besides the top prizes of a trip to Washington to compete in the National Spelling Bee, will include the 20-volume set of "Annals of America", "Britannica Atlas" and "The 1973 Britannica Yearbook of Science and the Future", all published by the Muleshoe Publishing Company. Criminal Justice Committee To Meet

The South Plains Association of Governments' Criminal Justice Planning Committee will meet in Post, Thursday, February 15, at 2 p.m. in the courtroom of the Garza County courthouse. Juana Garza, a member of the committee from Muleshoe will attend. The committee is made up of representatives from every county in the SPAG region, and was organized to help the SPAG Criminal Justice staff in the compilation of 1974 Regional Plan. The plan is submitted yearly to the Texas Criminal Justice Council and is the basis for allocation of funds to improve the criminal justice system in the region. As a result, of the work done by last year's planning committee, the South Plains region will receive in excess of 1.5 million dollars for criminal justice programs in 1973.

Easter Seals Provide Funds For The Crippled

Because of the steady growth in numbers of crippled children and adults in Texas, the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas has stepped up its rehabilitation services. According to Jimmie Crawford, who is the Easter Seal Representative for Bailey County, 16,572 handicapped Texans received Easter Seal treatments during 1972.

"Despite medical scientific advances," Crawford explained, "the ranks of the crippled are growing. This is because of population growth, increased number of accident and medical treatment which saves victims of crippling diseases who might not have lived in past years."

Quoting the annual report of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas, he said that 18 affiliated treatment centers are in operation in Texas. They include treatment and rehabilitation centers, sheltered workshops, recreation and educational programs, and many others.

"Through these programs, persons with a wide variety of handicaps receive the help they need to live normal lives," Crawford said.

The largest group served includes those with major deformities of bones and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis. Cont. on Page 3, col. 3

School Board Agenda

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees will meet Monday night, February 12, at 7:30 p.m.

The agenda is as follows: Hear and approve current financial report; hear average daily attendance report for first semester, and current enrollment report; study and consider approval of School Calendar for 1973-74 school year; select board member to hand out diplomas at High School Commencement, appoint election judge, place of absentee voting, and polling place for the annual School Board Election, that will be held April 7, and review election schedule; hear and discuss new information on Homestead Exemptions, set date to meet with city and county; examine and consider approval of bids submitted.

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees have announced the date for the 1973 School Board election. The election will be held on April 7, 1973. This year two regular terms and one one year term will expire. The regular terms of Dr. Charles Lewis and Joe Embry will expire along with the one year appointed term of David Stovall. The election will be held at the Muleshoe Junior High School from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. The following is a list of dates pertaining to the school board election:

February 12-Designate County Clerk to hold absentee voting; appoint election judge; and hold regular board meeting.

March 7--Candidates shall file with the secretary of the Board of Trustees, written application for places on the ballot not less than 30 days prior to

the election date, midnight of the 31st day preceding the election, not counting the day of election. The filing place will be at the school business office.

March 9-Drawing for order of names on the ballot.

March 14-Notice of election by publication in newspaper not more than 25 days nor less than 10 days before election.

March 19-Begin absentee voting at County Clerk's office. The period for absentee voting shall begin on the 20th day and shall proceed through the fourth day preceding the date of election. Sunday, March 18 will be the 20th day.

April 3-Last day for absentee voting.

April 7-Trustee election day, Junior High School, 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

April 8 Votes counted and tabulated within 24 hours after closing of polls.

April 8-Stub boxes delivered to the District Clerk at the time the ballot boxes are returned to the President of the Board of Trustees.

April 8-The presiding judge shall deliver to the President of the Board of Trustees, written returns of school trustees election immediately after all votes have been counted and tabulated, not later than 24 hours after the closing of the polls.

April 9-On the earliest date practicable, the Board of Trustees shall canvass the election, declare results and issue certificate of election to the persons elected.

June 8-If no contest arises out of the election within 60 days after the date of such election, the Board of Trustees shall cause the contents of the ballot box to be destroyed by burning the same.

Present members of the board include Aubrey Heathington, president; Lewis Wayne Shafer, vice-president; Joe Embry, secretary; Ernest Ramm, Carl Bamert, Dr. Charles Lewis and David Stovall.

