## Veteran Speaks for 'The Silent Majority'

A VETERAN of World War II, Furman Vinson, spoke Tuesday night for the "silent majority" mentioned recently by President Richard Nixon in a nationwide address. He was the speaker for a joint Veteran's Day program sponsored by the VFW and American Legion at the VFW Building.

The program had been designed to pay tribute to Motley County servicemen in Vietnam and those who have returned. The speaker was introduced by a lifelong friend, Luther Green.

Vinson declared that his would be considered a fighting talk on the "hawkish" side, as he admonished his listeners to get behind our President. "It makes no difference what your party affiliations may be," Vinson said, "this situation is beyond politics."

He called for the support of the people. He quoted from Stephen Decatur in 1816: "My country—may she ever be right, but right or wrong, my country." He traced briefly the history of the country to its present position and listed what is wrong with America to make it the greatest criminal nation in the world. "America is being used by too many people instead of being served by them," Vinson declared. He listed greed, dishonesty, drunkenness and immorality and the waning sense of patriotism.

He then listed the things that are right with America, including the many freedoms the right of children to obtain an education and a land where people can worship God without interference, and closed with repeating the quotation by Decatur.

Vinson received an enthusiastic ovation at the close of his address. The building was filled to almost capacity. Coffee and doughnuts were served later by the servicemen.

Leon Smallwood served as master of ceremonies and read a list of Vietnam servicemen. Invocation was by Rev. John Fitzgerald. Mrs. Charlie Johnson led the group in singing America, and Bill Pallmeyer led the Pledge of Allegiance. Benediction was by Rev. Larry Heard.

John Stotts, Commander of the VFW, and J. M. (Buzz) Thacker, Commander of the American Legion were recognized at the conclusion of the address.

Manuel Arenas died in combat in Vietnam in 1968 and his brother, Esequil was wounded in combat, and was later killed in an automobile accident in 1967 while stationed at Camp Pendleton, California.

If there are others from the county who have served in Vietnam, or are there now, their names are requested by the VFW for their records. "If we omitted any names from this list, it was certainly not intentional," Smallwood declared.

Mr. Whitworth, brother of J. R. (Randall) Whitworth of Matador, died Monday morning in Abilene where he and his wife were visiting her relatives. They had planned to visit in Matador on their return to Amarillo, where he had resided since 1935. He was a retired druggist and real estate agent. He died following a stroke which he suffered late Sunday.

Dr. Harry Vanderpool, pastor of Polk Street Methodist Church officiated and Masonic graveside rites were conducted in Llano Cemetery.

Mr. Whitworth was born July 30, 1897 at Flomot, Texas and was reared there and at Matador. He graduated from Matador High School in the class of 1919. He married Oretta Jane Cornelius on November 19, 1940, at Abilene and they continued residing in Amarillo, where she taught in the public schools system.

He was a member of Polk Street United Methodist Church, Masonic Lodge No. 1239 and Khiva Temple of the Shrine and was a past president of the Scottish Rite Association.

He is survived by his wife, brother, Randall, and a sister, Mrs. Vera Surles of Austin.

Mrs. Surles and her daughter, Mrs. William C. Gruver of San Antonio arrived here Tuesday night and accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Whitworth to Amarillo for the funeral. They were also accompanied by Mrs. Henry Ford.

The Homecoming game with the Hart Longhorns will begin at 7:30 on Burleson Field, following a barbecue supper in the American Legion building from 5:30 until 7:00.

## Rites Held for Pastor at Flomot

Funeral services for Rev. Jacob William Wells, 44, pastor of the Fairmont Baptist Church near Flomot, were held at 3 p.m. Monday in the Fairmont Baptist Church. Burial was in Flomot Memorial Park Cemetery under direction of Quitaque Funeral Home.

Officiating in the service were Rev. Roy B. Flippo, pastor of the Bethel Missionary Baptist Church, Rev. Ted Gammill, pastor of the Forest Hill Missionary Baptist Church and Rev. John McWilliams, pastor of the Calvary Missionary Baptist Church, all of Amarillo.

Rev. Wells was dead on arrival at the Lockney Hospital Thursday night after suffering an apparent heart attack.

He was born July 7, 1925 in Paris, Miss., and was ordained a Baptist minister in Tullia in 1960. Rev. Wells served two years in the Navy during World War II, and moved to Motley County from Amarillo in 1962.

Survivors include his wife, Verma, two daughters, Pamela and Karen, both of the home; two sons, Donald of the home and Joseph W., who is in the Navy and stationed aboard the SS Joubert; two sisters, two brothers and a half-sister.

