A public hearing on a water plan affecting Red River and tributaries above Denison Dam is announced for Wednesday, Nov. 5, at Fair Park Auditorium, North Commerce Street in Childress, starting at 9:30 a.m. according to Bill Palmeyer, County Agent.

All of Motley County, he said, is included in the plan, as the Pease River is a tributary of Red River. For additional information, Palmeyer said, the plan is posted in the courthouse.

All interested parties are invited to be present or represented at the hearing, including representatives of federal, state, county and municipal agencies; commercial, industrial, civic, highway, railroad, pipeline, utility, flood control and other water resources interests, and affected property owners.

All interests are urged to present pertinent factual material bearing upon improvements desired and to give detailed supporting data on the needs and economic justification of the undertaking. Interests who do not support any change are also urged to state their position.

The Corps of Engineers is particularly anxious that the views of all persons, both opponents and proponents, become part of the record of the hearing, the announcement stated.

To insure equal opportunity for all, either oral or written statements, or both, are encouraged and will be accepted and it was further stipulated that four copies of all written statements should be submitted.

Faith and Work Reward Couple

LIFE has been far less abundant for Mr. and Mrs. C. B. (Carney) Roberts of the East Afton community. They now have approximately 750 acres of good land with six irrigation wells, about 75-head of cattle and a comfortable farm home.

When they married in Ft. Worth in 1933 they had \$3 left after paying the preacher. They had been reared in the McAdoo area and returned there after their marriage. Times were very hard and the couple sometimes walked eight miles to pick cotton. They had a small crop in 1934 and because of the drought, harvested less than 600 pounds of seed lint.

They sold a few eggs and Mr. Roberts would walk nine miles to the Dobbs City store to trade them for other food items. Eggs were selling for 8c per dozen. They frequently had very little food, but kept faith and continued to work.

When their two children came along they frequently carried them to the cotton patch and then home after a long day in the field. Their son was killed in a tractor accident in 1949 near their home.

Receive Govt. Loan

In 1941 Mr. and Mrs. Roberts were able to receive a government loan and purchased 160 acres where they now live. Both worked in the field and Mrs. Roberts can still drive a big tractor, which she frequently does. They paid for the farm in about three years and purchased more land. In the early days they farmed with mules.

Mr. and Mrs. Roberts have a daughter, Mrs. Marvin L. McSpadden, who is a special education teacher in the Lubbock O. L. Slaton Junior High School. Mr. McSpadden is a mathematics teacher and assistant coach in Lubbock Senior High School.

Public Reminded Of Short Course

Farmers and other interested persons are reminded of the four-day short course scheduled to begin here Monday, Nov. 3 in the vocational agriculture building at 8 p.m. and continue through Thursday, Nov. 6.

Bob Jacobs, swine specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency at Texas A&M, will be instructor for the course. An entry fee of \$2. will be charged.

Swine Production Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each person who attends all the training sessions, Bill Moss, Vo-Ag teacher announced. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Jacobs will be available to assist students with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction. Moss said.

Mr. Jacobs states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as selecting and breeding, feeding and feeding requirements, management, disease and parasites, housing and equipment, and marketing.

"Short courses in swine production, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program between Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, who coordinates the program.

Specialists are now also available in the fields of beef production, farm (arc) welding, farm electrification, electric motors, tractor maintenance, pasture and oxy-acetylene welding.

ANGUS STEER PLACES IN STATE COMPETITION

An Angus steer, shown by Pat Peacock of Roaring Springs as a 4-H project, placed 10th in Angus heavy competition at the State Fair in Dallas, Wed., Oct. 15.

The animal was awarded a blue ribbon by a commercial grader, who graded the animals before the judging began. All animals are judged in advance, and only those receiving blue and red ribbons are eligible to compete in the various classes, according to County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

Continued Rainfall Leaves Area Soaked

CONTINUED rainfall in West Texas during the past four days has brought all farming activities to a complete stop and set a record for October precipitation in recent years.

Bob Stanley had recorded a total of 4.78 inches yesterday afternoon for the month of Oct. The last series of rains which followed a cold front, started Sunday afternoon and produced 1.43 inches.

Rainfall for the year to date, according to Mr. Stanley's records lists: Jan. none; Feb. .90; Mar. 2.80; Apr. .83; May 2.66; June 2.52; July .81; Aug. 3.76; Sept. 3.82 and Oct. 4.78 for a total of 22.88 in. At this date in 1968, total rainfall registered here was 25.92.

With rain, drizzle and murky skies in West Texas moderate floods rolled down some rivers in South Central Texas.

The mercury has remained above freezing point here during the past few days, but cold enough to be disagreeable. Nights have been in the neighborhood of 40 degrees with daytime temperatures slightly warmer.

Forecasters were cautious in predicting the length of the "Spell" but expressed belief that a clearing trend might start today.

Labor Survey Seeks Total Registration

The labor survey being conducted in Motley County has been slowed down to some extent during the past week because of weather conditions.

Gene Clements, supervisor of the group operating for the Employment Commission, urges everyone in the county to register, regardless of work or position, or lack of employment.

Mr. Clements said, "Every person in Motley County over the age of 16, whether employed or unemployed, is asked to show his support for the industrial and economic expansion of the county by registering his current and/or past work experiences with the Labor Survey Smaller Communities Team."

