

The Great Season

The familiar red kettles and ringing bells at shopping areas across Texas this Christmas season are symbols of generosity to the less fortunate. In the Lone Star State, this holiday tradition originated from the spirit and determination of one man, a new Texan whose career led him from the navy to the army—the Salvation Army.

A captain in the Italian navy, Adam Janelli witnessed the Salvation Army's work in Calcutta, India. The outreach he saw made a permanent impression. After he emigrated to the U.S. and eventually to Dallas, Janelli was determined to establish the Salvation Army there.

That was nearly 120 years ago. The Salvation Army of Texas credits Janelli as its founder. He began sending letters and petitions to international Salvation Army founder Gen. William Booth: "His letter barrage got so thick that the official word was given and the Salvation Army of Texas opened in 1889."

At first, Janelli preached on street corners. "Janelli gave both material and spiritual help to the poor and homeless," reports the Salvation Army, "and to the people of Dallas he became known as 'Mr. Salvation Army.' The people of Dallas could not recall a time that they did not see Janelli in his uniform. Many people doubted he had any other clothes in his possession."

One man on a Dallas corner eventually rippled out to communities throughout Texas, where the Salvation Army carries out its work today. Janelli is described as "one of the most unassuming Salvation Army personalities Texas and the United States has ever known."

Texas has countless organizations, large and small, founded and staffed by men and man need takes on greater visibility at year's end, and leads to broad support for the red kettles, Blue Santa and Brown Santa programs, Toys for Tots, food and clothing drives, and other efforts to help people.

There are many faces of need in our world. Sometimes we see them, but often we do not. Nonprofit organizations help identify and call attention to unrecognized and unmet needs wherever they exist. They are on the front lines.

Twenty years ago, President Reagan noted that personal charity provides universal benefits. "And very often, it's the giver who receives the most precious gift," he said. "Personal, private charity humanizes a society. It makes us more aware of each other, of our hopes and needs, and of our sorrows and

Lubbock currently offers Internet that is 10 times faster than that offered by Caprock. It is also less per month





11 pipers piping, for 13,40, (up from \$\$2,213,40, \$2,124.00)

10 lords-a-leaping, for \$4,285,06 (up from \$4,160.25) 9 ladies dancing, for \$4,759.19, the same as last year 8 maids-a-milking, for \$46.80, (up from \$41.20)

7 swans-a-swimming, for a cost of \$4,200.00, (no change from 2006)

6 geese-a-laying, for \$360.00 (way up from \$300.00)

5 gold rings, for \$395, (up from \$325.00)

4 calling birds, running \$599,96, (way up from \$479.96) 3 French hens, still a bar-

gain at \$45 2 turtle doves, still for a mere \$40.00

and a partridge (\$15.00) in a pear tree (costing \$164.99) (quite a jump from 2006's \$129.99)

Well, the numbers are in, and it's official--your True Love is going to have to pay \$19,507,25 or 3.1% more for this gift on the 12th day of Christmas.

And if your True Love sends you all the gifts listed in the song on each of the 12 days, the cost will be a whopping \$78,100.10 or 4.0% more than last year.

This is still a bargain compared to the \$128,886.37 your True Love will have to shell out if he does his shopping over the

To what can these price rises be attributed? Well, of course the rise in the minimum wage makes itself felt, with the milk maids, the only unskilled workers in the group, getting a pay raise.

An commodity prices have gone through the roof, as witnessed by the 20% increase for the geese-a-laying. The turtle doves and the partridges have not gone up, since these are not birds that wind up on the table. But the calling birds have gone up, too, even though canaries are not part of the average diet.

Still, demand is up, so the prices have risen 25%. That other commodity, gold, has gone up as well, so the 5 gold rings have gone up 21.5%. Still, this is nowhere near the all-time high of \$750.00 that they cost in 1989.

These figures and more can be viewed on the web at pncchristmaspriceindex.com. PNC Wealth Management has been calculating the cost of the 12 Days of Christmas for the last 23 years, and presents a wealth of historical information on their website. They also have games on offer, as well as a media kit and help for educators who want to use their lighthearted look at the economy in the classroom.

