New Storm Leaves Snow

White Blanket 5 Inches Here

FIRST severe storm of the winter left a snow blanket of as much as seven inches in the Texas Panhandle and New Mexico Sunday and Monday. The fall here was measured at five inches by pharmacist Bob Stanley, with a moisture content of 40-inch.

Drifts of snow as much as six feet were reported in some areas of the Foothill Country. Strong, bitter winds accompanied the storm. Streets here were kept open by city, county and state equipment, with large "windrows" still remaining in the business area.

Highways in the Panhandle remained open but extremely dangerous during the storm. Traffic moved slowly in all directions from Matador. Some bus schedules were cancelled here Monday.

While the severe weather has caused extra work for cattlemen, the moisture is welcomed by farmers and ranchers with wheat and rye pastures.

Skies were clear Tuesday morning as the storm moved to the southeast. Low temperatures have followed in the Panhandle Plains areas. Lubbock reported a low of 17 degrees Tuesday night and colder weather was reported in the north Panhandle, as several stations registered three degrees.

Clear, cold weather is expected today according to forecasts, but another storm is headed in this general direction.

Northfield Youth is Victim in Accident

TRAGEDY on the highway two miles east of Northfield near midnight Tuesday, Dec. 23 took the life of Ronnie Elliott, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Elliott, and left a wake of grief in the course of the Christmas holidays. The popular Matador High School freshman was believed killed instantly when the pickup truck he was driving went out of control at a sharp curve, on FM 94, overturned and skidded 267 feet, according to officers investigating the accident.

A passenger, Steve D. Smith, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clifton Smith of Childress, was treated at Childress General Hospital and dismissed, according to the Department of Public Safety.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church in Childress, and burial was made in the Northfield Cemetery. Members of the Matador Matadors football team served as pallbearers and honorary pallbearers.

Ronnie Harold Elliott was born at Childress, March 17, 1955, and made his home in Northfield, attending school in Matador. Survivors include his parents and two brothers, Randall and Richard, both of the home; three sisters, Cheryl and Linda, both of the home, and Mrs. Marcel Weir of Childress; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Elliott and Mr. and Mrs. O. E. Lankford, all of Childress; and a great-grandmother, Mrs. Tina Lankford of Azuca, California.