County 4-Hers Show Barrows In Houston

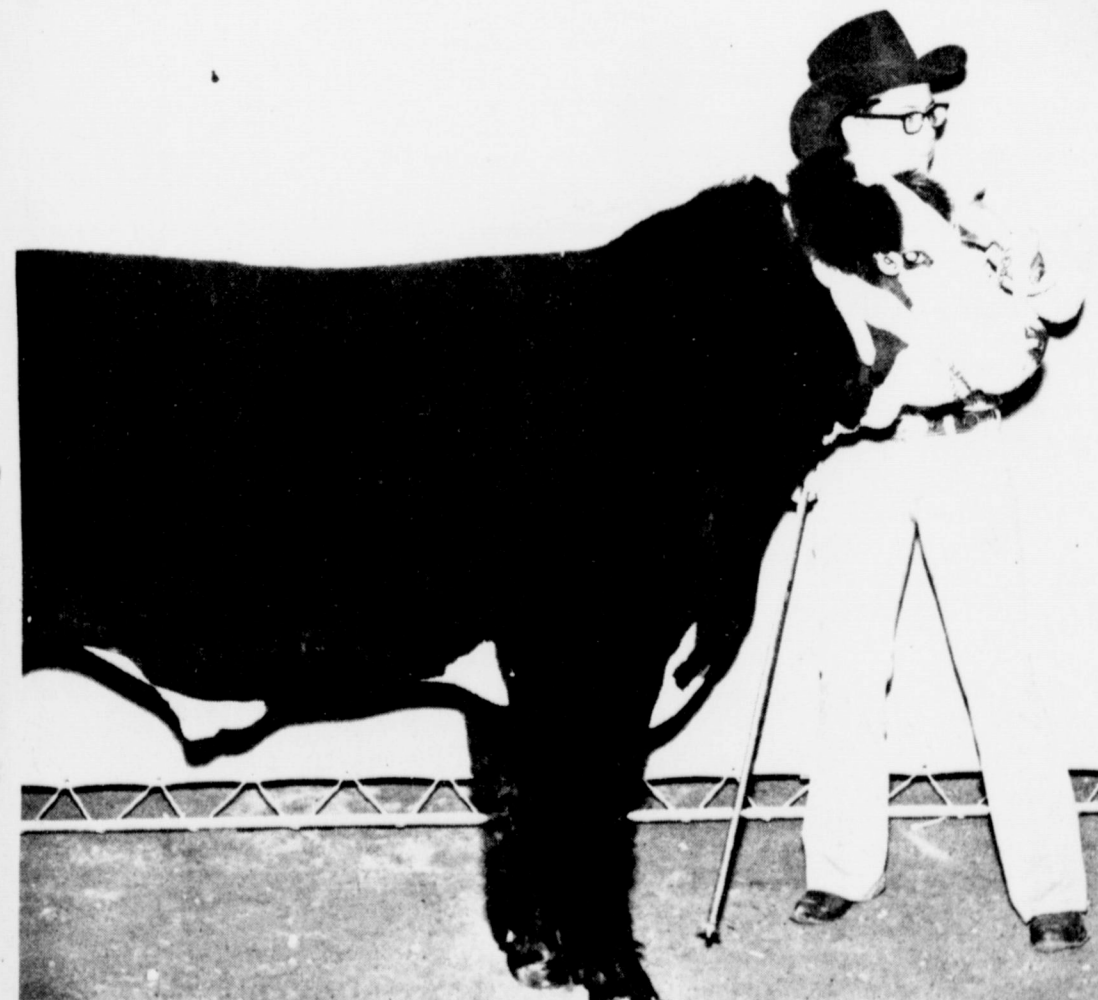
Several Bailey County 4-H boys and girls will be going to the San Antonio Livestock Show this week and will be showing barrows.

CONGRESSMAN

Bob Price

18th Congressional District

This has been a busy week for the Committee on Agriculture of which I am a Member. On Thursday, the Committee approved legislation to reinstate the Rural Environmental Assistance Program and sent this legislation to the House where it will be voted on within the near future. As a sponsor of a comparable bill to reinstate this valuable Federal

cost-sharing conservation program, I could not be more pleased with the outcome of the Committee's decision. I can only hope that the Congress will follow suit by approving this bill as soon as possible.

