# Third grade students tour MC jail and museum



The MOTLEY COUNTY TRIBUNE will have several pages -- as many as is required to bring readers all the news around the county. News items will not be cut to save space or limit the number of pages you receive. However, news items that are not time sensitive may be held over to the next issue if there is an abundance of news in a given week. Deadline: June 7


June 26 - Subscribers will receive their second issue of the Caprock Courier. Deadline: June 21.

July 3 - The Caprock Courier will be printed weekly (every Wednesday) starting with this issue. Deadline: June 28.

# A Retrospective of **Motley County Tribune**

As you learned last week, Marcy and Robert Garriott of Austin purchased the archives of the Matador-Motley County Tribune then, along with publishers Laverne Zabielski and Larry Vogt, donated 78 years of printed history to the Motley County Museum. The archival books from 1935 to 2013 will be housed at the museum, and at a later date will be made available to the Motley County Library in digitized

This is a significant contribution. Marcy is a filmmaker and photographer from Austin, TX, but has family roots in Matador. She is the great granddaughter of Nellie Harris Higgins and Walter Higgins; granddaughter of Nell Rhea Higgins Gilbert and Clay Gilbert; and the daughter of Mary Linda Gilbert Hussey, all former residents of Matador. Her great grandmother Nellie Harris taught school at Teepee City in the early days. After her marriage newspapers over the years." to Walter, the Higgins operated the City Bakery in Matador from 1914 to 1935. Also of significant importance is the acceptance of the archival books by Museum Director Marisue Potts. The museum will serve as the repository for the historical books.

Motley County has a roughand-tumble wild frontier past that was documented by enterprising newspaper men and women for more than 120 years. The county was founded in 1891, and records show that a newspaper has been published in Motley County since December 9,

The early-day papers don't exist, as far as we know; they were likely one- or two-page tabloids, hand distributed. However, for four decades, Douglas Meador, the renowned publisher-editor of the Matador Tribune devoted his life to publishing the news in Motley County (1933 to 1974).

Paying tribute to the past editors and publishers of the county newspaper seems an appropriate send off for the "Where History Has Pride" masthead. The following information was taken from Marisue Potts' Motley County Roundup, "New, News, Who's Got the News?: A brief survey of the county

Dec. 9, 1891: Luther Taylor, editor and proprietor.

May 12, 1892: Clarence Nugent, editor and propri-

January 8, 1915: Bob Johnson, Editor, and John Perkins, co-owners.

April 16, 1920: W.D. Starcher, Editor and Business Manager; C.A. Lamb, Asst. Editor.

Sept. 8, 1921: H.O. Ward, owner

March, 1925: Grover C. Mitchell, owner, editor, and publisher.

Dec., 1931: Trail Dust column first published.

Oct. 5, 1933: First published newspaper as Matador Tribune.

Mar. 14, 1934: Meador purchased the Motley County News from G.C. Mitchell, and combined two newspapers under the Matador Tribune masthead. The original publishing company partnership comprised of Howard Hamilton and Douglas Meador. The enterprise moved to the Masonic Building (located in the back of the Matador Variety Store, (Main and Hwy. 70) where the Tribune was printed for 19 years. In 1953 Meador constructed the Matador Tribune building (now Tom Edwards Law Office) across

from Pioneer Park on Main Street, downtown Matador.

March, 1935: Meador purchased Hamilton's interest in Matador Tribune.

About 1938: The Matador Tribune purchased "the circulation, advertising and good will of the Roaring Springs Reporter." The Tribune became owner of these previous names: Texas Maverick, Motley County News, Matador Gusher, Roaring Springs News, (a second Motley County News from G. C. Mitchell in 1934) and Roaring Springs Reporter.

1940: First publication of Doug Meador's "Trail Dust," 134 pages, cloth bound, sold for \$1.60; third printing, November, 1970, 140 pages; sold for \$4.95. Reprinted recently by Lila Meador's niece, Dale Nance. On the book cover: "Star-dusted philosophy by an editor from a small west Texas town."

March, 1948: The Matador Tribune started with Volume 54, No. 1 (Volume numbers of past publications were picked up in this num-

July, 1951: Tribune awarded first place in general excellence by West Texas Press Association.

Oct., 1952: Douglas Meador named "Texas Newspaperman of the Year" by Dallas chapter of National Journalism Fraternity, Sigma Delta Chi.

Aug. 24, 1967: Tribune celebrated 75th year of newspapers in the county.

Sept. 27, 1974: Douglas Meador died; his widow, Lila Meador became editor and publisher.

Sept. 1, 1977: Meador sold to Diana and Ray Freedman of Earth, publishers of Earth News-Sun, Amherst Press, Sudan Beacon News. Leon Watson, editor and owner.

1985: Roy and Patsy Tippin assumed ownership, Patsy became editor and publisher.

Feb. 2, 1986: Barbara Armstrong, editor and publisher. Carla Meador worked for Barbara for 10 years, seven months.

**Sept.** 5, 1996: Carla Meador, editor and publisher, extended her resume with an additional 10 years in community journalism.

Nov. 29, 2007: Laverne Zabielski and Larry Vogt, owners, editors, publisher.

June 1, 2013: Sally Arnold, owner, editor and publisher, purchased the Motley County Tribune, which will be published in the tabloid publication, Caprock Cou-

In summary, a weekly newspaper has been published in Motley County for 122 years, under the leadership of 12 editors and publishers. This is an end of an era in newspaper journalism in our county. While the transition is not an easy one for some, the paper will still be in printable form in an areawide publication, Caprock Courier, under the leadership of an enterprising young woman. 
