FACTS ON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Domestic violence, now generating much attention in the United States, is a tragedy viewed from any perspective. The statistics are alarming but informative.

- About 6 percent of violence victims who reported to the National Crime Survey in 1990 were attacked by members of their own family -m somewhat less than two-thirds were simple assaults.

— Women are the most frequent victims of simple assaults, with divorced, separated and cohabiting anyone. women at greatest risk.

— Intra-family violence accounted for at least 18 percent of all homicides in 1990.

- Twenty-nine percent of the women murdered in the United states in 1992 were killed by a husband, ex-- husband or suitor. The type of person who is a batterer tends to become a n stalker after the breakup of the relawoman frequently concludes that her 2 situaton can become dangerous if she or tries to leave. Economic dependence desire to preserve the home, and cone cern about separation from the children may also add to the reasons for a woman's unwillingness to leave or to press charges.

 — Eighty percent of batterers were the sons of batterers who observed their fathers abusing their mothers.

— Almost four million American women were physically abused by their husbands or boyfriends in the last year

- Forty-two percent of murdered women are killed by their intimate male partners.

— The U.S. Department of Justice estimates that 95 percent of assaults on spouses or ex-spouses are committed by men against women.

— In a study of a major metropolitan hospital emergency department that had a protocol for domestic violence, the emergency department physician failed to obtain a psychosocial history, ask about abuse, or address the woman's safety in 92 percent of the domestic violence cases.

— One study showed that 30 pertionship, a situation in which the cent of women presented with injuries in a hospital emergency department were identified as having injuries caused by battering.

- Interventions in the form of incarceration of the offender in early stages, protective restraining orders and family counseling seem to be helpful in many cases.

— Data indicate that the batterers in upper income and educational groups respond to punishment after the first police call, and that psychiatric counseling is valuable to many at

Bleeding - Call EMS immediately for serious or spurting bleeding:

* Have the person lie down and wound to stop the bleeding. Maintain pressure until EMS arrives.

* Elevate the injured limb, but do not raise the person's feet higher than the head.

* Do not use tourniquets.

Broken Bones - Keep the injured possible by loosening clothing at neck, limb or area from moving and do not chest and waist. Keep the person warm move the person unless he or she is in immediate danger.

* Apply ice pack to minimize swel-

* If a broken bone protrudes through or pulse, begin CPR if you're trained. the skin, cover with a dry dressing but do not try to push it back in. If excessive bleeding occurs, use direct pressure over the area to stop the bleeding.

> Seizures - Protect the person from further injury by removing obstacles:

*Turn the person onto one side. * If a person has fallen or shows signs of head injury, do not move the person until EMS arrives.

* Do not force anything into the person's mouth.

* Do not try to restrain the person's movements during the seizure.



Evidence to prove a common-law marriage include a statement from each and a statement from a blood relative of each. If either of the parties are dead, then a statement from two blood relatives of the decendent are needed.

The statements required by the husband, wife and relatives must be made on special forms that are available in any Social Security office. bank records, insurance policies, etc. may also be required to show that the couple considered themselves husband and wife.

While Social Security follows state law, couples can be considered married under the "sojourn doctrine." The sojourn doctrine stipulates that if a couple travels as husband and wife and holds themselves out as such in a state which recognizes common-law marriage, a common-law marriage may arise under the law of the state they are visiting.