Monday, February 5, brings another week of meetings for the Committee on Agriculture. During this time hearings will be held

on legislation I recently introduced to restore the Farmers Home Administration emergency loan program which has proven to be invaluable to the farmers in our district and the nation who have been hard hit by extremely bad weather conditions during the last several years. It is anticipated that the Agriculture Committee will once again act quickly to approve this legislation and send it to the House Floor for further action.

This has been a week in which Americans have rejoiced over seeing the names of those POW's who will soon be returning to their homes. For the last several years I have been wearing two of the POW bracelets which contain the names of two men who used to be my flying buddies during the Korean Conflict. Soon I hope to send the bracelets I have been wearing to these men who have constantly been in my thoughts as a small expression of appreciation for their extraordinary service to our Nation. Others who have been wearing these bracelets might wish to do the same.

The cold-blooded and cowardly shooting and wounding of Senator John Stennis this week has touched off a new wave of demands for gun control legislation. It is sad that Congress has, like an ostrich with its head in the sand, ignored the crime epidemic brought on by a decade of liberal, permissive leadership; but just as sad is the way in which the Congress is reacting to the brutal assault of one of its own Members. Contrary to the plea of liberals whose only solution is the confiscation of guns—"Let's get the guns off the streets" they say—the time has come for a return to strict law enforcement system. Instead of getting the guns off the streets, I believe what we really need is to get the criminals off the streets.

In answer to the appeals made by his constituents in the 13th Congressional District of Texas and those from other parts of the country who have suffered extensive losses as a result of adverse weather conditions during the last several years, Congressman Bob Price announced today that he has introduced legislation to correct this situation by reinstating the old emergency loan program of the Farmers Home Administration. Price's action came as a result of the recent decision announced by the Department of Agriculture aimed at terminating the Emergency Loan Program of the Farmers Home Administration. "If this decision is allowed to stand," Price announced, "it will have a severe effect on many of our Nation's farmers."

The Price bill would repeal the \$5,000 "forgiveness" clause and the 1 percent interest provision established by the "Hurricane Agnes" legislation since the continuation of this procedure would require considerable more funds than there are available at this time.

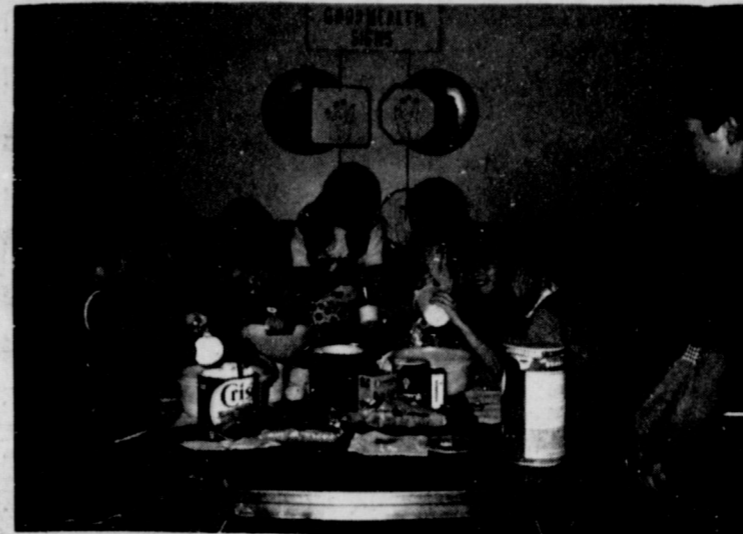

Soybean Testing Underway

Current premium soybean prices focus the spotlight on the High Plains Research Foundation's soybean breeding and testing program.
Since its founding in 1956, the Foundation has been a leader in High Plains area soybean research and has one of the largest testing programs. Besides its own program of researching new varieties and cultural practices for this area, the Foundation also is one of the sites for the U.S.D.A. Regional Soybean Variety Tests.
Presently there are 36 varieties and strains in the regional variety test. Popular varieties that have come from these tests include Hill, Hood and York. New soybean varieties that are being proven in the testing program include Columbus, Oksov and Essex.
The variety testing program provides a showplace for commercial varieties such as HP-363, Patterson, Hinn, SRF 300, SRF 400, and SRF 450. Varieties from Coker, McNair and Hale seed companies have been tested. Varieties from the midwest tested for suitability to this area have included Clark 63, Kent, Wayne, Williams, Corsoy, Amsoy and Beeson.
The Foundation's soybean breeding and testing program is under the direction of Dr. Douglas Owen, a state registered plant breeder.
Dr. Owen, cooperating with Dr. Hartwig of the U.S.D.A., has been studying the genetics and the physiological effects of soybean mosaic virus (SMV). Of primary

