



New Method of Killing Grasshoppers Is Found

PUTNAM, July 17. (AP)—A new method of poisoning grasshoppers is being advocated here by Robert McKinney, a cotton farmer, who says his method is not only more effective than any other he has tried, but less expensive. McKinney's formula is to mix one gallon with three table-spoonfuls of calcium arsenate, and mix thoroughly with it enough black strap molasses to sweeten. Afterwards he catches a few of the grasshoppers, kills them and saturates the molasses in the solution, then drops them on the ground at the edges of the fields. Hoppers immediately swarm to the dead ones to feed, taking in the poison. McKinney says that by using this formula he has not lost as much as a row of cotton, while others in the vicinity have lost entire fields.

TOAD IS RELEASED SAN ANTONIO, Texas, July 17. (AP)—One little horned frog was freed again this week, after he had been sent to Birmingham, Alabama during the recent craze for the little toads in the north and east. Lucas for release, and the postmaster, after turning the toad loose, predicted immediate recovery as soon as the gloomy little reptile realized that it was back in its native haunts.

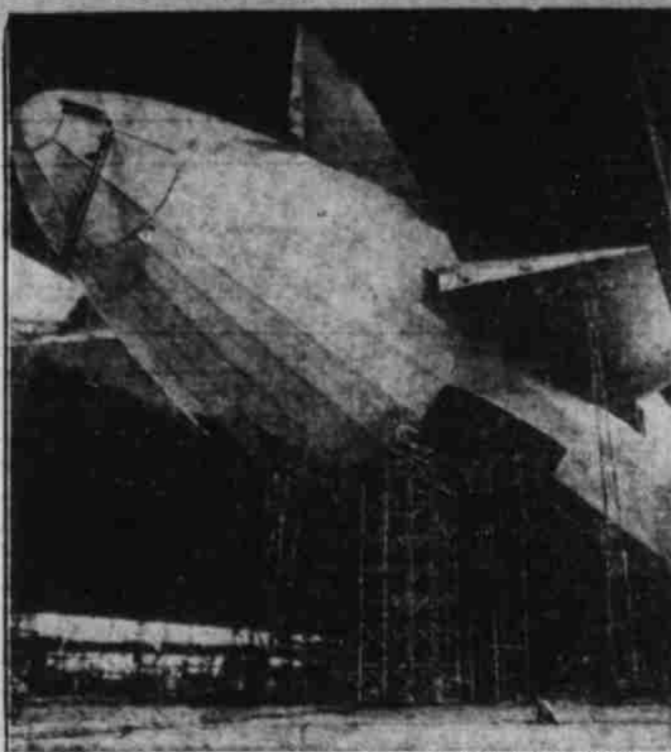
George Hill Trial Set For October 5

The statement of the experts was expected to end a contest over the plane's use for the hazardous journey. ASK REDUCED GAS RATES

PLAINVIEW, Texas, July 17. (AP)—Plainview's city council has asked the West Texas Gas company to submit its schedule of reduced rates, voluntarily announced recently, by July 20. The gas company announced that rates would be lowered, but the amount of the proposed reduction was not given out. Councilmen said they had promised the public lower rates before cold weather and are anxious to see the gas company's proposal.

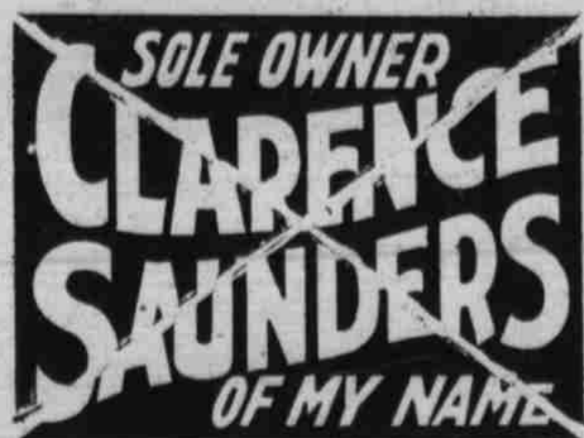

There is plenty of parking space on both sides of the building, which is located at the northeast corner of the high school block.