It requires only a few minutes to register. One man may register for his family if he wishes. The office, located in the basement of the courthouse (formerly ASCS), is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. every day. A member of the crew is on duty during the noon hour.

Others employed here in the survey include Hubert Hughes, Anthony Cox and John Childress.

Program on Challenge of Change Shows Club Members How to Read

Members of El Progresso Study Club were shown new methods of reading by a representative of Reading Dynamics Institute, Thursday in regular meeting at the home of Mrs. L. B. Campbell, president.

"Reading is a thinking process, and a means of getting information, rather than an end," Charles Sharp of Lubbock, guest speaker, explained to the club. "Knowledge is power, but comprehension, through reading, is necessary."

He explained further that while reading is a 'thinking process' a definition of 'thought' is relative. "Like concentration, reading must have an object... reading is a Man thinking; not a thinking process alone."

"Reading is a process of sampling," he declared. "One of the major contributions of Reading Dynamics is that it places purpose before definition, means before ends... schools stress the ends, not the means... an understanding of what a reader wants from a book must precede the choice of reading techniques he uses to accomplish his purpose."

Mr. Sharp preceded his remarks with a reading "test," by which the women were able to determine their "words per minute," reading ability. He then showed a film which explained Reading Dynamics' process of reading which enables a person to read as high as 7,000 or more words per minute. Average words per minute of the members ranged from 150 to 250.

He stressed three main tenets behind every worthwhile reading course: 1. few people possess an efficient style of reading; 2. anyone can improve his style of reading; and 3. everyone should read at the top level of his ability—there is no value in doing less.

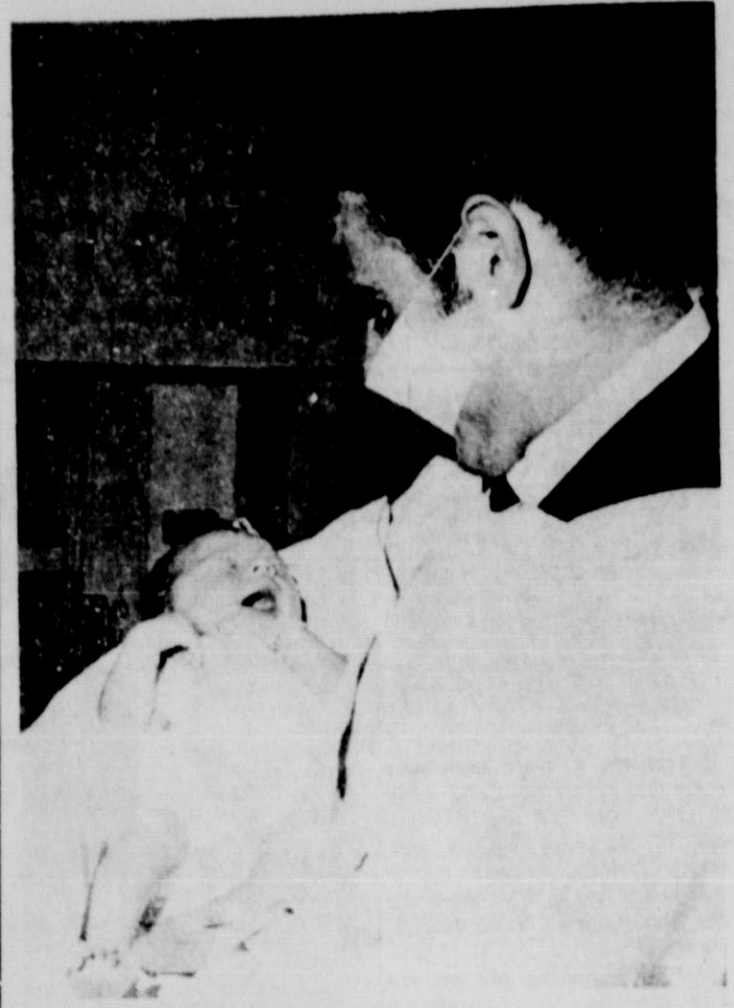

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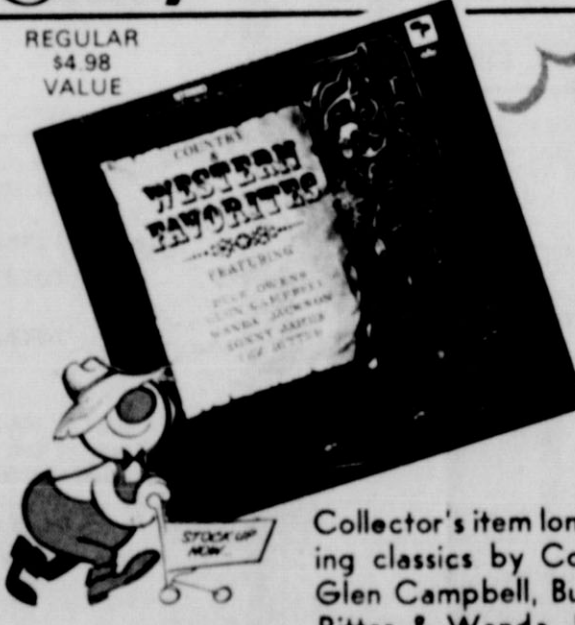