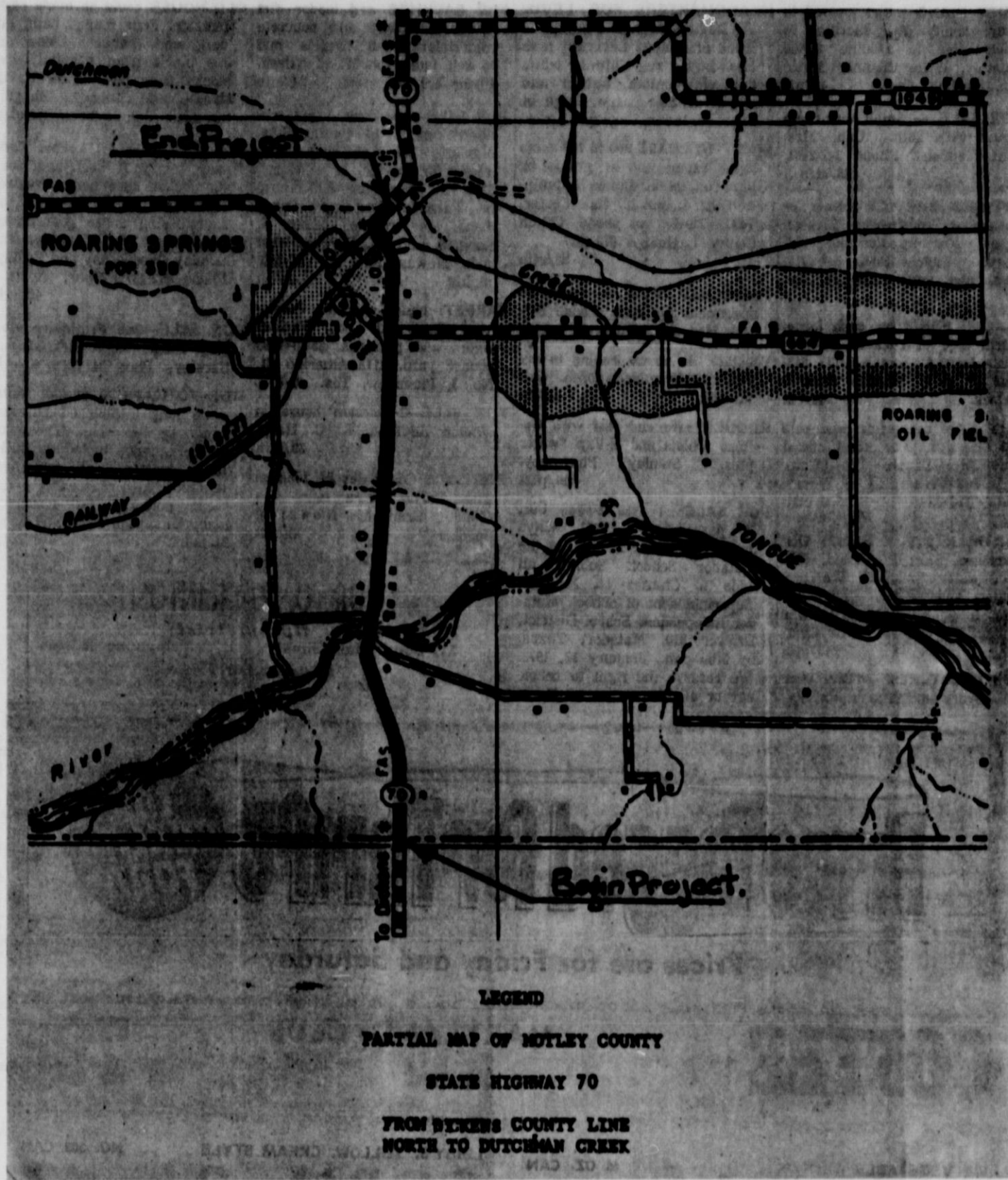

NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING COMBINED CORRIDOR AND DESIGN MOTLEY COUNTY

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of State Highway 70, from the Dickens County Line North to Dutchman Creek. The proposed highway project will pass through the town of Roaring Springs, in Motley County.

The proposed design will provide two (2) 13-foot lanes and paved shoulders with climbing lanes being provided where conditions warrant. Two intersections with other highways will be re-designed to improve safety. The present bridge over the South Pease River is 22 feet in width and will be replaced with a 44-foot structure. In most instances the right of way width on this proposed project will be 150 feet, with additional right of way being required where climbing lanes or turning lanes are provided.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's office at Matador, Texas. Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file in the office of the County Judge of Motley County, and the City of Roaring Springs.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Texas Highway Department District Office, P. O. Box 909, Childress, Texas, 79201.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic, and environmental effects of the proposed design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the office of the Resident Engineer, Matador, Texas, or to Mr. V. J. McGee, District Engineer, Childress, Texas, on or before January 22nd, 1970.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

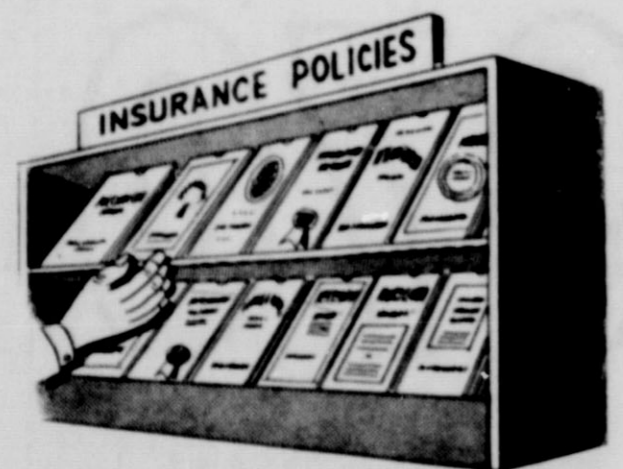
