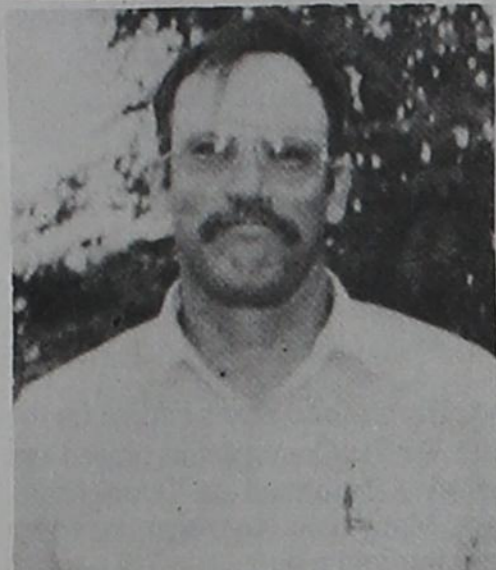

Special class reunions to be celebrated are the classes of 1946 and 1986

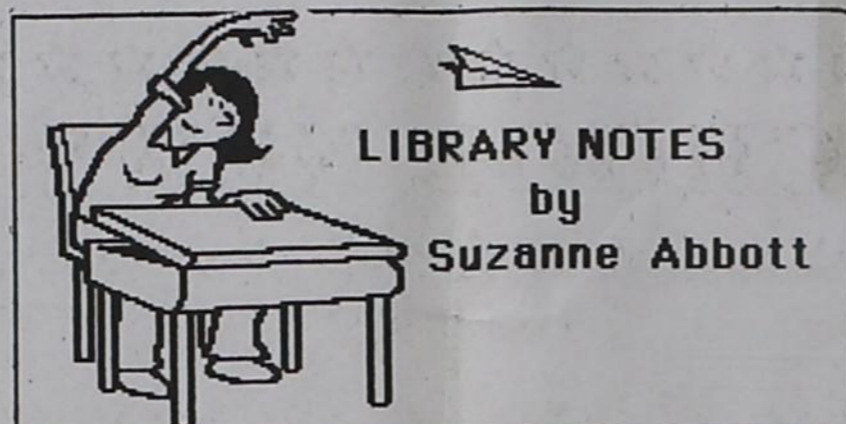

The library received a video from the University of North Texas at Denton. This video tells all about this university, and if you are interested in finding out what it has to offer, come by the library and check out the video.

