Betty wrote Kenneth Wyatt in her notes, but wrote Wyatt Earp on the copy she gave us.

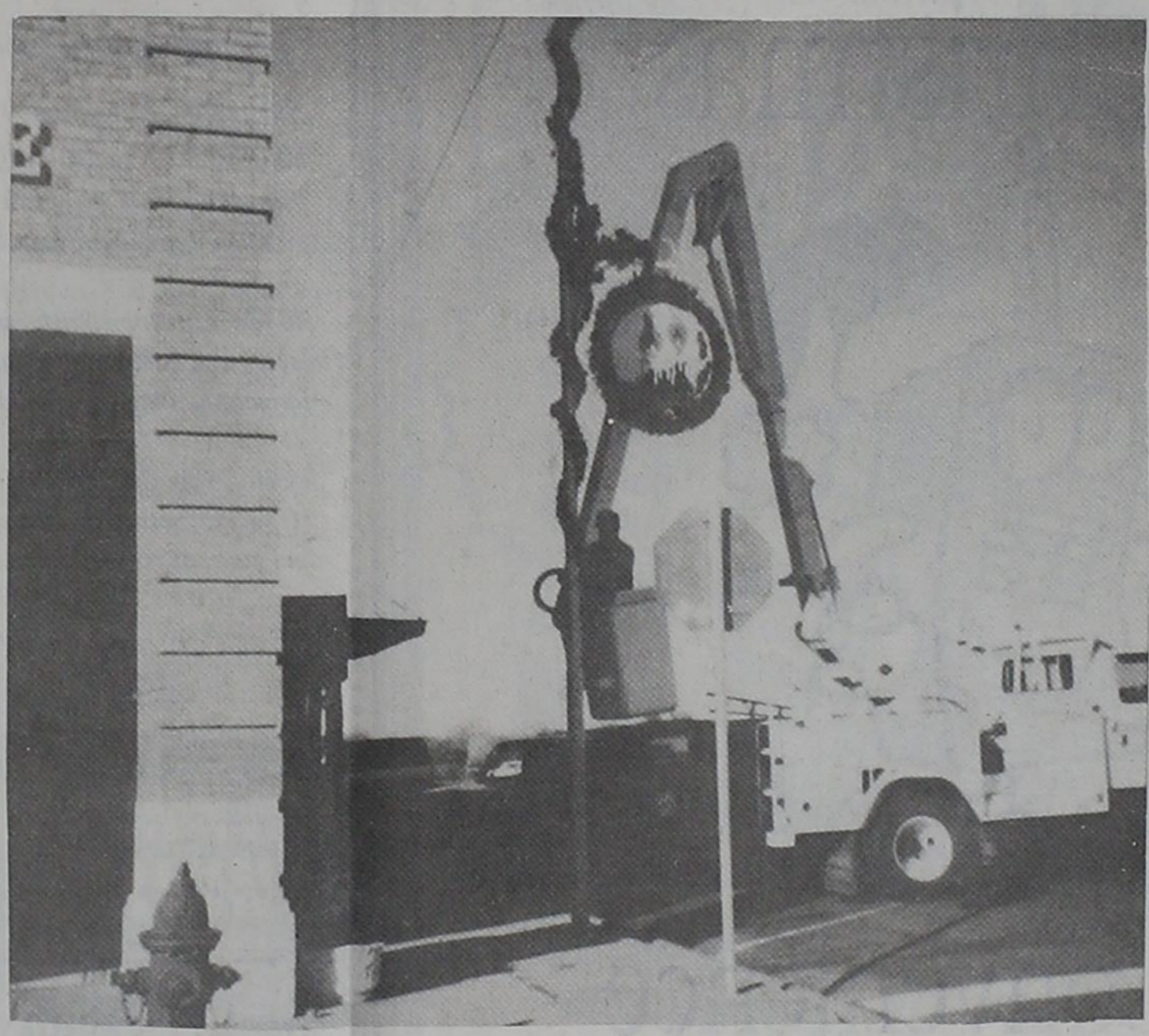
I wonder what Betty was thinking about when she wrote the wrong name.

Former Resident Has Narrow Escape After Being Pursued By Lakeview Man

Former resident and graduate of Motley County High School, Tanya Cummings Montgomery of the Lakeview area was involved in an accident Monday evening, November 27, at approximately 6:30 p.m.

Tanya, who is 8 1/2 months pregnant, and her 3 year old daughter were on their way home from Memphis when a man in another vehicle tried to run her off the road. She was forced to stop her car and the man ran to the child's side of the car and tried to open the door. Tanya took off and proceeded to drive toward her home outside of

Lakeview. Using her mobile phone, she called her father-in-law and told him what was going on.