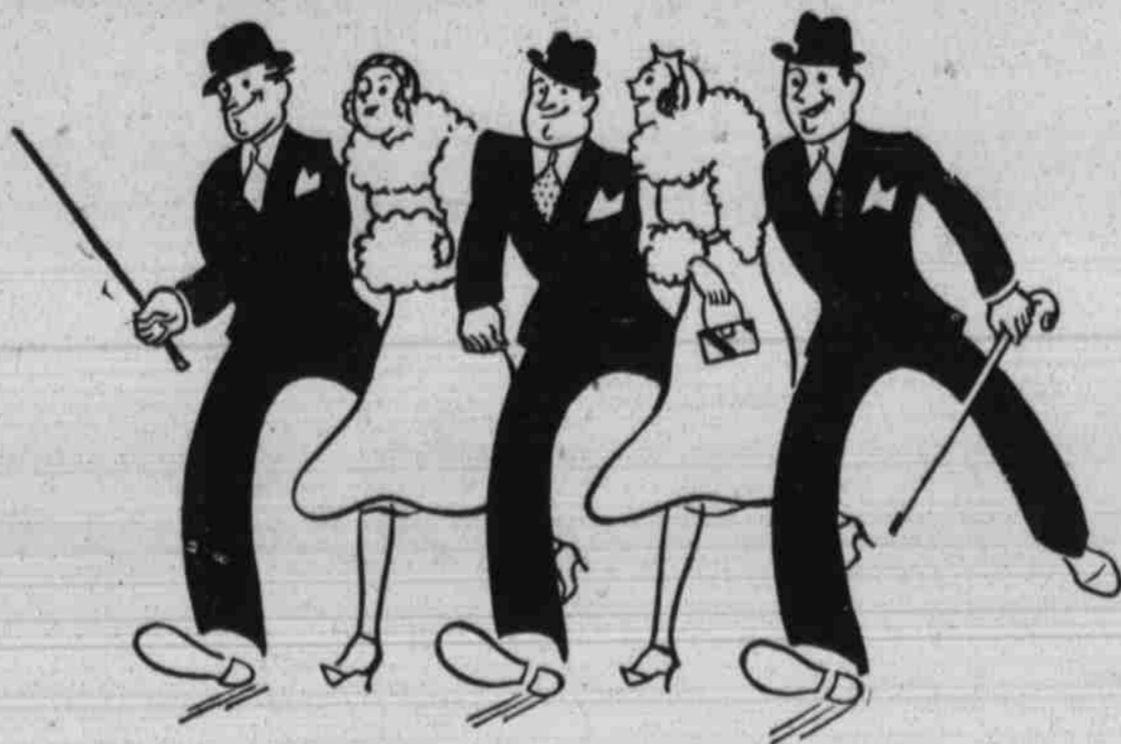

Next Move For Dave Goodwin Is Up To Sterling

AUSTIN, Texas, July 17 (AP)—The next move in the widely chronicled Dave Goodwin murder case is evidently up to Gov. Ross B. Sterling.

The pardon board recommended unconditionally that the Bowie county prisoner's death sentence be not commuted to life imprisonment.

Judge A. D. Martin, a member of the commission of appeals, since recalled, wrote that opinion. He said in part:

"All of appellant's charges in this brief are true, this case should not have been tried in Bowie county, but as the matter is presented, we are powerless to give him any relief. The question was raised by appellant for the first time after his conviction and clearly presents nothing for review by us without usurping authority which has been withheld from us by statute.

Morrow denied that the court was impotent to give relief when the record shows such as made it appear that the conviction was not upon a fair and impartial trial.

