Four from New York Will Ride in Rodeo

WHEELS are already rolling toward Roaring Springs Pioneer Park for the 42nd annual reunion of the Matador-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association which will start with a parade in down town Roaring Springs this morning.

In the parade an unusual horse and rider will appear. Douglas (Dink) Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jinks Wilson of Matador will be riding "Charcoal Cody" as the "Masked Rider of the Texas Tech Red Raiders", in full regalia. "Dink" Wilson, a Tech senior, is the official rider of Charcoal Cody and has kept the horse on his father's ranch during college vacation.

The rodeo, under management of John Stotts, has attracted an increasingly larger number of ropers, rider and fans each year. Betty Blackwell, who is in charge of registration each year, had three telephone calls from New York City for places in the bareback bronc riding. The three riders are Bill Burton (who will also take part in the bull riding), Larry Martin and Glen Hodges. Tommy Cooper, also of N.Y.C., son of former resident and native son, Jerry Cooper, registered personally for bronc riding. All places for 36 riding events (12 each evening) have been filled.

Ropers were still calling from distant places late Tuesday to compete in the ever-popular rodeo events.

Much Of Area Gets Series Of Showers

County Hits Low Lint Yield in '64

It is hardly a secret that Motley County hit a low cotton production record in 1964. Of the 23 Texas High Plains Member Counties of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., only one county (Borden) produced less. Motley County production is listed at 9,191 running bales in the preliminary reports as released by the U. S. Bureau of Census. Borden County produced an estimated 8,000 bales last year. Deaf Smith County produced only 11,821 bales but acreage in that county was only 11,249 acres as compared with almost 34,000 acres in Motley county.

Pounds of lint harvested per acre is interesting. In Deaf Smith County (irrigation) it was 443, in Motley 160, but down in Howard County it was only 156 pounds per acre. In Castro County (irrigation) in 1962, the average of lint harvested per acre was 648 pounds. The 23-county area average that year was 488 pounds. Motley County's average was 217, but in 1960 it was 310.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

THREE IN COUNTY TO BE STATE 4-H CONTESTANTS

Word has been received that two Motley County 4-H members were winners in the District 4-H records contests. Kate Thompson, Matador, was 1st in the Conservation of Natural Resources Contest, and Tommie Green, Matador, was 1st in the Boys Fire Prevention Contest. These records have been submitted for State honors.

Joan Barton, Matador, also will compete for state honors in the Dress Revue to be held at the Dallas Fair. Joan was the county winner in the Senior Contest, and placed 3rd in District contest.

A prickly pear control demonstration test plot was established on the James Ed Russell place east of Matador on the 20th. Twelve plots, using different materials and mixtures were established by Cecil Meadors, Amchem Co., and myself.

Creep feeding is a management tool in the production of calves to weaning. The ultimate goal is to increase profit, and in most tests, figures are on the wrong side of the profit ledger for calves on good pasture. Increased value of feeder calves is seldom enough to pay for the additional feed and labor costs.

Performance testing shows that the average creep-fed calf gains 1/10th lb. more per day than his non-creep-fed counterparts. This amounts to 25 lbs. extra at weaning.

Creep feeding varies widely from farm to farm, and the less grass in the pasture, the more the gains. Feeders should be placed where the herd congregates, such as near water or shade. A ready supply of clean, fresh, inexpensive feed is a must at all times. Winter creep-fed calves will probably need a ration containing 14 to 15% protein, and for summer pastures, 12% protein is sufficient.

Purebred breeders may profit from creep-feeding bull calves, regardless of pasture conditions, as often the additional 25 to 50 lbs. makes a bull calf bring \$50 more at sale time.

B-792 covers this subject. Those interested are urged to ask for a copy.

The annual field day at the South Plains Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock will be held Tuesday Sept. 21st, starting at 1:00 P. M. The

theme will be "Today's Six Keys to Lowering Crop Production Cost".

Thousands of Texas grassland acres go up in smoke each year, and the best cure is still prevention. Fire guards should be constructed or reworked to protect ranges from the carelessness of passing motorists.

Usually about 10 ft. is the desired width, and if fireguards have been previously established, be sure they are clean of vegetation each year.

I have had several inquiries about a dog program for 4-H members. This is one of the recognized award programs for 4-H members, and there are only two things that we need to start a program of this type in the county. First, members who are interested in this program, and second, leaders to help with the program.