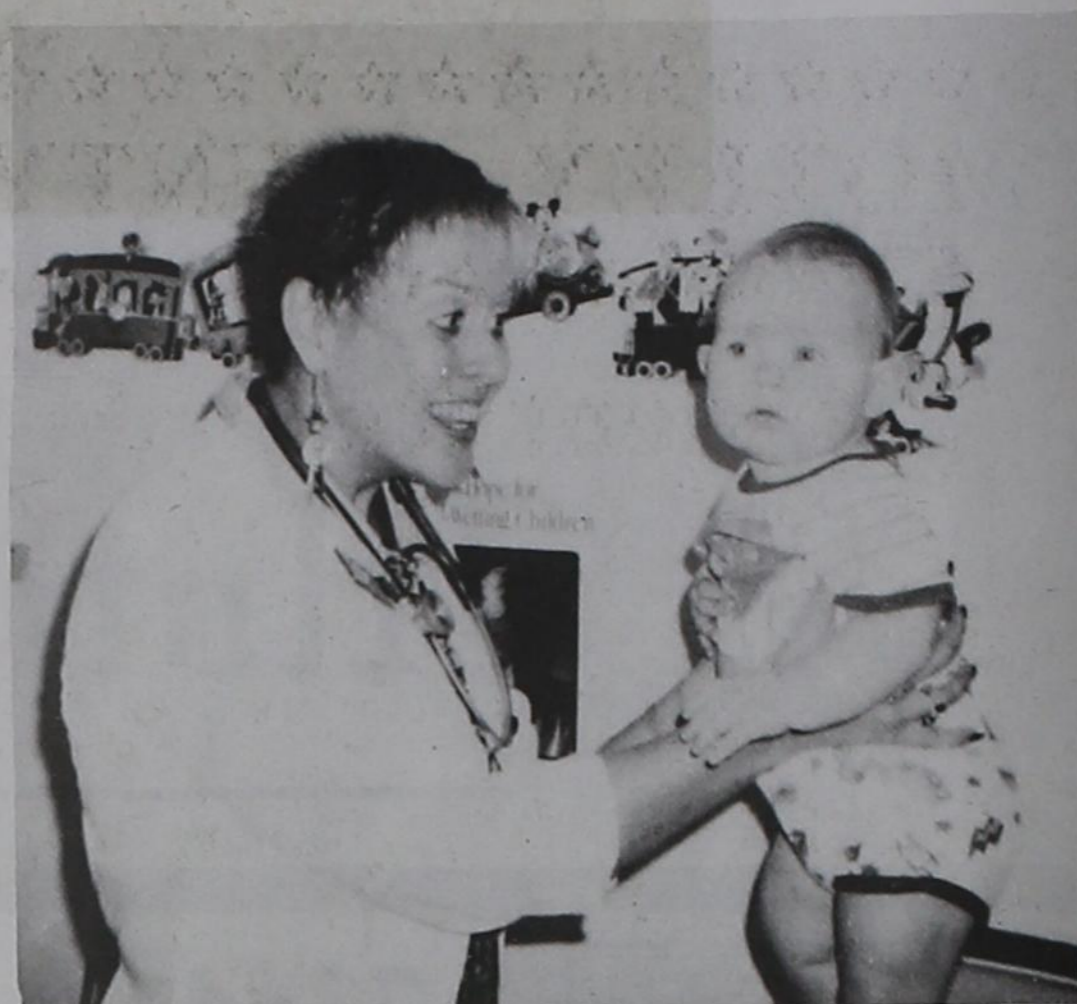

Home Economically Speaking

BUILDING A STRONG HOME BASED BUSINESS

A strong home based business is more than just a great idea. It takes support from family, personal traits, and resources to make the business successful. Consider these factors before you decide to start a business:

— Your business expertise. What skills and knowledge do you have that can be channeled into a business idea? What experiences in small business do you have? Can you determine the demand for your product or service? Are you able to keep accurate records? Have you ever written a business plan or marketing plan? You may want to consult with an agency that can help you complete these tasks or find someone to work with that can do these.

— Your personality. Are you the type of person who is self-motivated? Are you dedicated? Flexible? Decisive? If you have these characteristics you have a better chance of being a successful home business owner.

— Your home. To successfully operate a home based business out of your home, you will need adequate space, including space to produce or provide the service, display materials, meet with customers, and still have a family life. Is your family completely supportive? What arrangements do you have for answering the phone, pick-up and delivery, child care? How will work and family responsibilities be managed so that the business is seen by customers as a real business?

Thorough and thoughtful planning can ensure that your home based business can be more than just a good idea. Contact your county Extension office for more information on planning and managing a home based business.

You may have a great idea for a home based business. However, it's important to look beyond the inside of your house to determine if the business is a workable idea.

Know what the surrounding community support is for a business in the home. Zoning must be considered before you make the decision to start a home based business. Check with your deed restrictions for your home. Check with your city or town about local zoning regulations. Do zoning ordinances allow the type of business you want to run to operate in your neighborhood? If it is legal, what will your neighbors think? Will you increase noise in the neighborhood, need extra storage facilities on your property, or create additional traffic?

Once you establish that the business is legal, remember that you have to live with your neighbors. Will your relationship with neighbors change once you start a business? Will there be resistance to the idea? Maintaining a sense of community support may be important to the success of the business.