The cheapest year for the True Love occurred in 1995, when the cost for all the gifts on all the days was a mere \$51,000. Since then, as the cost for goods has decreased, the cost of ser-vices has escalated. With inflation and the decrease in the value of the dollar, expect your True Love to have to set aside even more of his paycheck for





Attorney General Abbott Reaches Agreement with WebSite **That Collects Personal Information from Minors**

Santa.com Implements stronger privacy measures to protect young Internet Users

AUSTIN- Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott today reached an agreement with Santa.com that will protect the privacy and safety of children who use the California-based web site, the Attorney General's legal action ensures that Santa.com complies with the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act (DTPA) and the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA). COPPA is a federal law that generally prohibits web sites from unnecessarily, collecting personal information from children under 13.

Under the terms of the agreement, Santa.com, which is operated by Small's Seed Company, L.L.C., must obtain verifiable parental consent before collect-'ing personal information from children, such as names, home addresses and email addresses. The web site also must clearly disclose how it intends to use the collected informations, including wether it will be shared with third parties or other Internet users. Santa.com also agreed not to require children to disclose excessive personal information as precondition to participating in the site's online games and features.

"Today's agreement ensures that a popular children's holiday web site will fully comply with laws that protect young Internet users," Attorney General Abbott said. "Under federal law, web sites that cater to young children

must obtain parental consent before collecting young users' sensitive personal information and must take steps to limit passthrough access to inappropriate content online. The Office of the Attorney General will continue aggressively enforcing laws that protect Texas children."

Under COPPA, web sites that cater to children must make a greater effort to ensure that parents consent before their children younger than 13 provide personal information online. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) offers several options for web site operators to obtain verifiable parental consent. Among them, the FTC recommends that web sites maintain a toll-free telephone number staffed by trained personnel for parents to call in their consent or provide a form for the parent to print, complete, sign, and mail or fax back to web site operators.

Today's agreement requires Santa.com to maintain link on every page of its web site, including homepage, that collects children's personal information. The link must direct users to a disclosure statement that provides the types of personal information. The link must direct users to a disclosure statement that provides the types of personal information the web site collects from children; how the information may be used; and whether it is disclosed to third parties. The link should inform parents that

they may decline the collection and use of a child's personal information.

Today's action is Attorney General Abbott's third legal action under COPPA. Earlier this month the Attorney General filed enforcement actions against TheDollPalace.com and Gamesradar.com for unlawfully collecting personal information such as names, ages, and home addresses from children. Investigators also discovered that the sites' parental consent features were easily manipulated and circumvented. The lack of reasonable controls readily allow children to access the sites' various features, including interactive chat rooms and forums, without their parents knowledge. Both lawsuits are pending.

Attorney General Abbott's has earned a national reputation for protecting children online. He reminded parents to closely monitor their children's Internet activities by using the following safety tips:

-Teach children never to give out personal information such as their last name, birthday, home address or telephone number, especially in a chat room, over an online bulletin board, or to an online pen pal, without your permission.

-Make sure your children know never to agree to a face-to-face meeting with someone they meet online.

-Instruct your children never to respond to e-mail or chat messages that make them feel uncomfortable or from someone they don't know. Stress that they should show such message to you.

-Surf the Internet with your kids. If it is not possible for you to actually surf with your children, at least talk to the about the web sites they are visiting.

-Place the computer in a public room of your house so that even when you are not surfing online with your children, you can monitor their use. Do not allow computers in a child's bedroom or permit the use of web cams.

-Establish ground rules for your children's Internet usage, including the hours they may surf and the kinds of web sites they may visit. Post the rules near the computer.

-Learn how to use parental controls and archiving features. You should be able to check your child's email account and review the sites your child has visited on the Internet.

Hoxie Smith led the Permian Basin FutureGen team and Tom Wilkinson directed the Jewett team.

"It is disappointing to Texans that the FutureGen Alliance ultimately chose a project site in Illinois. However, I vow to begin working as quickly as possible to make FutureGenlike projects a reality in Texas," said Williams. "There are many clean energy projects on the drawing boards and I, for one, am ready to get busy."

