

#### FINANCIAL HELP FOR CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES

A common concern among parents of children with disabilities is whether there will be enough money for their disabled, too. children if something happens to the parents. The Social Security and Sup-plemental Security Income (SSI) programs can do much to lessen this concern. These two programs can assure some economic security to disabled children of all ages.

Although there are differences between the programs, both pay monthly cash benefits to people with disabilities. And someone who receives Social Security or SSI is usually eligible for Medicare or Medicaid which can help pay the costs of health care ex-

The SSI program is somewhat different from Social Security. It pays monthly benefits to people with disabilies who have limited income and resources. The age at which the disability started has no bearing. Disabled people of any age - young or old - can qualify for SSI benefits.

A disabled child under 18 who lives with his or her parents can qualify for SSI only if the income and resources of the parents are limited. However, once a child turns 18, the parents' income and resources no longer count. If the child has little income and few resources, he or she will likely qualify