Her father-in-law and brother-in-law, who were stripping cotton in a nearby field, immediately left to meet her.

The perpetrator began to hit the rear of Tanya's car again which caused her car to flip. Tanya and her daughter crawled out of the car window and took off running. By this time her father-in-law and brother-in-law arrived and captured the man and got Tanya and her daughter.

Neither Mrs. Montgomery or her little girl received serious injury, although labor was induced on Mrs. Montgomery because of stress.

At 7:35 p.m. Tuesday, November 28, Mrs. Montgomery gave birth to a baby boy, Paul Matthew Montgomery, weighing 7 pounds 2 1/2 ounces and 19 inches long.

Tanya is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ron Cummings, former Roaring Springs residents. Mr. Cummings was the former MC ISD superintendent. She is the sister of Mrs. Tina Brooks of Roaring Springs.

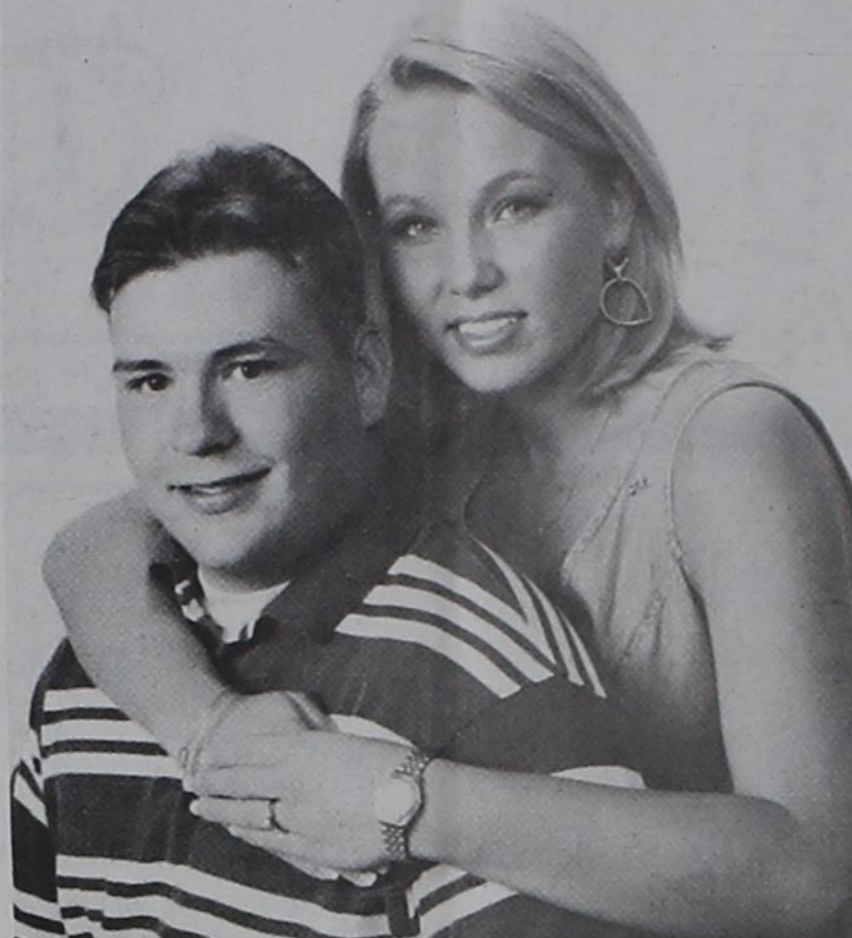

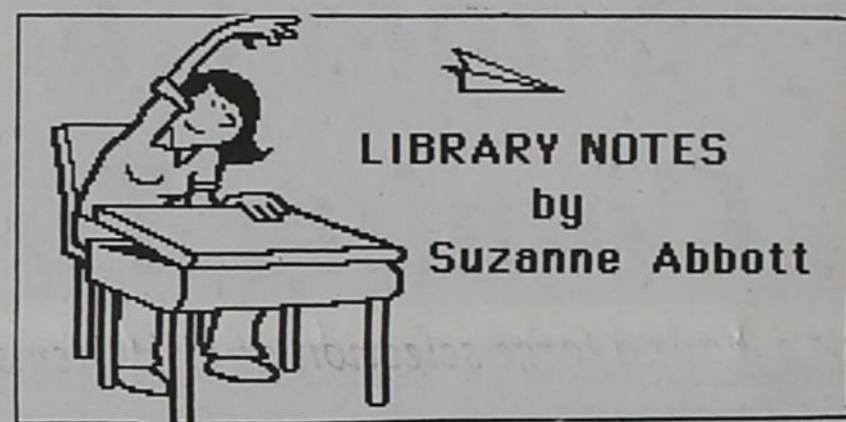
Joyce Meredith presided at the tea table.