WILLIAMS FILES FOR RE-**ELECTION TO THE RAILROAD** COMMISION

AUSTIN - Michael Williams filed the necessary paperwork today to place his name on the March 4th Primary ballot. He is running for reelection to his current post on the Railroad Commission of Texas.

Joined by U.S. Senator John Cornyn and Republican Party of Texas Chairman Tina Benkiser, Williams spoke about the need to continue his record working to insure and inspire:

• Environmentally sound and safe oil, natural gas and coal exploration and production,

Research, innovation and investment in pro-growth, affordable and clean energy solutions,

 Texas alternative transportation fuels, and

 The next generation of Texas scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians

Williams began, "Affordable and reliable electricity are key ingredients for economic growth. Economic growth yields prosperity. And natural gas, nuclear power, clean coal, wind and solar are all part of providing Texans with afford-able and reliable power. With-out affordable, reliable energy, Texas cannot attract the business, industry and jobs to sus-tain the level of economic growth that has made Texas a leader"

Williams heads the Texas FutureGen effort to build a power facility that is capable of producing hydrogen and sequestering carbon dioxide (CO2). The \$1 billion research project is intended to create the world's first near-zero-emissions fossil-fuel power plant.

Texas is a finalist for the project along with Illinois. A decision is expected to be announced in

the coming week. He noted that "Major re-search projects like FutureGen will require the knowledge of sharp thinking scientists, tech-nologists, mathematicians and engineers at a time when many of the best and brightest baby boomers will be retiring. For example, in the energy industry, up to half of the workforce will likely retire within the next five to ten years.

"As a result, we must inspire the next generation of scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians and commit Texas to becoming the global leader in these fields. I say this as the son of a mother who earned a bachelors degree in math, a father who earned a masters degree in math and the husband of a mechanical engineer.

"Without a new generation of sharp technologists, we will not develop the cutting edge energy innovations for tomor-row," concluded Williams.

Williams and Cornyn make up the Republican non-judicial statewide ticket in Texas in 2008. The Primary will be held on March 4, 2008.

Williams was appointed to the Commission in December of 1998 by then-Governor George W. Bush to complete an unex-pired term. He was elected to complete the term in November of 2000 and won election to a full term in November of 2002.







Dear Editor-

I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, "If you see it in The Sun, it's so." Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?

if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The external light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies. You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if you did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

Long, long ago evergreens were perfect, with each taking pride in branches sloping evenly from crown to symmetrical skirt.

This was particularly true in a small kingdom deep in Europe be-yond the Carpathian mountains.

On the first Saturday of Advent the Queen's woodsmen would search the royal evergreen forest for the most perfect tree. It would then reign in honor in a great castle hall, shimmering with silver balls and gold angels that sparkled in the light of thousands of candles. While a huge Yule log chuckled and crackled, the royal family and villagers together would dance and sing around the tree in celebration.

Out in the hushed forest every evergreen vied for this honor, each endeavoring to grow its branches and needles to perfection. All strained at the task, fully concentrat-

ing on their form and appearance. One cold night when a bright white moon glittered on the crusty snow as if it were strewn with mil-

The rabbit, eyes wide with fright, frantically searched for cover but found nothing among the dark trunks extending upward into branches that were artfully lifted from the snow.

Faster and faster the cottontail circled as the excited yelping sounded louder and louder. The trees looked askance at this interruption of their evening (when growing was at its best).

And then a small pine shuddered. Of all the young trees, it had the promise of being the finest of the forest. Everything about it from its deep sea-green color to the curl of its

branches was perfect. But now....its lower branches began to dip, down, down to the ground. And in that instant before the slavering dogs broke into the clearing, the rabbit found safety within the evergreen screen. In the morning the bunny found its burrow. But the little pine could not quite lift its branches. But no matter, perhaps a little irregularity in a tree so beautiful would not be noticed.

Then a powerful blizzard lashed the land. The villagers slammed shutters closed while the birds and animals huddled in nests and dens. A small wren, flown astray, desper-

Finally, in exhaustion, she fell into the little pine. The pine's heart opened and so did its branches, and the wren slept within them, warm and secure. But the pine had difficulty rearranging its branches. There would be a gap evermore.