Many problems encountered by the home based business owner can be prevented if the correct information is obtained prior to starting the business. For more information contact your county Extension office.

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MOTLEY COUNTY SCHOOL NEWS

Student Records Policy

A student's records are private and are protected from unauthorized inspection or use.

By law, both parents, whether married, separated, or divorced, have access to the records of a student who is a minor or a dependent for tax purposes, as do students 18 years of age or older. A parent whose rights have been legally terminated will be denied access to the records if the school is given a copy of the court order terminating these rights.

The principal is custodian of all records for currently enrolled students at the assigned school. The superintendent is the custodian of all records for students who have withdrawn or graduated. Records may be reviewed during regular school hours. The records custodian or designee will respond to reasonable request for explanation and interpretation of the records.

Parents of a minor or of a student who is a dependent for tax purposes, the student, if 18 or older, and school officials with legitimate educational interests are the only persons who have general access to a student's records. School officials include employees, agents, or trustees of the District, cooperative, or contractual placement facilities, as well as their attorneys and consultants who are:

1. Working with the student
2. Considering disciplinary or academic actions, and the student's case, or a handicapped student's IEP
3. Compiling statistical data
4. Investigating or evaluating programs

Certain other officials from various governmental agencies may have limited access to the records.

The parent's or student's right of access to, and copies of, student records does not extend to all records. Materials that are not considered educational records, such as teachers' personal notes on a student that are shared only with a substitute teacher and records on ex-students, do not have to be made available to the parent or the students.

Students over 18 and parents of minor students may inspect the student's records and request correction if the records are inaccurate, misleading,

or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy or other rights. If the District refuses the request to amend the records, the requester has the right to a hearing and to place in the student's record a statement commenting on the information. Although improperly recorded grades may be challenged, parents and students are not allowed to contest a student's grade in a course through this process. Parents or students may complain to the superintendent if they feel that the District is not in compliance with the law regarding student records.

Parents may be denied copies of a student's records (1) after the student reaches age 18 and is no longer a dependent for tax purposes; (2) when the student is attending an institution of post-secondary education. If the student qualifies for free or reduced-

priced lunches and the parents are unable to view the records during regular school hours, upon written request of the parent, one copy of the record will be provided at no charge.

Certain information about District students is directory information and will be released to anyone who follows procedures for requesting it, unless the parent objects in writing to the principal within ten school days after the issuance of this handbook. Directory information includes: a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, awards received in school, most recent school attended, and other similar information.

NEW MEDICINE POLICY

The school policy addressing medicine at school has changed over the summer. Parents should be aware of the changes in this policy.

A student who must take prescription or non-prescription medicine during the school day must bring a

written request from his or her parent and the medicine, in its properly labeled container, to the school secretary. The secretary will either give the medicine at the proper times or give the student permission to take the medication as directed. **No medication of any kind will be kept by the student in his or her locker, classroom, or on his or her person without prior approval by the principal or his designee.**

Students will not be given any medication without the written request from the parent. Motley County Schools will not provide medication to any student.

Motley County TAAS Scores Acceptable To State

Motley County Schools have been given an Acceptable rating by the state. The school also received Recognized accreditation for the number of students taking and passing the college entrance examinations.

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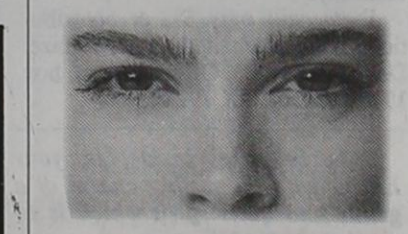

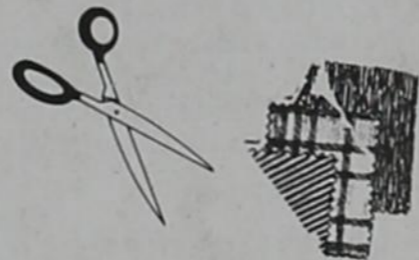
