Santa will make first stop in Motley County Friday night

Santa Claus will make his first stop in Motley County Friday night, November 24, when he arrives for the Late Night Shopping event in Roaring Springs. Santa will arrive straight out of the old west, by horse drawn wagon, and will visit with children at Graham Supply.

Businesses and various vendors will stay open until 9:00 p.m. and offer bargains, special discounts, refreshments and door prizes. Wagon rides will be given to children. This festive night will kick off the Christmas holiday season in Motley County.

Santa will come back to Motley County the following week and will arrive in Matador, Thursday night, November 30, by fire truck. He will visit with children at the old hotel building from 5:30 until 7:30 p.m. The Eternas Study Club will sponsor a Kiddie Store in the hotel. This special store gives children the chance to do their Christmas shopping in their price range. Small gift items are needed and anyone wishing to make a donation may contact Leadell Martin at 347-2686.

In addition to downtown businesses, Vendors will include belts, jewelry, Arbonne products, tupperware, baked gift items, Krispy Kream doughnuts and cookie mix gift items, 4R trinkets, tamales, and free blood pressure checks.

Council members tend to city business during regular November meeting

Matador City Council met Thursday, November 9. Councilmen in attendance were Terry Simpson, Chuck Ream, Lara Davey, Bert Darsey, and Pat Seigler. Also present were Mayor Pat Smith, City Secretary Debra Scott, Water Superintendent Steve Barton and Stan Hanesworth.

Mayor Smith called the meeting to order and Terry Simpson gave the invocation.

Matador resident, Stan Hanesworth addressed the Council in Open Forum. He inquired if everyone had found someone to appoint to the Sub standard housing board and about the possibility of getting the County Commissioners to help with the demolition of old houses. He feels that if we solicit bids for these projects that the contracting should stay within the county. Mayor Smith thanked him for coming and stating his ideas on the subject.

Mr. Barton reported that the City has received a commendation from TCEQ for Outstanding Operations of Wastewater Treatment Facility. Joel Guerrero is being used as part time labor while he considers options for replacing the Assistant Water Superintendent. Dustin Davis with OJD Engineering advises the city that the cost of the current water line project is exceeding the grant

by \$70,000 due to the rising costs of materials since the hurricane disaster. Mr. Barton will check with SPAG about the possibility of omitting some of the area planning to be replaced to keep the project within the projected costs limit. He will also check into tire disposal at the landfill.

In the Secretary's report, Ms. Scott said they have been trying to contact Jerry Poe, who agreed to do the repair on the water tower and have been unable to reach him. Council tried to contact him by certified letter and after receiving no response, City Attorney Tom Hamilton advised the City to put the repair work back up for bids. The second payment has been made to the VFD. The current rate offered on CD's is 4.65%, and with a contract, the interest is the same whether the city takes out a 6 month or a one month CD.

Council approved the minutes, and the expenditures with one correction made to TML and the Ross Graham statement.

Dianne Washington spoke with the Mayor about the Enduro Race being held in Matador the first weekend in March. Last year's race was named the Race of the Year because of the difficulty of the track and the cooperation of the community. 100% of the profits

were paid back to local non-profit organizations. This year one half of the profits will be paid back but the club feels that they will have a larger turnout because of the good rating at this location. The Council approved to hold the Enduro Races again this year.

After being unable to contact Jerry Poe about his bid to repair the water tower, Council voted to put the repair work back up for bids.

Council held a discussion about closing the landfill on Friday giving Mr. Barton additional help for clean up projects. If someone needs access to the landfill they can call City Hall and someone will meet them. Council approved the Friday closing and voted to have this published in the paper and a letter sent to major customers to advise them of the new hours.

Council appointed Paul Westbrook to the Matador Housing Authority board.

Roy Moreno requested to purchase from the city, 2 lots adjoining his lots on the east

side. Council asked Ms. Scott to be sure the city owned these lots and then put them up for sealed bids. Council approved.

A discussion was held about the lots adjoining the hospital being donated by the City to the Hospital District for construction of an Ambulance Barn. Council approved the Mayor to do research on this matter and convey these lots following necessary actions concerning the delinquent taxes.