The program covers care and training, so if you are interested, let me know and maybe we can start this program this fall.

Erath County To Roaring Springs Trip Made By Train And Overland

There was no railroad to Roaring Springs, January 1, 1907, when J. R. Havis moved his family from Erath County, to Motley County. There was no town of Roaring Springs when he bought land from the late Harrison Williams west of the Dutchman school.

His daughter, Mrs. Hazel Bridges, who has lived in the Roaring Springs area more than half a century, remembers the trip. The family possessions were shipped in an emigrant car to Childress, and the family traveled on the passenger train.

It required two days to unload horses two wagons, a buggy and household goods from the emigrant car. It required four days to drive the two wagons and buggy from Childress, to the new home in West Texas.

Four of the six children entered Dutchman school, which was taught by a young man named Homer Steen, about 18 years of age at the time. He later became editor and publisher of the Floyd County Hesperian newspaper, which he operated for more than half a century. He is now retired and lives at Floydada.

The four Havis children starting to school were Mary (now Mrs. Howard Rape, who lives in California), Mrs. Hazel Bridges of Roaring Springs, Kennie (now Mrs. John Huffstutler of Lubbock) and Herman Havis who now lives at Southland, Texas. 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Senate Passes Quarries Bill

WASHINGTON, D. C. — A bill proposing to make the Alibates Flint Quarries area north of Amarillo a national monument passed the Senate Monday, (Aug. 16) and only the signature of the President is needed to make the bill law.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, who introduced the first bill in 1963 to make the quarries a national monument, said Monday, "It is with a great deal of satisfaction that I note the passage of the bill by the Senate and the House."

The national monument would be located 35 miles north of Amarillo and along the Canadian River. Most of the land involved is already part of the Sanford Reservoir National Recreation Area, scheduled to open soon.

Sen. Yarborough said, "This bill insures that access roads, parking spaces and a visitor's center can be constructed so that the thousands of people who will soon start visiting the recreation area will also have the opportunity to see these great reminders of what human life was like on this continent before the time of Columbus."

The Alibates mines were first used by man on an extensive scale more than 12,000 years ago. The time was 6,000 years before the wheel was invented and 7,000 years before the great pyramids of Egypt were built. The flint from the mines has been found by archaeologists throughout the mid-and far-west, from the Canadian border to the Gulf of Mexico.

At the mines themselves are artifacts made of Red Minnesota pipestone, California shell, Yellowstone obsidian and Arizona pottery — all brought in by early Indian merchants to trade for the Alibate flint.

Veteran Dallas Policeman Tells Of Brother's Death In L. A. Riot

(Editor's note: The following is an article from Dallas Morning News issue of Sunday, Aug. 15).

A veteran Dallas policeman, his voice choking with emotion, Saturday told of his shock to learn his brother, a Los Angeles fireman, was killed during a Negro riot in that city and described a fire captain's bitterness over the situation.

Thomas G. Tilson Jr., 46, a radio patrolman who has been with the Dallas Police Department nearly 20 years, said his brother was killed when a wall collapsed on him.

The brother, Warren Earl Tilson, 31, was with two other fire-

men battling a fire in a looted market.

The policeman was notified at 7 a.m. Saturday by his mother in Matador, Motley County, about his brother's death.

The older brother said he later telephoned the fire captain at the station his brother was assigned to in Torrance, a Los Angeles suburb.

"He said a captain my brother worked directly under a third another fireman were in a building with Warren and the wall collapsed on all three of them. It happened about 2:30 a.m. Saturday, California time."

The Dallas policeman said he was told that the other two fire-

men were expected to pull through. One of the men suf-

fered internal injuries.

Thomas Tilson is the oldest of seven Tilson children, all born in Matador. Warren was the youngest.

"He tried to model himself after me," Tilson said about his dead brother. "He wanted to get into the police department in Los Angeles but got on the fire department about eight years ago instead."

He said all the brothers, himself included, had been in the military service and that most had served in World War II.

"And now the youngest one gets killed in a race riot," said Tilson, stressing the irony of his brother's death.

Tilson said he had telephoned Warren's wife in Torrance and learned riots were getting close to the suburban community.

Tilson said his brother, during his first three or four years with the fire department, performed hazardous rescue work, then was shifted to a regular fire company where his duty would be less dangerous.

"I called him last Sunday," Tilson said. "I talked with him for a long time, and I told him, you've got a lot to learn, since