He stated the sheriff said there was no evidence of a mob at the trial and that the crowd was orderly. Testimony of the two witnesses on the hearing of the motion for new trial "in the main support the idea that either the trial judge or the jury was controlled by a mob," Judge Morrow said.

Godwin was alleged to have shot Lloyd Elliott, young hog rancher, in the back when Elliott came to Goodwin's place looking for a hog which Goodwin was alleged to have stolen from him. The killing occurred in February, 1929. Goodwin pleaded self-defense.

The pardon board read all the circumstances of the case and both appellate court opinions and then wrote:

"While it is true the board may consider any application for clemency made in behalf of the convicted and sentenced criminal irrespective of the verdict of the jury and the judgment of the court, the technicalities or the rigor of the law, yet it certainly should do this with open eyes to the facts and circumstances of the offense committed in order to determine whether or not there are equities appearing in behalf of the defendant.

"The board finds no equity in behalf of a murderer who after threats and with malice aforethought kills an unarmed victim and conceals the body."

District Attorney "Probably no man in the capitol is more interested in the outcome of the case than R. G. Waters, assistant attorney general, although he has taken no part in it lately. Waters was district attorney of Bowie county at the time and prosecuted Goodwin. He says he told his duty as he saw it.

J. A. R. Moseley, Jr. of Texasans, Goodwin's attorney, has indicated that he might go to federal court on the contention that his client had not been given a fair and impartial trial as guaranteed by the constitution.

After Goodwin was arrested he was spirited from town to town because of the fear of mob violence and was then brought back to Bowie county and tried quickly. Several visiting sheriffs were on hand at the trial.

Elliott had been killed. Goodwin and his brother "Bud" were alleged to have tied ropes around his neck and feet, with the other ends fastened to a pole behind, and to have carried the body to the Sulphur river, where it was found three days later.

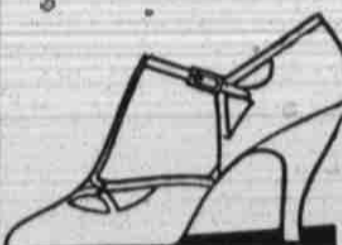

High Voltage Line Hums Prosperity In Tascosa, Texas

TASCOSA, Texas, July 17 (AP)—High tension transmission wires, carrying 66,000 volts of electricity, are humming a tune of new prosperity and better times for Tascosa.

For more than a generation, Tascosa, which was at one time the busiest and most colorful trading post in the Panhandle, has slumbered in the remembered glories of a better day. Its quietness was disturbed only by the clattering of

an occasional train on the Fort Worth and Denver line, machinery in one gravel pit, and activities of cowboys on neighboring ranches.

Its only buildings were a few adobe houses, fast crumbling under erosion. Its handful of inhabitants lived off fruit orchards and small farming plots, and "went to bed with the chickens" in contrast to old days when trail drivers and cowboys made "whoopee" all night, and the majority of the town's business establishments were saloons.

But today the little town is bidding for honors as the leading gravel shipping point in the south-west. Taking advantage of the power line built to the town by the Southwestern Public Service Company, gravel firms have established half a dozen huge pits, and they grind away day and night. There are 13 patrons of the power com-

pany, four of them ranches, but a majority of them industrial plants. The old courthouse, which has been moved half a mile north of town to become ranch headquarters for Julian C. Bivins, is now lighted with electricity.

The Denver railway recently completed the construction of a \$700,000 steel bridge across the Canadian river, replacing an old frame structure that was built during Tascosa's better days.

Only the famous Boot Hill cemetery remains undisturbed. When the power line was first constructed, workmen carelessly erected poles within the cemetery. But when C. S. McKaig, manager of the trespassing, he ordered the poles removed.

Panhandle road enthusiasts are seeking the designation of a highway from Amarillo to Dalhart by way of Tascosa, and probably the

rerouting of state highway No. 5 in that direction. Thousands of visitors each year travel the rough country highways to reach the historic old town. A hard-surfaced highway to replace the old cow trails would greatly increase the number.