Council went into closed session regarding personnel matters at 7:30 p.m. and reconvened at 7:46 p.m.

No action was taken on employee raises.

The subject of employee bonuses was tabled.

Council will check further into appointments to the Sub-standard Housing Board.

Council expressed that they would like the Chamber of Commerce and Craig Turner to be present at the next meeting to discuss the rental of the upstairs apartment. Council tabled this matter.

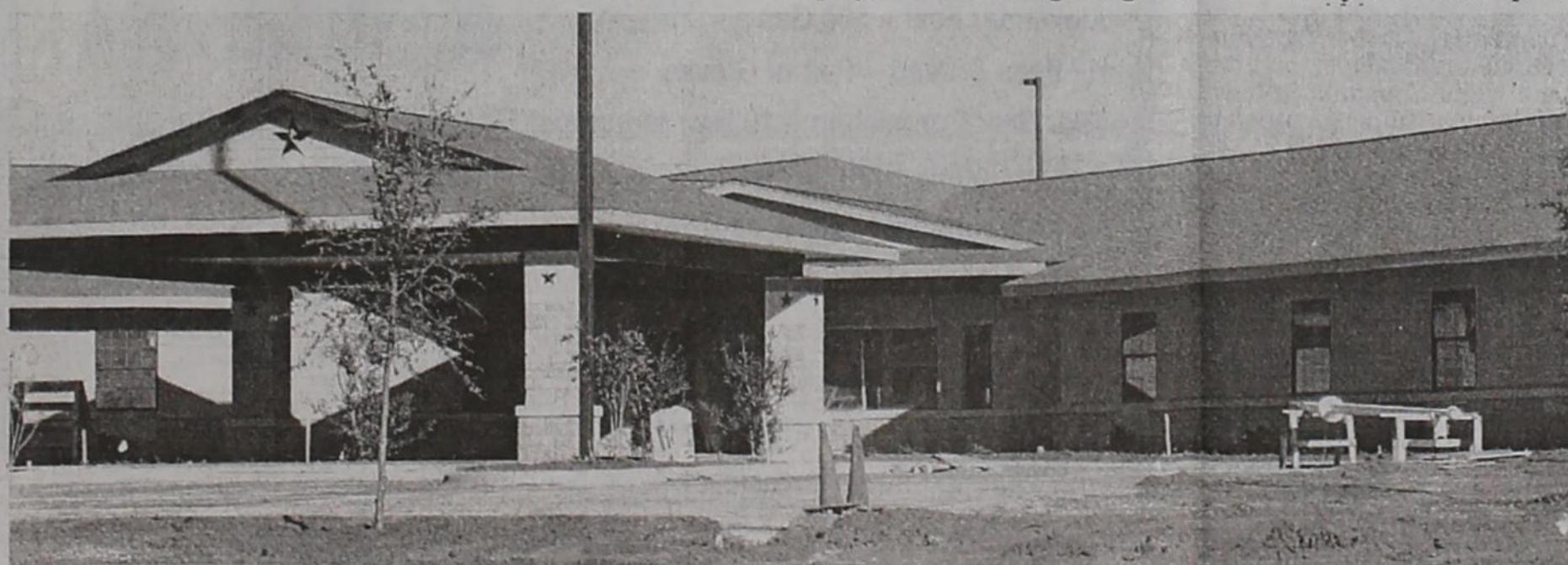
Granny's Tea Party set for December 3

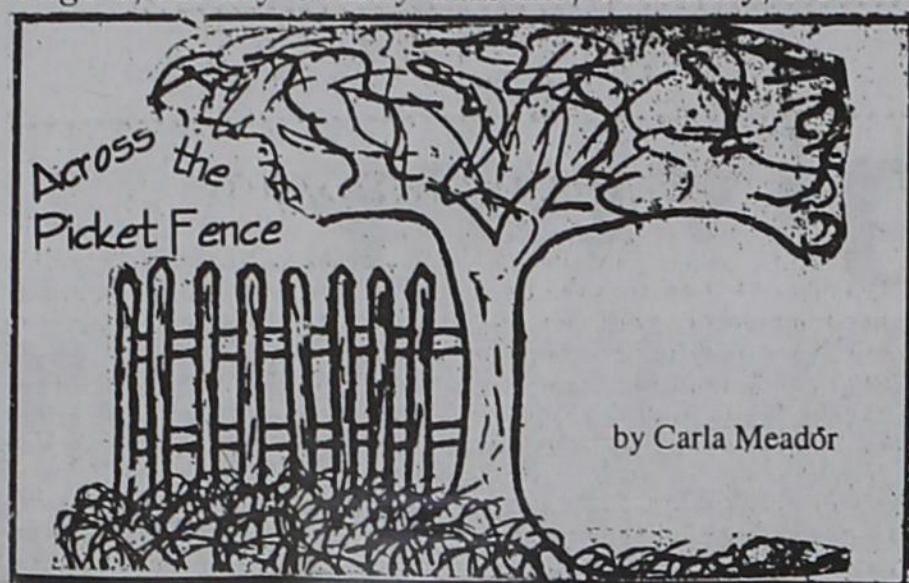

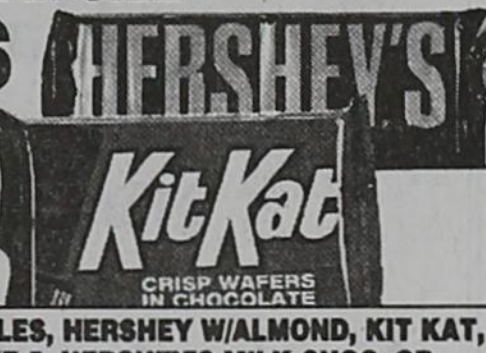

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TPWD predicting typical quail season

Austin -- Like most coveys, quail are going to be bunched up and could be tough to find during the upcoming hunting season, unless you're hunting on land being managed with quail in mind, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"This year, a little ground work on the front end will make a big difference in the quality of the hunt," said Robert Perez, TPWD quail biologist. "I would recommend hunters go early and scout out areas to try and locate birds ahead of time."

The statewide quail season runs from Oct. 28 - Feb. 25. The daily bag limit is 15, 45 in possession. Legal shooting hours for all non-migratory game birds are 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset. The bag limit is the maximum number that may be killed during the legal shooting hours in one day.

With quail hunting, opportunity is tied directly to production and this year's crop of birds looks to be average at best, according to TPWD quail census data.

Ideal quail production occurs in years that remain wet and cool during the spring and early summer months because it extends the window of opportunity for reproduction, according to Perez. He noted hens typically would make as many nesting attempts as conditions allow until they pull off a successful clutch. This year, conditions became hot and dry from late spring through September, which could have an impact on extended nesting success.

