mold is a type of fungus that has "roots" that penetrate the food, a stalk that rises above the food, and spores that form at the ends of the stalks, giving the fuzzy growth. When a food shows discarded. mold you can see, you can bet that the roots have invaded and are under the surface. In some cases, the toxins throughout the food.

Following are guidelines for hanchance of mold growth in foods in your kitchen.

General guidelines are that you can save hard or firm foods that have only a minor mold problem. On hard cheese, cut off at least an inch around and below the mold growth. Don't let the knife touch the mold. However, if you notice mold growth on any cheese,





#### **TOP 10 THINGS WOMEN** SHOULD KNOW ABOUT SOCIAL SECURITY

Although Social Security coverage is the same for men and women, there are still things a woman should know about Social Security that can make a difference in how well she does under the program. Following are ten steps you should take to protect your Social Security coverage as a woman.

1. Be sure to change your name with Social Security.

If you marry, remember to change your name on your Social Security card if you use your married name at work. If you don't make the change, your earnings may not be properly credited to your Social Security record. This means that when you retire, or if you become disabled or die, the benefits for you or your family will be incorrect.

2. Watch your disability coverage.