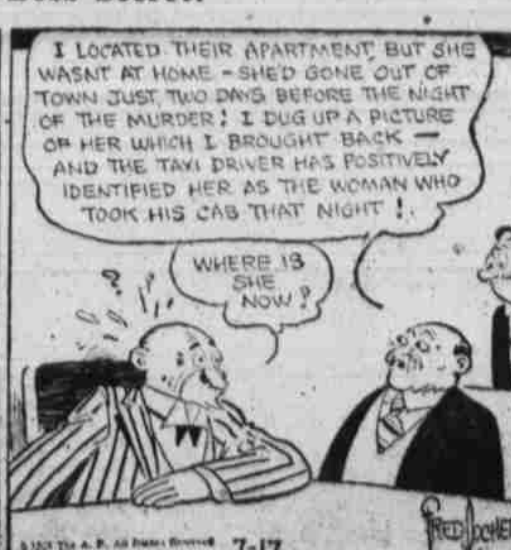

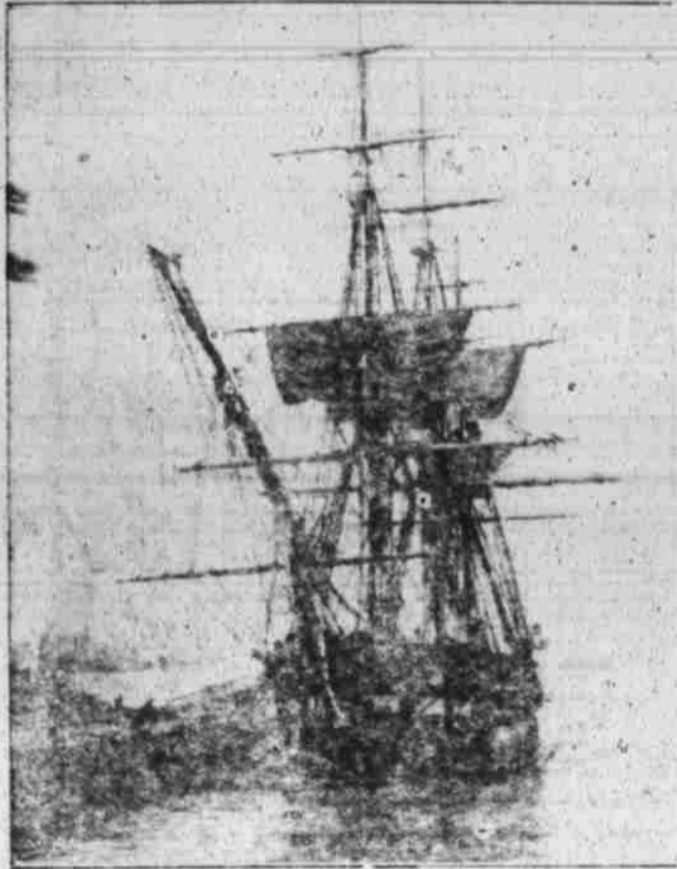

Even with a 15 per cent increase in freight rates they would earn under present traffic conditions an annual return of less than 4 per cent on the value of their properties. They are asking only for such an increase as is absolutely essential if they are to maintain their service and their credit. The 15 per cent advance in freight rates now sought by the railways in far less than the losses which the public will sustain, both now and in the future, if railway service breaks down and railway credit is destroyed.

Here is an excerpt from the report of the committee:

In brief, the railways must have higher revenues because their businesses have suffered such losses, both through the depression and through subsidized and unregulated competition on highways and waterways, that present earnings are not sufficiently high to maintain efficient railway service and railway credit. A freight rate increase is the only way in which the existing emergency can be speedily met. The railways are not now asking to obtain the fair return to which they are legally entitled.