Weeks passed and winter deepened, bringing a gale such as never before experienced in the mountains. It caught a small fawn who had wandered from its mother. Head down, blinded by snow, it inched into the evergreen seeking a windbreak. But the trees held their branches open so the wind could whistle through them without dangerously bending or breaking their limbs.

Again the little pine took pity and now tightly closed its branches, forming an impenetrable wall behind which the fawn huddled out of the gale. But alas, when the wind ceased, the small pine had been severely and permanently bent out of shape.

A tear of pine gum oozed form a branch tip. Now it could never hope for the honor it had longed for since a seedling.

Lost in despair, the little pine did not see the good Queen come into the forest. She had come to choose the finest tree herself.

As her royal sleigh slowly passed

scanned the evergreens now preen-ing themselves. When she saw the little pine, a flush of anger filled her. What right had a tree with such defects to be in the royal forest? Reminding herself to have a woodsman dispose of it, she drove on, but then

stopped and glanced back at it. As she gazed on it, she noticed the tracks of small animals that had found shelter under it and a downy feather within its branches where a bird had nested. And as she studied the gaping hole in its side and its wind-whipped trunk, understanding filled her heart.

"This one, she said. Her attendants gasped. And to the astonishment of the forest, the little pine was born to the great hall. And everyone who danced and sang around it said it was the finest Christmas yet. For in looking at its gnarled and worn branches many saw the protecting arm of their father, others the comforting bosom of a mother, and some, as did the Queen, saw the love of Christ expressed on earth.

So if you walk among evergreens today, you will find, along with rabbits, birds and other happy living things, drooped branches providing cover, gaps offering nesting places, forms bent from wrestling winter winds

For as have many of us, the trees have learned that the scars suffered for the sake of others make one most beautiful in the eyes of God.

You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil cover-ing the unseen world, which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the stron-gest men that ever lived could tear apart. Only faith, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and pic-ture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? About The Exchange

Francis P. Church's editorial, "Yes Virginia, There is a Santa Claus" was an immediate sensation, and went on to became one of the most famous editorials ever written. It first appeared in the *The New York Sun* in 1897, almost a hundred years ago, and was reprinted annually until 1949 when the paper went out of business.

Thirty-six years after her letter was printed, Virginia O'Hanlon recalled the events that prompted her letter:

"Quite naturally I believed in Santa Claus, for he had never disappointed me. But when less fortunate little boys and girls said there wasn't any Santa Claus, I was filled with doubts. I asked my father, and he was a little evasive on the subject.

"It was a habit in our family that whenever any doubts came up as to how to pronounce a word or some question of historical fact was in doubt, we wrote to the Question and Answer col-umn in *The Sun*. Father would

always say, 'It you see it in the The Sun, it's so,' and that settled the matter.

York Times and had worked on the The New York Sun for 20 years, more recently as an anonymous editorial writer. Church, a sardonic man, had for his personal motto, "Endeavour to clear your mind of cant." When controversal subjects had to be tackled on the editorial page especially those dealing page, especially those dealing with theology, the assignments were usually given to Church.

Now, he had in his hands a little girl's letter on a most controversial matter, and he was burdened with the responsibility of answering it.

"Is there a Santa Claus?" the childish scrawl in the letter asked. At once, Church knew that there was no avoiding the question. He must answer, and he must answer truthfully. And so he turned to his desk, and he began his reply which was to become one of the most memo-rable editorials in newspaper history.

Church married shortly after the editorial appeared. He died in April, 1906, leaving no children.

Virginia O'Hanlon went on to graduate from Hunter College with a Bachelor of Arts degree at age 21. The following year she received her Master's from Columbia, and in 1912 she began teaching in the New York City school system, later becoming a principal. After 47 years, she retired as an educator. Throughout her life she received a steady stream of mail about her Santa Claus letter, and to each reply she attached an attractive printed copy of the Church editorial. Virginia O'Hanlon Douglas died on May 13, 1971, at the age of 81, in a nursing home in Valatie, N.Y.