## First Bale of 1969 Cotton is Ginned

FIRST BALE of 1969 cotton ginned in Motley County was processed at West Texas Gin here Friday morning (Nov. 7). The cotton was raised by Wayland and Glynard Moore on their farm located at the southeast edge of the Matador townsite, formerly known as the "Luckett Place."

It is the latest "first bale" ever recorded by the Tribune in over 35 years of publication. In the Nov. 14, 1963 issue the Tribune published a picture of crowded gin conditions and said the "ginning season was at its peak." On that date the county had ginned

8,511 bales and estimates were that 60% of the crop had been harvested. In 1962 the first bale was ginned Aug. 24. In the past the first bale was usually ginned about the time of Old Settlers Reunion.

Mr. Moore (Wayland) said the 2000 pounds of seed cotton produced a 550 pound bale of lint and 820 pounds of cottonseed. He said the variety was Northern Star 5 and was harvested from about five acres. He estimated his total yield as low, perhaps in the neighborhood of one-fourth bale per acre.

Because of the severe hail storms in the north and south parts of the county, the severe heat of the summer and delayed rains which continued over a long period, production in the county will be light. No estimates of the 1969 crop have been received by the Tribune.

The first bale was ginned free and purchased by the West Texas Gin at 40¢ per pound (current price for the grade of cotton was estimated at about 15¢ per lb.).

The West Texas Gin has since processed two additional bales (as of Tuesday) but grown by Alfred Barton.

## G. C. Mitchell Dies in Lubbock

Grover C. Mitchell, 78, former publisher and owner of the Motley County News, died at his home in Lubbock, early Wednesday.

Funeral services are pending at Franklin-Bartley Funeral Home. Mrs. Mitchell preceded her husband in death on Sept. 30, 1966. Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Howard Traweck (Eleanor) of Matador and Mrs. George Grasmick (Naomi) of 1004 S. Austin, Amarillo.

Mr. Mitchell published the newspaper here from 1926 until 1934, when it was combined with the Matador Tribune in a purchase by the present owner, Douglas Meador and a partner, Howard Hamilton.

## Tullia Crash Victim Native of Matador

Services were held Wednesday for two young Swisher County farmers killed Monday night in a pickup-truck collision just west of Tullia.

Services for Andrew Burrell Jones Jr., 27, were at 3 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church, Tullia, with the pastor, the Rev. James T. Carter, officiating. Burial was in the Rose Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Jones was born March 19, 1942 in Matador. His parents were then residing at Flomot. They have resided in Tullia since 1959. He married Judy Altman on Feb. 16, 1963 at Tullia.

He is survived by his wife, Judy; a son Travis Ross of the home; two brothers, Rex and Max, both of Tullia; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Burrell Jones Sr., of Tullia; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Jones and Mr. and Mrs. Dick Washington, all of Portales, N. M. and all former residents of Flomot. He was a great-grandson of the late Leonard Crowell of that community.

Also killed in the accident was Patrick Walter Timmons, 26, whose services were held at 4

Tullia. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery. He was born in Tullia and had lived there all his life. His survivors are his wife; two sons; his parents and two sisters. Highway patrolmen investigating (Continued on back page)

A chest, decorated with miscellaneous pieces of costume jewelry in a design originated by Mrs. Ware Fogerson of Silverton, won the second-place ribbon in the beadwork division of the hobbies show at the New Mexico State Fair, held in September. Mrs. Fogerson is the former Sylvia Day of Matador.

The jewelry chest was a Christmas gift last year, from Mrs. Fogerson to her daughter, Mrs. Jack Mayfield of Albuquerque. N. M., who entered it in the fair.

Mrs. Mayfield's decision to enter the jewelry chest in the State Fair was the result of the many compliments she has received on its beauty and originality. Mrs. Fogerson knew the chest was entered, but did not learn that it had been awarded a ribbon, until she read about it in the Briscoe County News.

The chest was beaded and decorated with pieces of jewelry which had belonged to Mrs. Mayfield, her mother, grandmother and an aunt.

