


The parents of the children that have never attended the Motley County schools are asked to bring copies of the child's birth certificate, social security card, and shot record.







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Home Economically Speaking

TEETH ARE MEANT TO LAST A LIFETIME

In 1960, only about 35 percent of people over age 65 retained any of their own teeth. By 1990, that figure had doubled to 60 percent. Thirty years ago, before daily brushing, flossing, regular checkups, and fluoridated water and toothpaste were used in combination, the average 65-year-old only had about seven of 32 natural teeth; today's 65-year-old has about 18.

Fluoride -- The single most impor-tant advance in 20th century dentistry is the use of fluoride in water, toothpaste, and topical medications. Fluoride strengthens teeth and retards decay. It was first added to selected public water supplies in 1945 and to toothpaste in the mid-1950s. When ingested in youth while teeth are forming, fluoride becomes incorporated into the tooth structure, making teeth strong.

Today 94 percent of toothpastes and about 50 percent of the water sup-ply are fluoridated. To find out if fluoride is added to your water, ask your local dentist, health department representative, or water company personnel. You should know that if you drink bottled or well water, it is not likely to contain enough fluoride to prevent Are Important tooth decay.

- * Gum disease, known as gingivitis in its mild form and periodontistis in its more severe form, is the most frequent type of dental problem among older Americans. About 64 percent of people over age 65 some of these symptoms:

Regular Dental Checkups

Regular dental checkups (once or ing. twice a year) are essential. Besides preventing and arresting oral disease and decay, dentists can also identify early signs of systemic illness, such as diabetes, anemia, leukemia, oral cancer, and adverse drug reactions.

You can help your dentist monitor your general health by keeping him or her informed of surgeries, hospital stays, and medications. Also, be sure to alert your dentists if you have heart disease or a heart murmur, which could put you at risk for an inflammation of dental treatment.