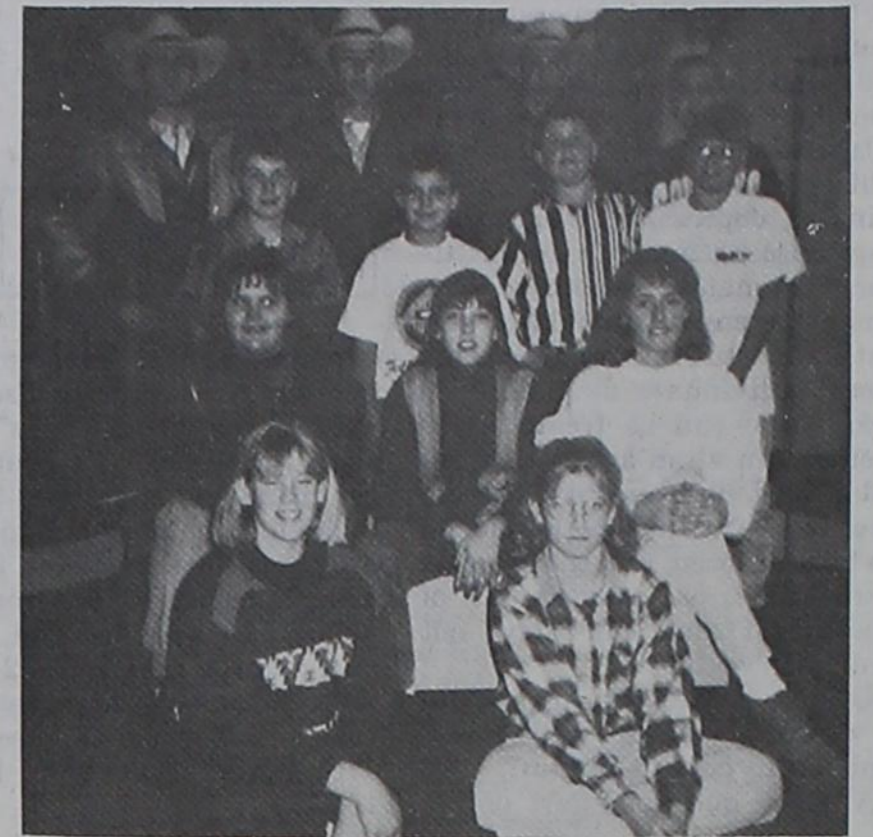

Q. What is hypothyroidism?
 A. Hypothyroidism is a common medical condition that affects from six to seven million Americans. It results from the failure of the thyroid gland to produce sufficient hormone for the proper functioning of cells. The symptoms, which can be subtle, include dry puffy skin, wrinkles, depression, weight gain despite a loss of appetite, and brittle hair. Fortunately, hypothyroidism can be diagnosed with a blood test that is almost 100 percent accurate. Those individuals diagnosed as hypothyroid can be treated with levothyroxin at an average cost of under ten dollars a month. Despite the ease with which hypothyroidism can be diagnosed, and the low cost of treatment, as many as half of hypothyroid Americans have not been diagnosed.

FINANCIAL HELP FOR CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES

A common concern among parents of children with disabilities is whether there will be enough money for their children if something happens to the parents. The Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) programs can do much to lessen this concern. These two programs can assure some economic security to disabled children of all ages.

Although there are differences between the programs, both pay monthly cash benefits to people with disabilities. And someone who receives Social Security or SSI is usually eligible for Medicare or Medicaid which can help pay the costs of health care expenses.

The Social Security program pays benefits to the children of retired or disabled people receiving Social Security benefits. Benefits also can be paid to children of workers who died. Any child under 18 may be eligible for benefits.

A child over 18 may receive benefits if he or she is disabled and the disability began in childhood - before the age of 22. Benefits can start at any age. For example, suppose Joe James, who has a 40-year-old developmen-

tally disabled son living with him, is planning to retire. Chances are Joe's son probably could collect benefits when Joe retires and probably could get benefits if Joe died or became disabled, too.

The SSI program is somewhat different from Social Security. It pays monthly benefits to people with disabilities who have limited income and resources. The age at which the disability started has no bearing. Disabled people of any age - young or old - can qualify for SSI benefits.

A disabled child under 18 who lives with his or her parents can qualify for SSI only if the income and resources of the parents are limited. However, once a child turns 18, the parents' income and resources no longer count. If the child has little income and few resources, he or she will likely qualify for SSI.

Sometimes children with disabilities who live in institutions could leave and live outside the institution if they had an income. Often, that needed income could come in the form of SSI.
