She also acknowledged Motley County Tribune for the Homecoming coverage, and for offering a complimentary paper to the homecoming crowd. A photo insert of former students and classes were included in the complimentary paper.

Of course we have to take our seasons as they come, but my undisputed favorite is the period we are in, namely, autumn. Next, get out your recording of Vivaldi's "Four Seasons" and finish your dwindling daylight hours with a playing of the "Autumn" section. Winter won't matter as long as autumn lasts way into December.

You gave us kids a start from your heart, and I want to im-


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

The message brought by Peg White, Lions District Governor at the RS Lions Club meeting touched my heart strings. Mrs. White told how the Lions Clubs were active in helping prevent blindness. One of the projects has been to help people in Africa who live near rivers to prevent River Blindness. There is a flying insect near the rivers that lay their eggs in the corners of human eyes that result in blindness. Many people who made a living on or near the rivers moved away from the rivers. The International Lions have brought vaccines that prevent river blindness. That has helped the economy as well as saving their sight because people whose occupations were river related could go back to the rivers to have jobs to support their families.

Another sight related project is to distribute measles vaccine to countries where the measles run rampant and cause blindness in many children. Lions International has a project that anyone can be a part of; it is the donation of eye glasses that are no longer needed and hearing aids.

When you get new glasses, don't throw the old ones away; find a Lion and donate them. They are re-polished and used to help someone that can't afford to have their eyes tested and new glasses. They run free clinics to check eyes and fit these recycled glasses. They are equipped with volunteer optometrists, ophthalmologists and hearing technicians to assist in this work. Both Roaring Springs and Matador have Lions Clubs participate in this worthy project. If you have a need for glasses and can't afford them call a Lion to arrange for tests and new glasses.





And yet that is precisely the penalty the early Christians paid for preaching the resurrection.