- * 4 oz. bittersweet chocolate chopped
- * Whipped cream optional

Instructions:

In a coffee mill, finely grind the beans. In a coffee maker, brew the espresso with the boiling water. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine the sugar and cinnamon and set aside. Using a small knife, scrape the seeds from the vanilla bean into a medium saucepan. Pour in the milk and scald over moderate heat, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat, add chocolate and stir until melted. Cover and keep warm over very low heat. Divide the hot espresso into 4 cups. In a blender, begin whipping half of the warm chocolate milk at low speed. Gradually increase the speed to high and blend until frothy, about 1 minute. Pour the chocolate milk into cups of coffee, stir briefly and top each serving with some of the milk froth. Sprinkle the reserved cinnamon sugar on top. Serve immediately with a dollop of whipped cream, if desired.



Grandmother's Sugar Cookies

3/4 c sugar

2. In a double boiler over gently simmering water, melt the bittersweet chocolate; let cool slightly.

3. In a medium bowl with an electric mixer at medium speed, cream the butter and sugar together until fluffy. Add the chestnuts, brandy, and vanilla, and blend well. Stir in the cooled chocolate until well combined. Chill the mixture until it is set.

4. With a melon baller, roll the mixture into 1 1/2-inch balls. Set the truffles on an ungreased baking sheet. If the mixture becomes too soft, chill in the refrigerator for a few minutes. Refrigerate the truffles for 10 minutes.

5. In a double boiler over gently simmering water, melt the semisweet chocolate; let cool slightly. Wit a fork, carefully immerse each truffle in the melted chocolate, then place it on a rack over wax paper. Allow to set for several minutes. Dust the truffles with cocoa before serving. Makes about 5 dozen truffles.

Christmas is a very special time for many children — the day presents are left by a magical person.

* In the United States and Canada, his name is Santa Claus. He flies through the sky in a sleigh pulled by eight reindeer.

* In England his name is Father Christmas. He looks much like Santa Claus, but he has a longer coat and a longer beard.

* In Wales (a principality in the United Kingdom), Santa is called Sion Corn - this translates as "Chimney John" relating to the story that Santa comes down the chimney of each house to bring his gifts to the children within.

*In France, he's known as Pere Noel. He is also called Pere Noel in Canada.

* In Brazil and Peru, he's called Papai Noel.

* In Germany, children get presents from Christkind, the Christ Child on the 24th of December. Also, in Germany Knecht Ruprecht and his helpers come on the 6th of December. Krampus brings coal or a wooden stick to the children that have not been good, Knecht Ruprecht brings mostly cookies, nuts and a small toy to the good children. Belsnickel - German version of Santa who carries a switch to beat the bad children. In Germany, Father Christmas can also be called der Weihnachtsmann.

* In Poland, Santa is "Gwiazdor" ("star man") — for the North Star. He visits children on Christmas Eve, bringing presents. The Christmas Eve meal begins once the first star is seen. "Swiety Mikolaj" (Saint Nicholas) was a cardinal in the Catholic Church, he visits children on December 6th and he brings presents, mostly sweets, which he leaves in children clean (it is very important) shoes.

* In Costa Rica, Colombia, and parts of Mexico, the gift bringer is El Nino Jesus, "the infant Jesus."

* In Puerto Rico, children receive gifts from the Three Kings on January 6th. Each child puts grass under their bed for the camels and in the morning the grass is replaced with gifts.

* Jultomten or Tomten Sweden. Jultomten visits in the evening before Christmas day, pulling a big bag of julklappar (Christmas presents) in the deep snow.

* In Russia, he is called Grandfather Frost or Ded Moroz. Also, there is Babooska the person who was searching for Christ the night he was born. She spoke to the Three Wise Men or Three Kings on their way to find him, they offered their company to her. But she replied I am too old, so the Three Men went on without her and she set search the following day but the "King" had gone from his

* På norsk (in Norwegian) "Julenissen" arrives on the evening of the 24th.