This year, most of the state experienced an unusually dry winter followed by less than average spring and summer rainfall. For these reasons quail production was delayed in some areas until rains fell, in other areas quail never really had much of an opportunity to nest due to lack of moisture.

"Had it rained earlier in August we might have seen some late production, but as it turned very little production over the course of the summer," Perez noted. "In parts of South Texas that did have timely rains -- a few showers across the summer -- they're covered up in birds, but it is extremely localized."

During our October buffer area quail surveys in the Rolling Plains, we heard a lot of birds, so it appears there are more places in that region that pulled off successful production and wider production than in other areas."

Here's a summary of quail production around the state, based on annual census surveys conducted by TPWD and what hunters can expect to find this season.

ROLLING PLAINS:

Those parts of the Rolling Plains region that received more spring/summer rainfall are where quail were most successful. Overall production was less than average with small brood sizes being reported by field staff. There were also a good amount of carryover birds from the previous season.

The average number of bobwhites observed per route was 14 compared to 37 last year. This is below the long term average of 23 and is indicative of a below average season. However, good bobwhite hunter opportunities will be found in areas under proper range management and in areas that received the most favorable weather conditions. Public hunting opportunities can be found at the Matador Wildlife Management Area and the Gene Howe WMA.

SOUTH TEXAS PLAINS:

Drought conditions affected south Texas to a greater degree than the Rolling Plains. High daily temperatures combined with low rainfall hindered bobwhite reproductive efforts. How-

ever, scattered rains fell at a scale too small for this survey to detect. In these areas, quail were more successful, especially where range was being properly managed. Field staff reported very little production but confirmed that certain areas, especially in the eastern half (more coastal) were holding fair numbers of birds.