Mrs. Mayfield wrote the Briscoe County News: "I did not know what division I should enter it in, but with the help of the women in charge of entries, we decided to put it in the Beadwork Division of the Hobbies Show. 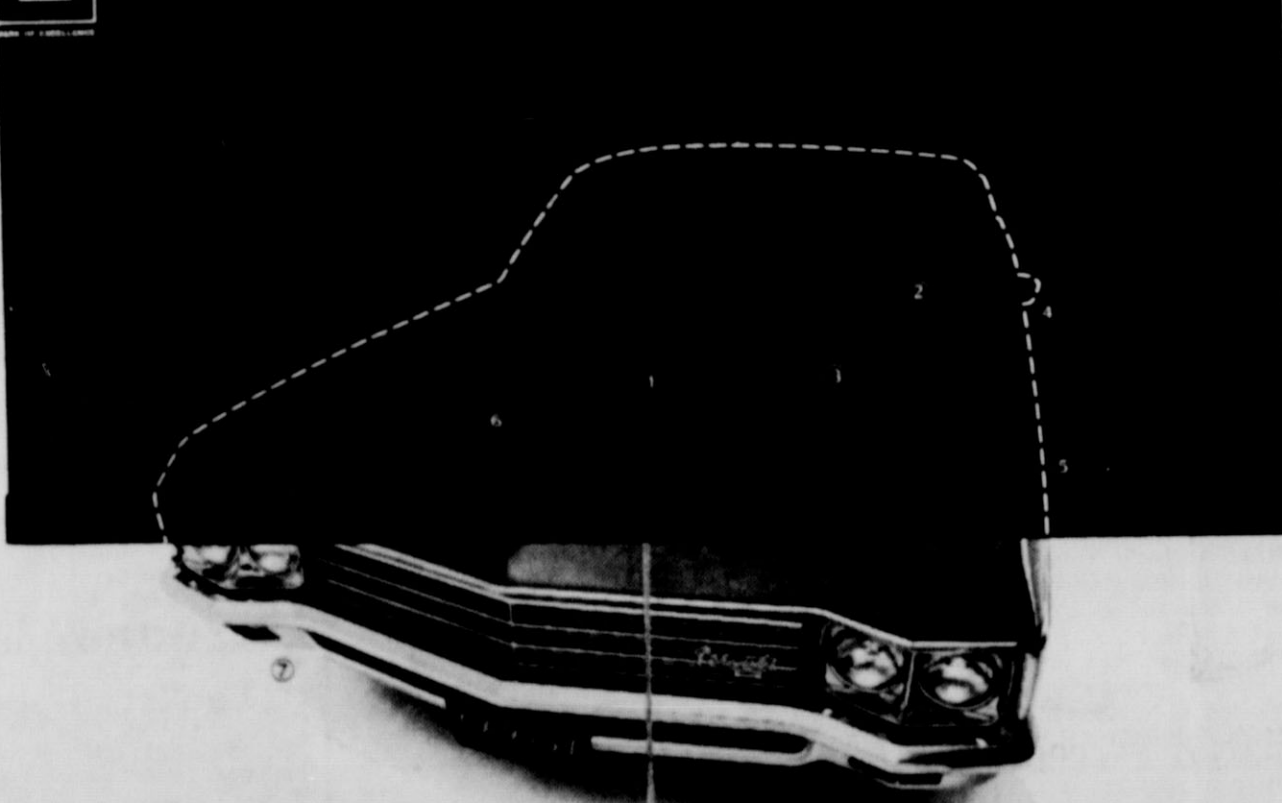

### ACCENT ON HEALTH

One of the most unwelcome guests in anyone's home is fire, but thousands of Texans are issuing invitations to disaster each year through carelessness, says the Texas State Department of Health.

In Texas last year, 462 deaths resulted from various types of fires and explosions. With winter coming on, homeowners and hunters should be especially cautious about their heating equipment.

Faulty gas connections can claim lives. Besides the danger of combustion from escaping gas,

improper adjustment of any fuel burning stove or heater can lead to the build-up of deadly carbon monoxide.

Eighty per cent of all fire deaths were caused by smoke inhalation and deadly fumes, the result of combustion. Carbon monoxide alone kills about 1,000 persons annually in the nation each year.

Gas furnaces and space heaters should be properly vented and periodically maintained for safety. Make sure vents have not become clogged during disuse. Sleeping with the bedroom window open at least a crack will help the circulation of fresh air.

Often objects near a stove will catch fire. Make sure furnaces, heaters and stoves, as well as flues and vents, are located well away from combustibles such as curtains, towel racks or bedding.

The most frequent victims of clothing fires are children. The next most frequent victims are elderly people. Clothing fires occur to children playing with

gasoline-powered mowers, edgers or other equipment. Make sure the fuel is stored properly in metal or plastic containers—not in glass bottles. Never store it near water heaters, since fumes from a leaking or spilled container can result in an explosion or fire. Many homes go up in flames each year from this type of fire.

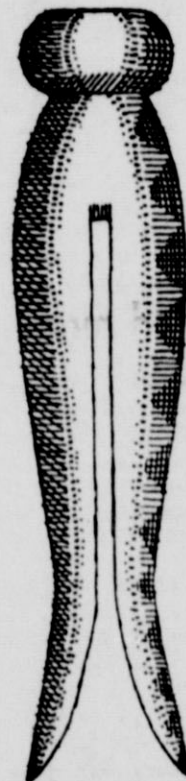