* In the Netherlands, he is called Kerstman. He flies through the sky with his reindeers and puts gifts under the Christmas tree on the 25th of December. De Kerstman lives in Finland. His counterpart "Sinterklaas" is another saint, who is celebrated on the 5th of December. Sinterklaas comes back every year from his home in Spain by steamboat, together with him are a whole group of "zwarte pieten" who help him while he's riding on the roofs - distributing gifts through the chimney.

* In Finland, he is called Joulupukki and his home is in Lapland in the north part of Finland called Korvatunturl. Also in Finland, the Swedish-speaking Finns (finlandssvenskar) call him Julgubben.

*In Spain the children the night of January 5th put their shoes under the Christmas tree and have presents from the Three Kings (Los Reyes Magos: Melchor, Gaspar and Baltasar). Santa Claus is called Papa Noel and there are children who have presents both days on December 25th (from Papa Noel) and on January 6th (from the Three Kings).

* He is also called St. Nick origin Turkey.

* Karácsony Apó, is Santa in Hunqarian.

* In Italy, he is called Babbo Natale. Also, they receive their presents on January 6th from the gift bringer an old lady called Befana.

* He is also called Kriss Kringle - origin unknown.

* In China, he is called Shengdan Laoren.

* In Denmark they call him, Julemand.

* In Hong Kong they call him Sing dan lo ian in Cantonese. * In Slovenia they call him

Bozicek. * In Latvia Santa Claus is called Ziemmassve'tku veci'tis.

* In the country Uruquay he is called Papa Noel.

* In Lithuania Santa Claus is called Kaledu Senis.

* In Portugal Santa Claus is known as Pai Natal. He brings presents on Christmas Eve. However, the Portuguese tradition says the presents in that night are brought by the Newborn Jesus "Menino Jesus".

* In Estonia he is called Jouluvana.

* In Ireland he is called Santa Claus and children abbreviate this to just Santy.

* Many children in the Hindu religion receive gifts from their god Ganesha during the Holiday Sea-

* In Austria, children get presents from Christkind, the Christ Child on the 24th of December.

* In Greece, Santa Claus is called "Aghios Vassilis" and he comes on the night of 31st December leaving the presents under the tree for the children to find them on New Year's Day.

* In Croatia, he is called Bozicnjak.

* In Bulgaria they call him Diado Coleda.

* In El Salvador, for some families Santa Claus brings gifts on Christmas Eve to those children who are well behaved. People get together with the family, children go to bed and find a gift on December 25th.

* In Urdu he is called Baba Christmass.

* In Romania, Santa Claus is Mos Craciun and he comes on the night of the 24th of December bringing presents. Also, the night of the 5th of December is Mos Nicolae (St. Nicholas) puts candies in the good children boots or a stick in the bad ones.





Christmas Eue Øf 1944

Christmas Eve, 1944. I was a sailor in the U.S. Navy, on a oneday leave in San Francisco. I had won \$300 at poker that ordinarily would have burned a hole in my pocket, but I couldn't shake an overwhelming sadness.

Scuttlebutt had it we'd be pulling out before the New Year for the South Pacific. I'd just received word that another friend had been killed in Europe. And here I was, an 18-year-old alone in a strange city. Nothing seemed to make any kind of sense. What was I going to be fighting for, anyway?

I spent most of the day in a mental fog, wandering aimlessly through crowds of laughing, happy people. Then, late in the afternoon, my vision suddenly focused, and for the first time a scene registered.

There in a department-store window were two electric trains chugging through a miniature, snow-covered town. In front of the window a skinny boy around nine years old, his nose pressed against the glass. He just stood there, fixed on those trains.

Suddenly the boy was me nine short years before, and the store was Macy's in New York City, my hometown. I could see, could feel the same longing, the same desperate hoping. I could hear the sigh of resignation-the frail attempt to hide the disappointment that Dad could not afford those trains. And I saw the reluctant turning away and then the one last look.

Not this time! I don't know what came over me, but I grabbed the boy by the arm, scaring him half to death.

"My name is George," I told him.

"Jeffery Hollis Jr.," he managed to reply.