The average number of bobwhites observed per route was 3 compared to 9 last year. This is well below the long term average of 20 and is predictive of a below average hunting season. The Chaparral and the Daughtrey WMAs provide public quail hunting opportunities.

TRANS-PECOS

The Trans-Pecos ecological region of Texas has experienced well above average populations of scaled quail for the past three years. Although still above average, scaled quail counts are down from an average of 34 birds observed per route last year to 19 birds per route this year. Reports from the western

edge of the Edwards Plateau (the Stockton Plateau) also indicate above average populations of scaled quail.

Public hunter opportunities can be found at Elephant Mountain and Black Gap WMAs.

OTHER AREAS

Our surveys indicate that bobwhite numbers in Gulf Prairies, Cross Timbers, and Edwards Plateau are all below their respective long term averages. Although there are certainly areas within each region where some quail hunting opportunity remains, there were not many parts of the state that were not affected by summer drought.

Access to hunting on TPWD managed public land is available with the purchase of a \$48 Annual Public Hunting Permit, which can be bought wherever hunting licenses are sold, online at http://www.tpwd.state.tx.us/licenses/online_sales/ or by calling toll free (800) 895-4248. There is a \$5 convenience fee for online and phone purchases.

When you come to the office this year to sign up for farm program or certify your acres, it make take longer than usual. We must, for 2007, review all of your documents that we have on file to ensure accuracy. This includes your farm operating plan, your adjusted gross income, your power of attorneys, etc.. This is being required statewide. Because it will take longer, it makes it even more important for you to have an appointment so that we can serve you better.

Anytime a required form is missing, filled out incompletely, or a signature is incorrect, and a payment is issued to that producer, it is considered an overpayment. Therefore, we must take the time to make sure we have everything required, and have it done correctly. This will be beneficial to you, the producer.

2007 NAP DEADLINE APPROACHING

Have you purchased your 2007 NAP policy for grass yet? The deadline is December 1. By close of business on that day we must have your check in our hand with all required signa-

tures for you to have met the deadline. There can be no exceptions to this.

If you purchased a policy on wheat for grazing, you must certify that wheat 15 days prior to grazing. If not, it will be considered a late-file with a \$46.00 minimum fee.

COTTON LOAN DEFERRING

By law we cannot receive a loan or LDP request and defer the payment. FSA realizes that CMA's can and are doing this for their producers, but our policy does not allow us to do so.

THANKSGIVING

This fall we have a lot to be thankful for, even considering the condition of most of the crops in our country. Consider the words of the prophet.

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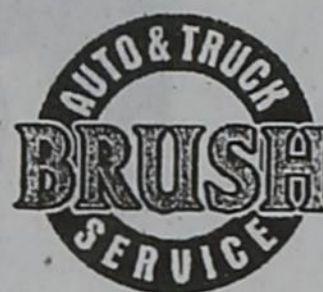
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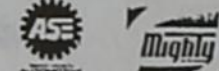

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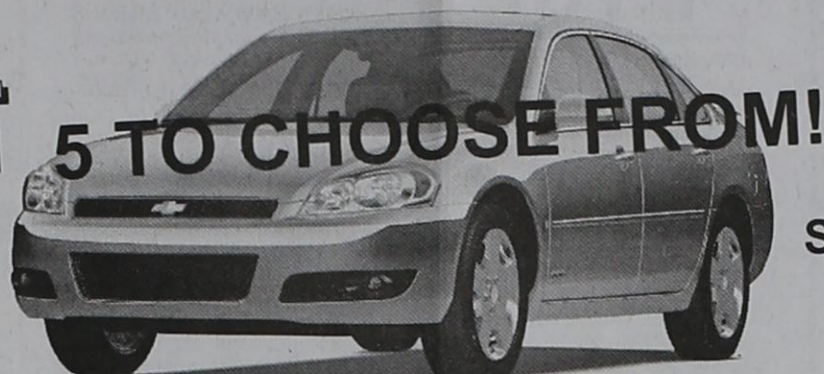
