Letters Home from Cross Cultural Solutions in Dharamsala, India by Stevie Welch, daughter of Steve Zabielski, granddaughter of Grace Laverne Tilson Zabielski

Hi Everyone!

My adventures here in India, as always, have been amazing. My latest journey has taken me into the realms of empowerment, self-discovery, and the incredible, yet cruel, beauty of nature.

In a country where nature and people are especially closely linked, the harsh realities of weather can be a brutal reminder of the forces of nature. Here, people and animals alike are exceptionally thin and work extremely hard for what they have. Many times, they are dependant on crops, and livestock for their income; hence, nothing is taken for granted, because it can be taken away in an instant if the weather changes.

This description of the way of life here in the foothills of the Indian Himalayas leads me into my description of my weekend camping trip into the mountains. This camping trip was a test of strength for me and my endurance, but while I endured a difficult trek for two days and one night, this is a way of life and livelihood for many people of this region. It gave me a much better appreciation for their hardships, lifestyle, and strength because I found it extremely difficult to do just a weekend trip!

We left on a Saturday mornthe taxi dropped us off at the point where the road was too treacherous to continue driving. We hiked for a couple of hours up steep paths, rocky slopes, and boulder fields. Eventually we made it to our first stop, Triund, and rested for a bit to have lunch and

Dharamsala was immaculate! With the early morning breeze and the clear view, I knew I was lucky to be able to appreciate this.

We continued on up the mountain, heading for the snow line of the middle range peaks of the Himalayas. This is where we were hoping to find the caves we were looking for and where we would camp. After hiking uphill for another couple hours, we stopped at a hut called the "Snowline Café" where the man that lived and worked there made us dal (lentils) and rice (our last hot meal until we got back to the home base the next evening). He offered for us to stay there but we where determined to find the caves.

We never found the caves. Instead, we crossed two ravines, one of which consisted of an 80 degree angle at which we had to rock climb the other side, and set up camp in a boulder field at the top. The view was spectacular! About 100 meters to the east of us, the slopes of the treeless, jagged, middle-range mountains jutted up into the sky. The western view was the sloping tree-covered foothills of the range. To the north was a steep drop-off where a deep ravine of snowmelt would flow in the spring, and the south of us was the path and ravines bilities in this area). ing at about 6:15 a.m. and we had just trekked across to get to this "campsite."

As the sun started setting, we had a fire going, but it was getting colder and colder by the minute. One guy that was camping with us came over from getting something out of his bag and says, "Umm, guys, I've got some bad news. some chai. The view over My stuff has a layer of frost on my view of this real-life plan-

it." At that point, we were all thinking the same thing, "We are not going to get any sleep tonight!" And that proved to be completely true!

The fire was no longer keeping me warm enough and I figured I would at least try to fall asleep. I snuggled inside my sleeping bag with my shoes as my pillow, my three pairs of wool socks, and layers upon layers of warm clothes on. To my dismay, sleep did not come to me that night. Instead, I shivered this November night away, and shockingly, my shoes were not a comfortable pillow!

It was eerily quiet where we camped. In the valley, were our home base is located, noise always fills the air. Whether it is dogs barking or fighting, car horns honking, fireworks going off, drums and trumpets sounding, or chanting coming from the distance, there is always some sort of commotion, even I the middle of the night. Here though, was silencecomplete and utter silence. The only noise was from each other moving in our sleeping bags. Still, I looked out of my bag where I was cocooned inside, every time I heard one of these noises, just to make sure it wasn't a bear, leopard, monkey, strange person, etc. (all of which were very real possi-


Because I did not sleep, I experienced the most surreal night I have ever had. I watched the moon glide across the sky and the constellations were the most brilliant I have ever seen in my life. The Milky Way was vibrantly spread across the sky. There wasn't a cloud in sight, so

etarium wasn't inhibited at all. I watched the moon rise over the peaks and, as I shivered the night away, it was my time-clock counting down until the time when the sun would rise and warmth would come again. Because I was not sleeping, I saw the first orange light coming from the rising sun, peaking his head over the valley. While, this was just the beginning, and warmth was still a couple of hours away, it provided hope and I could relate to the ancient cultures that worshipped the sun for its life-giving qualities.

Being in such a vulnerable situation where I couldn't control my environment around me by flicking a switch to provide light whenever I wanted it, or turning on the heat in my house when I was cold, made me appreciate the natural rhythms of the environment. I realized why people who relied so closely on its properties deified them and made them into gods in the past to honor them. While Hinduism has only three main gods, Brahma, Vishnu and Shiva, the natural world around them have been deified as incarnates of these main gods. I can now value this belief system even more because of this experience.

The utter exhaustion I experience, from hiking for miles, and getting no sleep, was just another reminder of the luxury that I live in and makes me appreciate all that I have even more.





November 26th - FSA office closed for Thanksgiving

December 1st-Deadline for buying 2010 NAP COVER-AGE for all types of Grasses. At the time you purchase NAP, you will also need to certify grass acreage at that time. Please remember you must have NAP coverage in order to be eligible for any Livestock Disaster Programs.

2010 Wheat Acreage Certification-if you purchased NAP coverage on Wheat for Grazing, you will need to certify 15 days prior to turning cattle on those fields. Please make an appointment as soon as possible. If you do not purchase NAP coverage on grazing crops, you will be ineligible for Livestock Disaster Pro-


Producers are now eligible to sign up for 2010 DCP/ ACRE program. If you desire to sign a contract for 2010, please make an appointment

with the office. We are asking that you bring all cash leases that are applicable to your farming operation. We may have some on file, but please bring all of them in so that we can double check that everything is on file. Remember, all cash leases must be signed by all owners.

Please bring in all 2009 Sorghum production if you had NAP insurance on it. We need a weigh ticket with an average weight, number of bales, producer's name, and crop year included on this weigh ticket. It also needs signed by the producer. This is crucial to calculating yearly APH's and if applicable a faster payment can be made to you. If you did not mechanically harvest or totally graze the crop out, please let us know ASAP as this will require an adjuster to come out and we need to know this as soon as possible.

All producer's will be required to fill out a new 926, "Average Adjusted Gross Income" certification for 2010.

"Motley County had a tough first-round matchup against nizing the student-athletes at