"Well, Jeff Hollis Jr.," I said in my best grown-up voice, "we are going to get us those trains.' His eyes grew wide, and he let me lead him into the store. I knew it was crazy, but I didn't care. Suddenly I wanted to be nine again and have a kid's dream come true. The salesclerk looked at us suspiciously, a scuffy black boy and a black sailor in ill-fitting dress blues.

"Those trains in the window," I blurted before he could speak. "The whole setup. How much is it?"

His snorting response was interrupted by the arrival of a

much older man wearing a warm Christmas smile. "One hundred and sixty-five dollars and sixtythree cents," the elder man replied, "delivery included."

"We'll take it," I said. "Right now, if we can."

"Sailor," he said, "we can! What about the rest of the family?"

I leaned down, and Jeff Jr. whispered that he had two little sisters as well as his mom and pop. I gave him \$50. "I'll have someone help him out," the elder man told me. And he called over a cheerful woman who took Jeff Jr. by the hand. While the trains and other purchases were being wrapped, the man told me he had two sons of his own in the service. After a lot of "Merry Christmases," a delivery truck was assigned to take us to the boy's home.

Jeff Hollis Sr.'s reaction reminded me of what my own father's would have been if I had shown up with a stranger and a whole lot of gifts. I could see he was a hard-working man, breaking his back to make ends meet and knowing he couldn't give his family all he wanted.

"I'm just a sailor a long way from home," Mr. Hollis," I said respectfully, explaining how I had seen myself in his son's longing gaze at the store display.

"You couldn't have spent the money any other way? he asked gruffly.

"No, sir," I replied.

His face softened, and he welcomed me to share their table. After supper, I read to Jeff Jr. and his sisters until they went off to bed.

"I guess you know we've got a lot to do before morning," Jeff Sr. said. His words startled me for a moment. Then I understood. I was no longer a child; I was a man now, with adult responsibilities. So I joined him at what turned out to be nearly an all-night job of getting the trains put together and set up. His wive, Marge, made sandwiches and coffee and kept me talking about growing up in New York. At midnight we paused to wish each other a Merry Christmas, then went back to the task of making a boy's dream come true. When we finished, I was bone-tired. Jeff Hollis Sr. looked for a long time at what we had done, then signed and sat back in a worn easy chair. "Mine was a bike," he said quietly. "A big two-wheeler with shinny spokes and bright-vellow

handlebars. The seat was real leather. I loved that bike. I dreamed about it and wished for it.

"Mine was a Christmas dress I'd seen in a dressmaker's window," Marge said. "I wanted everyone to say, "What a pretty little girl in that fine dress.'

Dreams I thought sleepily. Kid dreams. I guess I dozed because the next thing I knew it was five o'clock, and Jeff Jr. was shaking me. He had remembered I had to be back by eight. "It's time," Jeff Sr. said.

"Merry Christmas."

"Wow!" Joy mixed with disbelief. We hadn't done as spectacular a job as the window dressers, but we got the trains laid out all right.

"Dad?" Jeff Jr. asked. "George?"

I exchanged glances with his father and nodded my agreement. This was the honored, official first outing. With Jeff Sr. at one control and me at the other, we set the trains on their way. On the second circuit I eased Jeff Jr. into my place. For about five minutes he ran his train. Then abruptly, he stopped and, with-out a word, left the room. He returned with the presents he had bought, a look of pride on his face. He'd had some help, but he'd made the choices himself. I thought he was finished when he turned to me with a package in his hand. "Merry Christmas, George," he said quietly. I was totally surprised. The gift was a comb-and-brush set, along with a case for other toilet articles. He held out his hand, then changed his mind and hugged me warmly. The moment

of parting was bittersweet, for I knew I would probably never see the Hollises again. Jeff Sr. and Marge thanked me, but I was the grateful one.

As I made my way to the station to catch the bus back to the base, I realized I had no more nagging doubts. I had found more in this experience than I had received from all the pep talks and patriotic speeches I had ever heard.

For me, it was a revelation. I knew now what this war and the fighting was about. It was something at once wonderful and simple. This country, my country, was a place of dreams, and of dreamers who had the faith and the will to make dreams come true.




