





Since the latter part of the 18th century a great deal of material has been gathered on infantile paralysis, until today it has become a fairly well defined condition. In defining a disease, it is im portant to separate it from other similar conditions and to establish what scientists call a "picture" characteristic of the disease. This

picture makes diagnosis possible, and method for treating or pre-

venting the disease follow as product of further study. In the case of infantile paralysis, its eause was not even approximated until the beginning of

present century. Then it was shown that the dis ease, infantile paralysis, is caused by a filterable virus, a living agent, too small to be seen unde our most powerful microscopes and fine enough to pass through an ungiazed porcelain filter.
