"In many ways, this book is nothing less than a work of art," says Geney Spray Stan, Rosa Spray's oldest daughter who is an English instructor at San Juan College in Farmington, N.M. "Mother describes people, places, and events in a way that simply involves a reader, much as if he were reading a best selling novel.

"When she tells of huddling with her young husband and two sons in their small two-room house on 'Black Sunday,' in 1935, you are there with them. One of the more poignant sections describes how Jack and Rosa juggle to survive and support their young family on a total income of \$5 dollars a month during the dark days of the-Depression. A standing joke in that day when so many subsisted on pinto beans or black eye peas, she writes, was then whenever a Whiteflat resident had to go to a distant hospital and have a blood test made, the result was always the same: "All they found was black eye pea juice."

Spray, of Las Cruces, N.M., a retired White Sands, N.M. computer specialist, and his wife, Sylvia, took on the job of entering the work into a computer and publishing the book.

The second son of the Sprays was Melvin L. "Sleepy" Spray. He and his wife, Allie, were tragically killed in an auto accident in May of 1974.

All four surviving children were present when the book was presented to the Library Friday. These include Norman, Billy Jack, Geney, and Melba Ann Spray Rosser of The Colony, Texas. Also present were Sylvia, Billy

Jack's wife; Jonah J. Stan, one of Jack and Rosa's grandsons; and Wilma Faye Smith Hare, a niece now living in Clovis, N.M., and Cash Clifton her grandson.

Rosa's surviving descendants pre-sented a copy of the book to the Library in the belief that "it is too good not to share with the Motley County people who are a part of it and who understand mother's love for this country," Melba Rosser explained. "For us, it is a priceless heirloom. For anyone, it's an interesting book."

The book will be available for checkout or reading in the Library, said Suzanne Abbott, Librarian.



Home Economically Speaking

SETTING LIMITS FOR CHILDREN

Parents set rules and limits for their child's behavior to show they love and care for their child. Limits are like guard rails on a bridge. They provide protection and security for the child, as well as teach him to take responsibility

Setting limits requires being positive, firm, consistent and having realistic expectations. When parents set limits they:

— Teach children to avoid danger Help children to attain socially acceptable behavior (to have regard for others as well as for themselves)

- Put a sense of organization into a child's world

- Help themselves and their children know what to expect of each other

A few rules and limits that the child can understand are important to his security. While the two-year old can not be expected to stay away from the candy dish within reach, certain appropriate limits can be set, such as "only Daddy can give you candy", or "you may have grapes instead." As the parent removes the candy away from the child or the child away from the candy, briefly explain why this is not the best thing for the child, and distract him with the grapes, toy or activity.


Parents can deal with the toddler's natural defiance by making most decisions themselves. Begin to help them learn to make choices on food or clothing -- "Do you want apple juice or grape juice?," (not "What do you want to drink?") or "Do you want to wear this red shirt or this blue shirt?"

When setting rules or imposing limits, parents should try not to become trapped in a battle of wills. They may win the battle at the expense of the child's curiosity, enthusiasm, and selfesteem, or they may lose to a determined child's tantrums and negativism. When this new independence comes to the toddler, parents inevitably worry about spoiling. An independent one-year-old is not spoiled, but probably does not understand the rules or limits. Parents should select and impose as few limits as possible. These limits should be reasonable in relation to the child's age and ability, stated positively and imposed firmly and consistently.

Insecurity about the tasks of parenting and parental guilt can cause parents to have low expectations of their child. Children need well-defined and consistent limits. They forget easily and therefore need many repetitions or answers from their parents. Parents may become unrealistically patient and hesitant when they need to be firm. When rules are being established, the child's developmental level and his style need to be considered; the rules should be reasonable, protective, consistent and enforceable. Children will keep checking the limits until they are sure you really mean to keep them.