interest is the effect of seed coat mottling caused by SMV on yields and chemical properties of soybean varieties.
In 1973, 36 strains that are resistant to phytophthora root rot will be screened for resistance to SMV.
During the past two years, research has included blends of soybean varieties tested to see whether certain combinations might produce higher or more consistent yields. Dr. Owen said that current plans are to continue this program in 1973 and hopefully through 1975 to see if blends have a higher average performance over a period of years.
Soybean breeding is a continuous program, Dr. Owen said the

object of breeding is to select new varieties that are better adapted to this area. "It takes approximately 10 years from the time a cross is first made until a new variety can be adequately tested and released," he said. "And one new variety from 10,000 selections is a pretty good percentage," he noted.
"In 1972, we had 40 advanced strains in a replicated test that have been developed since 1967. Out of these, we hope to have from one to five improved varieties eventually released," Owen said.
He estimated the Foundation had approximately 2,000 strains in the soybean nursery from which new varieties with greater productive capabilities and improved agronomic characteristics, such as shatter resistance, maturity, lodging, etc., eventually would be developed.

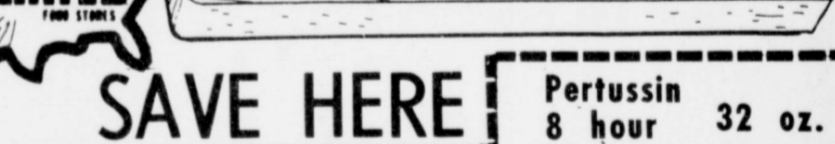

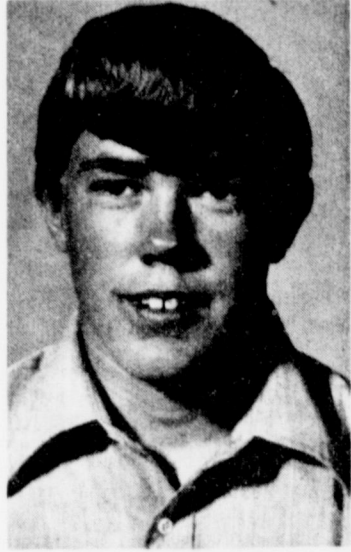
Speech Dept. Wins Hereford Sweepstakes

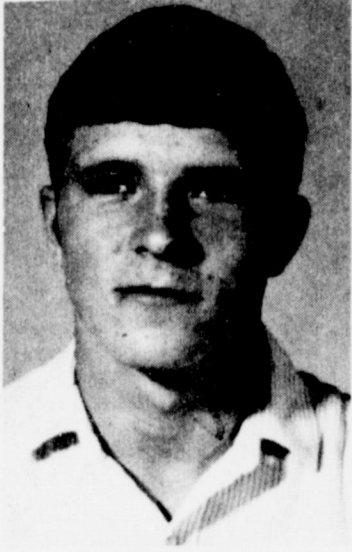
The weekend of February 9-10, the team will compete in the Kermit Tournament.

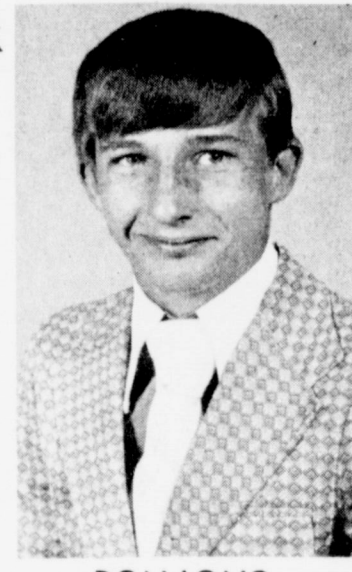

There was a meeting held Wednesday night at the Muleshoe State Bank to discuss the possibilities of running for state office.

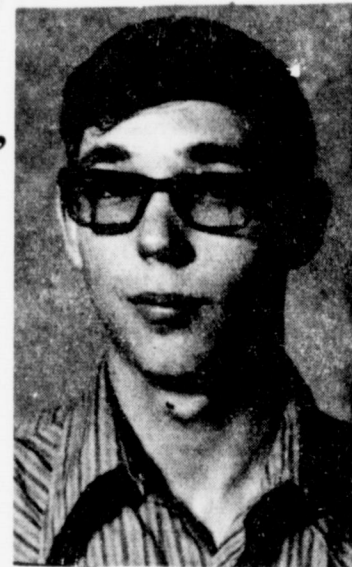
Students Will Participate In "Learn And Live"

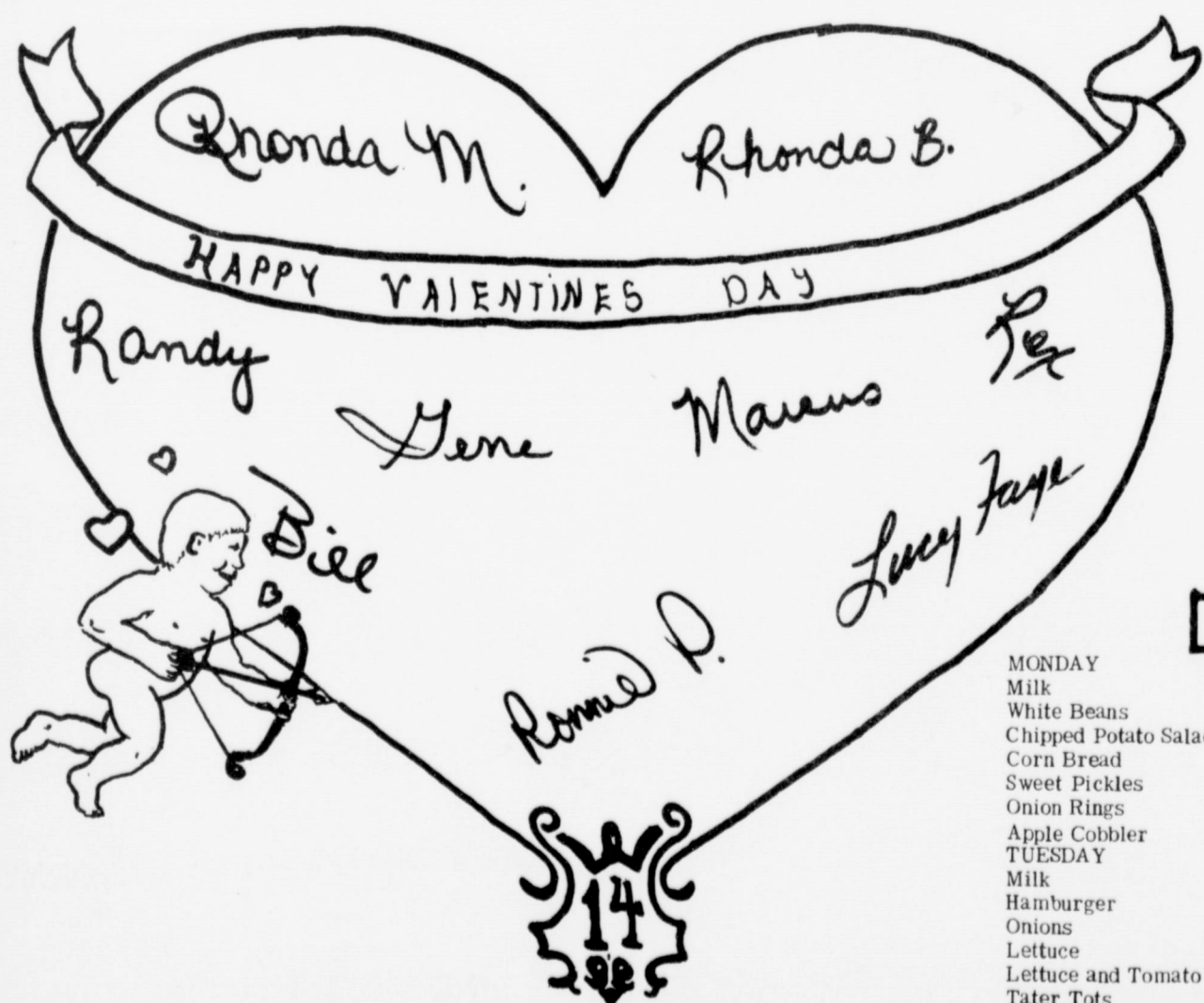


